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#### **BOARD OF TRANSPORTATION MEETING**

May 5-6, 2021

As part of the Act to Provide Aid to North Carolinians In Response to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Crisis, (S.L. 2020-3, SB 704) the General Assembly enacted modifications to the laws governing public bodies. The provisions are in Section 4.31 of the Act.

The May 5-6, 2021 Board of Transportation meeting is considered a hybrid meeting with members participating in person and via Microsoft Teams. The meeting was a hybrid due to the restrictions in place pertaining to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Chairman stated that since a portion of the board meeting is being conducted using simultaneous communication the meeting will continue compliance with General Statute §166A-19.24. The Honorable Michael Morgan conducted the swearing in ceremony of Chuck McGrady serving as state-wide, at-large member, Andy Wells serving as a state-wide, at-large member, Stephen Rosenburgh serving as a state-wide, at-large member, Melvin Mitchell serving as the representative of Division 4 and Brad Lail serving as the representative of Division 12.

Vice-Chairman Perkins thanked the Honorable Michael Morgan for administering the oaths and congratulated the incoming members on their official appointment to the Board of Transportation.

#### Call to Order

Vice-Chairman Perkins called the meeting of the Board of Transportation to order at 9:23 a.m. on Thursday, May 6, 2021.

# Approval – April 7-8, 2021 Meeting Minutes

Vice-Chairman Perkins stated that both the open and closed session meeting minutes from the April 7-8 meeting were distributed for review prior to the meeting. Vice-Chairman Perkins stated if there are no additions or corrections, he would accept a motion to approve the April 7-8, 2021 open and closed meeting minutes of the Board of Transportation. A motion was made by Board Member Tarleton and a second by Board Member Zimmer.

Vice-Chairman Perkins stated the motion passed.

### Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Honorary Designations

Board Member Mitchell presented a resolution naming S 70 Bypass (Future Interstate 42) from US 13 (North Berkeley Boulevard) to SR 1719 (North Beston Road) as the Chuck Allen Highway. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Mitchell and seconded by Board Member Clarke. Vice-Chairman Perkins stated the motion passed.

Tim Little, former NCDOT chief engineer, came forward on behalf of the Allen family. Mr. Little shared experiences from his time in division four that spoke to the solid character, integrity, and devotion to Goldsboro tirelessly demonstrated by Mayor Chuck Allen. Mr. Little read comments from the Allen family provided in appreciation of the Chuck Allen Highway naming.

Board Member Mitchell presented a resolution naming the bridge on Sunset Avenue crossing Wesleyan Boulevard in Rocky Mount the Gus H Tulloss Bridge. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Mitchell and seconded by Board Member Clarke. Vice-Chairman Perkins stated the motion passed.

Gus Tulloss, former longtime board member, came forward and thanked the Board and the committee for considering him for the bridge naming. Mr. Tulloss shared a history of accomplishments in division four during his longstanding board tenure with the audience, he shared the importance of the division four staff and the commended their dedication and hard work through the years. He introduced and thanked his family and friends for coming to the Board meeting and being a part of this special day.

Mr. Kevin Lacy, State Traffic Engineer, came forward and presented Mr. Tulloss with a custom sign prepared for him by NCDOT staff. The custom sign was made in honor of Mr. Tulloss' impeccable attire, good sense of humor and outstanding service to the NCDOT and Board of Transportation.

Mr. Tulloss was also presented the Road Gang Award for his position on the Board of Transportation and his service to the State of North Carolina.

#### **Secretary Remarks**

Secretary Boyette welcomed members of the Board, staff, and those listening to the livestream. He shared it was great to see everyone who could make it in-person to the meeting.

#### **Roadside Litter Collection**

Secretary Boyette shared details on the department's roadside litter collection with the Board. He stated the department has done a lot over the last few months to clean up roadsides across the state. NCDOT crews, contractors and volunteers have picked up over 5.4 million lbs. of litter statewide. He shared the spring litter sweep was from April 10-24. Through that time over 1.4 million pounds were picked up in the two-week period. He shared the department has begun partnering with athletic institutions across the state to create anti-litter messages. The department's current partners include UNC Chapel Hill, NC Wesleyan College, UNC Pembroke, Fayetteville State University, Kannapolis Cannon Ballers, CLT Knights and the Durham Bulls.

Secretary Boyette encouraged everyone to volunteer and get involved. He encouraged all to please visit, ncot.gov and search "litter management" for more information.

## **CASSI at Wright Brothers**

Secretary Boyette shared details on the CASSI with the Board. He mentioned the National Park Service and NCDOT launched the first-of-its-kind electric, self-driving public transit shuttle at the Wright Brothers National Memorial. The Connected Autonomous Shuttle Supporting Innovation, or CASSI, will remain at that location for a three-month trial program. He shared this will mark the first trial of a self-driving vehicle at a recreational public lands site in the country. NCDOT and the National Park Service hope that testing the shuttle at a national park will help them learn more about how driverless vehicles can safely and effectively be used in the future.

#### **FRC East Satellite**

Secretary Boyette shared updates on the Fleet Readiness Center (FRC) East with the Board. He shared the Fleet Readiness Center (FRC) East announced the opening of a new satellite facility at the Global TransPark in Kinston. He mentioned the FRC is North Carolina's largest aviation maintenance, repair, and overhaul service. He stated the FRC is moving their Air Force UH-1 "Huey" helicopter line to GTP and this will allow more space for other operations at their Cherry Point facility. FRC East will employ more than 4,000 North Carolinians with an average salary of \$72,000.

## **Turnpike Milestone**

Secretary Boyette shared a video on the NC Quick Pass milestone. In the video Customer Service Manager, Angela Queenland, shared that the NC Quick Pass now serves over 100 million transponders customers throughout the state. Since opening in 2011 they have opened three new locations and have reduced transponder prices for customers. Angela thanked the State of North Carolina for trusting Quick Pass for over the last 10 years. Secretary Boyette encouraged everyone to visit ncquickpass.com to learn more about the benefits of NC Toll Roads and registering for an NC Quick Pass Transponder Account.

#### **Charlotte Gateway Station**

Secretary Boyette shared the Charlotte Gateway station update with the Board. Secretary Boyette shared the department's Rail Division is leading Phase 1 of the planning, design, and construction of Charlotte's future multimodal train station. He mentioned phase 1 is targeted for completion in 2023. To date, the canopy foundations and several bridges that will support the railroad tracks are nearly finished. Other work is progressing on the platform, concourse wall, and the station baggage ramps. The City of Charlotte is leading Phase 2 with developer Gateway Partners. This will help with the large mixed-use development and station.

## **CCX Intermodal Terminal Update**

Secretary Boyette shared the CCX intermodal terminal update with the Board. Secretary Boyette shared Edgecombe County has a new 330-acre Carolina Connector site which will allow trucks to bring cargo containers to a rail yard where they will be transferred to trains for transport. This facility will serve many industries with efficient access to rail and help get products to customers and spur growth in the region. Crews from overseas finally received visas (COVID delay) to travel and assemble the cranes. The large electric wide span cranes are now stood up and are completed as of May 3. Secretary Boyette shared he anticipates that the CCX will be the center of domestic freight for the regions in North Carolina, Virginia, and South Carolina. This will bring good paying jobs to our rural areas and connect the region to both domestic and international markets.

#### **NC Ports Update**

Secretary Boyette shared the NC Ports update with the Board. Secretary Boyette mentioned the NC Ports is celebrating a record-setting month in March at the Port of Wilmington. During the month of March crews were able to beat pervious records that were held. Some of the records that were beat were:

- Most containers (throughput) 18,782 moves. Previous record of 17,114 (March 2018)
- Most refrigerated containers moves 1,686 moves. Previous record 1,459 (April 2020)
- Most rail moves (QCE) 989 moves. Previous record 784 (August 2020)

Secretary Boyette stated the NC Ports is also on track to launch Phase 1 of the newly upgraded Terminal Operating System in June. He shared this is a major IT undertaking that he is glad to see moving forward.

#### I-26 Update

Secretary Boyette shared photos of the I-26 widening project. He mentioned both sides (Buncombe/Henderson Counties) have utilized an Integrated Corridor Management system to close one direction of I-26 at night. The ICM allows crews to perform operations in one week that would normally take two to three weeks under rolling roadblocks, saving time and money. Most of the work this spring is geared towards shifting all traffic onto eastbound lanes later this year.

## I-40 Recycling

Secretary Boyette acknowledged what a great job the department's communications team did highlighting and recognizing the I-40 Widening Project in Wake/Johnson Counties for Earth Day. The video showed highlights on how the department is using recycled concrete from demolished ramps and reusing as a base under the new roadway.

#### **Census Recognition**

Secretary Boyette shared an update on the U.S. Census Recognition with the Board. Secretary Boyette shared he received an award from the U.S. Census Bureau for department's efforts in helping, promoting, and supporting in the 2020 Census process. He thanked all the department's units who helped to get the message out. He shared participation in the Census helps ensure our organization is represented to support the department's operations.

#### Other Recognition

Secretary Boyette shared other recognitions with the Board. Secretary Boyette shared it was State Employee Recognition Week at the department. He also mentioned the department celebrated State Employee Appreciation Day as well. He shared the organization has plenty to recognize and appreciate. He mentioned having worked at DOT for years his self, he knows the many amazing things employees do that not everyone even realizes are in view. He mentioned the pandemic has brought on challenges the organization could have never expected. Yet our employees found a new way to creatively answer to the challenges and have not missed a step. Secretary Boyette shared he wanted to say how amazing this is and how proud he is of the department's hard work and dedication in serving our state.

THE REMAINING PROJECTS WERE AWARDED BY THE SECRETARY TO THE LOW BIDDER.

#### AS A MATTER OF INFORMATION

AT THE APRIL 8, 2021 BOARD MEETING, ACTION WAS DELAYED ON THE MULTI-COUNTY BROADBAND FIBER INSTALLATION PROJECT TO ALLOW ADDITIONAL TIME FOR INTERNAL STAFF REVIEW (SEE MARCH 29, 2021 CENTRAL LETTING ITEM C, PAGES 1 OF 2 AND 2 OF 2). ANY LOW BIDDER IRREGULARITIES NOTED ON THE ITEM C DO NOT AFFECT THE VALIDITY OF THE CONTRACT. ON APRIL 28, 2021, STAFF RECOMMENDED AWARD TO THE LOW BIDDER. THE PROJECT WAS SUBSEQUENTLY AWARDED BY THE SECRETARY.

Vice-Chairman Perkins asked members of the Board to announce any recusals to the action items within the presented project items. Recusals made by members of the Board on project items are noted below.

On August 13, 2020 the Board of Transportation approved an allocation of Maintenance funds in accordance with Session Law 2020-91 and additional General Maintenance Reserve funding specifically for non-declared emergency expenditures made available per Senate Bill 356, Session Law 2019-251 totaling \$1,581,429,325.

With the creation of a new G/L account under General Maintenance Reserve specifically for non-declared emergencies, the Board approved a \$93,731,212 redistribution of General Maintenance Reserve in October 2020. An additional cashflow of Roadside Environmental, Contract Resurfacing, and Bridge Preservation funds totaling \$215,000,000 was approved in February 2021.

Staff recommends cash flowing an additional \$68,500,000 as detailed below to expand contractual and force account spending capacity, along with a redistribution of Pavement Preservation funds, bringing the total allocation to \$1,864,929,325. Additional details can be found in Tables 2 through 4 on pages S-3 through S-5.

There are no Comprehensive Transportation Plans to be presented for approval at the May 6, 2021 Board of Transportation Meeting.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BOARD OF TRANSPORTATION

There will be no Item V for the May 6, 2021 Board of Transportation meeting.

#### **Committee Reports**

Committee reports are developed by staff committee contacts of each respective committee and provided to BOT committee chairs for distribution to the full board during the committee updates.

Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Committee – Committee Vice-Chair Perkins provided a summary of the committee's meeting topics that included the committee approving one highway honorary designation request for Chuck Allen Highway to bring forward to the full board on May 6. The committee also approved two bridge naming and one highway honorary designation requests to bring forward to the full board in June. The Chief Donald M Gray Bridge, Senator Steve Goss Highway, and Judy West Brooks and C. Wade Brooks Bridge.

**Finance Committee** – Committee Chair Lathrop provided a summary of the committee's meeting topics that included Legislative Remarks, Revenue Update, and the Financial and Spend Plan Update.

Senator Mike Woodard, Senator Tom McInnis and Senator Vickie Sawyer gave Legislative remarks to the committee. They urged the Board to provide comprehensive oversight to ensure the department is a good steward of taxpayers' funds and stressed the fiduciary responsibilities given to them. The Senators expressed the desire to explore different ways to generate revenue and establish transportation funding for the future of NC.

Mr. Burt Tasaico gave a Revenue Update. He presented the comparison of the Total State Revenue by month for SFY 2019, 2020 and 2021. 2021 revenue is very close to 2020 and slightly higher than 2019 numbers. He compared SFY 2020 and 2021 in the three major revenue categories through March. DMV Fees + Interest was 7.3% higher in 2021, Highway Use Tax was 11.0% higher in 2021 and Motor Fuel Tax was 6.4% lower in 2021 after the motor fuel shift deferral. He then broke down the DMV fees and other revenue. He presented the Monthly Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) and Fuel Consumption from January 2018 through February 2021 and the VMT Daily Changes and 7 Day Average from March 2020 through April 2021. He had recently received data through April and traffic is almost back to the levels that were previously forecast.

Mrs. Stephanie King provided updates on the key actions happening within Financial Management. The NC Financial System was implemented in April and cash certification was successful. It did delay the Financial Statements but overall few issues. She mentioned hopes wo having the draft Spend Plan for the next 2 SFYs but is still vetting the data and will introduce the spend plan at the next Board meeting. Shared she is working on a new cash model in the SAP EBS platform - migrating from an Excel based model. Some financial reporting will change, and she asked for any feedback on reporting. Ms. King stated the closing cash balance for March was \$1.54 billion and the current cash balance is \$1.8 billion.

A motion was made by board member Roseburgh and seconded by board member Wells to not let any contracts over \$5 million in the next 30 days. Numerous members of the board provided points of discussion for consideration. During the discussion and in response to the motion on the floor, it was suggested that the STIP Unit present additional data during the June Finance Committee meeting on cost increases and the impact on projects, forecasts, and finances.

The motion was withdrawn.

**Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Committee –** Committee Chair Clarke provided a summary of the committee's meeting topics that included a presentation on Re-Opening Driver's License Offices by Charlotte Boyd-Malette, Driver Services Director. Steven E. Hairston, Director of Strategy, Research and Planning provided a presentation on the 2019-2023 Division Motor Vehicles Strategic Plan. NCDMV Commissioner Torre Jessup gave a verbal overview on the NC DMV Headquarters Move Update and REAL ID Modernization.

Highways Committee - Committee Chair Tarleton provided a summary of the committee's meeting topics that included a presentation on the Severe Weather Preparedness and Recovery by Emily McGraw, Manager of the NCDOT Maintenance Operations and Fleet Management Unit. Emily shared as the department prepares for various types of storms that may impact our state including hurricanes, snow and ice, tornadoes, and heavy rains. Preparedness involves training internal staff and consultant partners, communication through all levels of the Department and with other state agencies and activation of resources to respond to storms. The second presentation heard by the Committee was regarding Severe Weather Recovery using Survey123. Mr. Josh Kellen of the Department's Maintenance Operations and Fleet Management Unit discussed the need to provide documentation for storm damage. Following Hurricane Matthew in 2016 where there were approximately 2700 damage sites with over \$200M in damages, the Department looked for a solution to better gather the data and documentation needed for storm damage repairs that would meet Federal FHWA and FEMA reimbursement requirements. The solution for this issue was part of the ARCG is system which the Department already owns. The application is Survey123. It allows the Inspector to capture much of the initial data needed to begin the storm repair process including location details, types of damages, dimensions of damages, pictures of the sites, and preliminary damage estimates. The application was first tested when Hurricane Florence hit in 2018. It has since been used for multiple storm events with refinements being implemented as needed.

**Multi-Modal Committee** – Committee Chair Moran provided a summary of the committee's meeting topics that included a verbal overview on the Funding items and Multimodal updates by Julie White. A presentation on Modal STI Prioritization Overview was provided by Jason Schronce, Strategic Prioritization Office Manager. A presentation on How the Modes are Funded was provided by the Multi-Modal Directors.

#### Other Business

#### **Don't be Trashy Challenge**

Vice-Chairman Perkins called Board member Mathis forward to present the awards for the "Don't be Trashy Challenge".

Board Member Mathis provided a presentation on submitted photos from members of the Board volunteering throughout the department's litter campaign. Board Member Mathis presented the pictures, commended members and staff and announced award winners as follows:

Best Photo award was awarded to Valerie Jordan, Division 5 Board Member.

Most Unusual Item Found award was awarded to Melvin Mitchell, Division 4 Board member.

Grossest Item Award was awarded to Grady Hunt, Division 6 Board member.

Most Trash Collected in a Division award was awarded to Andy Perkins, Division 9 Vice Chairman.

Board Member Mathis shared during the 2021 spring litter sweep they collected over 1.4 million pounds of trash. From January 1<sup>st</sup> to April 29<sup>th</sup> the department has collected over 5.3 million pounds of trash. Board Member Mathis thanked everyone for their time and help in making the "Don't be Trashy Challenge" a success.

Vice Chairman Perkins reminded members of the Board Retreat that is scheduled for June 8, 2021 in Raleigh and the next Board meeting is scheduled for June 9-10, 2021.

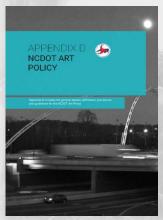

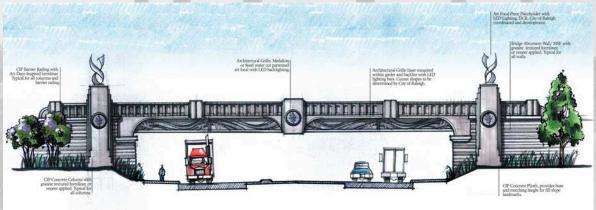

### NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC ART ON THE RIGHT OF WAY POLICY

#### PURPOSE

The North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) recognizes and values the importance of integrating Context Sensitive components into the design and operation of its transportation facilities. While NCDOT's first priority is to provide safe and efficient transportation facilities, the department understands that this can be accomplished by ensuring environmental sensitivity while providing transportation infrastructure that are integrated into the natural and human environment in a manner to reflect the local community's aesthetic values and intrinsic qualities. Transportation facilities enhanced by public art elements provide aesthetic and cultural benefits to a community. These benefits can potentially result in positive economic development and increase tourism both locally and throughout North Carolina. In order to ensure successful integration of art within NCDOT project designs and along rights of way, it is critical to maintain collaborative and cooperative partnerships with local governments, state agencies, non- profit organizations and private

#### DEFINITIONS

Public Art on the right of way proposed by local government agencies may be artwork, paintings, sculptures, columns, castings, obelisks, architectural and design features or other visual interests that may be freestanding or placed on roadway structural features such as noise walls, retaining walls, sidewalks, bridges, bike paths or other approved engineered structures. An element is considered "Public Art" if it is beyond NCDOT standard engineering practices or architectural treatments. Hereafter, "Public Art on the right of way" will be referred to as "Art" in this document.



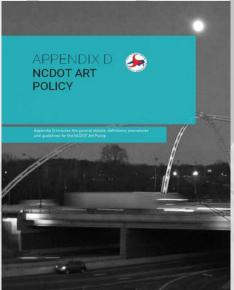


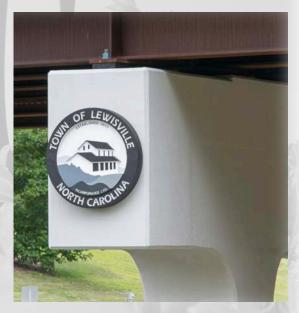

Local Government and Municipal Signs that comply with and are approved under NCDOT's Welcome Sign Policy do not fall within this Art policy and are not governed by the policies herein.

Highway Memorials for roadside fatalities do not fall within this Art policy but are governed through existing memorial policies for highway roadside plantings and "Adopt- a-Highway".

A Right of Way Art Committee consisting of representatives designated by the Secretary of Transportation shall be established to review and approve Art proposals. The Committee will consist of NCDOT staff and will also include one representative from local government and one representative from the N.C. Department of Cultural Resources. NCDOT staff representing the following business units will serve on the committee:

### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

### **Local Agency Requirements**

Art placed on NCDOT transportation right of way shall be provided and maintained by a sponsoring local government agency (city, county, etc), state or federal agency, or tribal government and is permitted through the encroachment permit process or may be integrated as a design element of a transportation construction project. The permit applicant must be the responsible local public agency representing the communities where the art will be placed. Private party art encroachments will not be permitted by the department.

Local government agencies may request Art on existing NCDOT facilities or as enhancements to proposed NCDOT transportation construction projects. These two types of project requests shall be addressed separately within this policy.

The Department of Transportation will require the sponsoring local government agency to assume financial responsibility for the construction and maintenance costs of the proposed Art above NCDOT's standard engineering practices and architectural treatments.

ART REQUESTS ON EXISTING TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES

### Description

A local government agency as defined above may request the installation of Art on an existing transportation facility. Sites for which these requests may include existing roadways, ferry sites, and rest areas. Such Art will permitted by encroachment permit issued under the criteria established above, but in no case will a permit be issued for installations that may result in possible safety hazards.

### **Pre-Screening of Proposal**

The Department acknowledges the importance of communication, cooperation, and coordination with communities and art proponents. Delineation of the general concepts and details of the proposed art work at an early stage is critically important in order to minimize early community investment while initiating a partnership of communication to understand program elements and define planning procedures. To facilitate these needs, NCDOT requires a preliminary review of the proposed art project concept to determine if the project falls within the program boundaries, has merit as a form of art relative to the community and state, and is suitable for installation on the right of way. A NCDOT prescreening process should be followed that provides a means for the department to determine if possible safety, construction, maintenance issues or other restrictions may prohibit the art project from proceeding. A department pre-screening approval does not guarantee that the final product will be approved. The final encroachment permit will be contingent upon the local government's compliance with applicable safety, construction, and maintenance standards established within this policy.

#### Permit Evaluation

Art encroachment requests will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis as each is unique. Written encroachment permit requests must be submitted to the appropriate NCDOT Division Engineer for roadway Art requests or the appropriate Transit Director for Ferry and Rail requests. The following minimum guidelines must be met before the request can be considered for approval:

#### Sponsoring Local Government Agency Commitment

The permittee must assume full financial responsibility for all aspects of the Art placement on existing transportation facilities including all costs associated with the planning, design, construction, maintenance and removal of the Art if required.

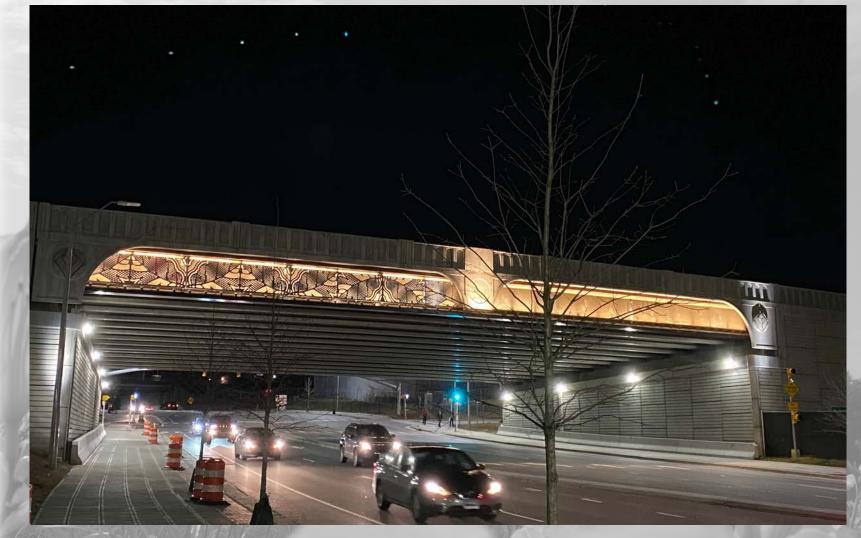

Please see the attached application, on behalf of the Genesis Park Neighborhood Association, for murals to be installed on the sound wall at I-77 Northbound, South of LaSalle Street Exit 12.

The Genesis Park Neighborhood Association, in partnership with the City of Charlotte and I-77 Mobility Partners, has been working on this project since 2017 when City Council Member Winston reached out to ask about public art opportunities along the sound wall that was being constructed adjacent to the Genesis Park neighborhood. Three community meetings were held to gauge neighborhood interest, survey residents for design ideas, and to vote and comment on the final designs. The three chosen designs were then posted on Nextdoor for additional feedback from the community.

The designs submitted here were created with the involvement of engaged neighbors and the project is strongly supported by the Genesis Park community. The project received major support from the City of Charlotte's Neighborhood Matching Grants program and additional funding from I-77 Mobility Partners.

Three designs by local artist Sala Faruq were reviewed and unanimously approved this afternoon by the City of Charlotte's Beautification Bureau, per the NCDOT for Public Art City Council resolution adopted on August 26, 2019. The designs will be rotated every two years to show a different mural through 2027.

The cable is \$/16° in diameter. The anchors are galvanized and 3/8° in thickness. We will drill a small hole and set the small silver piece (in photo w/ bolt) in the concrete, tap it down and when the bolt is inserted it expands and locks in place.

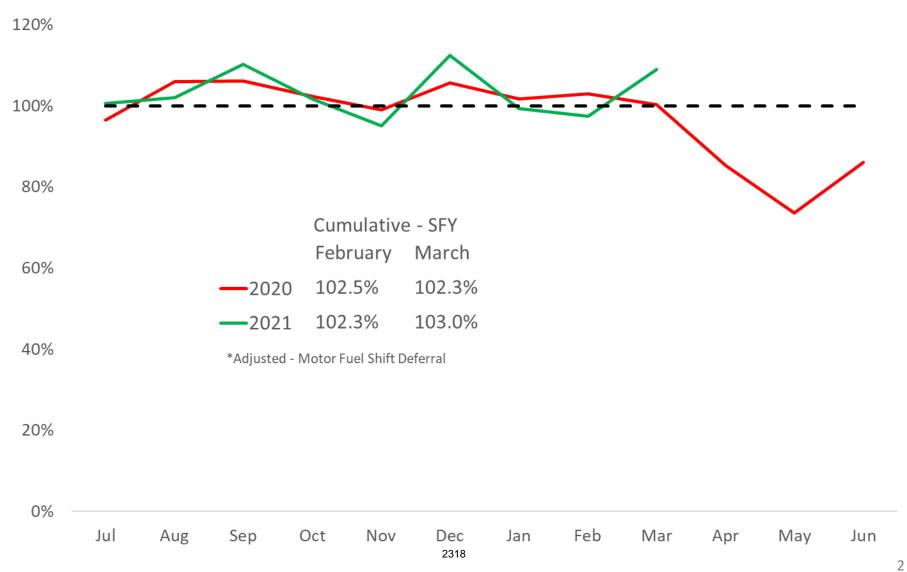

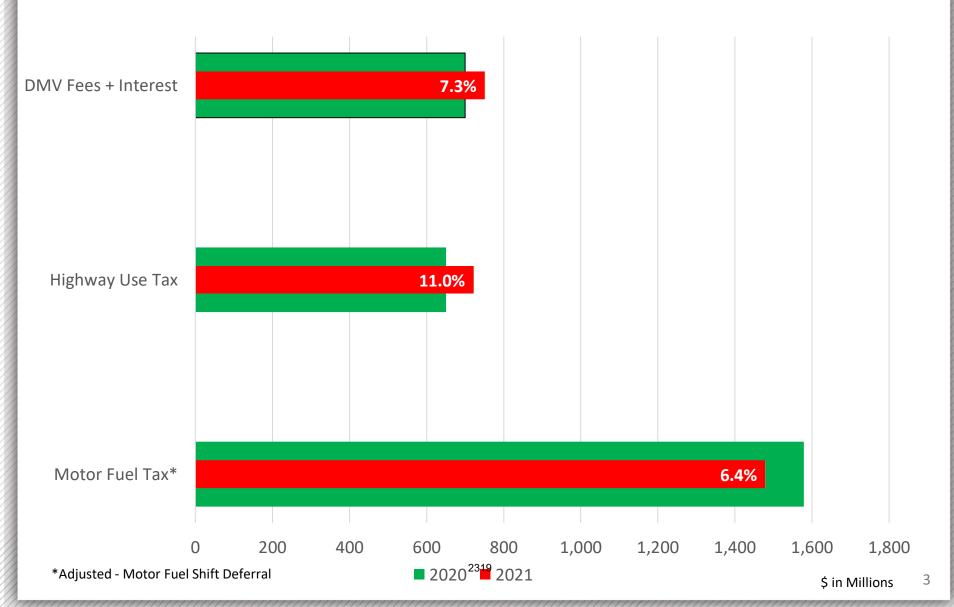

### **Total State Revenue Compared to Same Month in SFY 2019\***



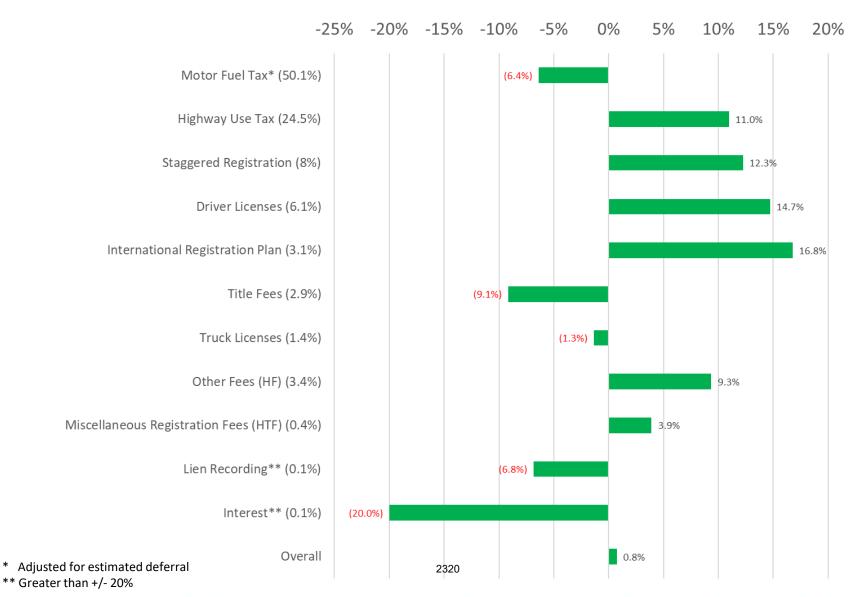
# State Revenue Comparison through March

SFY 2020 vs SFY 2021



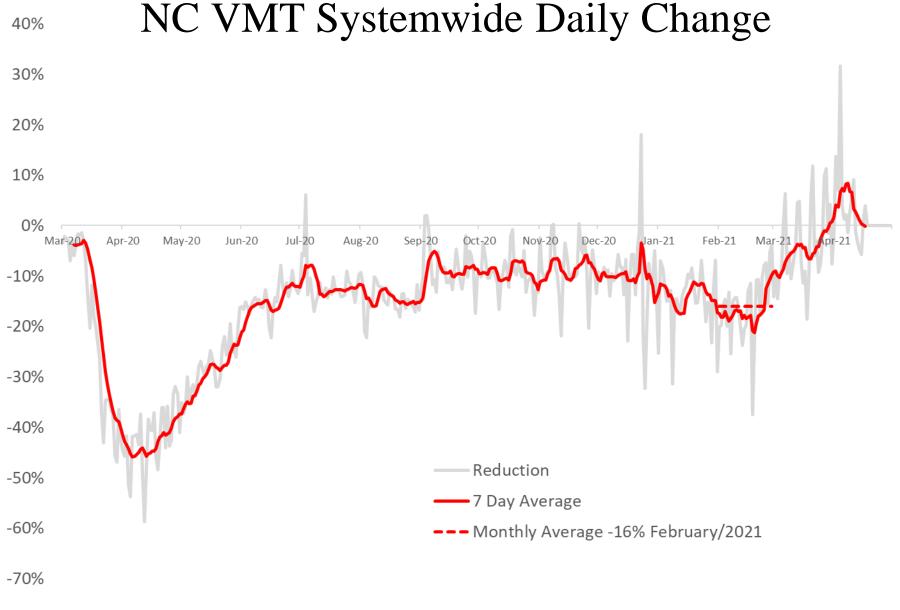
# State Revenue Comparison through March

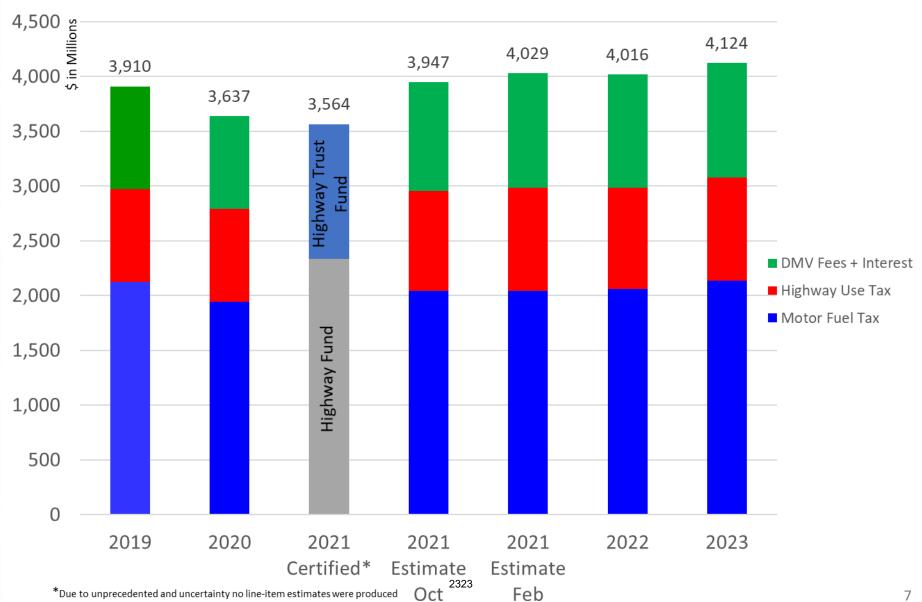


# Monthly VMT and Fuel Consumption

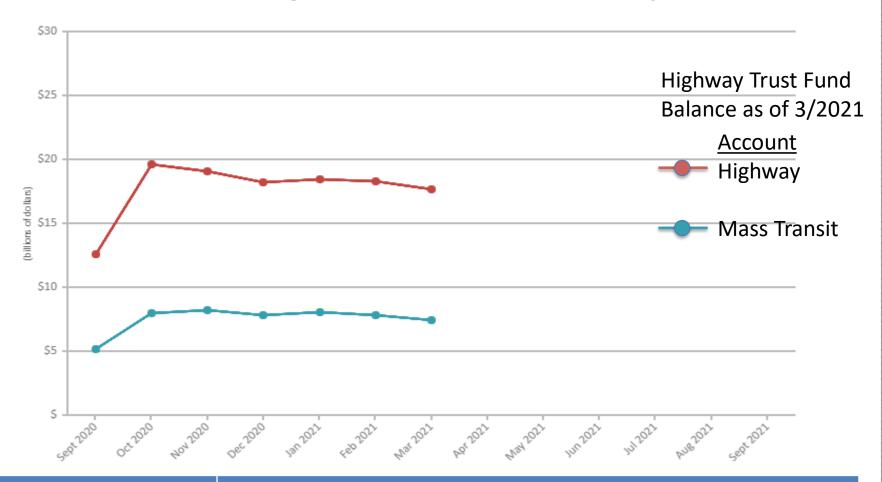




## State Revenue Comparison – Biennium Budget

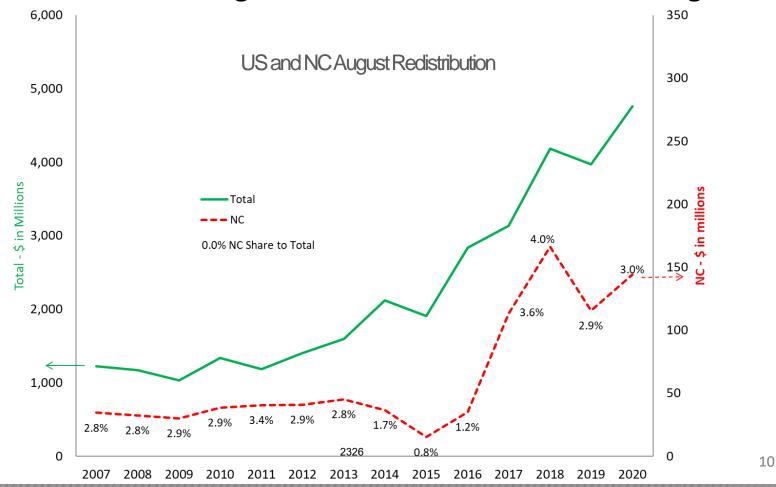

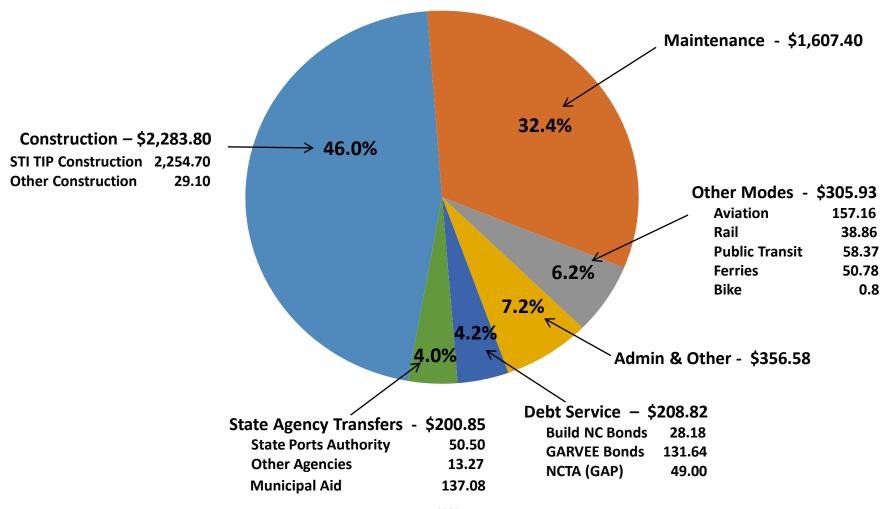

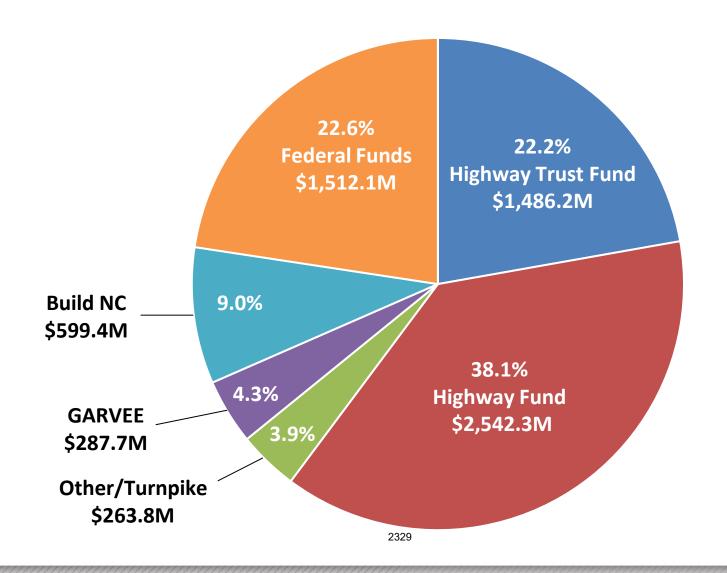
# Uses of 2020-21 NCDOT Appropriations\* Total Funding = \$4.96 Billion

# **Financial Analysis**

- **HF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$180.7 million in March 2020 to \$894.6 million in March 2021. An increase of \$713.9 million or 395.2%. This increase in cash was primarily due to increased motor fuel tax and license & fees revenues for the Highway Fund combined with decreased expenditures.
- **HF Revenues** Revenues increased from \$191.1 million in March 2020 to \$219.6 million in March 2021. An increase of \$28.5 million or 14.9%. This increase was primarily due to a \$10.4 million increase in motor fuel tax revenues and a \$15.9 million increase in license & fee revenues in March 2021 compared to March 2020.
- **HF** March 2021 YTD revenues were greater than March 2020 YTD revenues by \$194.9 million, and March 2021 YTD expenses were less than March YTD 2020 expenses by \$615.6 million.
- **HTF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$167.9 million in March 2020 to \$673.6 million in March 2021. An increase of \$505.7 million or 301.3%. This increase in cash was primarily due to continued decreased expenditures and loan repayments from Highway Fund.
- HTF Revenues Revenues decreased slightly from \$135.1 million in March 2020 to \$134.8 million in March 2021. A decrease of \$0.3 million or 0.3%. This decrease was primarily due to a \$25.3 million decrease in motor fuel tax revenue that was somewhat offset by a \$21.0 million increase in highway use tax revenue and a \$4.2 million increase in license & fees revenue in March 2021 compared to March 2020.
- HTF March 2021 YTD revenues were lower than March 2020 YTD revenues by \$92.9 million, but March 2021 YTD expenses were less than March YTD 2020 expenses by \$290.1 million.

### **Key monthly action:**

• On March 5, 2021, a \$45 million cash transfer was made from the Highway Fund to the Highway Trust Fund to repay the \$45 million advance that was made in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 147-86.15 on July 17, 2018. The grand total transfer during SFY 2021 through March was \$175 million. The outstanding balance of the advance after this payment was \$815.3 million.

# Spend Plan Analysis - Revenue

Total Revenues (\$4,945 million) were 1.75% below the spend plan forecast, or \$88 million, but were 13%, or \$550 million, more than year to date revenues for SFY 2020.

- State Revenue (\$3,032 million) was 0.07%, or \$2 million, above forecasted revenue.
- Federal Revenue (\$998) was 3%, or \$30 million, below the forecasted amount.
- Other Revenue (\$148 million) was 13%, or \$22 million, below spend plan forecast. Major line items for this category include Damage Claims (\$49.9 million), Federal Transit funding (\$18.7 million), Federal Transit CARES Act funding (\$27.9 million), Federal Aviation funding (\$13.3 million), GHSP funding (\$10.4 million), and LOGO Annual Fees (\$4.2 million).
- GARVEE Reimbursement (\$200 million) was 7%, or \$16 million, below spend plan forecast.
- Build NC Reimbursement (\$488 million) was 1%, or \$5 million, below spend plan forecast. The Department has received \$344 million of 2020 Build NC reimbursements from the trustee through March.

# Spend Plan Analysis - Expenditures

Total Expenditures (\$3,658 million) were 7%, or \$282 million, below the spend plan forecast and 20%, or \$896 million, below the previous year totals. This is a result of the slow down implemented during Spring 2020 and the lag time in reinitiating project phases.

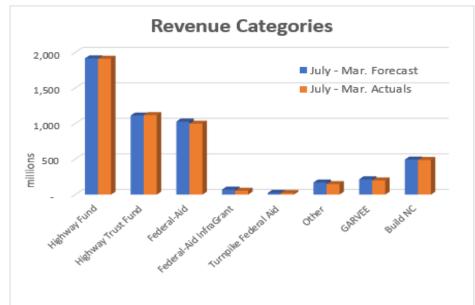
- Total Construction Expenditures (\$2,188 million) were 6%, or \$130 million, below spend plan forecast. SFY 2021 expenditures were 21%, or \$566 million, less than SFY 2020 construction expenditures.
- Maintenance Expenditures year to date (\$729 million) were 12% below the spend plan forecast, or \$97 million. SFY 2021 expenditures were 35%, or \$397.5 million, less than SFY 2020 maintenance expenditures.
- Total Modal Expenditures (\$305 million) were 10%, or \$35 million, below the spend plan forecast, but were 42%, or \$89.5 million, more than the previous SFY.

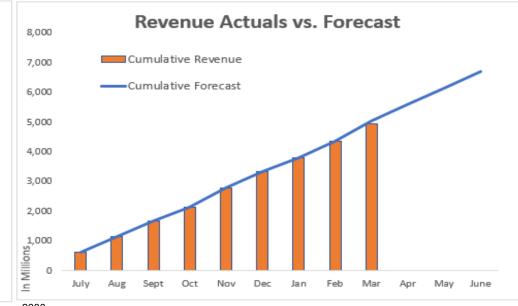

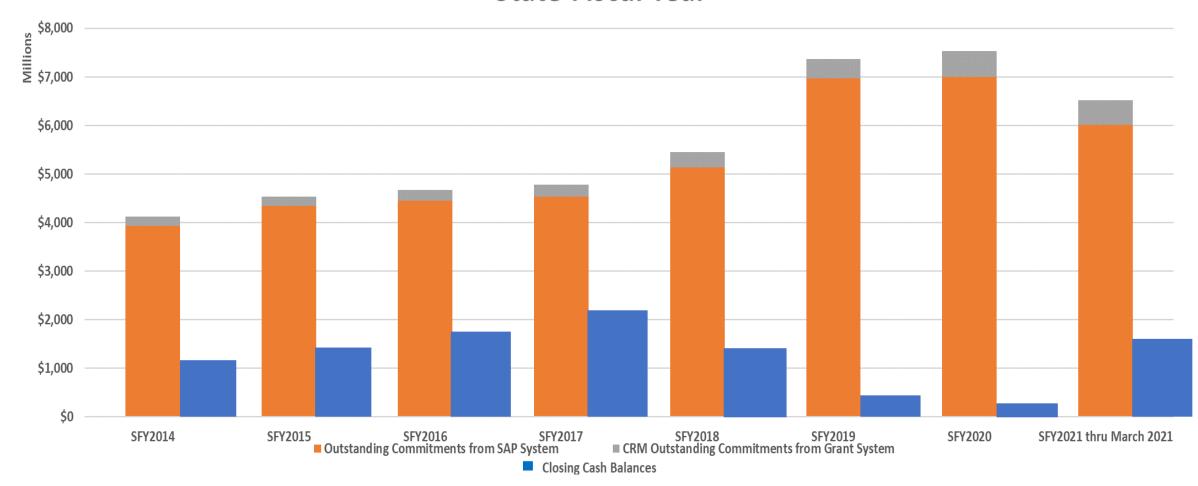

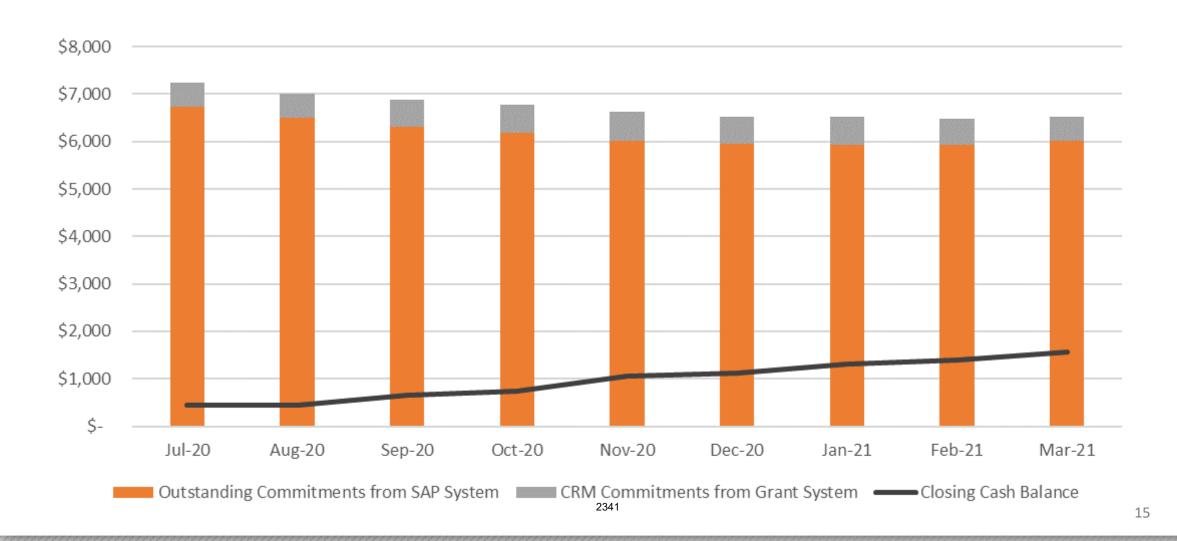

# NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by Month

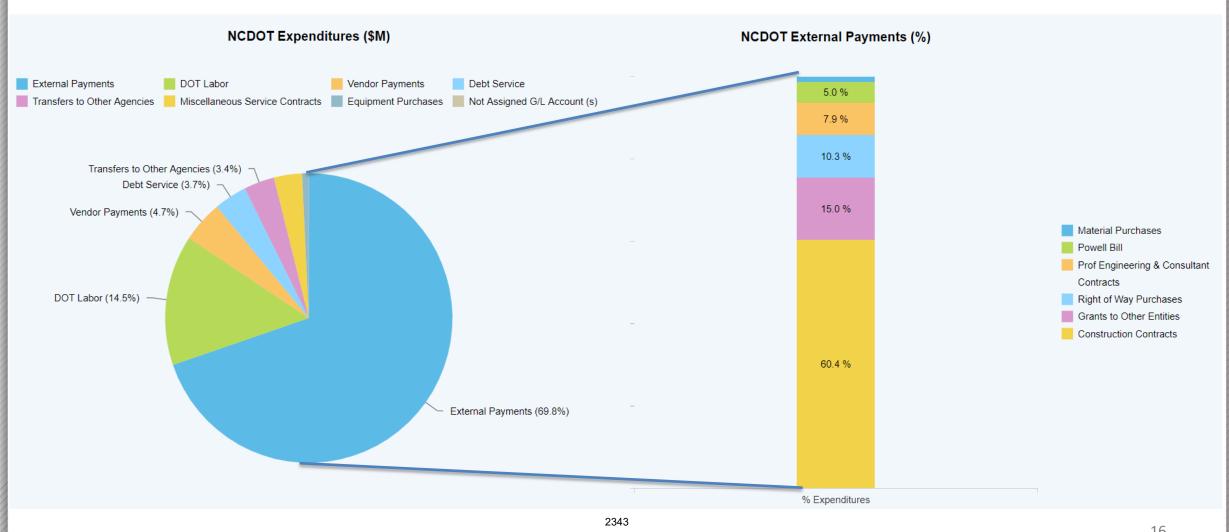

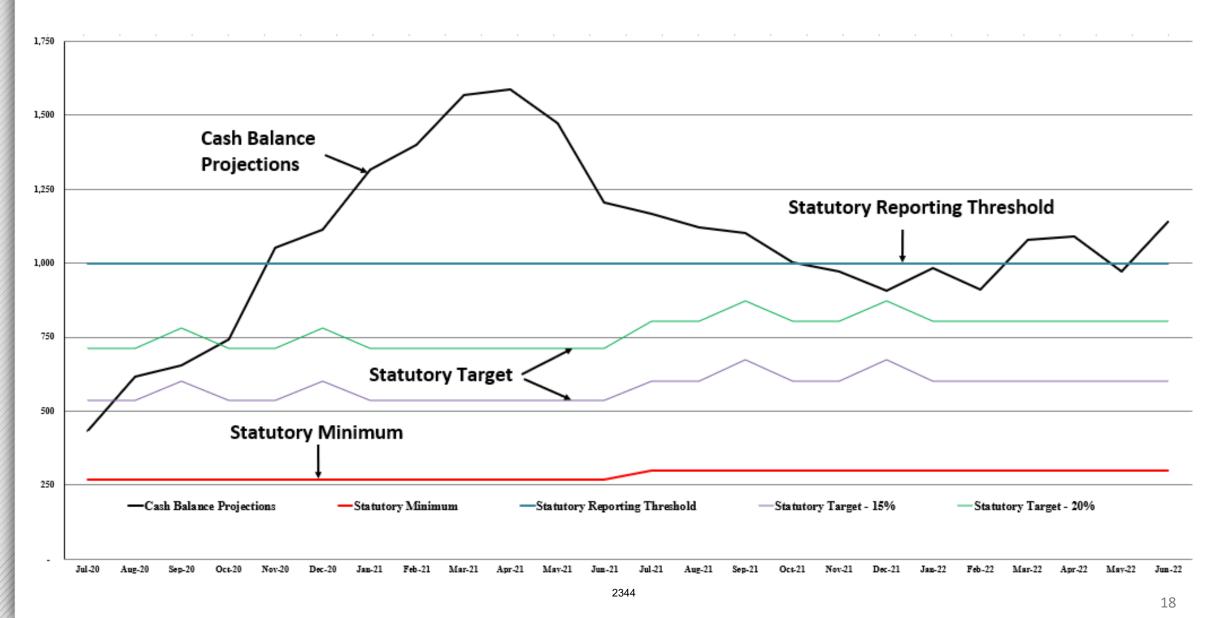
### March 2021 – Reporting Required

- Section 2.1 of Session Law 2019-251 requires DOT to report each month when the department's combined average daily cash balance for the month is outside of the statutory target range.
- For March 2021, the **average daily cash balance** of the Highway Fund and the Highway Trust Fund was \$1.35 billion.
- The cash target amounts representing 15% and 20% of the total appropriations for the current fiscal year are \$535 million and \$713 million, respectively.
- The closing cash balance for March was \$1.57 billion which is above the target range and above the minimum cash balance requirement of \$267 million under G.S. 143C-6-11.

# Spend Plan Variance

• GARVEE Expenditures, Build NC Expenditures, TIP and STI -6% Variance (-\$119M). Project lettings were delayed during budget restrictions.

• Division of Mitigation Services (Formerly EEP) 17% Variance (\$4M). Payments totaling over \$16.5M were disbursed to the NC Department of Environmental Quality Division of Mitigation Services (DMS) in February for compensatory mitigation to offset NCDOT construction impacts. These funds cover administration, restoration, long term monitoring and planning for DMS's SFY 2021 third and fourth quarters.

# Spend Plan Variance

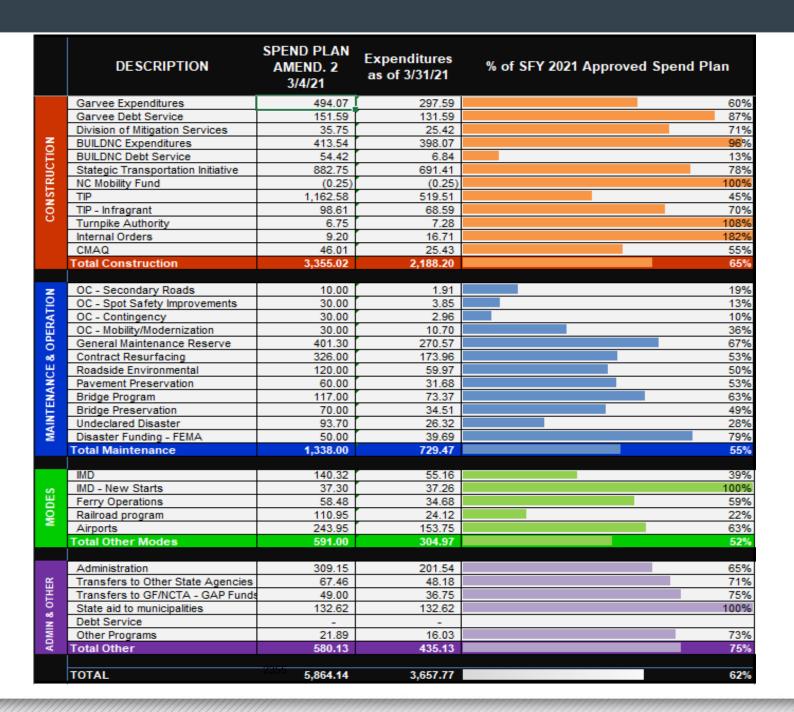
• Internal Orders -169% (-\$11M). Internal Orders are cost collectors for project surcharges. The variance is a result of a change in payments to the NC Department of Information Technology (DIT) from monthly to quarterly.

- Maintenance and Operations -12% Variance (-\$97M). Spend Plan Amendment #2 issued a realignment of expected cash outflows for SFY 2021. Contract Resurfacing and Bridge Program payouts are expected to increase in the fourth quarter of SFY 2021 into SFY 2022.
  - Undeclared Disasters -41% (-\$18M). Snow and ice response is the primary driver of expenditures. Ideal scenario would be to experience actuals below established targets for the fiscal year. This would allow a potential redistribution of un-used spending authority for other maintenance needs across the state.

# Spend Plan Variance

- Integrated Mobility Division -25% Variance (-\$18M). FFF 21 FTA grants involving state match were delayed at the beginning of SFY 21 due to spending restrictions. These grants have now been released and agencies are beginning to draw down funds. CARES Intercity Bus funding and traditional bus funding is anticipated to be awarded by FTA soon and \$15 million is expected to be expended by June 30. In addition, CARES Round 3 funding was recently awarded and distributed to recipients by FTA. This will lead to an acceleration in CARES Act funding expenditures.
- Railroad Program -37% (-\$14M). Many rail projects, including the Freight Rail and Rail Crossing Safety Improvement (FRRCSI) program, were previously on hold and are now being advanced. A FRRCSI solicitation is available to railroads for additional projects to support rail freight growth. These are anticipated to be awarded by May.

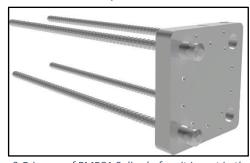

The EMECA 24-inch Splice is manufactured by EMECA/SPE USA out of Laurel, Delaware. It is approved for provisional use and listed on the Approved Products List (APL) as NP21-8865. The EMECA 24-inch Splice is a 24-inch square steel splice that is used to join two pre-stressed concrete piles together for use in deep foundation systems. The EMECA 24-inch Splice is cast in-place with the pre-stressed concrete pile. This allows for shorter, and subsequently lighter, more maneuverable concrete pile lengths to be transported and used on site. The two concrete piles are then joined in the field, once the first pile is driven. The two pile end splices are joined together by four steel pins in as little as 3 minutes. The EMECA pile splices come in standard square 12", 14", 16", 18",

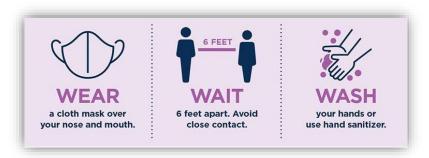

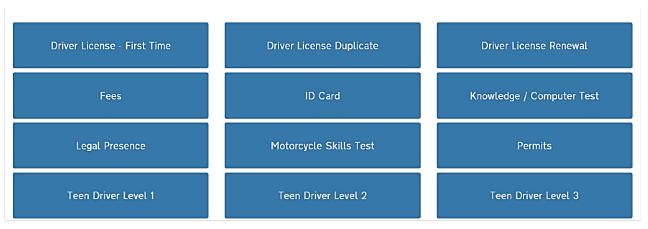

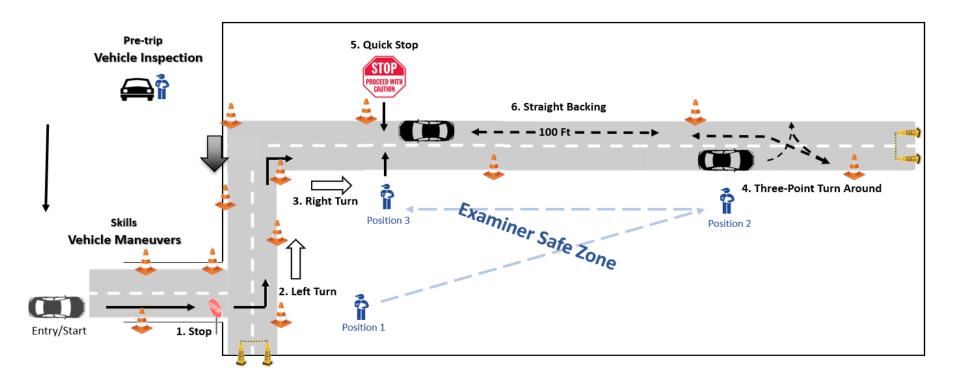
The Division implemented Online Appointment Scheduling in Phases. The Phase 1 Online Appointment Scheduling (with 20-minute time segments) was implemented on February 22, 2020 in select pilot locations. The public began scheduling online appointments on March 2, 2020. To date, Phase 1 proved extremely successful prior to and especially during the pandemic restrictions. This applications enabled the Division to better comply with CDC and DHHS guidance on social distancing.

As of March 2021, the Division replaced the 20-minute calendar templates with 15-minute time segments which increased capacity. In addition, we expanded the calendar availability range from 30 to 45 days out for booking appointments. In April 2020, DMV moved to expand walk-in capacity after the Governor relaxed COVID-19 restrictions. This also better prepares the Division with anticipation of increased demand for Real ID and Road Test application.

Phase 2 of OAS will provide some visual changes and upgrades that include Virtual Check in (VCI), an improved DLO location finder, a refined mass cancellation notification process, other visual improvements to office kiosks and calendars.

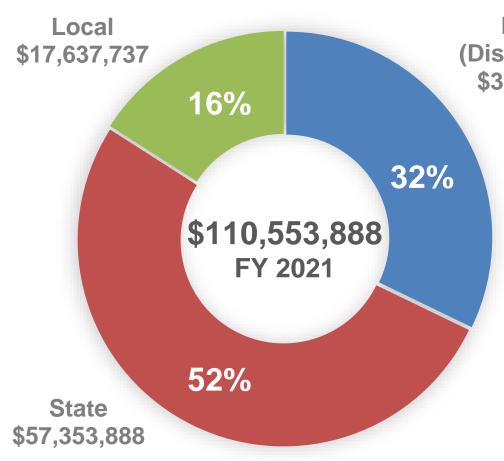

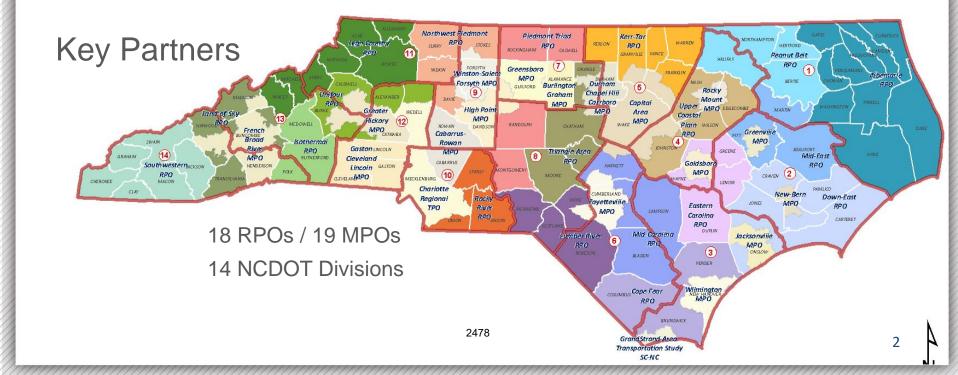

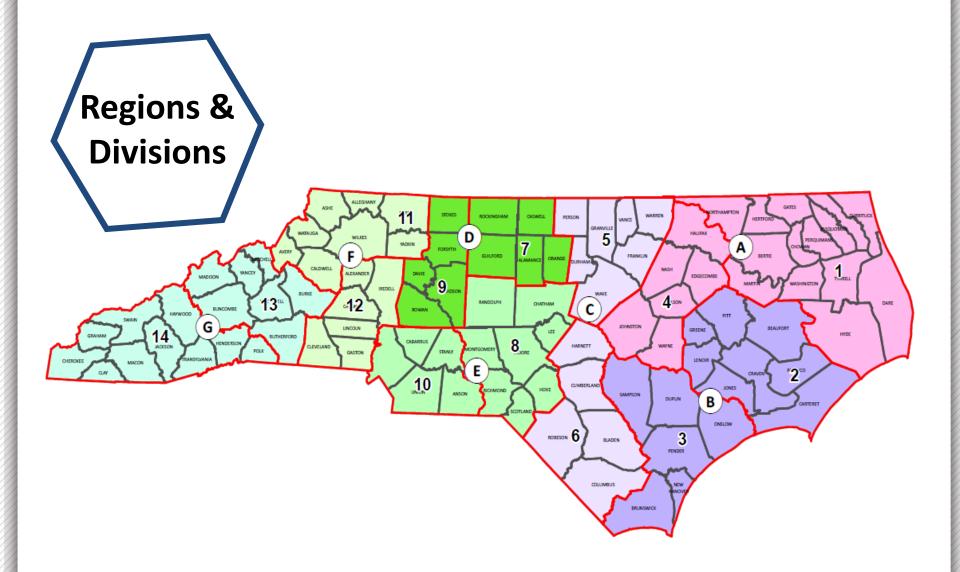

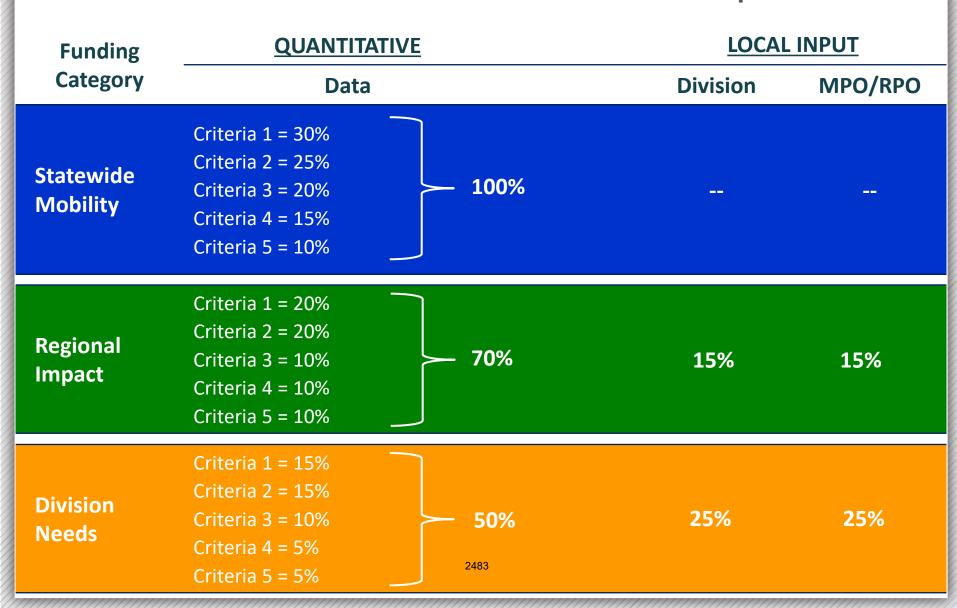






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## Quantitative Score vs. Local Input

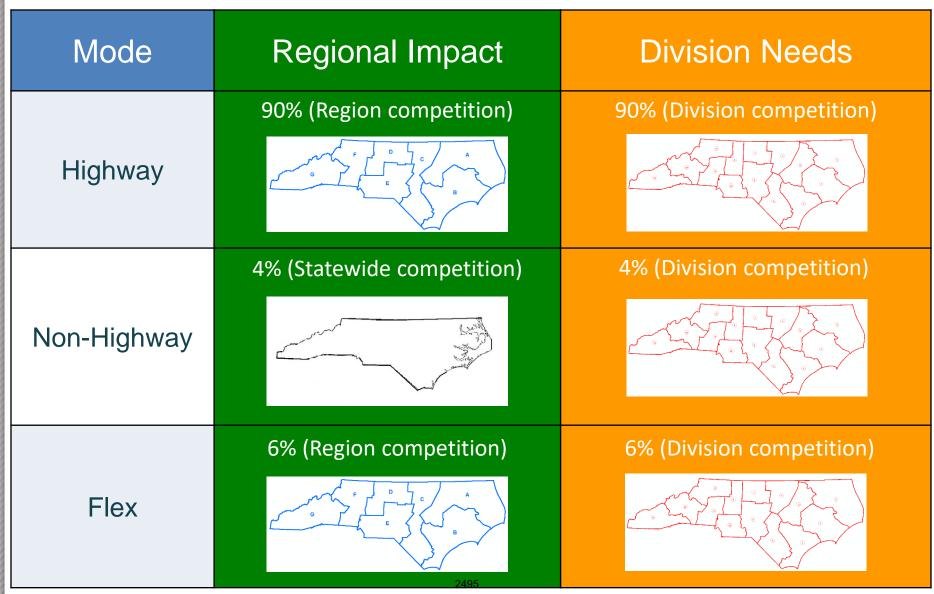
