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BOARD OF TRANSPORTATION MEETING

October 6, 2021

Chairman Fox stated that the Wednesday, October 6, 2021, meeting was a remote meeting and is being held in such way due to the current status of the COVID-19 pandemic. Chairman Fox stated that since the meeting is being fully conducted using Microsoft Teams the following protocol will be used:

- implementing a roll call voting system for all actions.
- ensuring that the meeting minutes reflect that the meeting is a remote meeting.
- recording when members join or leave the remote meeting.

The Chairman reminded members that all chats, instant messages, texts, or other written communications between members of the Board regarding the transaction of the public business are deemed a public record. As always, the meeting was properly noticed, and a live stream was provided for members of the public to access the meeting.

Wednesday October 6, 2021

All committee reports are located at the end of this document.

Members of the Highway Committed attended their meeting at 9:15am. Topics included a presentation on Traffic Noise Policy Overview and Proposed Changes by Missy Pair, Traffic Noise & Air Quality Group Leader. A committee overview is located at the end of this document.

Members of the Finance Committee attended their meeting at 10:30 a.m. Topics included the Financial and Spend Plan Update by Stephanie King, CFO, Remarks from Beth Wood, State Auditor, and a presentation on Federal Revenue Update by Burt Tasaico, Director of Strategic Initiatives.

Full Board Work Session

Chairman Fox welcomed members to the meeting and thanked members of the Board for being present online to handle business brought before them.

Chairman Fox stated this meeting is considered a virtual meeting with members participating via Microsoft Teams.

Call to Order

Chairman Fox called the work session of the Board of Transportation to order at 1:00p.m. on Wednesday, October 6, 2021, with the following members present in the virtual meeting: Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody.

Chairman Fox stated this month the Board will be conducting all Board business in one meeting today. This includes the full board work session and the official board meeting which typically occurs on Thursday. He shared that since the Board was meeting remotely and the schedule allowed in terms of committee meetings, that it would be a good efficient use of the staff and Board's time.

Ethics Statement

Chairman Fox read the Ethics Statement advising all members of the Board that may have any conflict of interest, or appearance of conflict, to refrain from participation in that item and to file the proper paperwork with the Secretary to the Board of Transportation.

Chairman Fox read, "In accordance with the State Government Ethics Act, Executive Order No. 2 issued on January 12, 2009, and N. C. G. S. §143B-350, it is the duty of every Board member to avoid both conflicts of interest and appearances of conflict. "To comply with this statement and the State Ethics Law, I ask whether any Board member has a known conflict of interest or appearance of conflict with respect to any matters coming before the Board today."

"If so, please identify the conflict or appearance of conflict when the item appears on the agenda for consideration, refrain from any undue participation in the particular matter involved and sign before our notary the Declaration that has been provided to you for such purpose."

Chairman Fox shared the first agenda topic would be the update on the SPOT workgroup.

Jason Schronce, Strategic Prioritization Office Manager, provided an update on the monthly Workgroup meeting to the Board. (Mr. Schronce's presentation is located at the end of this document.)

Mr. Schronce shared that the workgroup continues to meet monthly regarding P6.0 and the development of the 2024 to 2033 STIP. He mentioned the first couple slides show the P6.0 funding availability. He stated the slides he is sharing are those shown in previous months as well. Today his presentation will continue to provide the latest information since the board's last meeting.

Mr. Schronce shared last month's meeting was held on September 21, 2021. The workgroup participated in a positive and ongoing conversation. They reviewed the overall goals the group set out to accomplish. Mr. Schronce stated the main goal is to develop a trustworthy and dependable STIP that is fiscally constrained. He shared the workgroup would like the opportunity to fund new projects in P7.0 scoring in all 22 of the funding categories. This means having the appropriate number of projects programmed in the respective 22 funding categories (buckets) so that there is funding available by the time the next round of prioritization is completed. He emphasized is it important to ensure the processes are grounded in state and federal requirements.

Mr. Schronce elaborated that the workgroup also received an update on current "unknowns"; one being the inflation impact on the state budget, which David Wasserman will cover in the next presentation. Mr. Schronce shared the workgroup discussed the federal infrastructure bill and the ongoing department project cost evaluations of both committed and non-committed projects.

Mr. Schronce shared the workgroup received a great presentation from Deputy Secretary, Julie White and her staff. The presentation showed how the department utilizes grant discretionary funding, how existing projects in the STIP are used to meet those match requirements, and how that coordination piece is utilized to bring additional funds to the department for expanding our STIP. He shared the workgroup talked about the constraints of STI, how that fits in, and how to ensure we're still chasing opportunities when the new federal bill is signed and put into place. He updated that the workgroup spent time discussing the "held harmless" concept. This was outlined to members of the Board at the last board meeting. Mr. Schronce stated he would circle back to that in the presentation.

He shared that the workgroup structured their meeting around three main decisions. All of which propel into the development of the next 2024 to 2033 STIP.

Decision point one: Overall method

Decision point two: "Held harmless" scenario method

Decision point three: Committed evaluation method

Mr. Schronce shared that the workgroup is working through the three decision points in order. He stated that in the last meeting they successfully came to a consensus recommendation on the overall method.

Additionally, he mentioned they discussed the traditional STIP development approach. This approach reduces projects down to match the STIP budget for each of the 22 funding categories. This is the recommendation of the workgroup. They also discussed the split document approach. This alternative approach concept breaks the projects into two groupings; One is a delivery STIP, which is your construction STIP, where projects that are in full development to be let and go to construction, and second is a planning STIP that would focus on preliminary engineering.

Mr. Schronce stated the workgroup members are excited about this idea but feel that ultimately more time is needed to digest. He shared that there are multiple decision points to be made in that concept and the workgroup felt it best to table it until P7.0 and beyond.

The idea with the traditional STIP development is that we have our existing 2020 - 2029 STIP that we need to get to the future 2024 - 2033 STIP. What are the steps, actions, and processes that need to take place to get us there?

The first step from taking the existing document and creating the next one is to remove all the non-committed projects from the STIP. These become P7.0 carryovers and are evaluated next prioritization cycle.

The next step is to develop the "held harmless" project list, which are the projects that are early enough into the construction phase to maintain schedule and stay on budget. This provides our industry partners reliable workload and ensures the department is committed to delivery of these projects.

The third step is to determine which of the remaining committed projects from the 2020 - 2029 STIP can be added in each one of those 22 funding categories (buckets) to fill up the budget

category for that funding category. Those not selected or need to be removed to bring balance, would also become the P 7.0 carryover projects and be scored in the next prioritization cycle.

The three-step approach is how the workgroup will be modifying or adjusting the current STIP to develop the 2024 to 2033 STIP. Once the recommendation was made, the workgroup focused on the "held harmless" method.

The "held harmless" approach will consist of projects that will be the first ones added to the next STIP. He mentioned the workgroup members requested data at the last meeting to run different scenarios in an effort to see how much of each category budget would be held harmless and how many projects would be able to be added to the STIP in any one of the scenarios.

Scenario one is the base minimum required that the department is willing to accept or operate from, and this is anything let or construction before FY2026 or sooner or has grants awarded.

The scenarios are built on top of one another.

Scenario two are all the projects in scenario one plus those that have right of way underway and a let date after FY2026.

Projects are picked up in scenarios three, four, and five for right of way scheduling in 2024, 2025, and 2026.

This information was shared with the workgroup members. A solid conversation accumulated about the different ways to apply this approach where all 22 funding categories are applied with the same process across all coming 22 funding categories.

Mr. Schronce stated as a reminder, the "held harmless" intent is to maintain a reliable delivery program for our industry and public partners. People that have come to expect these projects, have seen these projects in the STIP, and want to make sure that we're moving forward and delivering on our promises. He shared that at the next meeting they will focus on the "held harmless" and will continue the conversation on how to evaluate the remaining committed projects. He mentioned the workgroup is working through this step-by-step and is excited to have the first consensus point obtained.

At that time, the meeting was turned back over to Chairman Fox for discussion. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Schronce and shared he had a couple of comments and then he'll open the floor for questions. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Schronce and his team for continuing to push this topic forward. He shared this is an important topic and he thinks the Board agrees with the goals set in place. Chairman Fox shared that on slide six the workgroup discussed having the opportunity

to fund new projects in P7.0 while complying with the state and federal requirements. He shared he'd like to make sure they are focused in two different prongs as they approach this, obviously the first prong would be to get the current STIP to a fiscally constrained document. He shared he knows the department must do that and they're working towards that. He shared the second thing is he didn't want to lose sight of the opportunity if we see process improvements that can be made along the way, so that we don't continue to have a problem moving forward in terms of the way scored projects are costed. He shared it is incumbent upon us to make sure that we do that while we're looking at everything. He mentioned those were the two real directions he wanted the Board to remember.

Chairman Fox shared it would be helpful to him and maybe other Board members if Mr. Schronce could provide numbers for the scenarios that were presented during the presentation. He mentioned it would be helpful to know how much each scenario would have available. Chairman Fox asked did the current STIP committed projects alone take all the available resources? Mr. Schronce stated he appreciated the comment, and he could definitely get some of that data included in a future presentation. Mr. Schronce shared the "held harmless" projects are committed projects that the department would be committed to moving forward and wanted to make sure they are included in the next STIP. He mentioned the Chairman was correct that the committed projects do take up the full budget and over, based on the slide presented. He elaborated that the workgroup is trying to identify those committed projects that are first added to the next STIP, and then that third approach, the committed evaluation approach, would be looking at the remaining projects and going through an evaluation or process of method in order to build up those funding categories (buckets) and the remaining of programmable revenue in those categories. Chairman Fox stated to his understanding we have more projects that are committed than we have resources for and that within that bucket of committed projects we determine which ones among those we're going to hold harmless. That will be a decision as to where you draw that line and then beyond that line, we can start working on different scenarios for adding additional projects back depending on the money. Chairman Fox asked Mr. Schronce was his understanding correct? Mr. Schronce stated that was correct.

Chairman Fox stated he felt it would help the Board if they were able to see numbers for the different scenarios. He shared particular in his division he gets a lot of questions about different projects. He shared it would help to have a list of projects by division.

Chairman Fox asked Mr. Schronce if his team could present the total numbers for scenarios one through five by the next board meeting? Mr. Schronce stated yes, they will work on that. He

shared his team would need to compile some of that information together. Chairman Fox asked if they could work on that and get that out to the Board at the end of the week before the next board meeting, so they would have some time to go through it. He shared he felt the Board would be better prepared with questions for the next month's meeting.

Chairman Fox stated Board members Wells and Lail had their hands up. Chairman Fox stated he would start with Board member Wells. Board member Wells thanked the Chairman and Mr. Schronce. He mentioned on slide eight it seems to match up with what he's been thinking but he wanted to come at it a little different with a simpler angle. He shared the public doesn't know all this is going on and they don't have a clue, not just the public, but the county and city managers don't know what's going on as well. He mentioned there's some chatter behind the scenes, but nothing definite so he feels like we need to tell them what's going on. He mentioned the way he is seeing this is the department has projects on the STIP right now that are going to be done more or less on schedule that they're in the STIP. He mentioned there's a red line out there and projects beyond that red line are in a black hole. He shared we don't know what the cost is going to be, and we don't know how they're going to be reordered and or rescored. He stated we don't know anything that is going to happen on those, but what he is hearing is that those projects beyond that red line are going to be extended another three to six years. So, people are making life decisions about a STIP thinking when's my house going to be taken? or when do I need to move? He mentioned people with businesses are making investment decisions based on the existing STIP. He shared we need to tell them that there's a problem out in the future at year X and beyond. He shared there's a great deal of uncertainty and at least with saying something they know that it's coming. He stated he felt it just wasn't fair to give the public misleading information. He mentioned they've had this conversation before, and they know it's coming, and he thinks the MPO, to some extent, know it's coming as well. He stated we need to give people the direction of what we know today. He shared he knows the department wants to answer all the questions and roll it out at one time, but we need to tell them there's a cliff at year X and we don't know at this point what's going to happen beyond year X. He stated we can plan for everything before year X but we just need to give them the certainty that we know we can give them. Chairman Fox thanked Board member Wells and stated he'll respond before Mr. Schronce if he has anything he'd like to respond with.

Chairman Fox stated he wholeheartedly agreed with Board member Wells that the public and our partners need to know what's going on and have the information. He stated part of the dilemma is the department doesn't know exactly where the red line is yet, and he thinks that's what we're working towards solving. He shared they are doing it as quickly as they can do it with

consensus. Chairman Fox stated he would have to disagree with people not knowing. He shared that he asked all Board members to make sure that they're talking to their MPOs and RPOs about this in terms of the process we're going through and identifying the problem. He stated he knows the workgroup is obviously aware of it and the department has talked about it publicly in our meetings for months.

Chairman Fox shared he certainly didn't feel like anything was being hidden or done in secret. He stated that we have been very open about this process. He mentioned he would talk with Secretary Boyette and the Chief Operating Officer, Beau Memory to make sure that we have checked all the boxes in terms of presentations and discussions to MPOs and RPOs because those really are our primary means of communication with our local officials. He shared the other groups representing all our local counties and municipalities are involved in the workgroup. They have representatives in the workgroup, the League of Municipalities, the Metro Mayors, and the Association of County Commissioners. They all have a representative on this and so maybe we can double check with them and ask how they are communicating with their members because we want to make sure that everybody knows what we're trying to do.

Chairman Fox asked Mr. Schronce did he have anything he wanted to add to that or to contribute?

Mr. Schronce stated he didn't have anything to add but Deputy Chief Planning, Joey Hopkins wanted to add a quick comment.

Mr. Hopkins stated Board member Wells made a great point and that's a conversation they constantly have in the workgroup meetings, how do we educate the public and how do we get their input and use that input in our decision making? Mr. Hopkins shared the summary the Board is getting from Mr. Schronce is a high-level summary and it doesn't include all the detailed conversations that they have in the workgroup. He stated when they develop a new STIP, there are federal and state requirements for public outreach. At minimum they will have to do that. He shared he agreed with Chairman Fox that there's been a lot of outreach through the MPO's from the Division Engineers and their staff. He stated there has been a lot of other outreach to the local staff talking about individual projects and potentially rescoping or resizing the projects. He mentioned there is an issue though when you're talking about an organization in a state of our size about reaching everybody and that's why we're in regular coordination with our department's communications office. He shared they have done a few interviews at different media outlets across the state and will continue to do that. He asked the Board if they had any ideas about other outreach in the short term, they are certainly open to recommendations and

ideas. He shared as Chairman Fox said, we need to have some decisions made not necessarily project level decisions on what stays and what goes but how do we do that when we go to the public, so then we can get good input from them on what their priorities are and then how we can use that moving forward. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Hopkins and Board member Wells for raising and highlighting on how we need to communicate to the public. Chairman Fox mentioned these are important decisions and he would ask all Board members to double back and make sure their keeping their MPOs and RPOs informed of what's going on and having robust conversations and encourage them to watch our Board meetings.

Board member Wells had a follow up comment. He stated the insiders in the transportation industry know something is coming, but he feels the public has no clue. We need to tell the public there's a storm coming because they do not know.

Chairman Fox shared he thinks we could probably also do some better education on the department's STIP processes. He stated he knows it is stated in the documents that the first few years of the STIP are "committed" and we say we're going to build, and other projects are subject to being rescored. He shared if people in the community see their project on the list is to start in 10 years, even though it's not "committed", in their mind it's going to be built then and that's not what we mean but that's what they take it to mean. Chairman Fox shared a lot of things could happen in 10 years and other project needs may come up, so that's why the department has the rolling 10-year STIP that the department evaluates every two years. Chairman Fox stated to Board member Wells, that he hears him we will look at ways to expand communication.

Chairman Fox called on Board member Lail for his comments. Board Lail stated he would piggyback off Board member Wells a little bit. He shared he received a call last week from a resident in Catawba County and they stated they heard NC 150 widening had been delayed to 2036 and it's because of financial misappropriation. He shared he agreed with Board member Wells and stated we need to somehow let the public know what is going on with the STIP. Board member Lail asked Mr. Schronce if he could clarify "held harmless" to him. He stated he understood the first part of projects with the let date 2026 or earlier. He mentioned those are committed and part of this STIP. Then, there would be a separate set of criteria applied to other projects to sort the funds in the remaining funding categories (buckets) and those would be the "held harmless" projects. Board member Lail asked Mr. Schronce was he understanding that correctly?

Mr. Schronce stated yes as far as the process is concerned, but that first cut of projects that fall into the STIP is what we're calling "held harmless" and then the reevaluation is the third step, which is the evaluation of the committed projects that we will continue and fill in the categories for all the remaining funding categories. Board member Lail shared it would be helpful for him to be able to take a schedule to his MPO meetings and show them what is happening in the workgroup meetings. Mr. Schronce shared the schedule presented still applies.

The plan is to meet with the workgroup through December and hopefully at the start of next year have conclusions on what that process fully looks like and what evaluation rescoring is needed. He stated this will happen early next year so that they can lead to a draft STIP in 2022. As they get a little closer to the start of next year and the workgroup ending, he shared he feels we will have set targets about when participation from different organizations will be needed at each step. Then we can clarify the calendar. He stated he shared with the workgroup that the Board desires to speed up or get to a conclusion as quickly as possible and they agreed. He stated he appreciates the feedback and that at the next update they will try to bring back a more refined schedule.

Chairman Fox stated he saw Board members Rosenburgh and Tarleton had their hands up. Chairman Fox stated he would start with Board member Rosenburgh. Board member Rosenburgh shared the Chairman raised a good point about getting numbers for the different scenarios and Board member Wells raised an excellent point as did Board member Lail about communication. He shared his experience is not all the elected officials are plugged in to the committees, MPO's, and RPO's. He mentioned we need some communication whether it's a press release or whether it's regional meetings. He stated those people are on the front lines and they are dealing with the citizens and know what their needs are. He stated he would encourage staff to do some basic accounting. He mentioned we need to know what's our revenue over the next five years for these roads. Then we need detail on what those projects are because Board members are being asked questions.

He stated the inflation number needs to come out so the Board members will know what that impact will be. He stated he didn't understand the 6.3 million where it starts and where it stops with respect to our projects. He stated he felt the Board has shown interest in the scoring criteria and have got to examine the criteria. He mentioned they definitely have to rescore to know where they are and then communicate that to the stakeholder groups. He stated once we have all that input then we must go back to the Governor and the Legislature. He shared he believed there's more funding for the department, but we must show we have a plan.

Chairman Fox thanked Board member Rosenburgh and stated he certainly agreed as well. He stated Mr. Schronce and his team are going to provide the Board with some of those numbers and hopefully we can then look at that and see which projects fall within certain categories. He shared he knows that's something our local people are interested in, and they'll be asked.

Chairman Fox called on Board member Tarleton. Board member Tarleton shared he thought Board member Wells has identified a very real issue and problem. He stated his suggestion would be for the Chairman and the Secretary to sit down with Deputy Secretary for Communications, Community Outreach & Public Engagement, Greer Beaty who runs a wonderful communications area and ask her and her staff to put together an action plan specific to addressing this problem and bring it to us at the November Board meeting.

Chairman Fox thanked Board member Tarleton and shared he would definitely do that because he also wants to make sure the Board members know the policy makers, local elected officials, and citizens are all aware of what the issue is and that they understand it. He mentioned he didn't want any misleading information such as financial mismanagement. He shared he wanted to give people accurate information and have them understand that it is not an issue of either mismanagement or unusual shortage of revenue, but rather that it is a cost issue. He shared we want the public to understand that, and I think that we've got a great communications office to help with that.

Board member Rosenburgh asked for a follow up and stated he felt it is important we set the narrative. It's not through mismanagement but things have changed and if we don't set the narrative, the story is going to be mismanagement again. He stated this is why it's so important we get these numbers so we can explain to people what it is and why it is. The sooner the better.

Chairman Fox asked for other questions or comments for discussion on this topic. There were no further responses from any member. Chairman Fox asked Mr. Schronce did he have anything else he wanted to add? Mr. Schronce shared this was a great conversation and the communication piece is something that we talk about here a lot, and he agrees setting the message is very important. Mr. Schronce thanked the Board for their time and comments. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Schronce and asked to please convey to the workgroup how much the Board appreciates the time and energy they're putting into this. The workgroup is a critical part of solving this problem.

David Wasserman, STIP Western Region, Manager provided a presentation on the Inflation Rate for 2024-2033 STIP. (Mr. Wasserman's presentation is located at the end of this document.)

He shared he works with Divisions 10 through 14 and very closely with Mike Stanley, Central Region and Leigh Wing, Eastern Region. He shared that at the August Board meeting Leigh Wing presented a few slides on inflation. He shared he was there to do a follow up that would include providing their staff recommendations on how to account for inflation in the 2024 - 2033 STIP. He shared he would give a quick refresher on inflation. He shared we need to account for inflation in the STIP for the increase in prices of goods and services overtime. He mentioned not only is it the fiscally prudent thing to do but it is also a requirement of the FHWA and FTA. He mentioned currently for the 2020 - 2029, STIP there is approximately a billion dollars withheld from programming projects. He shared as we look forward into the 2024- 2033 STIP cycle, one of the data sources we've been looking at is the National Highway Construction Costs (NHCC) indexer. The NHCC index is compiled by FHWA and is based on winning bids on highway construction contracts from across all states. Mr. Wasserman shared the price and quantity is included in the contract and what he is showing on the slide is a 10-year period from 2011 to 2021. It shows that costs have increased about an average of 2.5% a year. He mentioned the previous slide he showed was the national average. Next, he showed the North Carolina specific data. He shared this slide shows the same 10-year period with the NCDOT Construction cost index for that same period. Mr. Wasserman displayed on the slide where the increase is averaged about 3.9% over those ten years. Mr. Wasserman compares the two and points out that the changes on the national index are more subtle. There aren't any huge swings from year to year as seen on the NCDOT average. To assist with evaluating the appropriate inflation values for the 2024-2033 STIP, staff reviewed how other states accounted for inflation. To do this, they worked with the Institute of Translational Research and Education (ITRE) at NC State. They surveyed other states to see how they accounted for inflation and received 12 responses. From the twelve responses, it was learned that there is no standard approach and each state accounts for inflation differently, However, it appears most inflation rates vary between 2% and 4% compounded annually. Additionally, the twelve responses provided that the respondents STIP's are four to five years whereas North Carolina is 10 years in length. This is due to North Carolina's STI law.

Mr. Wasserman shared in the August Board meeting Leigh Wing presented several different inflation values that we could use for the next STIP ranging from 1% to 5%. He stated the available funding in each of the 22 STI funding categories (buckets) could compound inflation

annually for the first five years and then hold the value constant for the remaining part. He shared the higher the inflation percentage that we use and the more money we put in the reserve account means we have fewer dollars available for programming other projects. He stated we are currently using 1% inflation in the 2020-2029 STIP for the first five years, then holding it constant for year 6 to 10.

Mr. Wasserman stated after careful consideration, NCDOT staff are recommending 2.5% compounded annually for the first five years, and then we hold this value constant for years 6 thru 10. He added that this coincides with the national average at NHCC which falls within the range used by other states. He stated if we hold out too much inflation, we may not have sufficient projects in the development pipeline in the future. This could limit our ability to have competitive projects for future federal grants as well. He stated sometimes there are project delays that arise during development and if we have fewer projects in the STIP there's less opportunity to adjust schedules to maintain a constant delivery program for our industry.

Mr. Wasserman mentioned they would reevaluate the appropriate inflation percentages every time we develop the STIP, which would be every two years it would come back to the Board.

At that time, the meeting was turned back over to Chairman Fox for discussion. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Wasserman. Chairman Fox asked for other questions or comments for discussion on this topic. Chairman Fox stated he saw Board member Tarleton's hand up. Board member Tarleton mentioned he heard they are recommending 2.5% but was wondering if we are asking other states what are they doing in this area? He shared we can't be the only state affected by inflation. Mr. Wasserman stated that was a great question and the answer was yes. They sent the survey out to all 49 states and received 12 responses back. The range of inflation values received from the survey respondent were from 2% to 4% approximately. The department is within that range with other states. Board member Tarleton mentioned he would feel more comfortable at 3% rather than 2.5%.

Board member Rosenburgh stated the issue is not how much money will have left for programming but is to be realistic in our inflation so we know if we will have money to do these projects. He shared he felt the national numbers are relevant when you look at North Carolina being one of the fastest growing regions in the country. Our state prices are going up a lot faster than North Dakota or lowa, and other places like that. He shared he thought Board member Tarleton made a good point. Board member Rosenburgh stated 3% should be the minimum over the life of the project. He shared how can you stop at five years and say after five years it will be zero. He stated he felt we would need to review every two years because things change.

He mentioned at least we would have realistically budgeted a number that makes sense. Chairman Fox thanked Board member Rosenburgh.

Board member Lathrop shared he had a big picture comment and maybe an overall sort of higher-level strategic concept. He stated in certain ways we are a victim of our own success in North Carolina with growth which has caused all these escalations but also in the modern era, here we are dealing with disruptions in technology and data with flow of information that is forcing us to increase the pace with what we are doing. He shared the department is becoming a \$5 to \$6 billion annual construction management firm. He shared he felt we need to evolve as an organization and not reinvent the wheel on this. He asked are their other resources out there that we could tap to help us do this? Whether that's consultants or other resources who have experienced similar growth pressures and cost escalations. He stated he knows we have great people here on our team internal to NCDOT who are wrestling with this new process and how we are going to change in the future to avoid these problems. Board member Taft stated there was a comment that described the downside risk of being overly conservative on our inflation estimate related with federal matches. He asked Mr. Wasserman if he could elaborate on that for him. Mr. Wasserman shared the greater the inflation value, means less money now for programming projects for the STIP.

Board member Wells stated the rate for inflation is largely a function of whether we want to under promise and over deliver and that needs to be in our minds when we look at that rate. He mentioned we have a massive series of experts we work with on a regular basis that we could go to and get answers about inflation. He stated those are the guys that sell concrete, steel, stone, and asphalt. Why don't we ask them every year how they're planning to run their business? He shared he gets his information about cost increases from asking his contractors.

Chairman Fox thanked Board member Wells and shared he made a great point. He shared we are very fortunate in North Carolina to have great group of partners to work with. He stated we manage construction projects, and we don't build them all ourselves.

Vice-Chair Perkins shared inflation rates are based upon what the cost of a project is going to cost you over time. He shared right now the rate of inflation is far exceeding what we have budgeted our projects for. He mentioned in the last year in a half, prices have gone up in terms of material costs and on average of 25% from everything from steel to nuts and bolts. He stated the same thing goes for the labor for hiring contractors. Their cost for labor is sometimes as much as 35% and some don't even have the labor and therefore it drives your project out 1 and 2 years. He stated the real issue for the department is what is it going to cost to complete

projects over the next 10 years. And what is the appropriate inflation rate the department should be using to be able to make sure they can fund those projects as they come up on the STIP?

Vice-Chair Perkins stated we need to let people know that inflation and cost for materials and labor have caused us issues in terms of how much money we have to be able to complete projects. Now is the time to be able to get to a position where we can actually afford what we have to build. Chairman Fox stated Vice-Chair Perkins made a great point. Chairman Fox shared he agreed with the Board and the staff that the number that we have been using is too low. He shared we asked the staff to come and give the Board a recommendation which they have done today at 2.5%. The issue before the Board that he'd like to see consensus on is the number the Board would like to direct the staff to plug in for the next STIP round and what we're looking at going forward. He mentioned he heard Board member Tarleton say 3% and Board member Rosenburgh said a minimum of 3%. Chairman Fox asked is their consensus or any other thoughts out there? Board member Clarke stated he was good with 3% realizing we would need to look at it every 2 years. Board member Lathrop stated he wanted to add compound to the 3%. Chairman Fox shared this item didn't require a formal vote from the board, because they can direct staff to adjust at any time.

Chairman Fox stated he is seeing there is consensus at directing the staff to calculate the interest rate for the STIP at 3% and asked Mr. Wasserman if he was clear on what the Board members requested. Mr. Wasserman asked for one clarification whether the Board was asking for 3% compound annually for the first five years and then hold constant for year 6 to 10 or is it 3% compound for all 10 years? He shared the staff recommendation is for the first five years and then holding that numbers steady for years 6 to 10.

Board member Clarke shared since they would be looking at this again, he would recommend the 3% compound for the first five years. He shared after that it's incumbent upon the Board to look at the numbers again and come up with the correct number. Board member Lathrop agreed with Board member Clarke. Board member Rosenburgh stated he felt the Board needed something in place because it's unrealistic to think of zero. He shared the Board should maybe start visiting this topic annually, and not every two years.

There was discussion regarding inflation consensus and confusion about how years 6-10 are handled. Chairman Fox stated because there is some confusion over how inflation is treated after the five years, he would like to direct staff at this meeting to proceed with the 3% compounded annually through the first five years, and come back to the Board at the November

meeting with a concrete example and walk the Board through year one at 3% this is what we count for inflation, year 2, 3, 4,5, 6 all the way to 10 so that they can understand what they are recommending. Mr. Wasserman shared they would look into the best way to communicate that to the Board at the next meeting. Chairman Fox stated once the Board understands what they are recommending they will make a decision about any modification to the 3% and how it is treated. Chairman Fox asked if any Board member was not okay with that plan. There were no responses or opposition from any member. Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Wasserman for the presentation to the Board.

Johanna Reese, Deputy Secretary provided a legislative update to the Board. Ms. Reese shared an update on the State Budget with the Board. She stated the budget is in the hands of the Governor and the Legislative leadership.

She shared the agency bill was on the Senate floor today and they would go into session. She mentioned once she finished with the Board meeting, she would be heading over there to make sure everything is in order. She shared presuming it passes the Senate, it will go back to the House where the House will either concur with Senate changes or not. She mentioned she was excited the agency bill seems to be approaching its final passage. She shared on the federal side the Board members received a good briefing from Burt Tasaico in the Finance committee, but she just wanted to add that both the Secretary and the Chairman have had some conversations with our congressional delegation members who are expressing their support and requesting support for the infrastructure bill that contains the surface transportation reauthorization. Chairman Fox asked for questions or comments for Ms. Reese. There were no further responses from any member.

Product Evaluation Program Awareness

Chairman Fox noted that copies of this month's Product Evaluation Program Awareness update were provided to members of the Board for review and posted on the Board's website.

Other Business/Announcements

Chairman Fox shared the Board had their first ever Board of Transportation retreat this past June. He stated he appreciated everyone's participation and interest and would like to provide a brief update. He stated he asked Ann Dishong and her team to y work on taking the areas of focus that you as the Board identified to work on over the next couple of years and start working those strategically into the board's committees. This allows our committees to begin vetting those issues and bring them before the full Board for insight and possibly action. He stated Ann and her team have been meeting with the committee Chairs, Vice- Chairs and their staff contacts to identify the strategic topics per committee for 2022. He stated he and Vice-Chair Perkins are looking forward to receiving the first draft of the Board's long-range plan for 2022 in the next couple of weeks. He shared they will review it and then get back to the committees.

Chairman Fox stated he would declare a brief five-minute recess before the official Board session. He asked all members to be back at 2:30pm. He reminded members they didn't have to leave the meeting and they could just turn their video and mic off.

Official Board Meeting

Chairman Fox welcomed all Board members back to the meeting and declared the start to the official Board session. He mentioned he didn't think he needed to do another roll call since we just had one previously.

Approval – September 1-2, 2021 Meeting Minutes

Chairman Fox stated the meeting minutes from the September 1-2, 2021, were distributed for review prior to the meeting. Chairman Fox stated if there are no additions or corrections, he would accept a motion to approve the September 1-2, 2021 meeting minutes of the Board of Transportation. A motion was made by Board Member Tarleton and a second by Board Member Clarke.

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Board member Moran joined after the roll call.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Honorary Designations

Chairman Fox presented a resolution to honorarily designate Interstate 73 from Interstate 40 to Joseph M. Bryan Boulevard in Guilford County the Senator Kay Hagan Highway. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Chairman Fox and seconded by Board Member Zimmer. Chairman Fox invited Chip Hagan, husband of the late Senator to speak. Mr. Hagan thanked the Board for the recognition. He shared Kay was very committed to the development and growth of North Carolina in the highway system. She played such an integral part in that development and growth and having a highway named after her was not only appropriate but very much appreciated by her family. Mr. Hagan thanked the Board again for this resolution. Chairman Fox asked Mayor Vaughn if she would like to make a comment. Mayor Vaughn thanked the Chairman and shared she was happy a portion of the loop will be named after Senator Kay Hagan. She shared that portion of the highway leads into the airport and is one of the biggest economic development drivers. She stated the control tower that is seen on that route was helped by Senator Kay Hagan to secure funding. She shared she felt it is a natural place for that part of the highway to be named where she brought such an economic impact to their city. Chairman Fox thanked Mayor Vaughn for her comments. Chairman Fox asked Senator Vaughn if he would like to make any comments. Senator Vaughn stated he was fortunate to replace Senator Kay Hagan in the North Carolina Senate. He shared she was totally irreplaceable there and on behalf of Wake Forest Law School, the highest award in State and Local Government and Wake Forest Law School has been named the Kay Hagan Award. Chairman Fox thanked the guest for their comments he shared it was safe to say the entire community misses Senator Kay Hagan. He stated they are most proud to be able to honor her work in this way. (A copy of the resolution is at the end of this document).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Chairman Fox presented a resolution naming the bridge on US 421 over NC 24 near the beginning of Sunset Avenue in Clinton, NC the Officer Donald Ray Tucker Bridge. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Chairman Fox and seconded by Board Member Tillman. Chairman Fox asked if Mr. Reggie Tucker the brother of officer Donald Ray Tucker had any comments. Mr. Tucker thanked the Board for passing the resolution and it is a great honor to receive this for his brother. (A copy of the resolution is at the end of this document).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Board member Mitchell presented a resolution naming the bridge on NC 222 over I-795 in Wayne County the Mayor Andy Evans Bridge. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board member Mitchell and seconded by Vice-Chair Perkins. Chairman Fox asked if Ms. Evans would like to make any comments. Ms. Evans thanked the Chairman, the Secretary, and the Board members for this opportunity to speak. She shared her family is

honored by this dedication for her father's life. She shared he was a steward of the land, his community, and his office. She shared he would always use this quote from Luke chapter 12 verse 48 which said, "To whom much is given much is expected". She stated her father understood that with his talents and gifts they were meant to serve others. Ms. Evans thanked the Board and shared she couldn't think of a better location as this bridge overlooks his beloved farm and town of Fremont. Chairman Fox thanked Ms. Evans and shared the Board is honored to be able to honor her father. (A copy of the resolution is at the end of this document).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Board member Lathrop presented a resolution naming the bridge on US 601 that crosses over US 74 in Monroe the Sergeant Jeffrey W Greene Bridge. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board member Lathrop and seconded by Board member Tarleton. Chairman Fox invited Ms. Deyton for comments. Ms. Deyton stated on behalf of her family she would like to thank the Board for this honor. She shared her father served God, family, community, and his country. She stated she was very humbled and honored to accept this resolution. Chairman Fox thanked Ms. Deyton for her remarks and shared the Board was pleased to honor his life and service. (A copy of the resolution is at the end of this document).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Secretary's Remarks

Secretary Boyette welcomed members of the Board, staff, and those joining virtually.

AASHTO Contest

Secretary Boyette shared details on the AASHTO Contest with members of the Board. He shared the project to transform business 40 in downtown Winston-Salem which now called Salem Parkway is a finalist in the 2021 America's Transportation Awards competition put on by the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials, or AASHTO. He stated this is a big deal. He shared this is one of just 12 projects nationwide and the only one from NCDOT that is in the finals. He shared the department is up for two awards, the National Grand Prize and the People's Choice Award. He mentioned the winner of each project gets \$10,000 for a charity or transportation-related scholarships of their choosing. He shared he urges everyone to visit bit.ly/3ome3mv and vote for the project once per day per device through the contest deadline of October 25. He stated through the first week of voting in the competition, the project was in 4th place. He mentioned many may recall the work that went into this unprecedented project, overhauling a 1.2 mile stretch of U.S. 421. The project features a series of safety upgrades, multimodal improvements and aesthetic enhancements including the addition of a multi-use path, reduced interchanges, rehabilitated pavement, reconstructed shoulders, ramps, 10 bridge replacements, bike lanes and two new signature pedestrian bridges. He shared never in the history of our state has a section of freeway been closed in both directions at the same time for reconstruction. He shared they listened to the community, which overwhelmingly favored a 2-year full closure project versus a 6-year partial closure of Business 40 during construction. He shared this project required a significant amount of agency coordination and collaboration and extensive public involvement and outreach. Secretary Boyette shared he wanted to make sure Division 9, our project team and partners bring home the hardware for their hard work. Please help us by voting daily.

Litter

Secretary Boyette detailed the department's litter collection efforts with the Board. He shared the department just wrapped up the fall litter sweep. During that time more than 418,000 pounds of roadside litter was picked up statewide. Secretary Boyette thanked everyone who participated and stated every little bit truly helps. He mentioned the crews, contractors and volunteers have now surpassed 10.5 million pounds of litter picked up from roadsides this year, setting a single-year litter collection record. He stated while this is a great accomplishment, this is not something we celebrate. He shared the department spent more than \$13 million this year alone on litter cleanup. He shared they would much rather be in a situation where everyone is putting their trash in its proper place, so we don't need to spend time and money and call on volunteers to help clean up our roadsides. He shared since that's not the reality at this time, he would reiterate how thankful the department is for all our partners who help keep North Carolina beautiful.

DBE Meetings

Secretary Boyette updated the Board on the department's disadvantaged business outreach meetings. He shared the department had another good wave of outreach to small and disadvantaged businesses over the past month. He shared they held informational meetings, mostly virtual, with half the divisions on September 11th and the other half on the September 25th. He mentioned more than 100 firms participated in these meetings, where the division staff talked to them about how they can do business with the department. He stated we do this to be sure DBEs are aware of the hundreds of contracts we advertise and award each year for all kinds of projects. These outreach meetings are one way we've been able to help people compete for our contracts, work with the department, and grow their businesses. They have shown us people really are interested in learning more about working with NCDOT. Secretary Boyette shared they plan to continue holding these outreach events periodically and the next round will be in January 2022.

Vaccine Rides

Secretary Boyette detailed the vaccine rides with the Board. Secretary Boyette shared with COVID-19 booster shots now being recommended for thousands of eligible North Carolinians, they wanted to remind everyone of the department's partnership with the Department of Health and Human Services to help get people transportation to and from vaccine sites. He shared since January of this year, NCDOT and NCDHHS have administered \$2.5 million in Coronavirus Relief Funding to offset the operating costs associated with transit

rides to and from vaccination sites for people who are receiving or helping someone else get the COVID-19 vaccine. He stated this service is also extended to people getting their booster shots. He shared the federally funded program has already helped 85 transit agencies statewide pay for transportation for more than 10,000 people to get a vaccine. The initiative will continue until the funds are exhausted. Secretary Boyette thanked the department's transit partners for all they do to help the citizens and residents of our great state.

Powell Bill

Secretary Boyette shared details related to the Powell Bill with the Board. He shared the department has distributed the first wave of state street aid to more than 500 municipalities. He shared the department would be disbursing more than \$143.1 million in Powell Bill funding to 509 municipalities this year. These funds are used mainly to resurface town streets, but can also be used to maintain, repair, construct or widen streets, bridges and drainage areas, or to plan, construct and maintain bike paths, greenways or sidewalks.

Passenger Ferry Season Ends

Secretary Boyette shared an update on the Passenger Ferry Season with the Board. He shared the department's passenger ferry just wrapped up its third season and the numbers showed people are taking advantage of the service. He shared nearly 16,600 people rode the Ocracoke Express passenger ferry between June 21 and Labor Day this year. The passenger ferry lets riders skip the vehicle ferry waits and cruise directly between Hatteras and Ocracoke Village. He shared a survey showed 94 percent of passengers rated it as either "excellent" or "good." The Ferry Division plans to bring back the Ocracoke Express next summer. Secretary Boyette stated for more information please visit ncferry.org.

Bonner Pier

Secretary Boyette shared updates on the Bonner Pier with the Board. He shared down east, a section of the old Herbert C. Bonner Bridge on the Outer Banks reopened last week, as a fishing and pedestrian pier. He mentioned officials with the Cape Hatteras National Seashore opened the bridge to the public Friday morning and dozens of eager fishermen were lined up to try it out. NCDOT retrofitted 1,046 feet of the old bridge with structural and cosmetic repairs, brand new railings, and an ADA compliant walkway. He shared the National Park service will operate and maintain the facility. Secretary Boyette shared the rest of the Bonner Bridge was replaced by the Basnight Bridge in 2019.

Football Trains

Secretary Boyette shared details of the Football Train with the Board. He mentioned it is now football season and he would like to remind everyone the department is making it easy for Panthers' fans to get to the games. NC By Train is hosting football trains that carry fans to and from select home games in Charlotte. In addition to not having to drive, this option also comes without the hassle of traffic and parking. He shared the trains arrive in Charlotte at 9:40 a.m. and depart at 7 p.m. Secretary Boyette stated for more details or to purchase tickets, visit ncbytrain.org and click on "deals."

CLEAR Winners

Secretary Boyette shared updates on the CLEAR Winners with the Board. Secretary Boyette stated he had the pleasure to announce the winners of a new innovation challenge, the CLEAR Challenge. He shared the CLEAR program, which stands for "Communicate Lessons, Exchange Advice, Record" launched the first annual CLEAR Challenge on August 16th. The theme this year was "Implemented Innovation." He shared the highly qualified panel of judges selected the following winners:

- Frist place was awarded for the innovation to go paperless by using QR codes for e-ticketing. This idea was submitted by Division 14 Assistant Resident Engineers Kenny McCourt and Nathan Tanner, and Highway Construction and Materials System Tech Luke Templeton.
- Runner-up went to Division 3 GIS Analyst Michael Madsen, Project Manager
 Trace Howell, Division Utility Engineer Lonny Sleeper and Utility Coordinator
 Monica DuVal for their idea to use GIS for a Right-of-Way and Utility Dashboard
 that can quickly and clearly identify or track priority parcels and display the
 associated right of way costs.
- Honorable mention goes to the creators of a review appraisal worksheet that
 cuts down on review time and mathematical errors for appraisal offices. This was
 submitted by Laura Gourlay on behalf of Boris Robinson, who developed the
 worksheet. They are review appraisers in the Right of Way Unit Area 5
 Appraisal Office (Divisions 13 and 14).

Secretary Boyette shared the first place and runner-up winners got to present their ideas at this week's Research and Innovation Summit. The Secretary congratulated all the winners and thanked everyone who submitted an idea or participated in this challenge.

Aviation Honor

Secretary Boyette shared updates on the Aviation Honor with the Board. He shared it was his great honor to recognize Aviation Director Bobby Walston, who was recently presented

the 2021 Willard G. Plentl Aviation Professional of the Year Award from the North Carolina Airports Association. This award recognizes service to North Carolina's aviation sector that exemplifies the ideals of Plentl, the former NCDOT director of aviation and founding member of the airports association's predecessor organization, who contributed more than 50 years of professional service to the business of aviation in North Carolina. Secretary Boyette shared Bobby Walston, has served with the Division of Aviation for nearly 30 years, initially worked under and was mentored by Plentl. Secretary mentioned nominators said Walston demonstrates the same brand of leadership, commitment to aviation, community involvement, and works tirelessly to raise awareness about aviation's impact on North Carolina and the nation.

DELEGATED AUTHORITY ITEMS

Chairman Fox stated that items C, D, E, H, and L are delegated to the Secretary and require no formal action by the Board.

Item C: All bids were rejected for the project on page 11 of 12. The remaining projects were awarded by the Secretary to the low bidder.

Consideration of Projects

Chairman Fox asked members of the Board to announce any recusals to the action items within the presented project items. Recusals made by members of the Board on project items are noted below.

Chairman Fox invited a motion to approve the project items as presented.

A motion was made by Board Member Moran and seconded by Board Member Clarke to approve all projects for items G, I, K, M, N, O, P, R, S, and T. (excluding items C, D, E, H, and L as they are delegated authority items and require no formal Board action).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Overholt, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Jordan, Tillman, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Clarke, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Chairman Fox stated he would skip the committee reports for this month since they had full Board attendance in both committee meetings. He shared the Highways Committee, and the Finance Committee were both great meetings with good discussion today.

Other Business/Closing Comments

Chairman Fox shared everyone should have received the save the date for our holiday dinner. He shared he is excited to go back to Margaux's, which is the venue the Board used in 2019. He mentioned transportation to and from will be provided.

Chairman Fox stated Chris Moore, Board Secretary, is still collecting contributions for the coffee fund this month. He asked members to please write a check to the NCDOT Coffee Fund in the amount of \$125 and provide to Ms. Moore. He shared in addition to celebratory or sympathy occasions, the coffee fund covers many costs throughout the year.

The next meeting of the Board of Transportation is currently scheduled for November 3-4, 2021. Chairman Fox shared he is in constant discussion with the Secretary about the status of the COVID pandemic across the state and whether we can have a meeting in person for next month.

Board Member Lathrop recused himself from voting on the following projects:

- Item K Project P-5705A, WBS 44475.3.1; Charlotte Gateway Station Wye Connection Track at Charlotte Junction. Initial funds are requested for construction. This is a Cash Flow project with \$4,211,000.00 in SFY 22 and SFY 23.

Plenary Broadband Infrastructure (PBI) 21IM.21 This Operations, Maintenance, and Commercialization Agreement (OMCA) is for PBI to operate and maintain NCDOT broadband assets (including fiber, conduit, and ITS devices) along 600 miles of I-95, U.S. 70, and U.S. 74 right of way. PBI will install further broadband assets which it shall commercialize. The revenues from this commercialization will be shared with NCDOT and used to reduce the operations and maintenance (O&M) costs of NCDOT's broadband assets.

National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak) 42801.3.F2 43413 This Agreement includes the operations for Federal Fiscal Year 2022 for Amtrak to operate rail passenger service under the name Carolinian (Trains 79 & 80) between Charlotte and Washington, D. C. This Agreement will cover all costs associated with the operation of the Carolinian including locomotive fuel, host railroad payments, and the estimated capital cost for Amtrak-owned passenger train equipment. The estimated cost to the Department included in the agreement for the period October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022 is \$9,290,723. This cost will be reduced by Federal funding provided through the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act of 2021, and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021.

National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak) 42801.3.F2

This Agreement includes the operations for Fiscal Year 2022 for Amtrak to operate rail passenger service under the name Piedmont (Trains 73, 74, 75, 76, 77 & 78) between Charlotte and Raleigh. This Agreement will cover all costs for Amtrak's operation of the Piedmont. The estimated cost to the Department included in the agreement for the period October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022 is \$6,126,519. This cost will be reduced by Federal funding provided through the Coronavirus Response and Relief

provided through the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act of 2021, and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021.

NC Department of Environmental Quality, Division of Air Quality C-5601C 50062.4.2 10985 This Project consists of the continuation and enhancing a program of education, outreach, and partnerships to affect driving behaviors; encouraging vehicle maintenance; supporting transportation alternatives, energy conservation, and energy alternatives; and partnering with local, state, and Federal agencies, in an effort to improve air quality in North Carolina. On July 1, 2021, in accordance with the Governor's recommended budget, the Board approved a partial allocation of maintenance funds in the amount of \$1,087,731,212. At the time of the partial allocation, the General Assembly had not ratified House Bill 555. As of October 1, 2021, when this agenda item was prepared, Senate Bill 105 had not been ratified by the General Assembly. At this time, however, staff recommends allocating an additional \$406,787,935 for General Maintenance Reserve, Roadside Environmental, Contract Resurfacing, Pavement Preservation, Bridge Program, and Bridge Preservation.

The recommended supplemental allocation of \$406,787,935 will increase the total FY 2022 maintenance allocation to \$1,494,519,147. This amount represents the minimum appropriation proposed for maintenance programs this fiscal year and does not exceed the appropriations specified in the FY 2021-23 Continuation budget.

It is recommended that funds within each of the above program categories be allocated in accordance with the figures detailed in Table 1 on Page S-2.

The Board previously approved \$205,000,000 for General Maintenance Reserve as part of the July 1, 2021 partial allocation. To support ongoing maintenance and operations activities, and to avoid contract and scheduling delays, staff recommends allocating an additional \$135,265,380 for General Maintenance Reserve at this time. - A substantial increase over existing levels occurs.
 - Future noise levels are 10 dB(A) or more over existing



Abatement

Where impacts occur, we must consider abatement. We build

abatement that is:

- Feasible
- Reasonable
- Practicable (for some state projects)



Most of the time, "abatement" means noise wall.

Feasibility

Acoustic feasibility: 5 dB(A) reduction for at least 2 impacted receptors

Engineering feasibility:

adverse impacts to property access, drainage, topography, utilities, safety, and maintenance

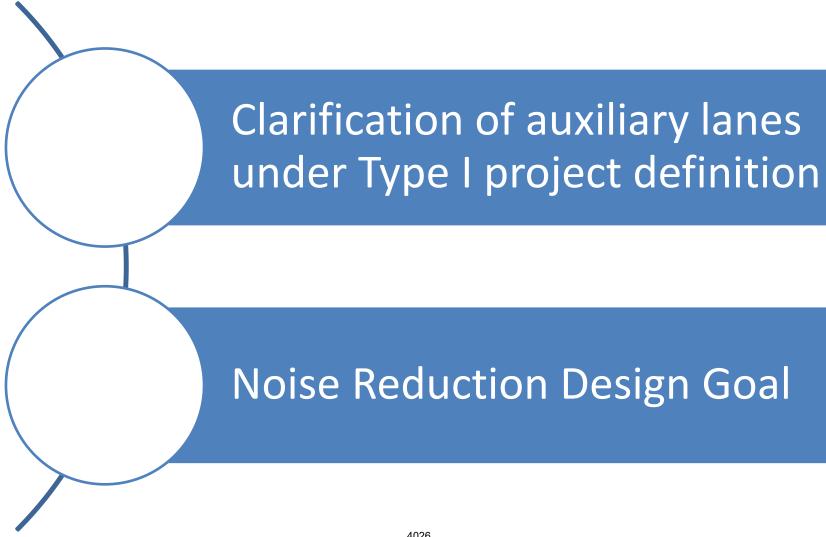

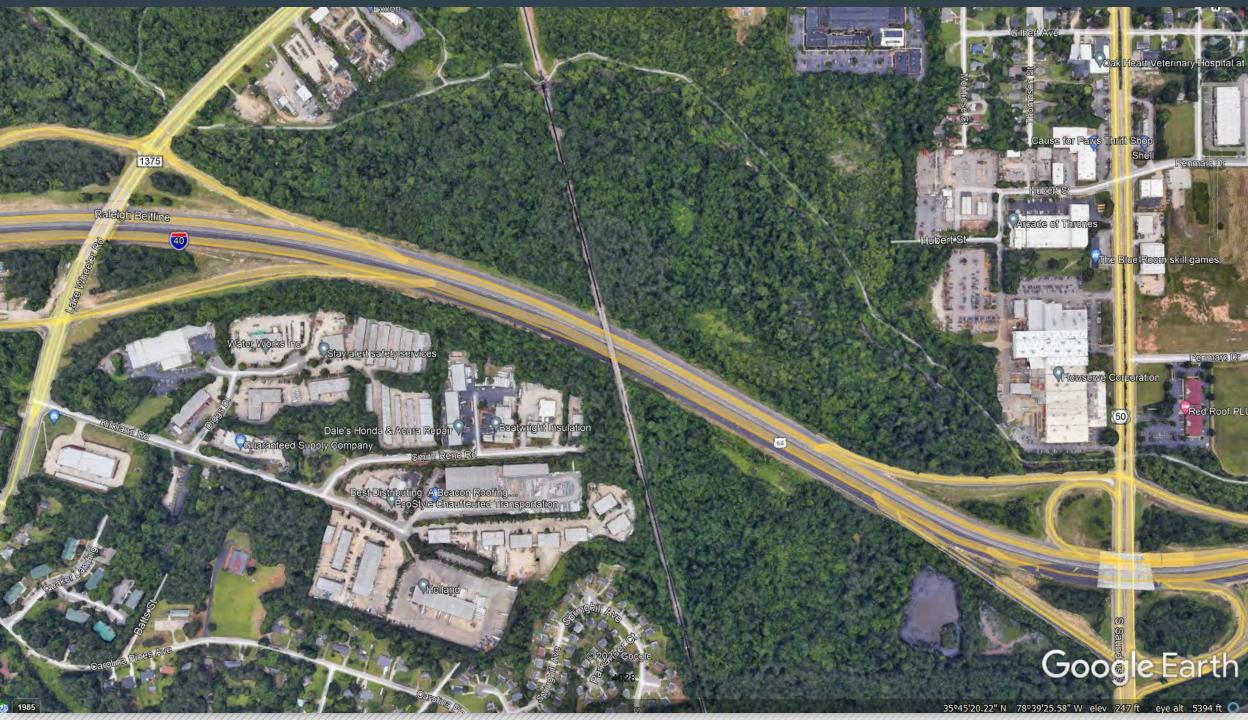

Noise Reduction Design Goal

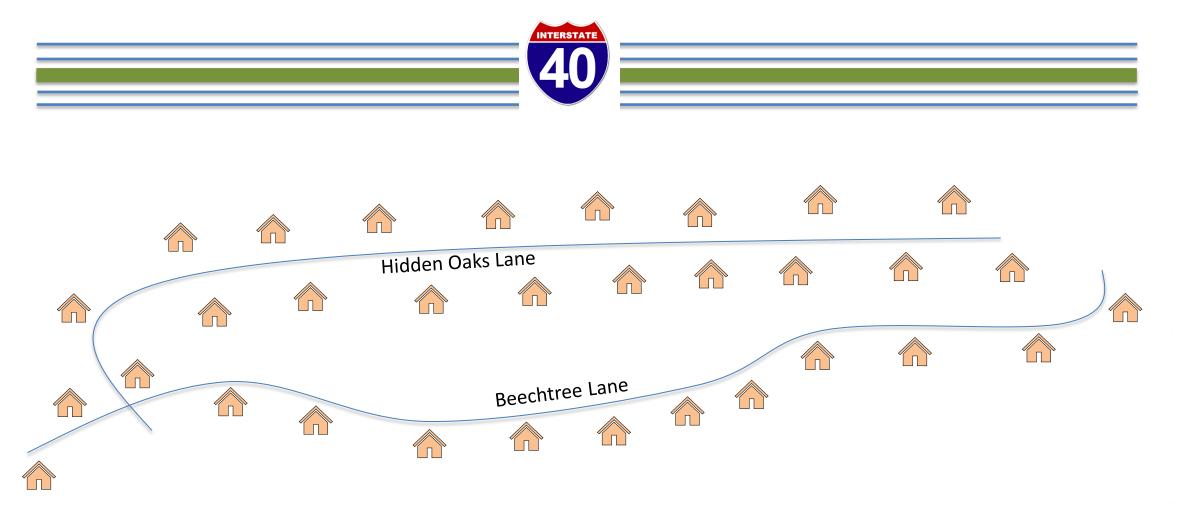
Replace:

A noise reduction design goal of at least 7 dB(A) must be <u>evaluated</u> for <u>all</u> <u>benefited receptors</u>. At least one benefited receptor must achieve the noise reduction design goal of 7 dB(A) to indicate the proposed noise barrier effectively reduces traffic noise.

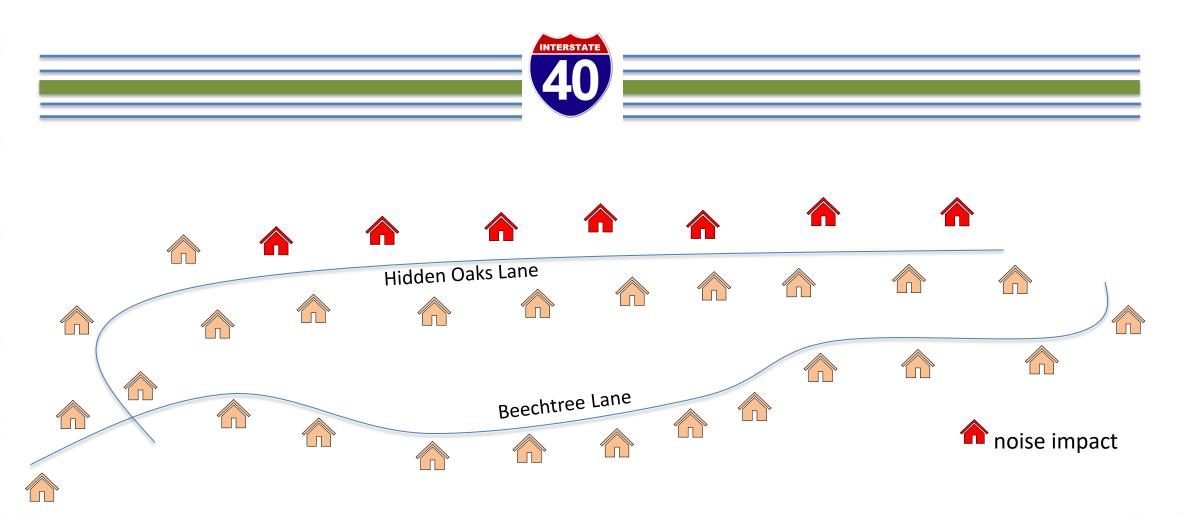
With:

A noise reduction design goal of 7 dB(A) must be achieved for at least one benefited receptor, whether impacted or not. If it can be achieved for one benefit, then the barrier shall be optimized to <u>achieve 7 dB(A) at as many impacted receptors as possible.</u> The initial evaluation of at least one NRDG is focused on all benefits. The subsequent assessment of achieving NRDG at additional receptors is focused only on impacts.

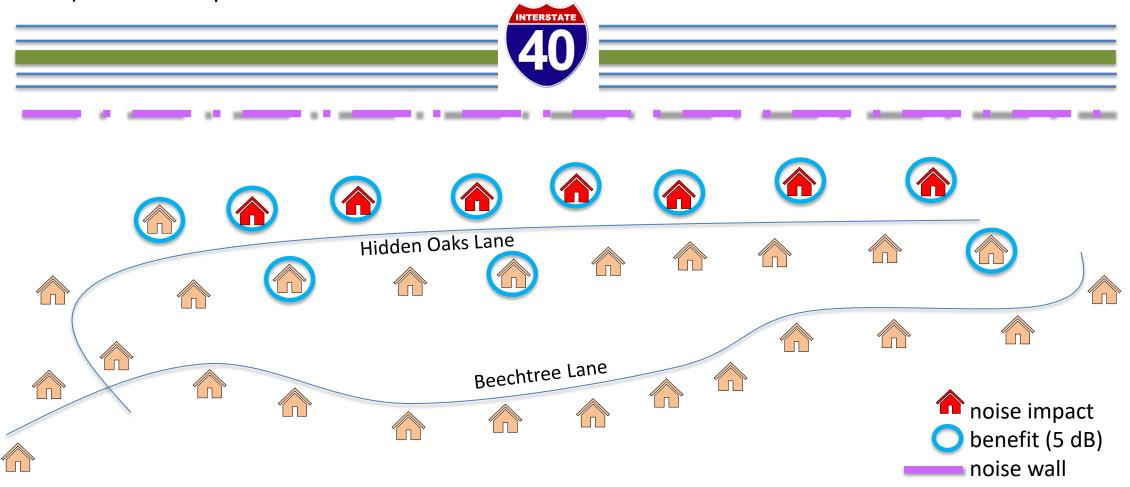
Step 1: Undertake a noise study for this highway widening project. This means we predict future noise levels (project built) at all these houses to determine which are impacted and if noise abatement meets feasibility and reasonableness criteria.



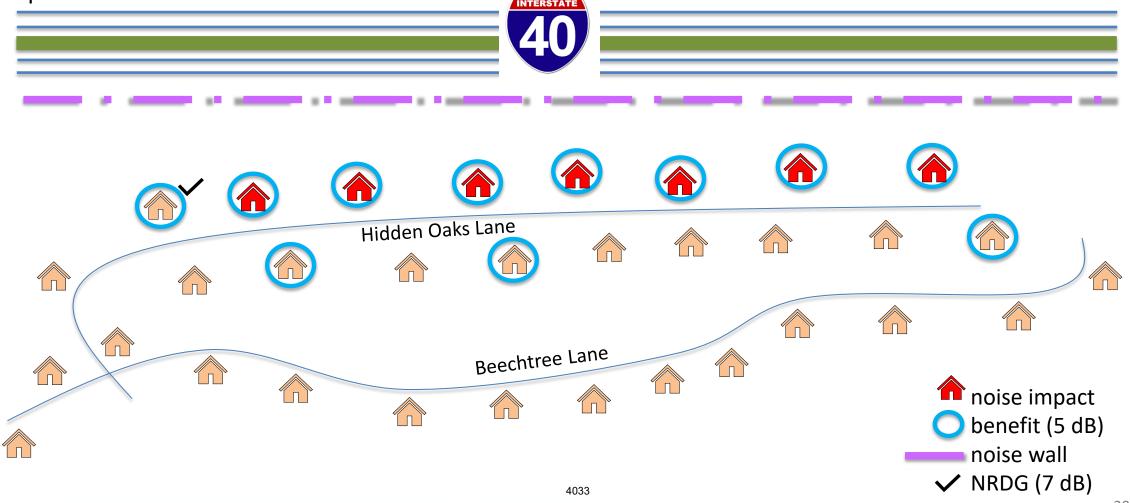
Step 2: Predict noise impacts. Homes that will be impacted (as defined by Policy) by noise in the future have turned red.



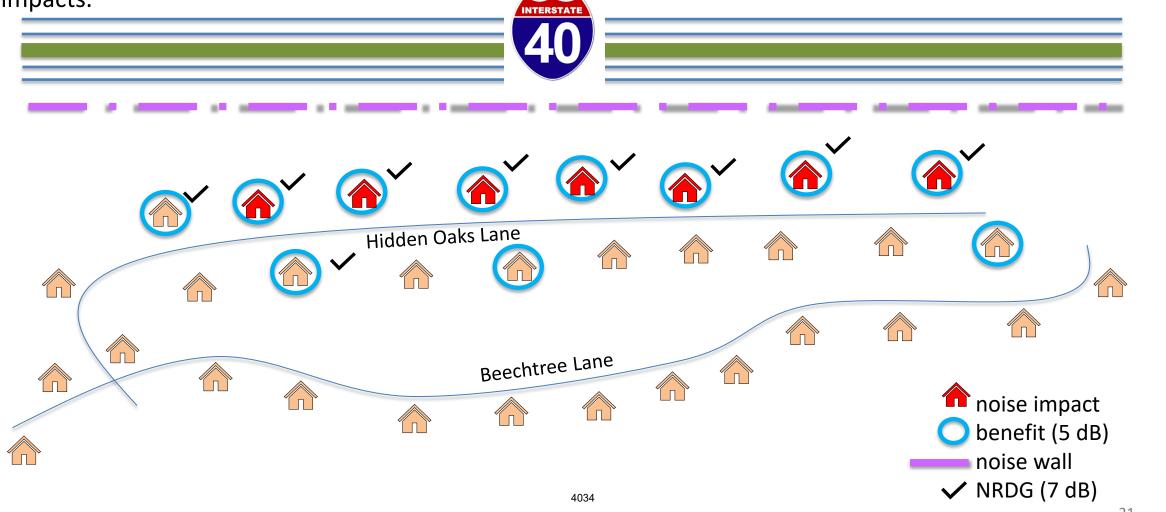
Step 3: Design noise wall to benefit impacted homes. At least two reds must be benefited, but all reds must be benefited if possible. We were able to benefit all the reds with the wall, so they are now circled. But notice in designing this wall, we incidentally benefited homes that were not impacted (circled beige houses). This is acceptable but not the intent.



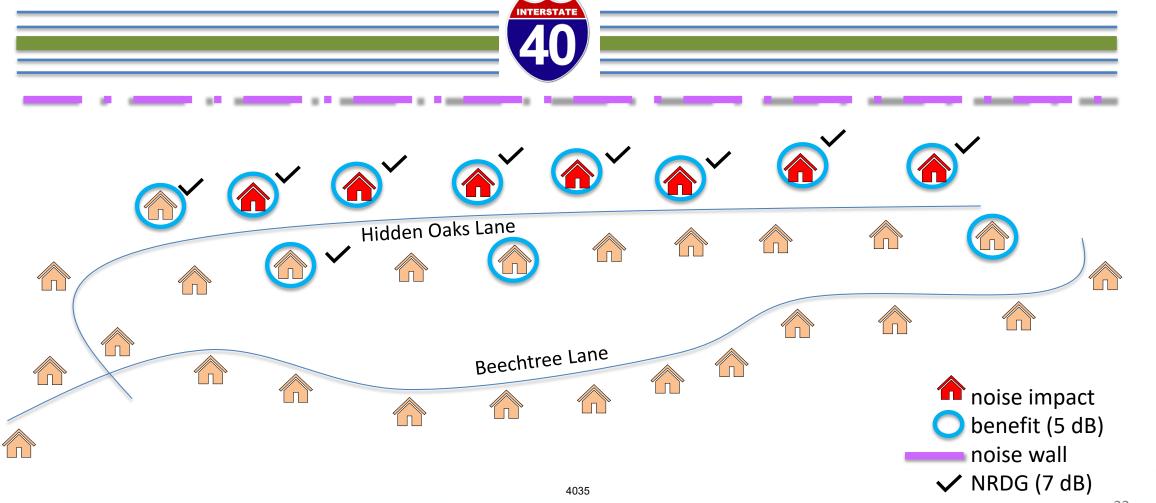
Step 4: Achieve noise reduction design goal (NRDG) of 7 decibels for one benefit, whether impacted or not (any circle, regardless of color). We were able to do this at the beige (not impacted) house with a check mark, so we now know the wall is acoustically reasonable. But we aren't done...there is another step in NRDG evaluation.



Step 5: Optimize wall to achieve NRDG (check marks) for as many red houses as possible by making wall taller and longer. In this example, we achieved a 7-decibel reduction at all the red houses. We also achieved 7 decibels at two of the beige houses. This is okay but the focus was on the red houses since those are the impacts.



Step 6: Verify wall complies with other criteria, including cost effectiveness. Summary of acoustic evaluation: at least two impacts must receive a 5-decibel reduction (acoustically feasible), and at least one house must receive a 7-decibel reduction for a wall to be constructed (acoustically reasonable). The version that gets built is the one that achieves the most 7s (checkmarks) for red homes while meeting other criteria.

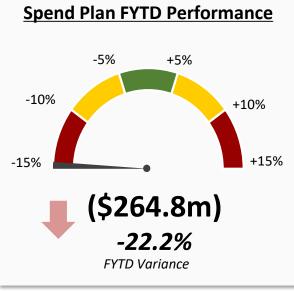


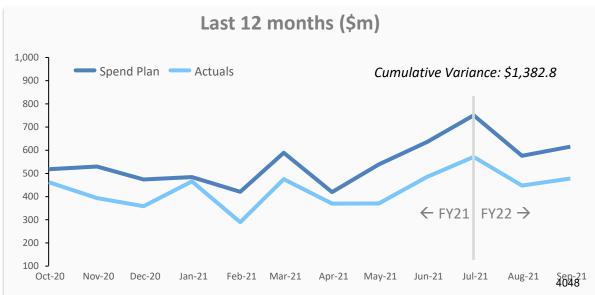
Revenue Commentary

- Total Revenues continue to trend in line with Spend Plan projections
- Federal revenues were higher than plan in August due to the timing of GARVEE debt service reimbursement
- Continuing to monitor for potential forecast changes due to COVID impacts – no amendment currently required
- Overall state revenues were \$9M (2.6%) less in August and \$8M (1.1%) less SFY to date
- Fuel consumption and therefore motor fuel tax revenues were \$4M (2.2%) less in August
- Truck and vehicle registrations along with driver licenses revenues were down a total of \$3M (5%)
- Highway Use Tax was on target for the month and SFY to date continues at \$10M (6.6%) above target

Expense Commentary

- Spending on Right of Way and Preliminary Engineering are in line with Spend Plan
- Macro-economic factors, including volatile commodity prices, supply chain impacts, material shortages, and labor availability are impacting partners' ability to spend as projected
- Current underspend to Plan is primarily driven by TIP, Bridge Program, Contract Resurfacing, and Pavement Preservation
- As a result, management is contemplating an amendment to the Spend Plan with a 15%-25% reduction in spend targets in these areas

Spend Plan Monitoring

NCDOT has focused on continual improvement in its Spend Plan forecasting processes and procedures, including increased engagement with SAS Forecasting and additional retention of 3rd party advisors



As a result of this ongoing monitoring, NCDOT is evaluating a Spend Plan amendment to adjust for lower rates of spend due to labor, material and other supply issues impacting project delivery

Detailed Report

Financial Analysis

- **HF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$366.1 million in August 2020 to \$1,080.1 million in August 2021. An increase of \$714.0 million or 195.0%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures over the past year due to the cash shortage in early FY 2021.
- **HF Revenues** Revenues increased from \$206.5 million in August 2020 to \$207.1 million in August 2021. An increase of \$0.6 million or 0.3%. This increase was mostly due to a \$1.6 million decrease in motor fuel tax revenues and a \$2.5 million increase in license & fee revenues in August 2021 compared to August 2020.
- **HF** August 2021 YTD revenues were less than August 2020 YTD revenues by \$62.2 million, and August 2021 YTD expenses were greater than August YTD 2020 expenses by \$47.7 million.
- **HTF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$250.5 million in August 2020 to \$958.4 million in August 2021. An increase of \$708.0 million or 282.7%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures during FY 2021 as a result of the cash shortage in early FY 2021.
- HTF Revenues Revenues increased from \$124.7 million in August 2020 to \$136.1 million in August 2021. An increase of \$11.4 million or 9.1%. This increase was mostly due to a \$3.1 million increase in motor fuel tax revenue, a \$7.6 million increase in highway use tax revenue, and a \$0.8 million increase in fees revenue in August 2021 compared to August 2020.
- **HTF** August 2021 YTD revenues were greater than August 2020 YTD revenues by \$7.0 million, and August 2021 YTD expenses were greater than August YTD 2020 expenses by \$17.7 million.

Key monthly action:

• On August 25, DOT entered into a Bond Purchase Agreement for the issuance of \$252.6 million in State of North Carolina Series 2021 Grant Anticipation Revenue Vehicle (GARVEE) Bonds with a closing date of September 16, 2021.

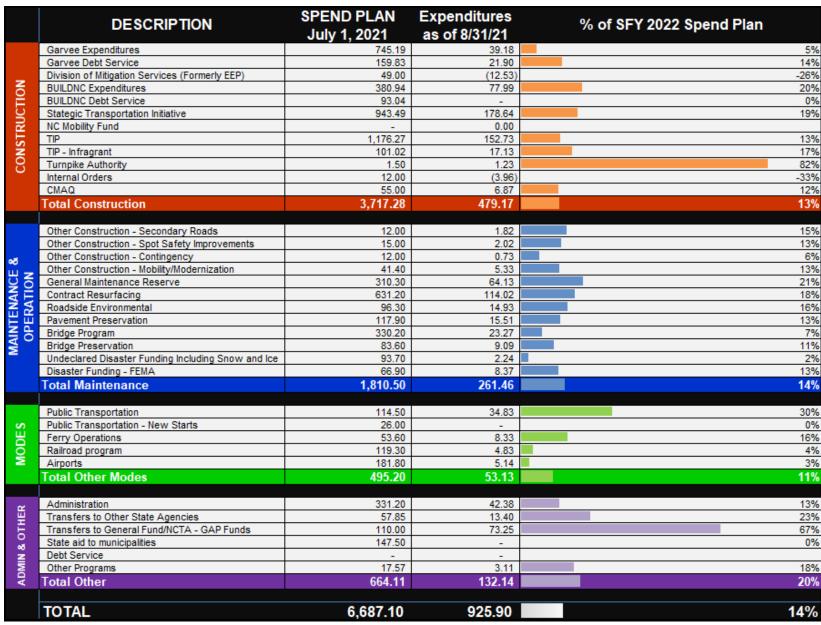

Spend Plan Analysis - Revenue

Total Revenues, \$1,030 million, were 2% above the spend plan forecast, or \$5 million, but were 11%, or \$126.5 million, less than revenues for SFY 2021. This yearly difference in revenues is due to DOT receiving approximately \$80M (split between HF and HTF) in 'catch up' revenues from DOR for amounts not collected in the late spring due to COVID in July of 2020, which caused July 2020 revenues to be inflated.

- State Revenue, \$685 million, was 1.7%, or \$11.8 million, below forecasted revenue.
- Federal Revenue, \$207 million, was 35%, or \$54 million, above the forecasted amount. The Department received \$21.9 million of FHWA Reimbursement for the GARVEE debt service interest payment.
- Other Revenue, \$28.6 million, was 11%, or \$3 million, less than the forecasted amount. Major line items in this category are Federal Transit funding (\$6.8 million), Federal Transit CARES Act funding (\$8.2 million), Federal Aviation funding (\$1.3 million), Non-System Street Reimbursement (\$6.0 million), Damage Claims (\$1.5 million), GHSP (\$2.1 million), Local Participation (\$1.7 million), and LOGO Fees (\$580k).
- GARVEE Reimbursement, \$24 million, was 31%, or \$11 million, below the forecasted revenue.
- Build NC Reimbursement, \$81 million, was 11%, or \$8 million, above the forecasted revenue. The Department has received \$532 million of 2020 Build NC reimbursements from the trustee through August.

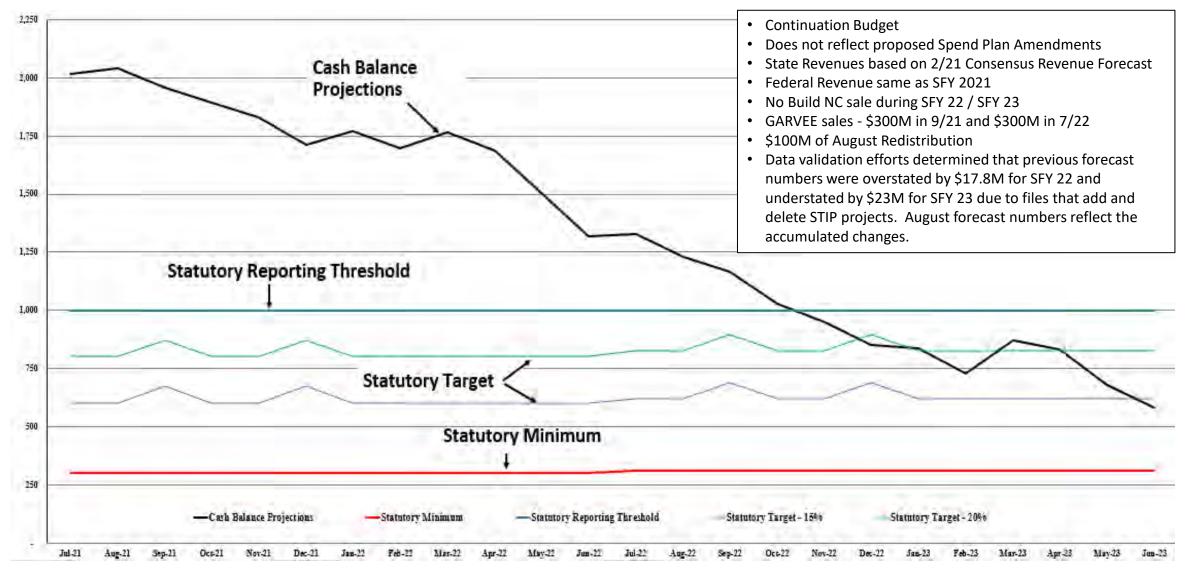


Spend Plan Analysis - Expenditures

Total Expenditures (\$925.9 million) were 22%, or \$264.8 million, below the spend plan forecast and 10%, or \$83.4 million, below the previous year totals.

- Total Construction Expenditures (\$479 million) were 25%, or \$158.6 million, below spend plan forecast. SFY 2022 expenditures were 9%, or \$48.9 million, less than SFY 2021 construction expenditures.
- Maintenance Expenditures for SFY 2022 (\$261.5 million) were 25% below the spend plan forecast, or \$86 million. SFY 2022 expenditures were 38%, or \$72.6 million, more than SFY 2021 maintenance expenditures.
- Total Modal Expenditures (\$53 million) were 32.5%, or \$25.6 million, below the spend plan forecast, and were 20%, or \$12.9 million, less than the previous SFY.
- Other Expenditures \$12.25 million was transferred from the Trust Fund to the Turnpike Authority.

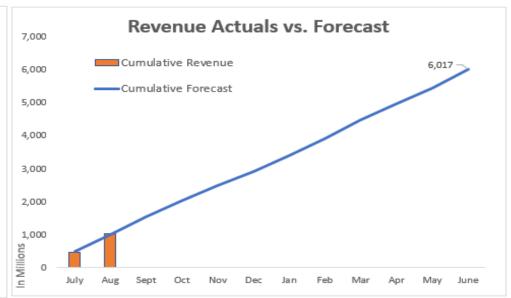
24 Month Cash Forecast – SFY 22 / SFY 23 Spend Plan

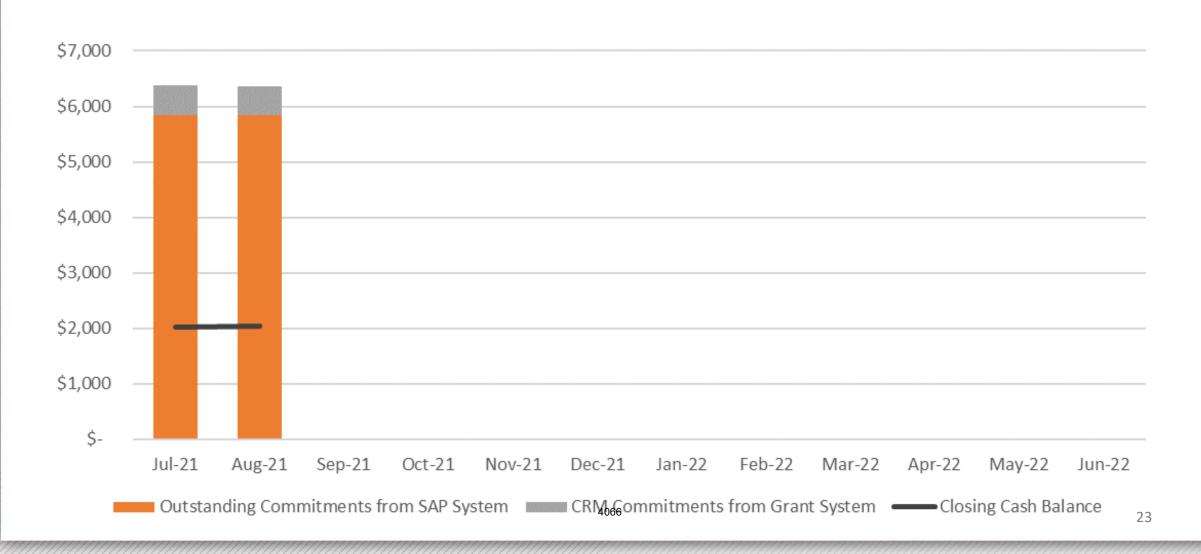




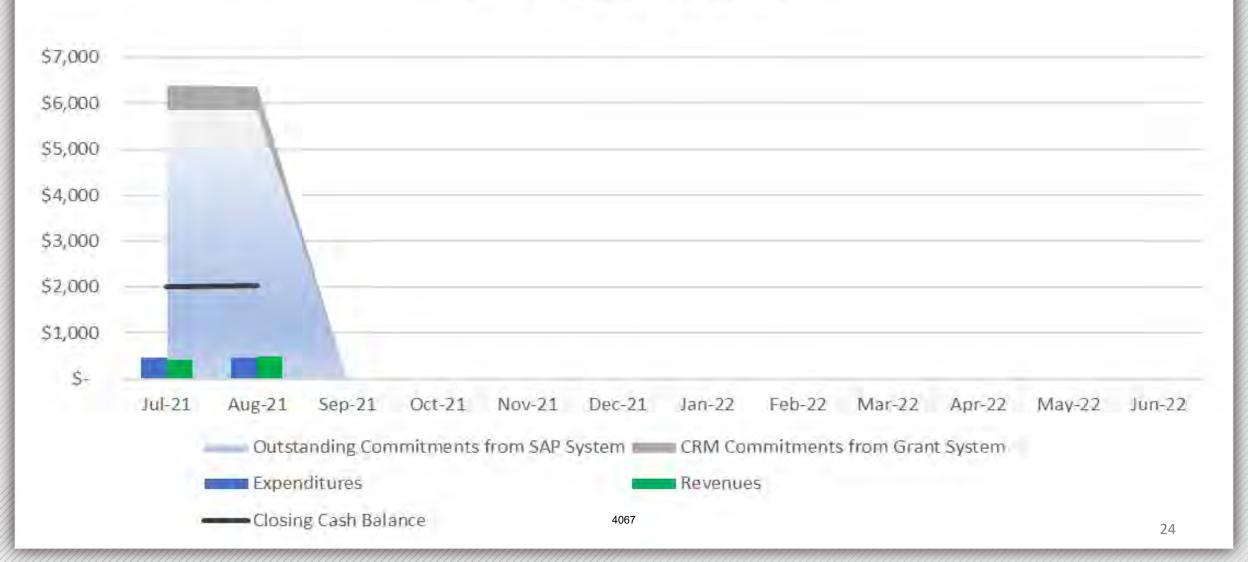
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by State Fiscal Year

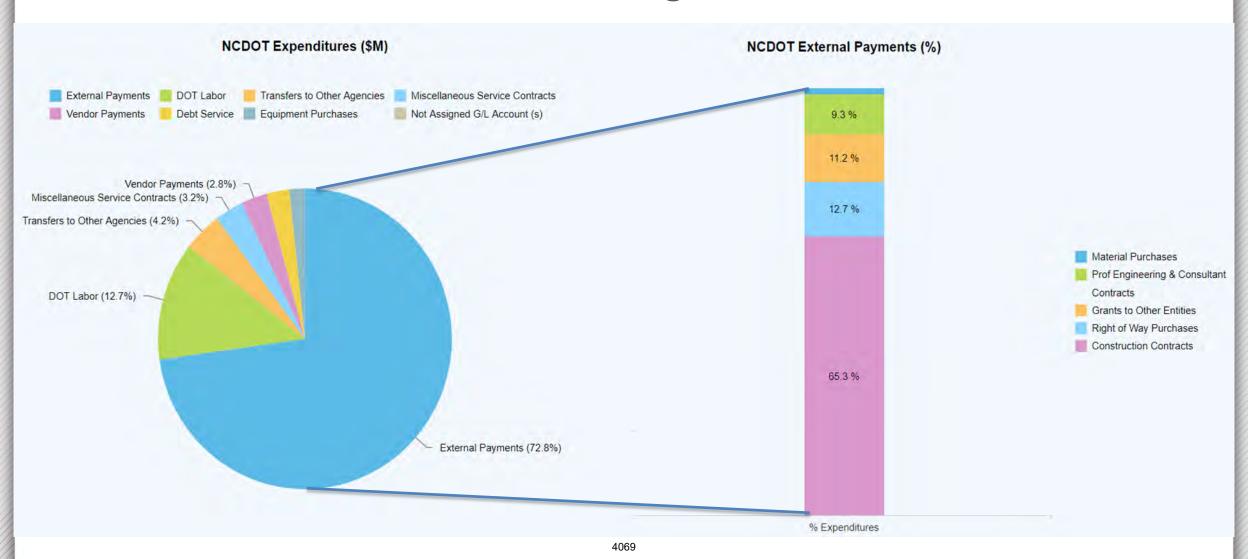
Cash Reporting Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee

August 2021 – Reporting Required

- N.C.G.S 143C-6-11(m) requires DOT to report each month when the department's combined average daily cash balance for the month is outside of the statutory target range.
- For August 2021, the **average daily cash balance** of the Highway Fund and the Highway Trust Fund was \$1.91 billion.
- The cash target amounts representing 15% and 20% of the total appropriations for the current fiscal year are \$603 million and \$803 million, respectively.
- The closing cash balance for July was \$2.0 billion which is above the target range and above the minimum cash balance requirement of \$301 million under N.C.G.S. 143C-6-11.

Spend Plan Variance

- GARVEE Expenditures, Build NC Expenditures, TIP and STI -21% Variance (-\$57M). Construction projects are progressing slower than projected. Factors contributing to this are labor shortages and material availability (long lead times).
- Division of Mitigation Services (Formerly EEP) -185% Variance (-\$27M) and Strategic Transportation Initiative (STI) 16% Variance (\$10M).
 \$12.5M of expenses related to Mitigation Services has been transferred to STI WBS elements. The process has changed based on a work group analysis.

Spend Plan Variance

Maintenance & Operations -25% \$86M

- Spend Targets are based on an entire FY using the Continuation Budget. While
 detailed monthly spends are challenging to predict, all spending is monitored.
 Plans are being made for revised spend targets in anticipation of the approved
 certified budget, but projects cannot move forward until a Spend Plan
 Amendment is approved.
- Department Contract Programs (Contract Resurfacing, Pavement Preservation, Bridge Program) are forecast by a statistical modeling tool based on active projects. Programs are monitored and adjustments will be proposed as part of the quarterly amendment process.
- Labor shortages are having an impact on project spends. Some contractors are operating at 75% of normal levels because of difficulties hiring staff.

Spend Plan Variance

Modal Divisions – Spend Plans were built on the assumption of a certified budget

- IMD IMD is within 1% of their spend target for non-CATS Blue Line Extension funds. The BLE \$25m payment is scheduled to be paid in September.
- Ferry Division -36% (-\$5M) Given ferry proposed budget changes in S105 the Division has restricted spending awaiting final budget approval.
- Rail Division -54% (-\$6M) State funds: FRRCSI is experiencing reduced invoicing due to a delay in construction materials for participating short lines. Amtrak billing is experiencing a short-term reduction in costs due to applied federal recovery funds. Local funds on CGS have experienced delay in invoicing from the railroad contractor.
- Aviation Division -64% (-\$9M) Airport construction projects continue to experience supply chain issues and personnel shortages.

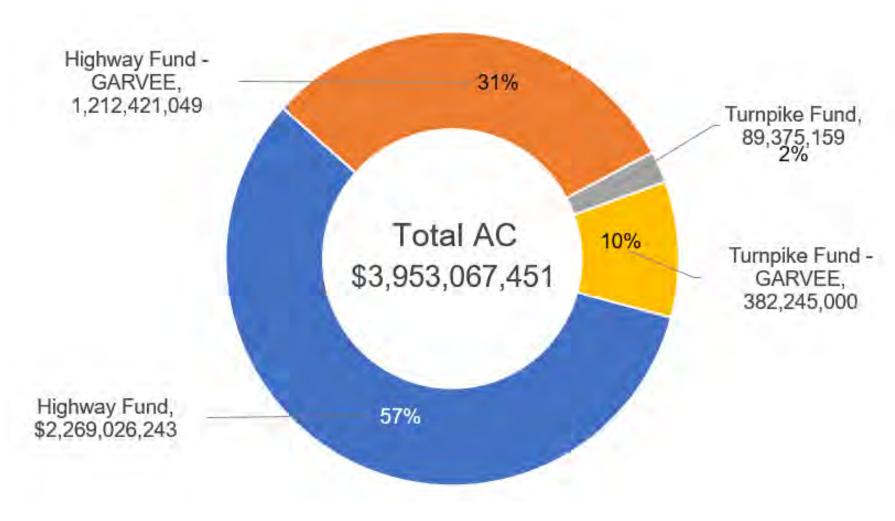

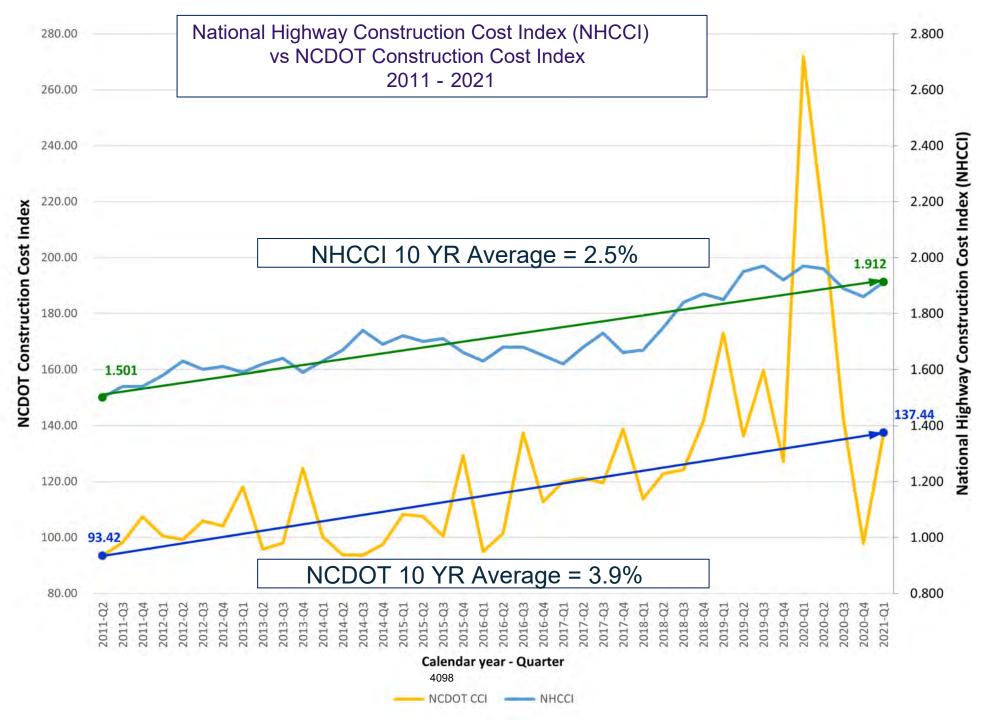

WHEREAS, Greene served honorably in the U.S. Air Force and in the United States Marines for 10 years; and

WHEREAS, Greene joined the Union County Sheriff's Office in 2004 and rose to the rank of sergeant; and

WHEREAS, Greene was a Sunday school teacher and volunteered with the NC Baptist Men's Association on numerous mission trips; and

WHEREAS, Greene was killed, while on duty, as a Union County deputy sheriff in a traffic accident on Nov. 19, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Union County Women of Law Enforcement requests that the North Carolina Department of Transportation name a bridge in honor of Greene; and

WHEREAS, the Monroe City Council and Union County Board of Commissioners unanimously support naming a bridge in Greene's honor.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the North Carolina Board of Transportation names the bridge on US 601 that crosses over US 74 in Monroe the *Sergeant Jeffrey W Greene Bridge*.

That appropriate signs will be erected at a suitable time.
