Official Board Meeting

Wednesday February 2, 2022

Chairman Fox stated that the Wednesday, February 2, 2022, meeting was a remote meeting and is being held in such way due to the current status of the COVID-19 pandemic. Chairman Fox stated that since the meeting is being fully conducted using Microsoft Teams the following protocol will be used:

- implementing a roll call voting system for all actions.
- ensuring that the meeting minutes reflect that the meeting is a remote meeting.
- recording when members join or leave the remote meeting.

The Chairman reminded members that all chats, instant messages, texts, or other written communications between members of the Board regarding the transaction of the public business are deemed a public record. As always, the meeting was properly noticed, and a live stream was provided for members of the public to access the meeting.

Call to Order

Chairman Fox called the official Board of Transportation meeting to order at 2:31 p.m. on Wednesday, February 2, 2022, with the following members present in the virtual meeting: Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Zimmer, Mitchell, Jordan, Hunt, Mathis, Molamphy, Lathrop, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, Clarke, McGrady and Cody.

Board member Rosenburgh and Board member Taft joined the meeting after the roll call.

Board member's Overholt and Tillman were absent.

Chairman Fox stated this month the Board will be conducting all Board business in one meeting.

Ethics Statement

Chairman Fox read the Ethics Statement advising all members of the Board that may have any conflict of interest, or appearance of conflict, to refrain from participation in that item and to file the proper paperwork with the Secretary to the Board of Transportation.

Chairman Fox read, "In accordance with the State Government Ethics Act, Executive Order No. 2 issued on January 12, 2009, and N. C. G. S. §143B-350, it is the duty of every Board member to avoid both conflicts of interest and appearances of conflict. "To comply with this statement and the State Ethics Law, I ask whether any Board member has a known conflict of interest or appearance of conflict with respect to any matters coming before the Board today."

"If so, please identify the conflict or appearance of conflict when the item appears on the agenda for consideration, refrain from any undue participation in the particular matter involved and sign before our notary the Declaration that has been provided to you for such purpose."

Approval – January 6th, 2022 Meeting Minutes

Chairman Fox stated the meeting minutes from the January 6, 2022, were distributed for review prior to the meeting. Chairman Fox stated if there are no additions or corrections, he would accept a motion to approve the January 6, 2022, meeting minutes of the Board of Transportation. A motion was made by Board Member McGrady and a second by Board Member Zimmer.

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Jordan, Hunt, Mathis, Molamphy, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, Clarke, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Honorary Designations

Board Member Hunt presented a resolution naming Bridge 178 over Browns Creek on SR 1145 in Bladen County the James C Batchelor Jr Bridge. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Hunt and seconded by Board Member Taft.

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Jordan, Hunt, Mathis, Molamphy, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, Clarke, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Chairman Fox stated there were several friends and family members attending virtually for the James C Batchelor Jr. Bridge. He shared Mr. Campbell is a former Board member and is part of the attendance this morning. Mr. Campbell stated that he wanted to thank the Board for having him and thanked Board member Grady Hunt for the reading of the resolution. Mr. Campbell shared he had Ms. Linda Gillespie with him today who's a community servant and a good friend of Mr. James. Mr. Campbell stated he knew a lot of groundwork went into this resolution for his good and he appreciated it.

Mr. Campbell shared his wife Sylvia, the current mayor of Elizabethtown, and Mr. James started working together at one of the industries that first came to the town. Mr. Campbell shared Mr. James was one hundred percent a community man. He stated knowing Mr. James and his interest in Elizabethtown was never ending as he shared his time with various boards with talks about volunteering his help. Mr. James would do anything to help Elizabethtown become a better town to live in. His love for sports and young people were unconditional. Mr. Campbell shared Mr. James would always be on the sidelines during the high school football games and would end in the corner dugouts during baseball season.

Mr. Campbell stated Mr. James simply cared about everyone and wanted everybody to have the opportunity for good education and a good life in Elizabethtown. Mr. Campbell shared he felt it was only proper to name the bridge after Mr. James. He stated when people travel over

the bridge here in Elizabethtown, they will see his name and it will remind them of his hard work and community service in Bladen County.

Ms. Minnie Price shared she supported naming the bridge on Martin Luther King Jr Drive in Elizabethtown in honor of Mr. James C. Bachelor. She shared many times people with fame and fortune get their name put on things, but Mr. James was an ordinary person in the community doing extraordinary things for many people. Ms. Price stated Mr. James attended meetings to get information to help the citizens there in Bladen County, Elizabethtown, and the surrounding communities. Ms. Price stated she was glad the bridge will be named in honor of Mr. James for his known role in this community.

Chairman Fox stated for the next three resolutions he would like to propose a slight modification in the process. Chairman Fox asked, would there be any board member who would have an objection to reading each resolution and then having a roll call vote on all three motions at the end? Chairman Fox paused. He stated since hearing no objection, he will do that and after the third resolution, the Board will take one vote for all three resolutions. After the motions pass for the resolutions, he would come back and give everyone who wants to speak their time.

Board Member Tarleton presented a resolution naming Rivers Street from Blowing Rock Road to Burrell Street in Boone as the Chancellor John Thomas Thruway. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Tarleton and seconded by Board Member Rosenburgh. Board member Tarleton spoke on the behalf of the Chancellor John Thomas family. Board member Tarleton shared Chancellor John Thomas wife, Janice Thomas was attending the meeting with both of her sons Scott and Brandon Thomas. Board member Tarleton stated the family asked him to express their sincere appreciation to the Board for this honorary designation. Board member Tarleton shared he was very excited for this naming because Mr. John Thomas was his friend. Board member Tarleton stated he knew Mr. John Thomas well and he was delighted to be a part of this moment. Board member Tarleton stated he wanted to thank Mr. John Ward who is the Boone Town Manager and Mr. Tim Futrelle the Mayor of Boone for their cooperation in making this happen. Board member Tarleton stated he also wanted to thank his friends Mr. John Cooper and Mr. John Blackburn for their assistance in this process. Board member Tarleton shared he could assure the entire Thomas family is elated over this designation.

Chairman Fox thanked Board member Tarleton and shared for those who knew Chancellor Thomas knew his contributions would hit the community, the schools, and to the state. Chairman Fox shared he had the honor to also know Chancellor Thomas and shared how

he made a difference in his life. Chairman Fox shared as a student at Appalachian State when Chancellor Thomas was there, he was fortunate enough to be invited to participate in a program called the Chancellor 's scholars' program. Chairman Fox stated this program involved a lot of interaction with the Chancellor with regularly meetings, dinners, and social activities. Chairman Fox stated he could truly say Chancellor Thomas was a great mentor to him and had a direct impact not only on his life in his undergraduate education but also in his interest in transportation. Chairman Fox shared a photo of him and Chancellor Thomas from the 1980's with the Board. Chairman Fox stated Chancellor Thomas had a direct impact on some of his interests in his life. Chairman Fox shared another photo where Chancellor Thomas appointed him as an undergrad to the University traffic committee. Chairman Fox stated if you have ever been on a university campus, then you know parking and traffic are always a problem. Chairman Fox shared he didn't know why he was lucky enough to be assigned to the committee, but it did give him early experience in transportation, and he had Chancellor Thomas to thank for it.

Board Member Cody presented a resolution naming SR 1298 from US 129 to its terminus in Robbinsville as Wayne Carringer Boulevard. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Cody and seconded by Board Member Tarleton. Mr. Chip Carringer, his son, spoke on behalf of his father and the Wayne Carringer Boulevard. Mr. Carringer stated on behalf of the Wayne Carringer family they are truly grateful to have this road named in his honor and his memory. Mr. Carringer stated their father was a man of character, integrity and was well respected throughout the community and Graham County. Mr. Carringer shared his father served in the Army Air Core during the World War 2 for over 6 years and 3 and a half of those years as a Japanese prisoner of war. Mr. Carringer stated his father served his community and was elected multiple terms for the Robbinsville City Council and as a member of the Graham County Schools Board of Education. Mr. Carringer shared his father leaves behind 3 children, 7 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren and they are all appreciative and thankful to have him and his legacy honored in this manner. Mr. Carringer shared he would like to thank the North Carolina Department of Transportation Board for this great honor.

Board Member Cody presented a resolution naming NC 107 between Moody Bridge Road and Old Cullowhee Road in Jackson County as Conrad G Burrell Highway. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion by Board Member Cody and seconded by Board Member McGrady. Chairman Fox spoke on the behalf of the Conrad G Burrell family.

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote for all three action items. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or" aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Vice-Chairman Perkins, Moran, Taft, Zimmer, Mitchell, Jordan, Hunt, Mathis, Molamphy, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, Clarke, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion.

Board members Overholt and Tillman were absent.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Secretary's Remarks

Chairman Fox stated the Secretary couldn't join but Ronnie Keeter, Chief Engineer, will give an update primarily focused on the multiple weather events that the Department has had recently. Chairman Fox thanked Ronnie and his whole team for all the great work they do in keeping the roads open and safe when we have these type of weather events.

Ronnie Keeter, Chief Engineer, thanked the Chairman and stated the TWS and equipment guys are the ones who deserve all the thanks. They worked hard long hours for little credit sometimes, but the Department thinks the world of them. Mr. Keeter stated he appreciates the opportunity to present to the Board.

Winter Storms

Ronnie Keeter shared details on the recent weather event with members of the Board. He stated he wanted to start off by recognizing the hard work of the crews across our state as we prepared and responded to several weather events over the past month. Mr. Keeter stated COVID, labor shortages, and supply chain issues impacted the Department just like it impacted other industries this season.

Mr. Keeter shared the Department hasn't had a single county that hasn't had either snow, ice, freezing rain or some combination of all those elements over the course of the different weather events in January. He shared the Department's divisions and contract crews worked around the clock to restore safe access to our roadways and they deserve the credit

and our gratitude. He mentioned the local officials and residents have reached out to the Secretary and the division office personally to say thank you for all their hard work.

Mr. Keeter shared comments from various towns throughout the state. He stated Michael Peaks the Fire Chief from Williamston, North Carolina emailed and stated they had five inches of snow fall in their town the weekend of January 22nd. He mentioned it would have been a lot worse for the town if the local DOT wouldn't have come through to clear the roads.

Mr. Keeter shared comments from Kyle Breuer, Surf City Town Manager, who said "We didn't respond to one call for service regarding vehicle accidents or issues, which can be partially attributed to the State's efforts."

Mr. Keeter stated a Hendersonville resident also reached out to express their appreciation for responding to 18 inches of snowfall that fell over the January 15th weekend. He said, "my wife and I have lived in a number of states during our work careers and the efforts of the NCDOT, we believe, are head and shoulders above many other state departments of transportation."

Mr. Keeter shared he also wanted to thank the residents across the state for listening to the Department's messaging in the media and on social media, urging them to stay home unless they absolutely had to drive. He mentioned when pictures started coming in during these events, they saw a lot of empty roads and highways. He shared this was safer for the public and safer for our crews and helped them do their jobs more efficiently.

Social Media

Mr. Keeter shared recent updates on the Department's social media with the Board. He stated speaking of weather the Department's communications team issued another extremely popular social post a couple weeks ago. They rewrote part of the 1990s hit "Ice, Ice, Baby". This was one of the Department's top posts of all time in several categories and on several different platforms. Mr. Keeter mentioned between Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn, the post reached about 3.5 million people. He stated while this post and several of our other recent, fun posts have gained overwhelming approval from our audience. Some people have questioned why we aren't sticking to only serious safety messaging. He shared the reason for this is, we hope that gaining some attention with the occasional comical post will help us keep people's attention when our more critical safety messages go out. Mr. Keeter shared he hopes all North

Carolínians will continue to both enjoy and pay attention to the messages the Department shares.

DBE Outreach

Mr. Keeter shared details related to the DBE Outreach events with the Board. He mentioned he wanted to make sure everyone is aware that the January DBE outreach meetings have been rescheduled due to weather and will take place in February. He shared the odd numbered divisions will be set on holding their meetings this Saturday February 5th from 10:00 AM to 12:00pm. He mentioned the even numbered divisions meeting has been rescheduled for February 19th. He shared these meetings are critical in helping to make sure our small and disadvantaged businesses know how to make connections and learn how to do business with DOT. He shared we encourage any of the Board members and anyone else who wants to attend these meetings. Mr. Keeter shared he encourages anyone who would like to attend to please search DBE on the Department's website and find out which meeting they'd like to attend.

Chairman Fox ask the members of the Board if they had any questions for Chief Keeter on any of his updates. Board member Rosenburgh shared he thinks our Department does an amazing job, getting out ahead of the storm. Board member Rosenburgh stated having grown up in a country where ice is prevalent, he has not seen the ability to get out ahead of the storm and he thinks it is amazing what staff does. Board member Clarke stated he wanted to echo some of Board member Rosenburgh comments and shared he thinks the Department did a great job in a difficult situation and we are grateful for it.

Chairman Fox stated he wanted to highlight something Mr. Keeter touched on about our Department's social media account. He shared he thinks the Department's communications team has really taken it up a notch on their social media in a positive way. Chairman Fox shared he wanted to walk through a couple of slides with the Board. He shared he wanted to recognize the Department's Communications unit on their social media. He mentioned he wanted to first start off and show the slide from Twitter of the Ohio State license plate, which the Secretary talked about previously when they first changed their license plate image. He mentioned this was a very clever way to have a little fun in rivalry with another state and remind everyone that North Carolina, was First in Flight. He shared another slide from the Department's Facebook page where the Communications team took the words of the song, "Ice, Ice, baby" and modified it a little bit to reflect the current weather situation within NCDOT. He shared the most recent post of the Department's Facebook made him loud out loud. He shared a slide of the famous

meme that uses the joke on Phil the groundhog on predicating six more weeks of winter on Groundhog Day. Chairman Fox stated this was really a clever way to get the word out and get people to follow the Department on social media platforms.

Board member Jordan stated she has been following the Department's social media for a while and honestly knows how active the page is at times. She also stated while everyone was at home, the Facebook page brought a little laughter but also brought a lot of safety reports around the divisions. She mentioned she felt the Communications Team stepped up tremendously.

Board member Mathis stated the communications Facebook page did get the attention of the Treasurer's Office. They chimed in on the comments as well.

INFORMATION AND DELEGATED AUTHORITY ITEMS

Information - Workgroup Updated Related to 2024-2033 STIP Development

Joey Hopkins, Deputy Chief Planning, provided an update on the Workgroup related to 2024-2033 STIP Development to the Board. Mr. Hopkins shared that he and his team have been coming to the Board since last May discussing the 2024-2033 STIP Development. He shared getting feedback from the board and bringing recommendations back from the Workgroup has been very helpful. He mentioned they've had multiple conversations with all the Board members over the last few months about this and he wanted to personally say thank you. He shared this has really helped make a good progress and be well informed both on the Department side and working with the stakeholders.

Mr. Hopkins shared a presentation with the Board. He stated many of the slides he will review today are ones the Board has seen various times. A couple of highlights he made include, the total revenue (in this slide) is about \$22 Billion dollars and the total projected deficit in slide is around \$11.7 Billion dollars. He mentioned he did want to remind everyone that the slide is a snapshot in time when they did this in October last year. He shared this was, the Department's expected federal revenue and our expected state revenue. He stated it was the project cost as it stood at that time. He stated as for our department who doesn't stand still and must keep moving forward. He shared him and his team has updated the current slide and now and he would now show all those changes.

Mr. Hopkins stated he is sharing the latest data that they have with the new federal revenues projected out over the 10 years of the future STIP, the 2024 to 2033 STIP using latest

state revenue projections based on the budget that was passed since the last time. He mentioned the updated slide also shared any kind of cost changes or impacts on the programming side. He mentioned several items have changed since then. He shared they've had new bridge projects or additional bridge projects and some divisions that are considering alternate criteria, which will impact the specific division tier funding or regional tier funding in those divisions. He shared the Department has had cost increases from low bid adjustments, which was stated earlier. He mentioned they've also had cost increases and projected cost increases that have impacted the process.

Mr. Hopkins shared he tried to do a simple math exercise where if our revenues are now "X" versus "Y" then our deficit should be the same amount. He stated but unfortunately, it doesn't work out that way. He stated our projected revenues are now at or around \$26.7 Billion dollar range versus the just under \$22 Billion and the deficits went from around \$11.7 Billion to around \$8 Billion. He shared (the current slide) here is just about \$3.7 Billion dollars better than the one in July, but it's not quite as high as what you would expect with all the revenue.

He stated because we haven't stopped in the meantime there has been other costs changes. He shared they have pulled in additional \$600M out of the revenue forecast to account for inflation, so now that total is about \$3.4 Billion dollars over the total program versus somewhere in around \$2.7 billion dollar range, they discussed a couple of months ago.

Mr. Hopkins shared they have had to tie up additional holdouts for bridge projects, safety projects, rail projects, the local dollars, etc. He shared even though the federal dollars have increased that many of the different line items on the federal side have increased too. He shared some of those we put holdouts into the STIP because some of those programs are alternate criteria. He shared they have their own criteria and a good example of that would be the funding that the large MPO 's receive. He shared they that comes out of the division tier funds and if those buckets increase than some of the other buckets must make an adjustment for that.

Mr. Hopkins stated he was going to take a quick pause to see if there's any questions. He mentioned before he did, he wanted to go back for a second and just point out one thing. He shared if you look at "Region A" on the original slide it shows they were projected back in October to be \$325M over. He shared because of that they added revenue and made adjustments based on any kind of programming or cost changes since October. He shared now the Region is projected to be \$383M over. He shared that was a big difference if you added up going the wrong direction. He mentioned this is the one of those buckets that heads that

direction and it's really for two big reasons. He shared the first one is in Division 1, they added two large bridge preservation projects that totaled about \$95M and in Division 4, there were 3 projects added and those bridge projects totaled about \$44M. He shared those Divisions do get new projects but those we alternate criteria. He mentioned those projects do subtract out of that regional impact bucket because those are regional impact projects.

He stated he did want to point that out because it's not a strict plus or minus exercise. There's just a lot of different things going on in the process.

Mr. Hopkins stated he would now take a quick pause in case there's questions on these slides before he moved into the heart of the presentation.

Chairman Fox asked if any Board members had any questions for Mr. Hopkins. He stated hearing none, Mr. Hopkins could go ahead with his presentation.

Mr. Hopkins shared he would go through the remaining slides quickly because they have already spent a lot of time with the Board over the last few months talking about the process. He shared he felt they're kind of getting to the end piece of this phase. He mentioned it hasn't been an easy process, but it's been a methodical process as we work through it, and now we're going to assume that we keep moving forward. We're going to get into the hard questions now of how projects are impacted.

Mr. Hopkins shared a slide with the Board and reminded the Workgroup recommendations to the Board in which the Board approved the overall goals when they first started the process. He stated everybody wants a trustworthy and dependable STIP, one that's fiscally constrained. He shared they want a STIP that is produced using our current project list and we want to be able to do that transparently. He mentioned they all want to have an opportunity to fund new projects in the next cycle the Prioritization 7.0. He shared he thought it goes without saying the process should be and shall be grounded in state and federal laws and requirements. He mentioned they did change the term delivery projects to held harmless and even now, he didn't know if that was a great term. He shared there has been a lot of conversation on his end and with a lot of the Board members about terminology that they use and maybe doing a better job of thinking that through as we move forward.

Mr. Hopkins shared he was going to follow the traditional STIP development method. The Workgroup recommended the process to the Board, and they agreed with that. He shared they all agreed on scenario 2 approach. He shared it would be for those delivery projects and

then the next point of decision that we need to have been is what is the approach that we follow to fill in the rest of the buckets. He stated the workgroup is bringing to the Board the recommendation that they do Prioritization 3.0, Prioritization 4.0, and Prioritization 5.0 approach with flexibility.

Mr. Hopkins shared a slide explaining how they are trying to figure out what process do they use to fill up the remaining budget on the current bar charts. He mentioned this was a little bit different than what the Board has seen before. He stated with some conversations with a couple of Board members they have added dollar amounts to the percentages. He mentioned if you look at the statewide green bar on the current slide, it shows 19% of the bucket is available for this process and that equals about \$1.5 billion dollars. He shared in "Region A" it shows we have 54% remaining in that bucket and that equals to about \$270M. He stated that each of those buckets have different amounts but in the updated slide they are now considering the updates based on the latest revenue projections and the programming changes.

He shared the updated slide which showed statewide went up to 28% and about \$2.7 billion dollars total and "Region A" went up to 39% which equals to \$244M, which is lower than where we were before. He shared all the other buckets other than "Region A" have more dollars in that bucket.

Mr. Hopkins stated he wanted to remind the Board members that the work group recommended using the prioritization 3.0, prioritization 4.0, and prioritization 5.0 approach. He stated this would start with the oldest projects first, then the projects that were committed under the prioritization 3.0 cycle which were in the 2016 to 2025 STIP. He shared they would sort projects by high score to lower score in descending order and work their way down the list. He stated putting the project in each appropriate bucket as they work down. He shared if funding remains available in any of the buckets, they will repeat that process for projects that were committed in prioritization 4.0 and then prioritization 5.0. He mentioned if the bucket ran out of funding, they would just skip that bucket and go on to the next one with the flexibility opportunities for funded projects.

Mr. Hopkins stated the Workgroup felt all projects at one point were once funded and they all got prioritized and were selected for funding. He shared they felt that each area of the state should have an opportunity if projects are more important to them that didn't make the cut using that process that they should have an opportunity to swap it with a project that did make the cut. He shared any project that isn't selected for funding can be swapped with other projects that were selected for funding. He mentioned he wanted to remind people; this wouldn't mean it

will keep the specific same schedule. He shared the swap could work out, but the new project may have a slightly different schedule because of delivery issues or something else so the schedule may change slightly. He shared all swaps must be agreed to by the Department and any affected MPO or RPO where the projects are located. He mentioned in general, the cost of the projects or projects swapped in can't be more than 10% higher than the cost of the project swapped out. He stated the swap should generally occur within the same funding category, however there is an opportunity to cascade down. He stated the STI law allows cascading down, so the Department is allowing too. He stated you could swap out a regional tier project and swap in a statewide project as an example or swap out a division to your project and swap in a regional tier project. He mentioned they would allow swaps between modes if the normalization percentages were still met. He stated that meant it would be a minimum 90% highway, minimum 4% mode and then the 6% is a flexible percentage. He stated the remaining 6% is based on scores as long as you still meet those minimum scores in each of the buckets you can do those swaps. He mentioned they do expect the divisions as they work with the MPO 's and they're looking to swap out across modes that they coordinate with the modal managers.

Mr. Hopkins stated going back to the visibility of any swaps conducted in this whole process must be documented, which will be made available to the public. He shared this will be, so they understand what we're doing and why we're doing it and who agreed to it. He mentioned the second thing they wanted to talk about was, where do they draw the line on projects for the next cycle prioritization 7.0? Which projects are subject to reprioritization and which projects are not? He shared the Workgroup talked about several different scenarios, and ultimately came to recommendation of selecting the second option on the slide which is the 5-year line. He stated this was the Workgroup recommendation to the Board and it goes back to the way they did it in prioritization 3.0 and prioritization 4.0. He shared in prioritization 5.0 the Workgroup recommendation was approved by the Board was a 6-year line. He shared the Workgroup proposed to him to go back to the 5-year line. He stated they didn't need the decision today, but they do need it by the time they get the draft list out. He shared this would be helpful to the locals and the Department will know which projects would be subject to the flexibility or swapping consideration.

Mr. Hopkins shared they have had some discussions with the Board members. He mentioned some questions have come up such as how many funds that the 5-year line ties up or 4-year line or 6-year line. He stated if the Board wasn't ready to make that decision or give them the green light on that today, then they can work with that a little bit. He mentioned he would like to stay in the April time frame that they would need to know something moving

forward because there's a lot of work that's going to have to happen to have those swapping inflexibility discussions with the MPO 's and RPO 's or local governments across the state.

Mr. Hopkins stated to quickly summarize the presentation the next steps are assuming they get the consensus to move forward with the prioritization 3.0, prioritization 4.0, and prioritization 5.0 with flexibility option. He shared the STIP managers are going to begin developing what we're calling the preliminary draft STIP. He shared that have already started talking to the Communications team to develop messaging on how we explain this to people or also looking to develop partner education that'll be rolled out this spring. He mentioned this would be kind of a two-way fold type of meeting. He shared one would be more of the technical type of education for the MPO and RPO staff members and the second part would be more of a higher level for your elected officials, town managers, and those who aren't as involved in this process, but still need to know the basics behind it. He shared they would need to know what we're doing, why we're doing it, and how we're moving forward. He stated we are also required under state and federal law to involve the public. He shared we are talking about moving schedules, taking funds off a project, and swapping projects. He mentioned the public will be involved in that and should be involved in that.

Mr. Hopkins shared they are now starting to have those conversations. Example: How did this process differ from what we normally do when we're developing a STIP document? He mentioned one of the most important things is once they get the preliminary draft STIP developed there will be on-going meetings between the MPO 's and RPO 's. He shared they saw this being a month-long process mainly because even the MPO 's and RPO 's that meet monthly, many times we bring something to them for information. They think about it, and they come back next month and then they vote on it and give us a direction. He mentioned that could be a minimum 2- or 3-month process. He shared many of the MPO's and RPO's don't meet monthly some of them meet every other month, some of them meet quarterly and they'll have to have their own public involvement pieced rolled into that too. He stated he would say minimum for any MPO's or RPO's we would be talking 3 to 4 months for all questions and answers and more likely 4 to 6 months total to get through the coordination meetings and the swap discussions. That timeline puts us into the late summer or fall. Mr. Hopkins stated that concludes his presentation and he would take any questions.

Chairman Fox stated he would start and then open it up to questions and comments from the rest of the Board. Chairman Fox stated they can decide if they can reach some consensus on at least the first decision point that Mr. Hopkins asked the Board to make it. He

shared which is appropriate to do so, since they have the information necessary to move forward on that. He shared he did think that it would be in the Board's best interest to wait until a little later like Mr. Hopkins offered on the second decision of where to draw the line on what the Board views as committed or not committed projects. He mentioned they have talked about this concept before, and he think it's important to reiterate it while we have a 10-year program.

Chairman Fox stated they needed to get their arms around this before they have a new STIP. He shared the reason he thought they need to hold on the second decision is to see the list. He shared the goal of the 10-year STIP and the concept of having a varsity and junior varsity would be the first list the projects that the Board can decide to complete those projects within the timeframe. He stated versus the second group of projects they would need to balance the need between having enough projects that are committed in your program. He mentioned this would make sure you wouldn't run out of projects to build. He shared that is how the cash builds up and we don't want to do that unnecessarily. He shared if the Department has the money to spend on projects that the public needs, then they need to go ahead and complete those projects. He stated they needed to have enough in the pipeline, so they don't hit any delays. He mentioned 10 years is a long time in any community, he stated all communities do change to some degree in that 10-year time frame. He shared the Department's process does allow for new projects to be summited every two years and that really allows for flexibility for new projects being able to come into the 10-year STIP at some point in the second 5 years.

Chairman Fox shared the Workgroup certainly appreciated and wanted that flexibility as well, he mentioned they said from the beginning, and he was certainly an advocate of it. He stated he didn't think it was right to go ahead and fill up the 10-year plan with no chance of flexibility. He stated to the Board members the work they have done so far has provided the balance of a stable buildable program, with some flexibility built into the back end so that they can evaluate changing circumstances. He stated part of the reason it's important is to understand where the line is drawn. He explained at one point they had a 6-year line and now they're back to recommending a 5-year line.

Chairman Fox shared one of the important things to remember is that it's not as simple as if you take half of the 10-year program and say we're going to commit to 5 years. He stated in doing so they haven't just committed to half the money, they actually in reality committed to more than half the money because the projects that you're buying right-a-way for in year 5 would have construction costs in probably year 7, 8, and 9. He stated he wanted the Board and all the other partners to be able to understand once they see the list of projects. He mentioned

the staff will then come back to the Board with some data that they can analyze, how much of the money does drawing the line at 5 years consume? He stated they would need to know if it does and would it consume 60%, 70%, 80%? He mentioned then they can use that along with our local partners and the Workgroup to come to another consensus on where the right place for that line is in balancing the need to have enough projects in the queue, so they continue building.

Chairman Fox stated even if the Department had all the money for a new project right now, they still couldn't start moving dirt because of the process. He shared they would still need to go through a design phase, environmental, permitting review and they would still need to purchase right-a-way. He stated they would need to relocate the utilities in many cases so you're looking at a 2-to-3-year process typically before you can start moving dirt. He stated the Department can't just bring a new project in and start working on it right away. He shared those were some of the balancing factors that he knows that have been looking at. He shared he felt Mr. Hopkins and his staff have done a great job and in bringing information to the Board and letting the Board and workgroup make decisions. He stated he would support the recommendation that that Mr. Hopkins brought forward to do the prioritization 3.0, prioritization 4.0, prioritization 5.0 and then allow that flexibility. He mentioned he would like to also defer the second decision until April when they are able to see the list.

Board member Rosenburgh stated he agreed with the Chairman's statement that we should support the first recommendation. He shared he wanted to thank Mr. Hopkins and his staff for spending an immense time with him bringing him up to speed on this subject. He stated Mr. Hopkins and his staff has recognized one of the issues several of the Board members have raised. He stated there are many elected officials on the front line that do not serve on the RPO's and MPO's and they really need to know what we're doing.

Board member Clarke shared flexibility is important in this process. He shared he spent a long time with Joey Hopkins and David Wasserman and his Division Engineer going over all of this. He stated he really appreciated the effort Joey, David, and the Workgroup are doing to keep the Department heading in the right direction.

Chairman Fox shared he would echo in saying he, Vice-Chairman Perkins, and Board member Overholt have been around long enough to have seen the old ways of this process. He stated they see the different from 10 years ago to now seeing the different iterations of the STIP process and the prioritization process. He stated every single time he's talks to Joey Hopkins, Van Argabright, Ray McIntyre, or Mike Stanley he learns something new about the process and

our system and how it works. He mentioned he encourages the Board members to spend the time to understand it the process and how it works. He stated it is part of the Board member role to communicate what we're doing, and the options that we have to all our constituents, our partners, and our local elected officials. He stated to Board members with them being knowledgeable about it, along with your division engineer is very helpful in giving them confidence that they are considering all the options and making good decisions.

Board member Lail stated he also wanted to acknowledge Mr. Hopkins and his team for working with him on trying to get him up to speed. He shared he was glad the Board is nearing the end of the process and making some of the decisions that have been hard. He shared he thought the Board could sort of move past some of this and get through to some of the harder stuff. He stated once the process is communicated clearly, it would help everybody.

Chairman Fox stated he didn't just want to just have the Board fix one issue but instead wanted to make sure the Board looked at the system going forward. He mentioned if there were any improvements that needed to be made either in execution, planning, or communication that we go ahead and do those. He shared he has always been a fan of while you're in the middle of something fix everything you can so that it's not the next person is problem. He stated he felt the Board is really committed to doing that.

My. Hopkins thanked the Board members for helping him and his team out with the following process. He stated the staff in planning and program are smart people and they have lived this, and they know a lot of the history. He shared they have worked hard to educate other staff members and our other stakeholders. He stated they didn't have all the answers and so he really wants to thank each person from the Board for providing their direct input. He stated the feedback that their getting from others has really helped improve this process. He stated he has also thought of ways to make this more of a marketable document to help the public understand it better. He stated similar conversations that they've already had on items like how to improve what the STIP document will look like. He stated that it makes it better for him to understand as well to feeling they are doing a decent job of educating members and using the knowledge from their own background to help.

Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Hopkins and shared he has had many conversations with Mr. Hopkins, staff members and the Secretary. He stated how they communicate what the STIP is sort of a problem of their own making because they want to deliver good news.

He stated when they put out a list of projects and the 10-year project list no one sees the fine print that only the first of many years are really going to be built. He shared the second list of projects are projects that are still being developed. He mentioned nobody hears that if you live in a community where that project is in the 9th year, and it gets put in the newspaper that NCDOT is going to build it. He shared he felt it was time the Board really focus on making sure the message is clear to everybody not just those people who really know how our system works.

Consensus By the Board / Direction for Staff

Chairman Fox asked Mr. Hopkins he knew in the past they didn't have to take formal votes on these other decisions. He shared they just had a consensus of the Board to proceed in that direction. Mr. Hopkins stated yes that was how they've done it so far since May. Chairman Fox stated if it was okay with everybody, and they were comfortable with that then like to stay consistent. He asked if any Board members who have any concerns or issues or wants to discuss further. He asked if any Board member had an issue with moving forward with the first recommendation that Mr. Hopkins made? He stated they will take the recommendation of the Workgroup to do the prioritization 3.0, prioritization 4.0, and prioritization 5.0. with some flexibility. Chairman Fox asked if any Board members had any objection to that? He stated hearing no objection, there appears to be consensus by the Board. He asked if there is any Board member who has any objection to us holding on that second decision until April, so we see the list that results from the first decision they just made? He stated this would give a chance to get the staff members to give the Board some numbers on what percentage of the 10-year budget might be eaten up by different decisions the Board makes whether they do 5 years, or 6 years. He asked if anyone had an objection to holding on that until April? He stated hearing no objection, there appears to be consensus there too.

He thanked Mr. Hopkins and his team. He stated he knows they have spent countless hours with all the Board members probably saying a lot of the same things repeatedly. He shared it has been very effective because the board is really reaching an understanding of this issue. He stated he was very pleased with the level of engagement that the Board has had and he's confident that when we get to the end of this process our Board members along with our division engineers will be good ambassadors for explaining the system to our partners and bringing back any concerns that they may raise in the meetings. He stated the Board would need to take in to account whatever changes they might think are appropriate before it goes back through the MPO 's and the RPO 's and then ultimately back to the Board to have a vote on the 10-year STIP.

Chairman Fox thanked Mr. Hopkins and his team and stated he looked forward to getting more information from them. Mr. Hopkins thank the Chairman and the Board.

Information - Product Evaluation Program Awareness

Chairman Fox noted that copies of this month's Product Evaluation Program Awareness update were provided to members of the Board for review and posted on the Board's website.

Delegated Authority

Chairman Fox stated that items C, D, E, H, and L are delegated to the Secretary and require no formal action by the Board.

Item C: All projects were awarded by the Secretary to the low bidder.

ACTION

Action – Project Items

Chairman Fox asked members of the Board to announce any recusals to the action items within the presented project items. Recusals made by members of the Board on project items are noted below.

Chairman Fox invited a motion to approve the project items as presented. A motion was made by Board Member Tarleton and seconded by Board Member Mitchell to approve all projects for items G, I, K, M, N, O, P, R, S, and T. (excluding items C, D, E, H, and L as they are delegated authority items and require no formal Board action).

Chairman Fox shared that he will now conduct a roll call for the vote on the action item. He explained to members that he will call each board member by name, he stated when you hear your name, please respond to the action item up for consideration by saying either yes (or "aye") if you approve or no if you are opposed to the item.

Chairman Fox, Moran, Mitchell, Hunt, Mathis, Molamphy, Lathrop, Rosenburgh, Tarleton, Lail, Wells, Clarke, McGrady and Cody all stated yes or aye on the motion. Vice-Chairman Perkins and Board members Taft, Zimmer, Overholt, Jordan, and Tillman were absent.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

- The meeting was adjourned at 9:24 AM with a motion by Vice Chair Wells, seconded by Committee Member Clarke.

Workforce Committee

Chairman Grady Hunt called the **February 2, 2022**, Workforce Development Committee meeting to order, conducted a roll call of members present, and declared a quorum was present. Chair Hunt read the non-conflict/ethics statement and asked if there were any know conflicts of interest. The **December 8, 2021**, minutes were unanimous approved by the Workforce Development Committee.

Presenter: Laura Oakley, Manager Qualification and Salary – The Lifecycle of a Hiring Package

- A Position Becomes Vacant: Mission critical memo to post and fill is submitted, then reviewed and approved by Executive Management.
- Job Posting: Job is posted online for at least 5 business days. Positions historically difficult to fill or reposted may receive enhanced recruitment such as social media groups, job boards, connections in Transportation Industry, Employment Security Commission website, and others.
- Screening Applications: Applications are received via NeoGov and screened within 3 business days of the job posting closing; To qualify for position, applicants must meet education and experience requirements established by Office of State Human Resources (OSHR); Applicants who do not meet the requirements are sent an email notification that they do not meet the qualification standards; Applicants who do meet the qualification standards are sent to hiring manager.
- Interviews Are Conducted: Hiring manager reviews applications and selects candidates to interview; After interviews are conducted and a candidate is chosen, the manager or Unit HR Representative completes the hiring package and submits the recommended applicant and salary in NeoGov; The hiring packages goes through a series of approvals in NeoGov and EEO reviews every package; Once each approval level is completed, the hiring package is

automatically sent to Central HR.

- Hiring Package: Consist of 10 forms (HR Action Form, Candidate Selection Form, Job Application, Salary Qualification Worksheet, Equity Report, Relative Form, Annual Notification Placement Form (EEO Form), Job Posting, Referred List, and Education Verification Form).
- Central HR Reviews Hiring Package: Rechecks package to ensure content meets OSHR polices, then is approved by HR Supervisor and HR Director. Salary exceptions and packages for which NCDOT does not have delegation must be submitted to OSHR before an approval is given. (Example Engineering Supervisor III or higher)
- Position Offer: Once the hiring manager receives approval to offer the position, they contact the applicant and offer the position; Once the applicant accepts the position, an orientation date is established for new hires or applicants transferring from another agency; Upon reporting to work, the on-boarding process is completed for the applicant; All other applicants who were sent to the manager for consideration are notified they were not selected for the position.
- The meeting adjourned at 9:37 AM

Economic Development and Intergovernmental Relations (EDIR) Committee

A presentation on the Economic Utilization of ROW for Broadband was presented by Chris Peoples, Deputy Chief Engineer

Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Committee

Dr. Julie Parenteau and Dan DeMaio-Newton presented information on DMV Diversity Recruitment. A PowerPoint Presentation was shared which expounded on the topic.

Topics included:

- Diversity in applicants
- How DMV compares to the rest of the North Carolina workforces, genders, education levels, and age

No Actions were taken by the Committee.

Finance Committee

1. Financial Update – Stephanie King
 - FYTD Revenues are largely in line with the Amended Spend Plan. FHWA Federal Aid has not met Spend plan expectations for the past two months and is currently ~10% below Amended Spend Plan (\$56.6M) for FYTD.
 - Expenditures are 2.9% or \$90.2M less than projected vs. Amended Spend Plan FYTD. Construction spending has exceeded latest approved Spend Plan for the first time this fiscal year.
 - The HF has a cash balance of \$1,000M and the HTF has a cash balance of 956M. Open commitments are currently at \$6,959M.
2. Revenue Update - Burt Tasaico
 - Revenues for 2022 appear to be steadier for the first half of the year that it has been for 2020 and 2021.

- As of today, revenues are 9.4% higher than what they were in 2019.

3. Build NC Issuance – Matt Lane

- Propose additional issuance of ~\$300M to be made in the coming months to:
 1. Ensure accelerated delivery of critical infrastructure
 2. Allow NCDOT to build a consistent capital program, encouraging private sector businesses to grow capacity to meet market demand
 3. Take advantage of the favorable interest rates to allow NCDOT to deliver consequential long-term assets at a low cost to the motoring public.
- Legislation allows for \$3 billion of financing over 10 years; the State Treasurer's office is assessing the timing of the issuance.
- The proposed project list is favorable for accelerating the timeline of compliance with S.L. 2018-16 Section 2.3 and 2.4, ensuring an equitable distribution of bond proceeds to Divisions and Regions across the state over the duration of the program.
- The IIJA federal funding will not overlap with projects that would be considered under the Build NC Bonds.
- There was a discussion around the rationale for a Build NC issuance given the departments current cash balance.

4. Introduction of Spend Plan Amendment 2 – Michelle Overby

- Build NC legislation did receive a technical correction that would allow for a bond issuance in the coming months.
- DOT business areas have requested changes for SFY 2022 Spending based on current forecast trends. DOT staff is requesting approval for an overall increase in spend targets by \$118M for the SFY 2022

spending plan.

- Federal Transportation legislation has passed in Washington, DC but not reflected in the Spend Plan because we are waiting for guidance on the NC share.
- Utilizing new SAS forecasting method for construction projects incorporating COVID effects.
- Total expenditure change of \$226M more than approved plan; net change in cash is \$186M more than approved plan.
- DOT is seeking approval to amend the DOT FY22-23 Spend Plan from the Office of State Budget and the Board of Transportation in March.

5. Powell Bill– Majed Al-Ghandour

- The goal was to provide financial assistance to municipalities for municipally maintained streets.
- Fixed appropriation from the State Highway Fund for FY 2021-2022 is \$154.9M & other municipal assistance of \$4,319,350.

Highways Committee

The Highways Committee heard two presentations. Ms. Kristin Barnes, Director of Highway Operations, provided a presentation on Operations and Maintenance Allocations. She discussed Fiscal Year 2022 appropriations and explained the allocation process for maintenance and preservation programs: General Maintenance Reserve, Roadside Environmental, Contract Resurfacing, Pavement Preservation, Bridge Program, and Bridge Preservation. Ms. Barnes detailed the criteria and formulas used to allocate Fiscal Year 2022 funds for each of the programs. She also discussed appropriations and allocations for small construction programs: Spot Safety, Contingency, Secondary Roads, and Mobility & Modernization. Ms. Barnes concluded the discussion with an overview of historical spending by Division and provided estimates for Fiscal Year 2023 funding.

The second presentation heard by the committee was from Ms. Rebecca Gallas, Staff

Engineer in the Chief Engineer's Office. Ms. Gallas provided a quarterly update on the ArTEMIS initiative: Advancing our Technology Ecosystem through Maintenance Intelligence Solutions. The goal of ArTEMIS is to connect maintenance work accomplished and costs with specific routes and asset locations. Ms. Gallas discussed the project's phased problem-solving strategy and reviewed the phases. The initial phase: Business Processes, was implemented in November 2021. The Next Phase: System Improvements, will begin with testing and pilot of mobile data collection of maintenance work in the Spring of 2022.

Multi-Modal Committee

- Board Member Allen Moran (Chairman) called the February 2, 2021, Multi-Modal Committee meeting to order. The November 3, 2021, meeting minutes were unanimously approved by the Multi-Modal Committee Board Members.
- Public Transportation Division, Rail Division and Aviation Division Funding items presented by Multi-Modal Directors and were recommended for approval by the Multi-Modal BOT Committee.
- Multimodal Updates were provided by Julie White, Deputy Secretary for Multi-Modal Transportation.
- Presentations from the Mode Directors followed:
 - Bobby Walston, PE., Aviation Division Director provided a presentation on Aviation's Role in Disaster Response and Recovery. The Division of Aviation provides disaster response support for three key types of disasters – hurricanes, landslides and COVID. This presentation highlighted how the Division's small staff mobilized an all-hands-on-deck effort when these events occur, with high-impact results.
 - Ryan Brumfield, IMD Division Director provided a presentation on IMD's role in Emergency Response and Disaster Recovery:
 - The Integrated Mobility Division (IMD) shared information regarding their emergency response activities. IMD monitors and tracks transit service operations during and after emergency events. In cases of

extreme natural disasters, IMD may help transit agencies and local officials plan and operate evacuation services. IMD also helps transit agencies respond to unique emergency events, such as the COVID-19 pandemic and expectation from the Governor to maximize access to vaccinations.

- Jason Orthner, PE, CPM, Rail Division Director, provided a presentation of Rail's Role in Natural Disasters and the Statewide Rail Network.
 - Rail Division presented on the effects of natural disasters on the rail network, and the role the division played in supporting train services and response during these events.
- The meeting adjourned at 2:15 PM




Total Registered Vehicles 2,771,558 (Aug 2021)



 - Targeted recruitment by NCDOT Talent Management



Screening Applications

- Applications are received via NeoGov and screened within 3 business days of the job posting closing.
- In order to qualify for position, applicants must meet education and experience requirements established by OSHR.
 - Applicants who do not meet the requirements, or possess the knowledge, skills and abilities, are sent an email notification that they do not meet the qualification standards.
 - Applicants who demonstrate they possess all posted knowledge, skills, and abilities are sent to hiring manager.
- Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities
 - Criteria an applicant must demonstrate beyond education and experience requirements to successfully perform job duties.
 - Established by the hiring manager in coordination with Central HR.

Interviews Are Conducted



- Hiring manager reviews applications and selects candidates to interview.
- After interviews are conducted and a candidate is chosen, the manager or Unit HR Representative completes the hiring package and submits the recommended applicant and salary in NeoGov.
- The hiring package goes through a series of approvals in NeoGov. This approval chain varies depending on internal processes. EEO reviews every package.
- Once each approval level is completed, the hiring package is automatically sent to Central HR in NeoGov.

Central HR Reviews Hiring Package

- Once Central HR Receives hiring package, all documentation is checked for accuracy and to ensure content meets OSHR policies. This is completed within 2 days.
- This package is submitted to a Central HR Supervisor for approval. The supervisor checks the subordinate's work and will either reject it for corrections or approve. This is completed within 2 days.
- The hiring package is then submitted to the HR Director's office for approval.

Hiring Package Review

Continued



- Once approval is received, Central HR notifies the Unit HR Representative of approval via email.
- Hiring packages that are salary exceptions or packages for which NCDOT does not have delegation must be submitted to OSHR before an approval is given.
 - An example of a package NCDOT does not have delegation for is an Engineering Supervisor III or higher.
- Any hiring package that is considered a salary exception is submitted to OSHR for review.
- These hiring packages are typically reviewed and approved by OSHR within 3 days. Once approval is received, Central HR notifies the Unit HR Representative of the approved salary.



Position Offer

- Once the hiring manager receives approval to offer the position, they contact the applicant and offer the position.
- Once the applicant accepts the position, an orientation date is established for new hires or applicants transferring from another agency.
- Upon reporting to work, the on-boarding process is completed for the applicant.
- All other applicants who were sent to the manager for consideration are notified they were not selected for the position.

Ability to plan, design, develop, acquire, construct, equip, maintain, and operate communications infrastructure supporting transportation infrastructure within the State of North Carolina.

Requires a competitive process

Information

Per law, communications infrastructure supporting transportation infrastructure means

fiber optic trunk lines, microcell towers or other broadband or data transmission facilities located within the right-of-way of the interstate or primary highway system that is owned, and utilized completely or partly, by the Department for traffic management, highway safety, vehicle technology integration, and other functions of the Department.

Action

An agreement entered into under this subdivision requires the concurrence of the Board of Transportation.

Report to JLTOC regarding contract details 60 days prior to signing.

The Role of Controlled Access ROWs for Broadband



Broadband connectivity is reliant on an end-to-end network which generally includes a long distance “middle mile” or “backbone” component that is connected to a shorter distance “last-mile” component to serve customers.



In rural areas, there is often a shortage of both middle-mile and last mile networks. The installation of middle mile networks can provide a catalyst for the deployment of last mile networks, and bridge rural connectivity gaps.



Controlled access ROWs may be attractive to developers as they could present a significant opportunity to install a backbone over long distances without having to navigate the complexities of multiple land purchases and/or easements. Last-mile networks are then built laterally to connect small towns to the backbone provided by the ROW. However, there is a cost to the State and NCDOT associated with these types of encroachments. Historically, until NCGS 136-18(46), the Department did not have the authority to allow this access (2019).



In addition to bridging rural connectivity gaps, controlled access ROW backbone networks could provide NCDOT with broadband connectivity for the deployment of ITS devices and communication with autonomous and connected vehicles.



As demonstrated with the I-95/US-70/US-74 Project, in exchange for providing ROW, NCDOT can share in the commercialization potential of the network and use this to offset its O&M and capital costs.

NCDOT could further leverage its controlled access ROW to bridge rural connectivity gaps and fulfill its own broadband requirements.





2021 DMV Hires by Gender




















How Does DMV Workforce Diversity Compare to the NC Workforce?


NC Workforce Ethnicity



DMV Employees by Ethnicity




DMV vs. NC Workforce Ethnicity






DMV Workforce vs DMV Applicants by Ethnicity






How Do DMV Workforce Genders Compare to the NC Workforce and DMV Applicants?

NC Workforce by Gender










DMV Workforce vs NC Workforce by Gender





NC Workforce by Age Group






How Does the DMV Applicants' Education Level Compare to the NC Workforce?








SFY 2022 Mid-year Revenue Update


SFY 2019 Comparisons – Total State Revenue




SFY 2019 Comparison – Major State Revenue

Favorable Interest Rates

Interest rates continue to remain low based on historical standards. Municipal bond inflows remain strong and MMD/UST ratios are favorable.



Projected Diminishing Cash Balance

Cash Model projects cash to peak in early 2022, followed by a drawdown into 2023. Cash is currently elevated because expenditures have fallen short of projections due to labor and material shortages. As the labor market stabilizes and supply chain issues begin to ease, expenditures should accelerate.



Legal Compliance

The proposed project list is favorable for accelerating the timeline of compliance with S.L. 2018-16 Section 2.3 and Section 2.4, ensuring an equitable distribution of bond proceeds to Divisions and Regions across the state over the duration of the Program. Analysis continues to identify NCDOT's debt capacity in future years.



History of the Powell Bill Program

- NC G.S. 136-41, Law passed in 1951
- The goal was to provide financial assistance to municipalities for municipally-maintained streets
- State Senator Junius K. Powell, an attorney & former Mayor of Whiteville, led the signatures on the bill, hence the name of the “Powell Bill” Program
- First Powell Bill funds were distributed in the Fall of 1951 (\$4.5 million among 386 participating municipalities)

Division Allocations based on 5-year average expenditures for Snow & Ice activities




Total Investment by Division (FY 2018-2023)


Total Spend by Division (FY 2018 – 2021)





NCDOT has about 20 drone pilots with varying degrees of experience. Other state agencies have their own drones, including police and firefighters, and private support was also going to be called in from partners including Dronescape, North State Engineering, PrecisionHawk and SM&E. Then there was coordination with the National Guard, FEMA and the Federal Aviation Administration.

"The major thing for us was coordination," says Darshan Divakaran, the UAS program engineer at the North Carolina Department of Transportation's aviation division. Divakaran's office became what he calls the "UAS champion," a sort of air boss coordinating the efforts of all these disparate players.









Budget expended by Delivery Projects

Project Selection Method

Workgroup Recommendation

- Use “Programming P3-P4-P5” Approach with Flexibility
 - Use highest scores from each cycle until each STI category budget is filled
 - Start with projects committed P3.0 → Sort projects by highest score (descending order)
 - Program projects until available funding runs out
 - If funding remains available, repeat process for projects committed in P4.0, then P5.0
- Flexibility opportunities for funded projects (swaps)

Flexibility Option

NCDOT will allow flexibility once Preliminary Draft 2024-2033 STIP is programmed

- Project schedules can be swapped

Prior to Issuance: Process

6 months prior to expected date of Build NC Bond issuance, NCDOT must have:

- ✓ Consulted with State Treasurer
- ✓ Consulted with the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee and the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. Provide these details:
 - ✓ The **total amount** of Build NC Bonds that will be issued
 - ✓ The estimated amount of the **debt service payments**
 - ✓ The estimated amount of **debt capacity that would be remaining** after the issuance

Additional Stipulations

- 1 Funds are subject to appropriation by the General Assembly
- 2 Proceeds from the sale are not allowed on nonhighway projects or a project utilizing tolling⁴
- 3 Funds must be split evenly between Division Need Projects and Regional Impact Projects. Funds distributed to divisions must be allocated in equal shares and funds distributed to regions must be allocated based on population estimates certified by OSBM
- 4 **Section 5.1.(a) G.S. 143B-350, Subsection (f) 1c., Requires Board of Transportation to review and approve the use of bonds**

Favorable Interest Rates

Interest rates continue to remain low based on historical standards. Municipal bond inflows remain strong and MMD/UST ratios are favorable.



Projected Diminishing Cash Balance

Cash Model projects cash to peak in early 2022, followed by a drawdown into 2023. Cash is currently elevated because expenditures have fallen short of projections due to labor and material shortages. As the labor market stabilizes and supply chain issues begin to ease, expenditures should accelerate.



Legal Compliance

The proposed project list is favorable for accelerating the timeline of compliance with S.L. 2018-16 Section 2.3 and Section 2.4, ensuring an equitable distribution of bond proceeds to Divisions and Regions across the state over the duration of the Program. Analysis continues to identify NCDOT's debt capacity in future years.




