On July 7, 2022, the Board approved an initial maintenance allocation totaling \$1,699,760,767. Several days later, on July 11, 2022, House Bill 103, the Current Operations Appropriations Act of 2022, was enacted as Session Law 2022-74. The appropriations act included a \$1,000,000 increase for Bridge Program and a \$33,100,000 increase for General Maintenance Reserve.

In addition to the \$34,100,000 increased appropriations noted above, \$14,913,355 of prior year funding was made available for distribution after being approved for Legislative, Medical and Retirement increases and inspection tax proceeds.

At this time, staff recommends allocating the additional \$49,013,355 to the divisions.

Staff also recommends cashflowing \$423,656,947 from future year allocations.

Total Allocation: Staff recommends allocating an additional \$41,311,826 for Traditional General Maintenance Reserve (Traditional GMR), and cashflowing (advancing) \$121,326,607 from future year allocations.

Legislative Increases: On June 30, 2022, an additional \$8,211,826 was made available for GMR after being approved for prior year Legislative, Medical and Retirement increases. Staff recommends distributing these funds to the divisions using a previously approved formula.

Certified Budget Increase: House Bill 103 (Session Law 2022-74) increased the FY2023 GMR appropriation by \$33,100,000. Staff recommends distributing these funds to the divisions using a previously approved formula.

Cashflow: The GMR cashflow balance of \$181,989,911 was repaid in full as part of the initial allocation approved on July 7, 2022. At this time, staff recommends cashflowing \$121,326,607 from future year allocations. The cashflow funds will be distributed to the divisions using a previously approved allocation formula. Together with the \$41,311,826 allocation increase, the \$121,326,607 cashflow advance will increase the total division distribution of Traditional GMR from \$256,049,694 to \$426,688,127. This recommendation will provide the Department with necessary funds to support ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the system.

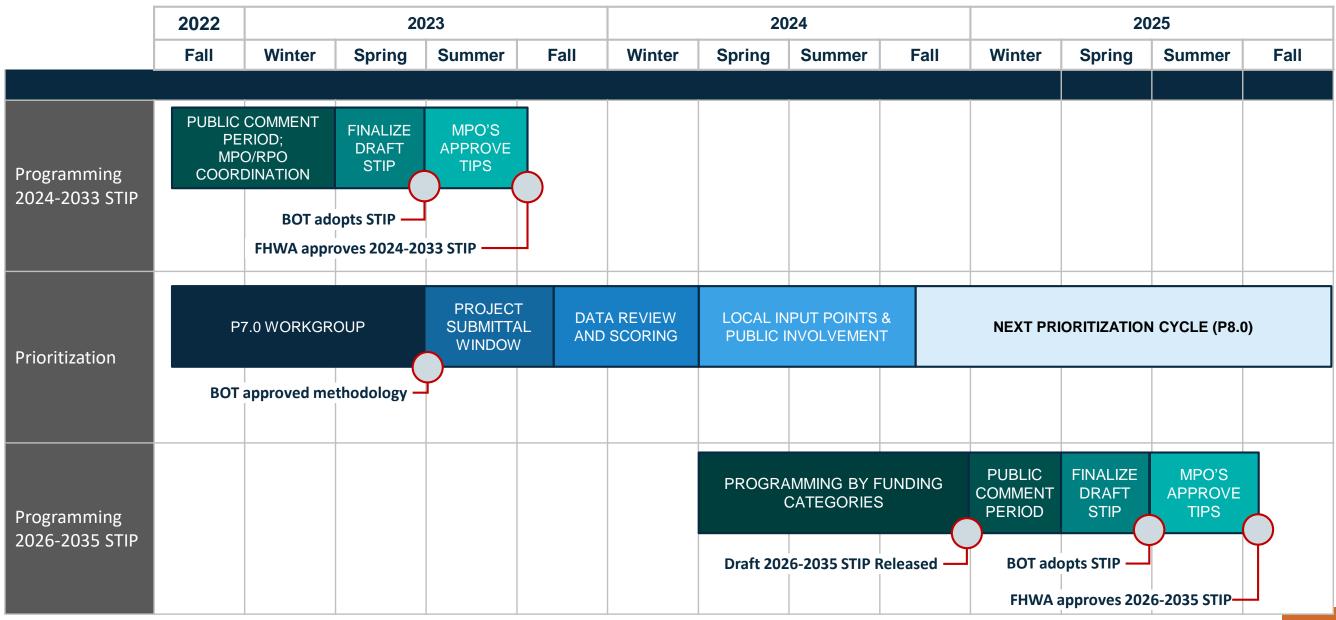

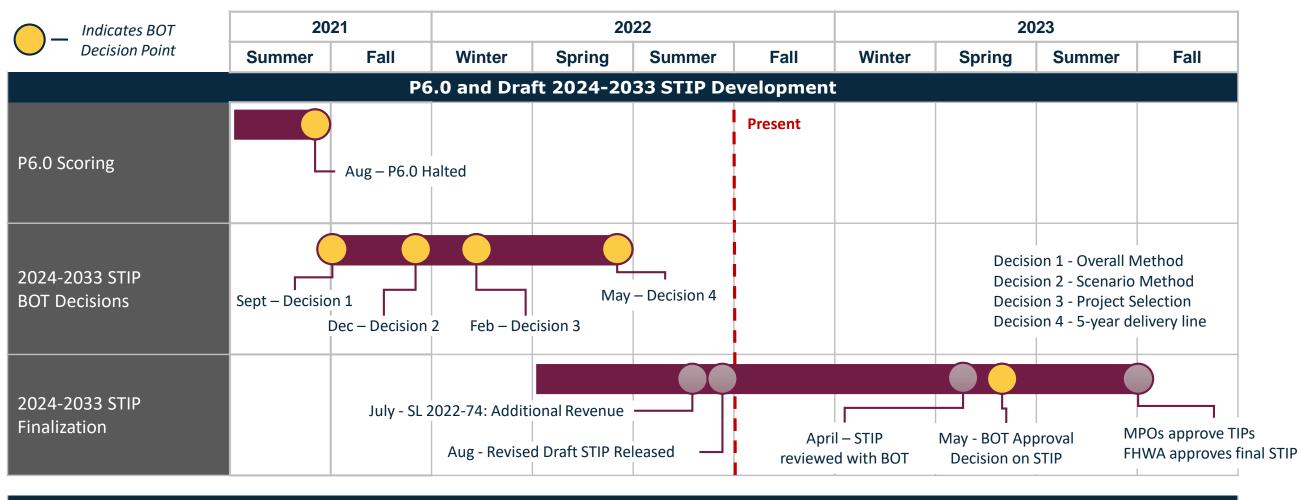

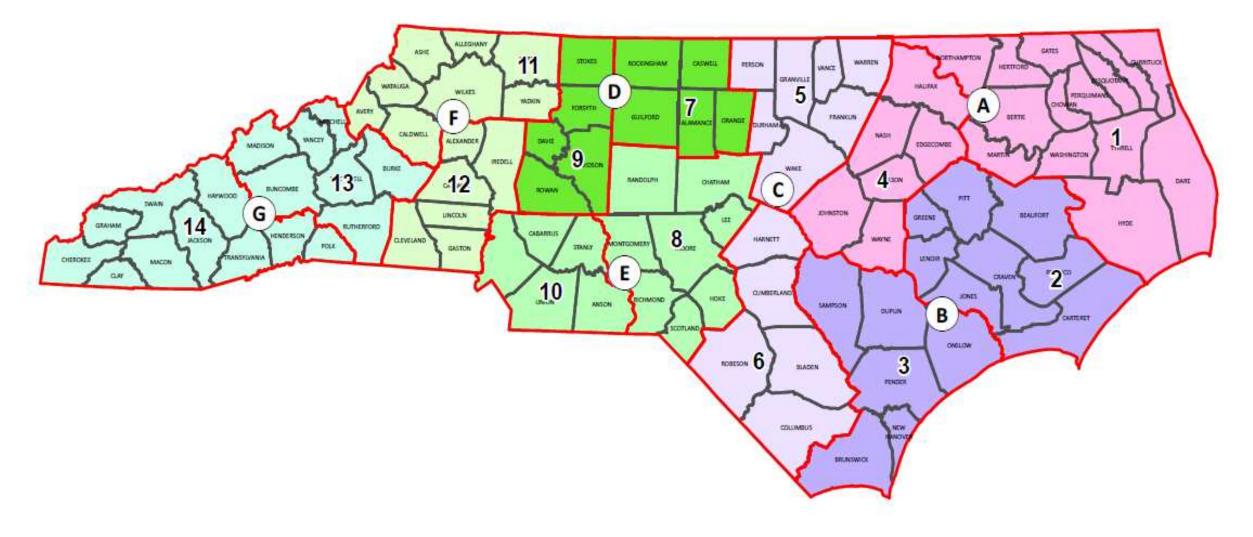

The Department shall endeavor <u>to continually improve the methodology and criteria</u> used to score highway and non-highway projects pursuant to this Article, including the use of normalization techniques, and methods to strengthen the data collection process.

The Department is directed to continue the use of a workgroup process to develop improvements to the prioritization process.

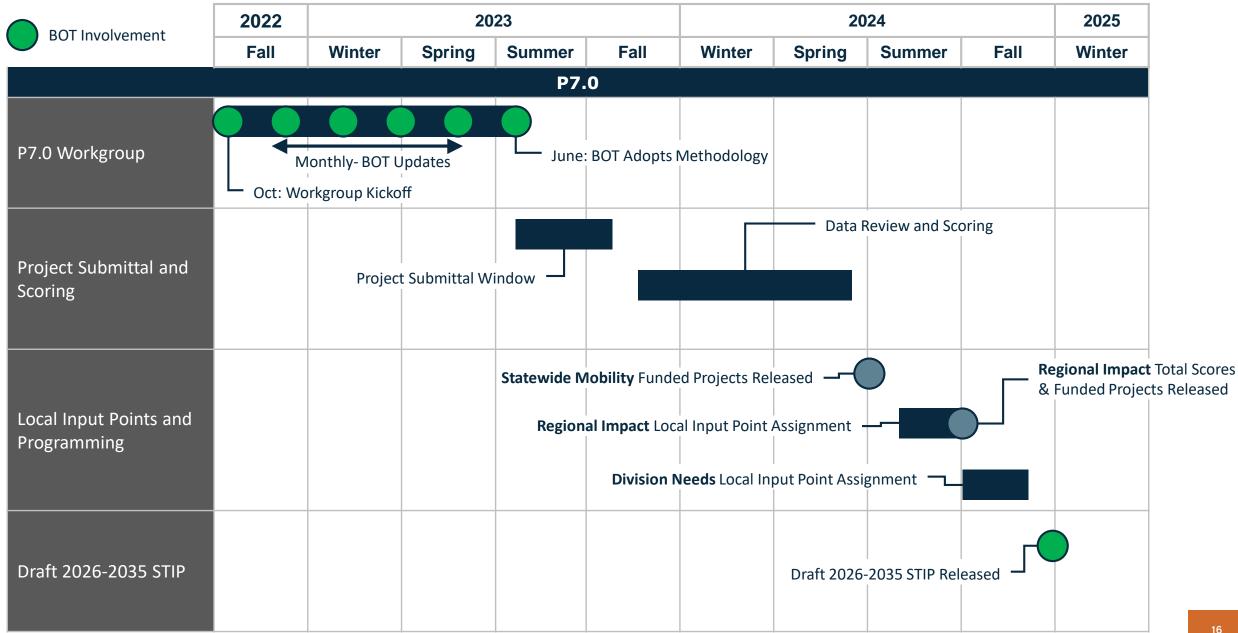

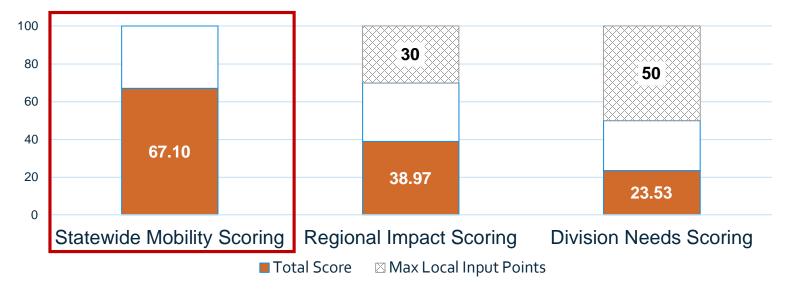

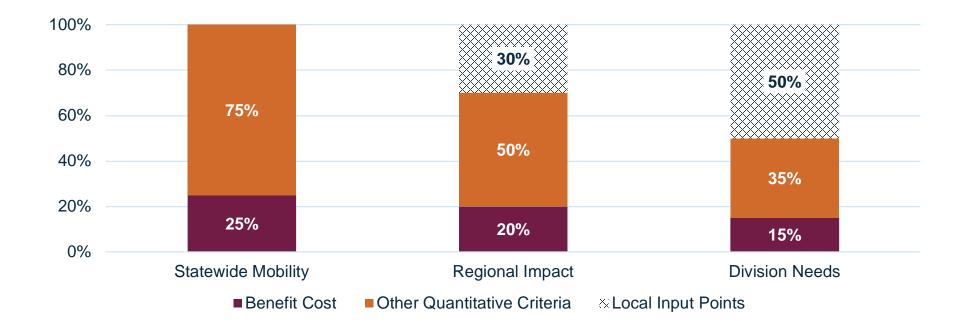

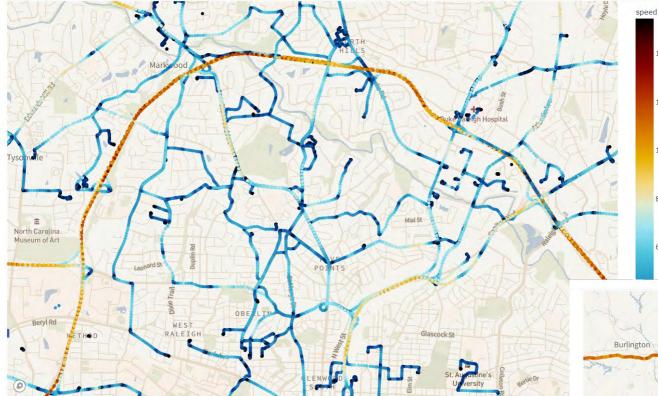

Figure 2: North Carolina Counties by Population Density

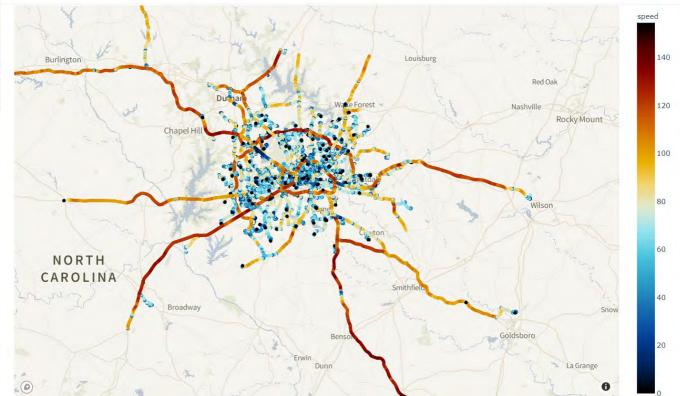

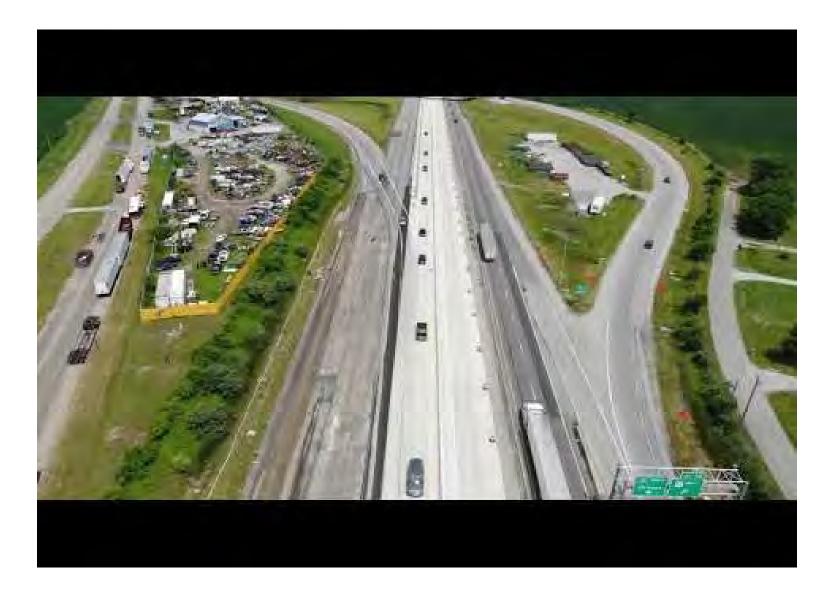

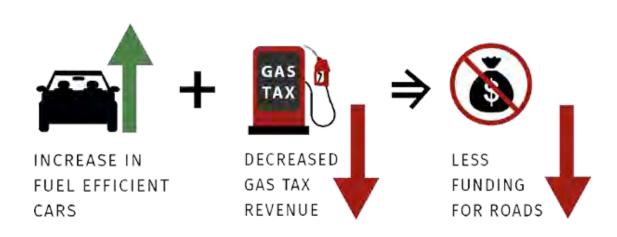




How can Wejo support MBUF Initiatives?

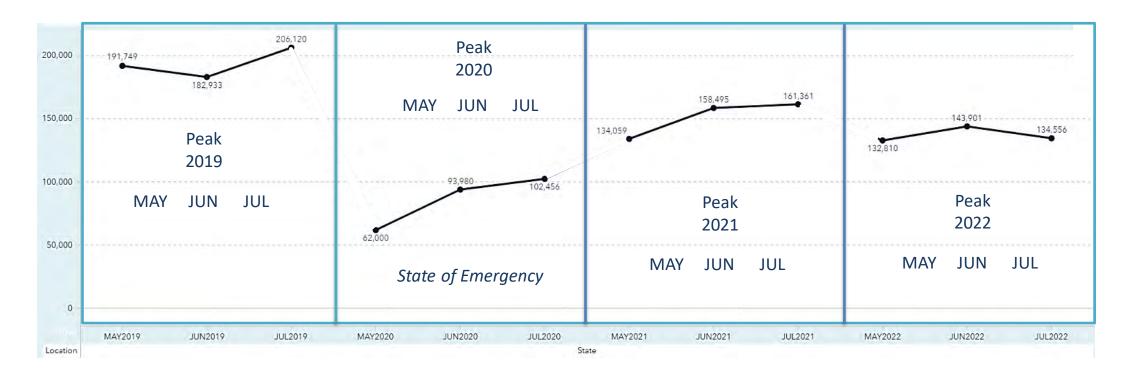

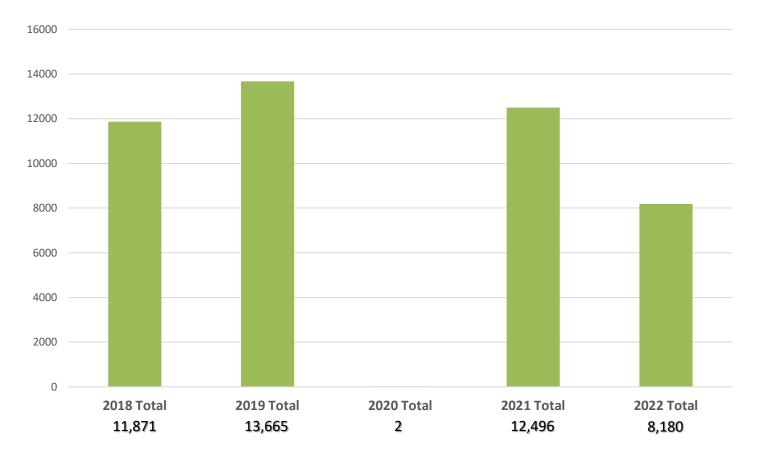

End of the State of Emergency – August 15, 2022

- Road Test Waivers will discontinue 30 days after the completion of the SOE (Sept 14)
- HB 650 DMV Omnibus bill extended the end date of Session Law 2021-24 to one more year through 31 Dec 2022. Level 1 drivers need only 6 months of driving for Level 2 eligibility through this date.
- Effective 1 Jan 2023, Level 1 drivers will require 12 months of driving for Level 2 eligibility in addition to all previous requirements.

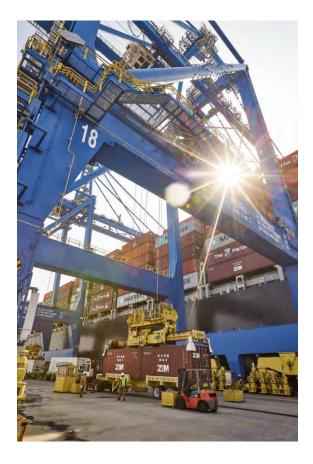

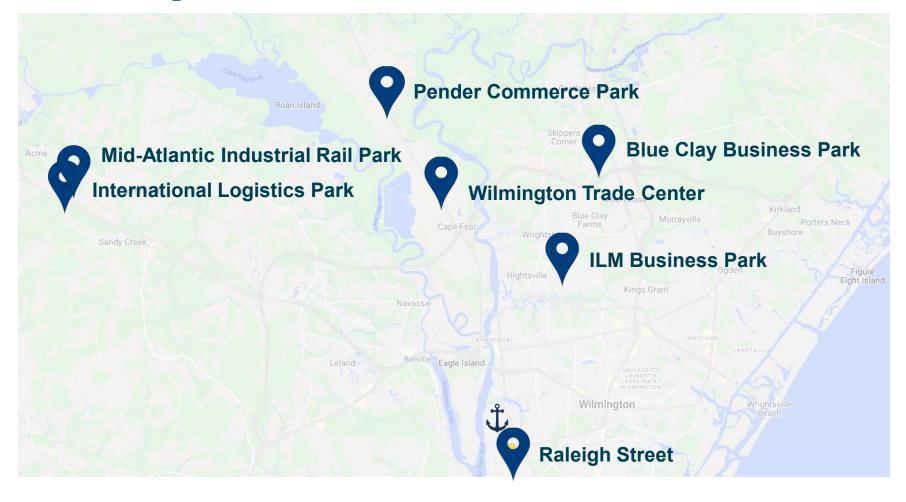

Chair Lathrop asked for a voice vote. All members voted in favor of appro minutes and the June 8, 2022 minutes were approved unanimously.					
2. Financial Update, Stephanie	King				
	Mrs. King started off by discussing the financial status for the 2022 SFY.				
	Revenue is \$6.66B which is 1% less than the previous year and 2% less than the forecast. Expenses are \$6.3B which is over \$1.3B more than the previous fiscal year and 7% lower than forecast. NCDOT spent 93% of what was predicted for the year. Trust Fund expenses continue to lag due to industry issues (over 81% of June expenses were for construction contracts).				
DISCUSSION SUMMARY	August Redistribution request was submitted for \$213M, this will provide more billing authority. NCDOT was recently notified that its submittal can be revised to request more billing authority. We are working on getting this request out.				
	Overall for the 2022 SFY we were stable and in close alignment with our forecasts. The books are closed for June.				
	Our 2023 Budget has passed, this will help get the second year of the biennium ready. Overall Highway Fund appropriations increased by \$334.8M for a total of				



\$2,938.2M. This is due to the revised consensus forecast & additional revenue from the Sales Tax. Highway Trust Fund appropriations increased by \$107.2M for a total of \$1,835.5M.
Currently we are going through "Budget Certification" with OSBM. Once a budget is passed it goes back to all primary governments to perform various budget and accounting entries so that the budget can be truly certified.
Regarding the Sales and Use Tax Transfer, the HF will receive \$193M for 2022-23; this is an estimate. Economic factors could impact the estimated amount. NCDOT and State Budget will be working together on these numbers.
Spend Plan Amendments – we are asking for the Board's consideration and approval at this board session for two particular items: the inclusion of Sales Tax revenue (\$193M) and the Time Limited Cost Escalation Adjustment (\$135M). Our team is currently working on a process with the restraints indicated in the legislation. In addition, we will be working on providing State Budget with a monthly report on this status, per their request.
Next month we will have a Spend Plan Amendment 2, which will have the adjusted Business Unit Action Plan with the new budget and retooling certain items that did not get spent in the last FY. We are asking the Board to consider this for approval next month so that our division engineers, modal, etc. will have more time to get this money to work.
Eagle Audit had no financial issues identified over our major classifications of our accounts. There were some minor IT items that were addressed.
The Annual Comprehensive Financial Report is underway. This is the biggest audit our agency goes through each year. We have a packet due to the State Controller's office at the end of August. The Auditors will audit this as well.
Ultimately this gets compiled in the Statewide financial statement, which rating agencies look at for Bond ratings.
This fall there will still be a Spend Plan performance audit required by session law. E&Y is working with us on documentation of an overall governance document that shows where we were, improvements we made, and what are plans are for the future. We will also have a Spend Plan Audit Response document, which will be finalized after SAS analytics has retooled its forecasting methodology. SAS indicated they will have a new version with the updated COVID adjustment to us by August 25 th . This will allow us to forecast on the project level. We hope to have that by September 15 th .
Looking at Revenues – for the month of June the variance to spend is at -1.6% and for the year it is -2.3%. June collections for MFT and HUT picked up from May with HF and HTF exceeding projections by 15.5% and 12.8%, respectively. The HF and HTF grew by ~4.5% or ~\$184M on a combined basis compared to SFY 2021.
Looking at Expenses – actuals were less than expected for June. However, maintenance was able to take advantage of good weather and got closer to their spend goal. Expenses for the entire fiscal year were -7.5% below our spend plan. Monthly variances were at -6.9% due to Rail's S-Line acquisition being delayed



until SFY 2023 and issues with labor and materials shortages. Expenditures have increased 24.8% from the prior year. We are continuing to work with SAS on another forecast adjustment that will be tested in September.
We ended the year with 2.37B in cash. Cash on hand is about 137 days. Our open commitments are over \$8B; 71% of this is in construction. We started 48 new projects and closed out 52 projects for the month of June.
Brief Budget Overview
Overall HF appropriations increased by \$334.8M, with \$193M generated from the Sales Tax transfer. The budget provides \$135M for cost escalations on existing contracts; \$33M more for GMR; \$25M for commercial services airports; funds for an economic liaison; and a 3.5% raise for all State Employees.
HTF appropriations increased by \$107M. The budget provides for a transfer of \$109M from the HF to the HTF for STIP/Right of Way (ROW) acquisitions and increases STI funding by \$106.9M.
Technical corrections are needed for the \$240K for the visitor centers; the language does not direct where the money needs to go. However, we do not expect to see a correction bill. But we are staying up to date on what is going on at the GA.
Denied Requests – we go through an expansion budget process, asking the business areas what they need which ultimately goes into the governor's budget. Our expansion items were not approved. We did not get an increase in mailing costs; ferry did not get a state match for IIJA or for the US Coast Guard; and we did not get the 6 additional positions requested.
Areas of Concern – the budget directs over realized revenue in the HF to loan repayments in the amount of \$107.7M. This basically writes off over-realized revenue that could be used for the general maintenance reserve (GMR); NCDOT hopes to get this issue resolved in the next session.
Generally, at the end of the fiscal year, any additional money that comes in above the yearly budget (ex. admin money not used, money from inactive projects, etc.) goes into a pot in the HF that ultimately goes to GMR. There has been some confusion with the loan repayments from the HF to the HTF, so instead of the 107.7M going to GMR, it was effectively written off. As a result, the credit balance to the HF is only approximately \$12M. The HTF side received the full \$74.7M in credit balance. We hope to get a comprehensive packet together for the legislative members, so that we can provide them more information to hopefully correct this issue.
Mrs. King then showed slide 12. Based on June's ending balance, NCDOT has well over \$2.2B in the bank. Based on what we currently know there will be a downward trajectory with the lowest point being in December 2023 of about \$1.25B. This graph is calculating \$100M in August redistribution; this will adjust when we know the actual amount.
Total revenues and other receipts have been within 2% of projections. For the construction program there is a 10% variance, maintenance had a 1% variance



	and modal had a 12% variance. Overall, we delivered 93% of what was in our Spend Plan; this is good considering all the various factors we had in play this year. This concludes Mrs. King's presentation.

	A separate line item for the Sales Tax revenue was created for more visibility. We anticipate receiving these revenues quarterly and spread equally, starting in September.

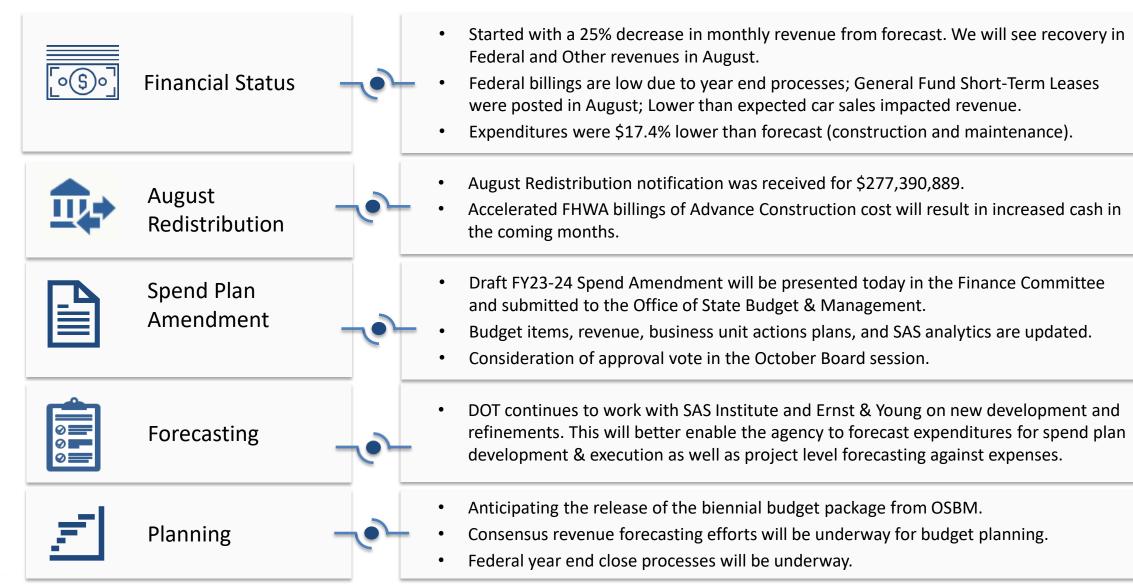

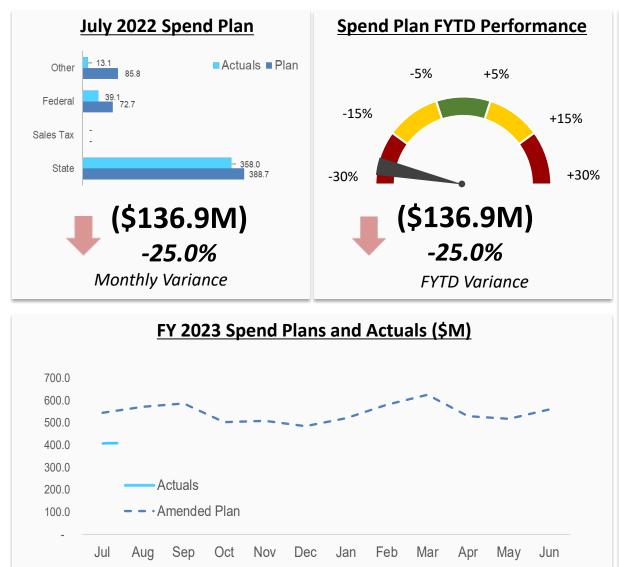

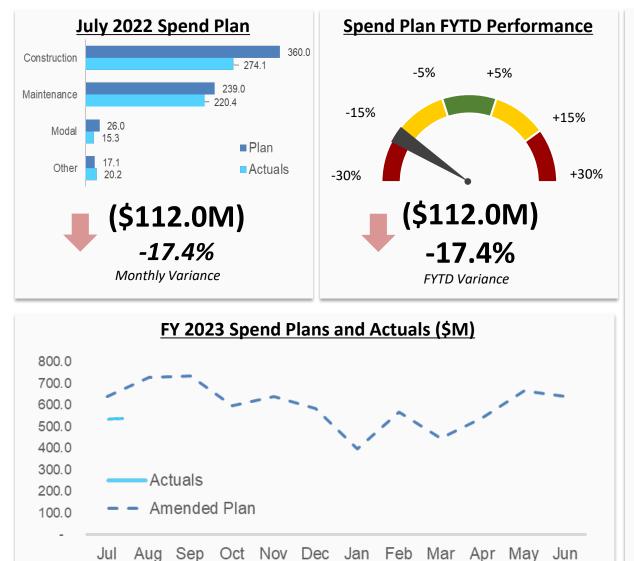


Revenue Commentary

- Negative monthly variance is attributable to all revenue categories for July.
- Most of the negative variance is due to Other Revenue and FHWA-Federal Aid.
- Build NC (-\$41.6M) and GARVEE (-\$15.7M) revenues were lower or nil, respectively, due to a slow down of reimbursements.
- FHWA-Federal Aid (-\$33.6M) revenues was lower than spend plan due to SAP being closed for most of July due to year end close which prohibited billings from being generated.
- Highway Fund variance is a result of the Short Term Leases transfer that was posted on 8/1.
- HTF and the HF had lower than expected car sales for the month of July.

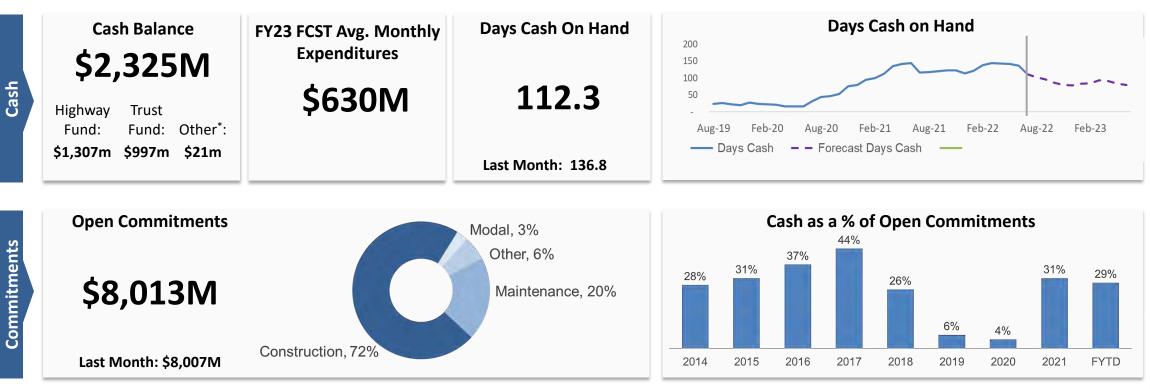


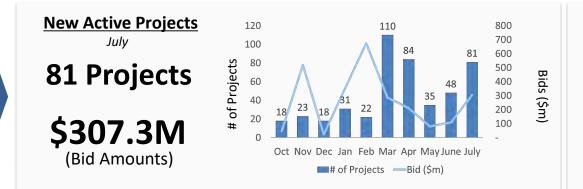

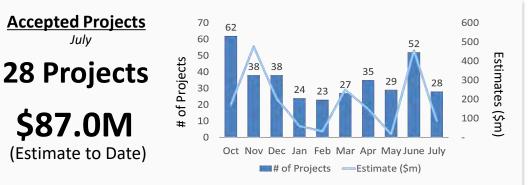
- Total monthly variance were largely due to underspending in Construction (\$85.8M) and Maintenance (\$18.6M).

Financial Analysis

- **HF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$1,064.6 million in July 2021 to \$1,306.9 million in July 2022. An increase of \$242.4 million or 22.8%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures during SFY 2022 due to labor and material shortages.
- **HF Revenues & Expenses** Revenues increased from \$207.5 million in July 2021 to \$220.1 million in July 2022. An increase of \$12.7 million or 6.1%. This increase was due to a \$11.2 million increase in motor fuel tax revenues and a \$1.5 million increase in license & fee revenues. There was no change in highway use tax revenues in July 2022 compared to July 2021. Expenses (current accounts) decreased by \$23.4 million, or 30.8% in July 2022 compared to July 2021.
- HTF Cash Cash balance increased from \$951.0 million in July 2021 to \$996.7 million in July 2022. An increase of \$45.7 million or 4.8%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures during SFY 2022 due to labor and material shortages.
- **HTF Revenues & Expenses** Revenues increased from \$134.3 million in July 2021 to \$137.9 million in July 2022. An increase of \$3.6 million or 2.7%. This increase was due to a \$5.6 million increase in motor fuel tax revenue, offset by a \$1.9 million decrease in fees revenue. There was no change in highway use tax revenue in July 2022 compared to July 2021. Expenses (current accounts) decreased by \$9.2 million or 81.9% in July 2022 compared to July 2021.

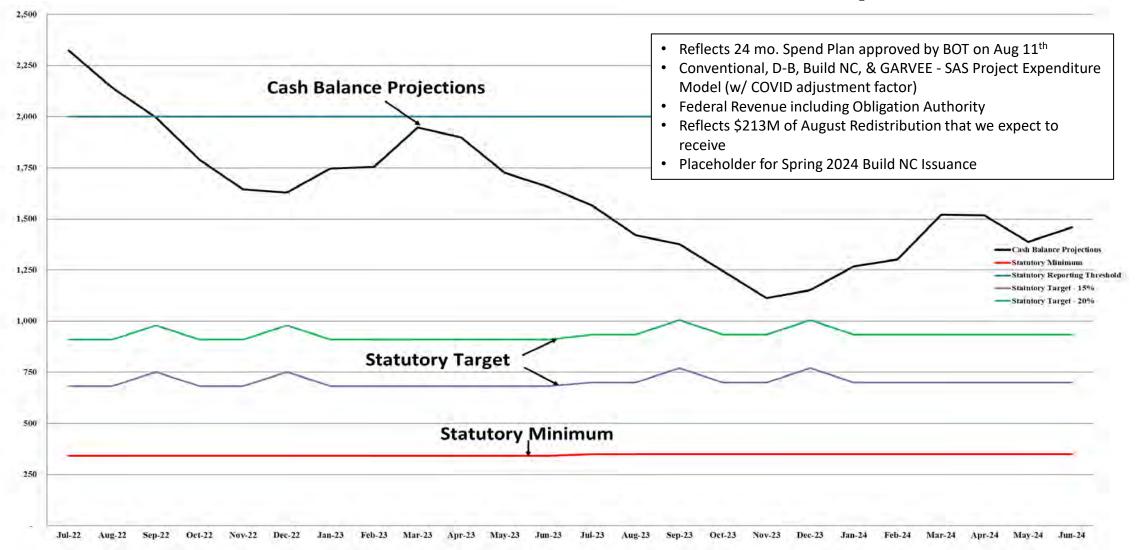
Key monthly action:

On July 26, DOT repaid \$40M of the Highway Trust Fund loan to the Highway Fund. This repaid a portion of the loan made on November 15, 2018 for \$150M. The outstanding balance of the loans after this payment will be \$165,300,000.

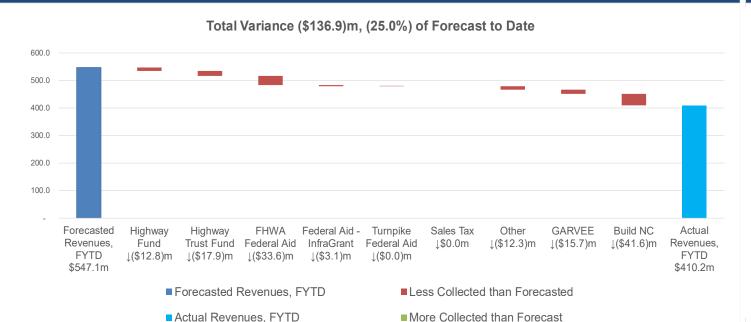

Variance to Spend Plan - Fiscal Year to Date



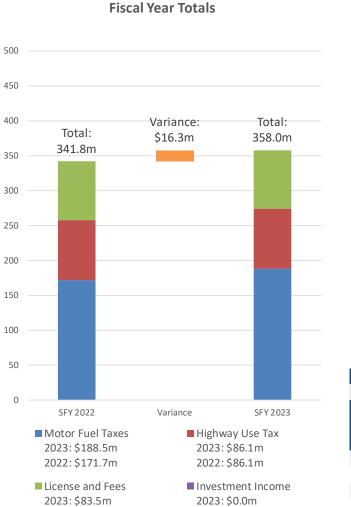

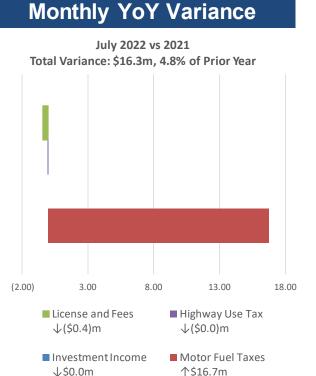
Highway Fund & Trust Fund Details July 2022(\$M)

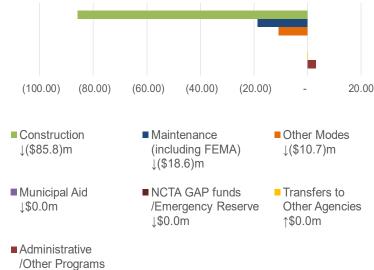

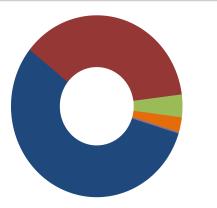

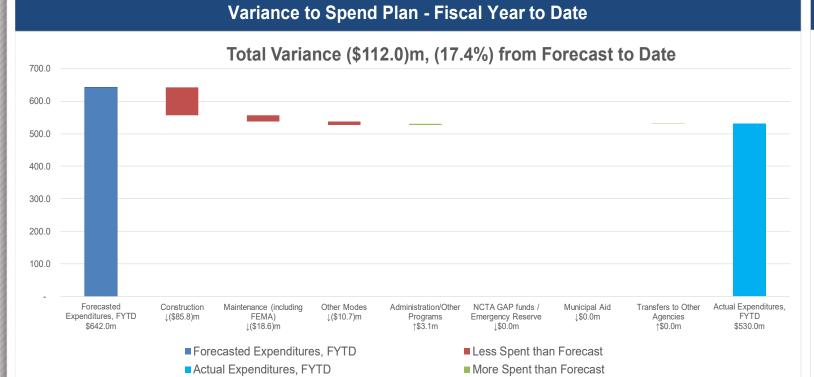

Overall Expenditure Summary and Variances – Fiscal YTD (\$M)

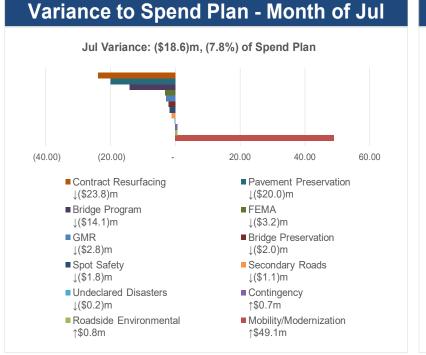

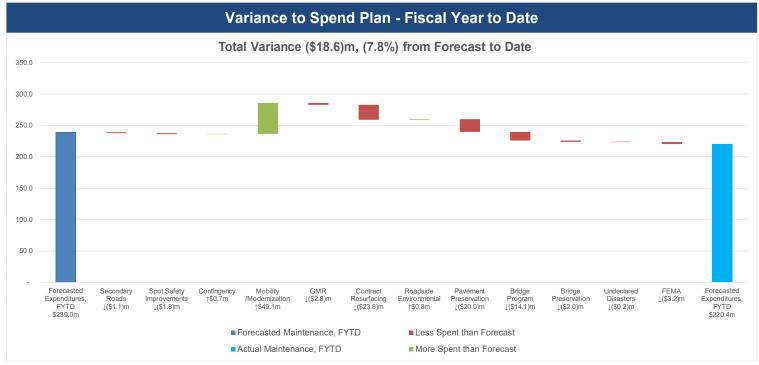

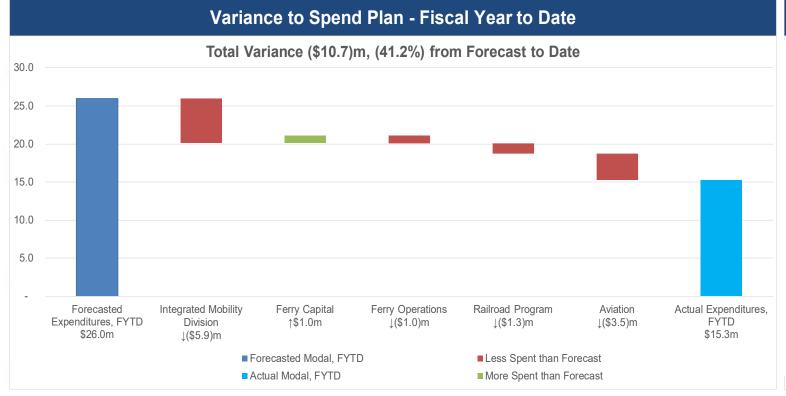

Modal Expenditure Summary and Variances – FYTD (\$M)

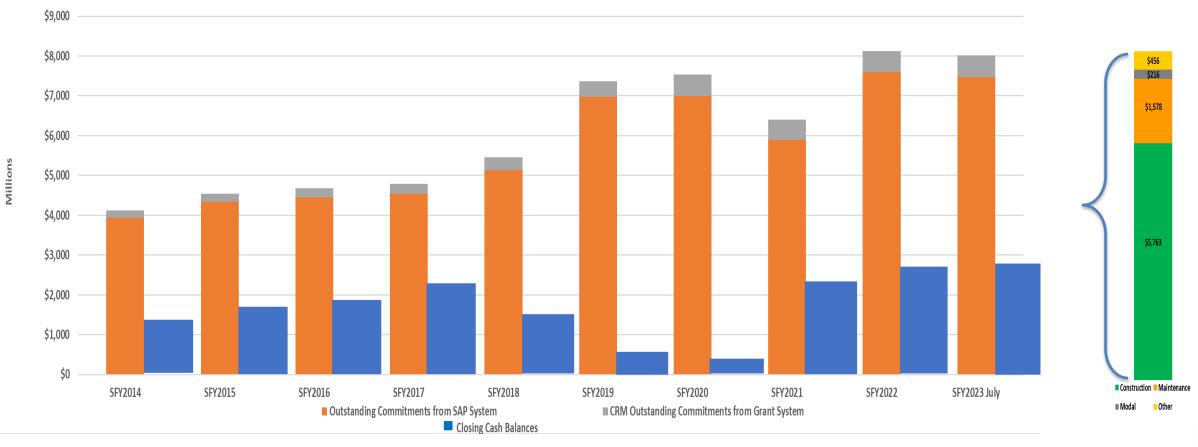

NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by State Fiscal Year



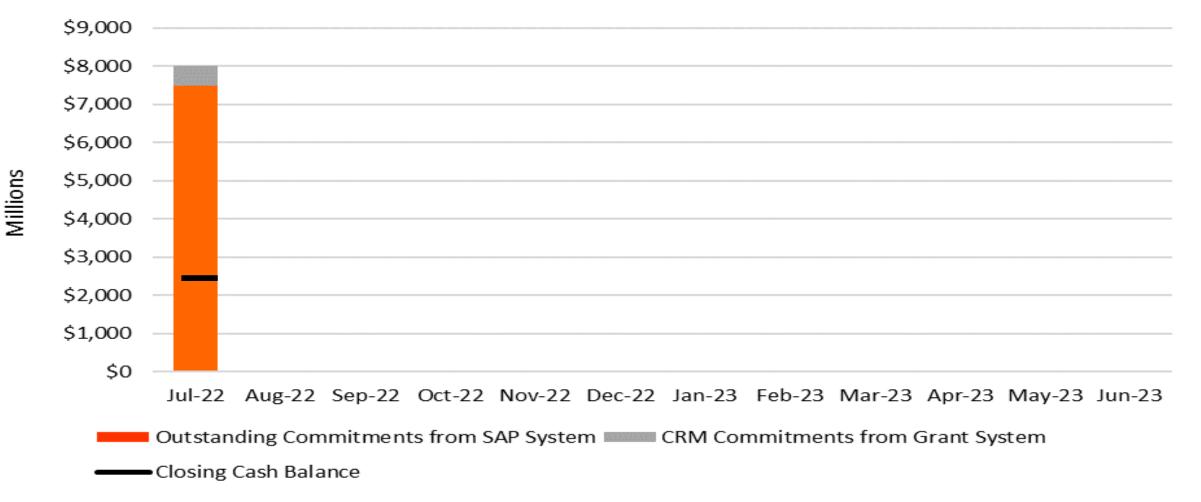

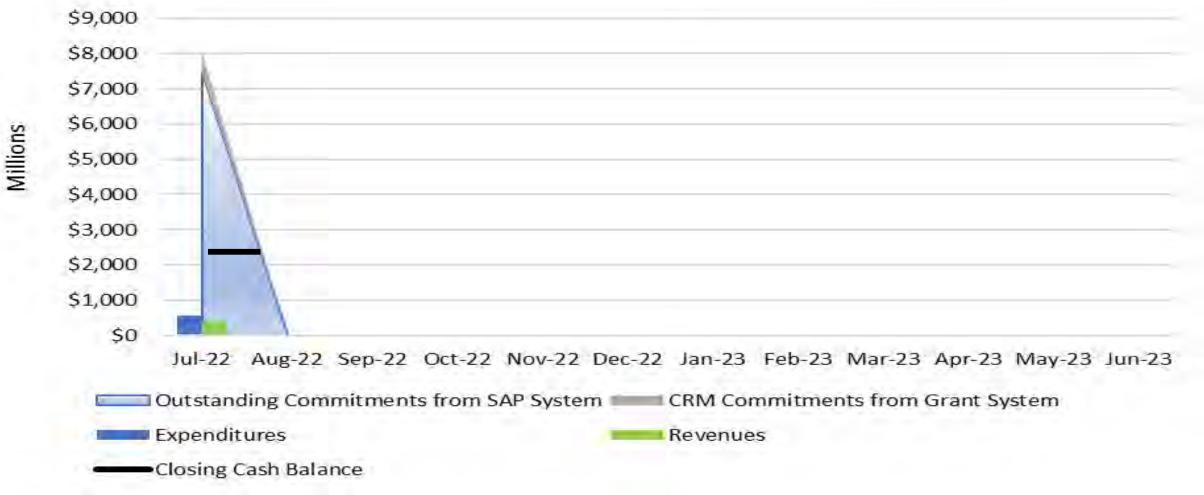

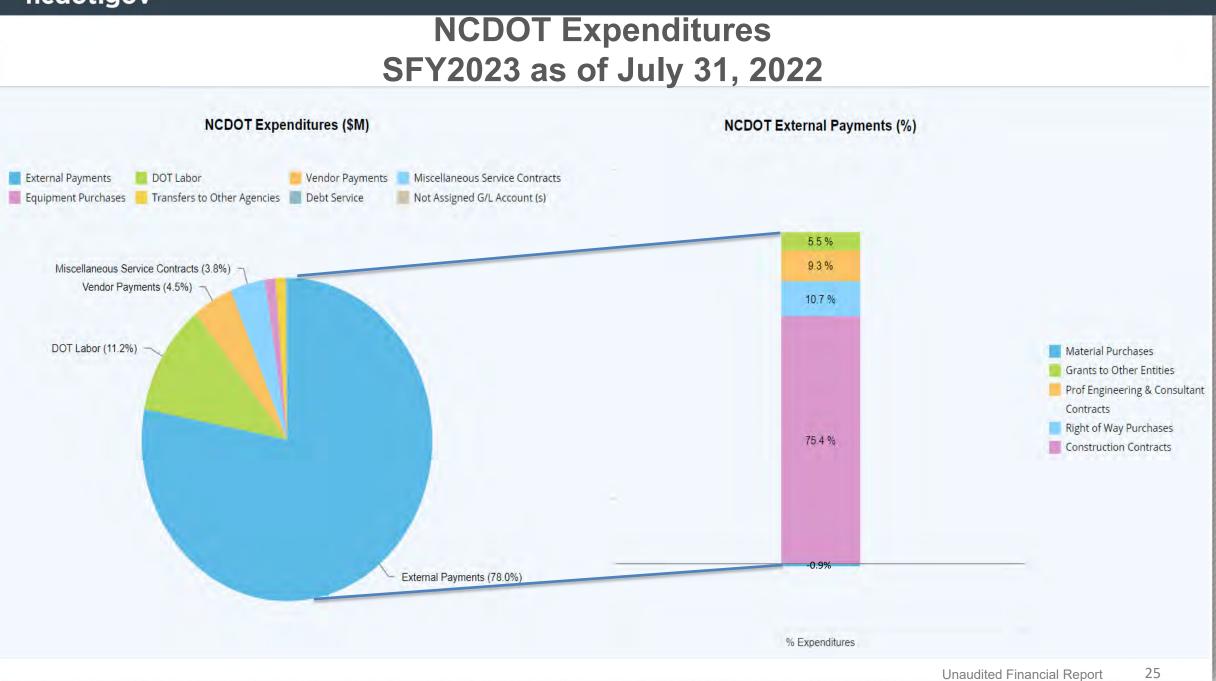

July 2022 – Reporting Required

- N.C.G.S 143C-6-11(m) requires DOT to report each month when the department's combined average daily cash balance for the month is outside of the statutory target range.
- For July 2022, the **combined average daily cash balance** of the Highway Fund and the Highway Trust Fund was \$2.26 billion.
- The cash target amounts representing 15% and 20% of the total appropriations for the current fiscal year are \$687 million and \$916 million, respectively.
- The closing cash balance for July was \$2.32 billion which is above the target range and above the minimum cash balance requirement of \$344 million under N.C.G.S. 143C-6-11.

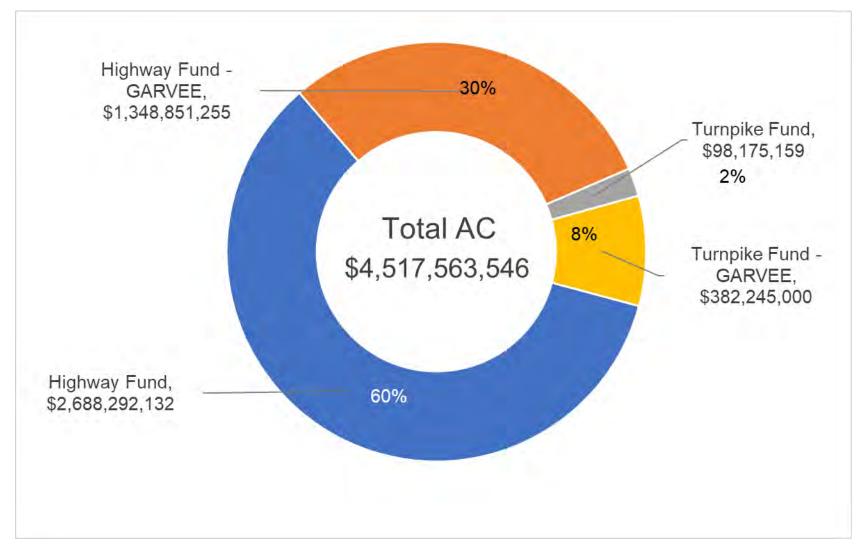

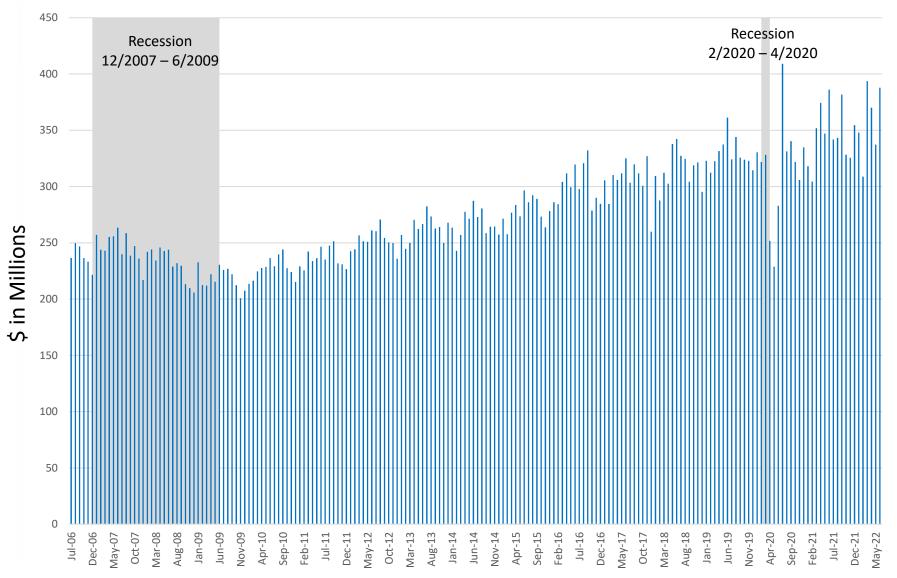

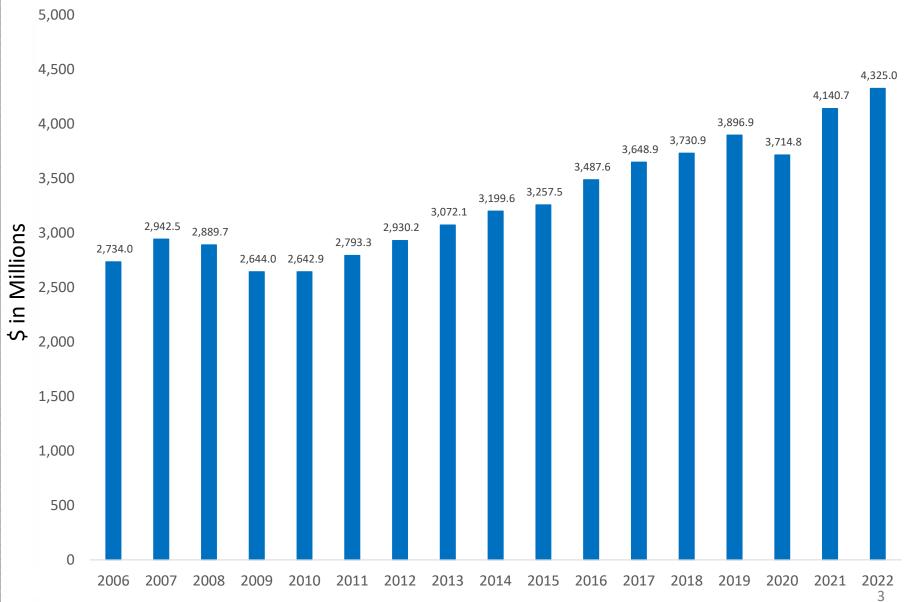
State Revenue – Historical Analysis

SFY 2007-2022 – Monthly Transportation Revenues



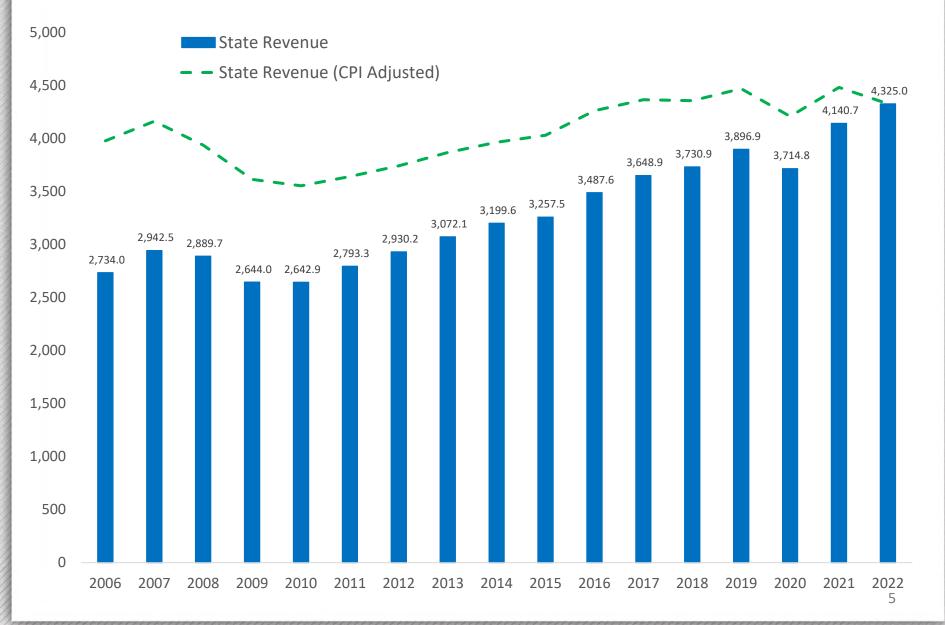
SFY 2007-2022 – Transportation Revenues

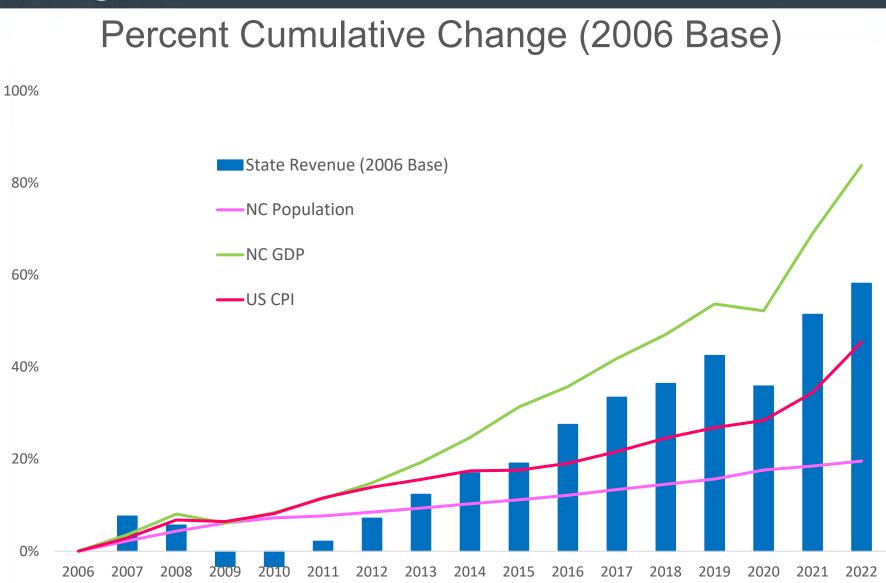

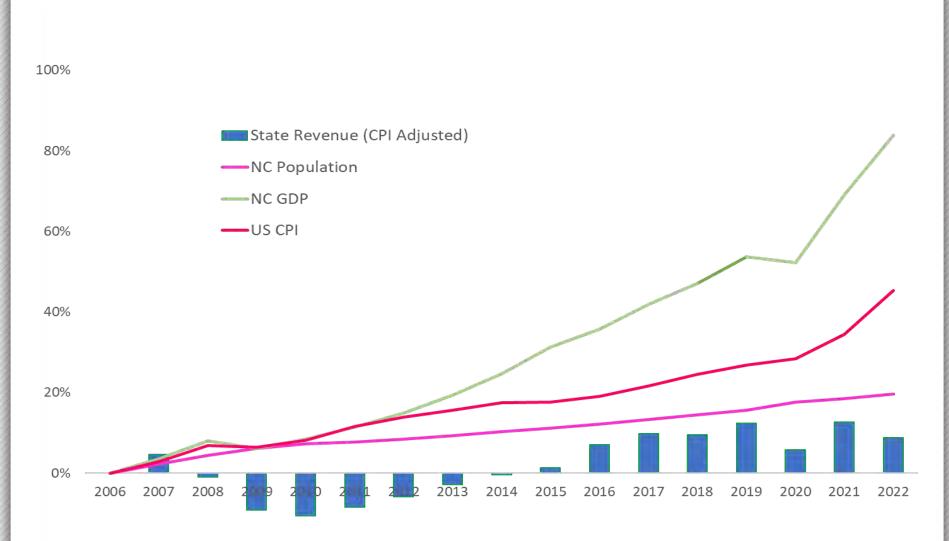

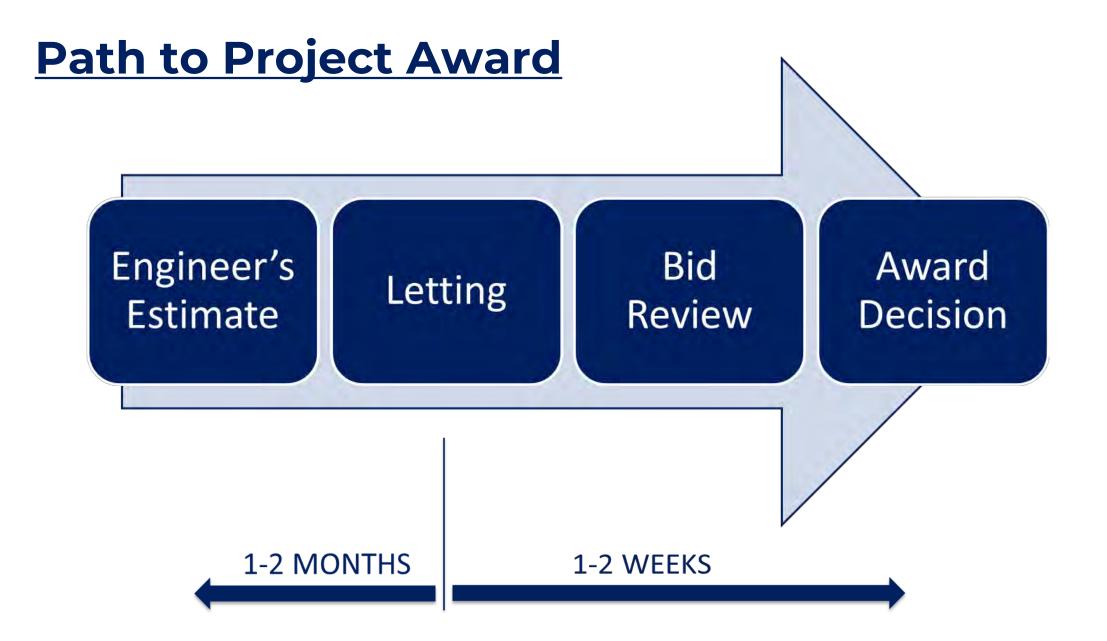

Bid Review Committee – Policy & Procedures

Policy Statement

It is the responsibility of the Bid Review Committee (Committee) to <u>carefully review all bids</u> submitted and to formulate recommendations on the acceptance or rejection of bids. These recommendations will be reviewed with the Director of Technical Services prior to award of projects by the Secretary of Transportation.

Bid Review Committee Members

Chairperson: State Contract Officer (vote only to break a tie)

Members: Deputy Chief Engineer (voting member) Director of Field Support (voting member) Director of Preconstruction (voting member) Director, Rail Division (voting member) Program Development Branch Manager (voting member) FHWA Division Administrator (or his representative, non-voting member)



Low bids and best value proposals which are less than the engineer's estimate and low bids and best value proposals which are higher than the engineer's estimate by no more than 10% are generally considered satisfactory, provided the project is adequately financed.

For projects on which low bids and best value proposals are more than 15% below or more than 10% above the engineer's estimate, the estimator will prepare or have prepared a report for distribution to the Committee. The report will consist of the Item C sheets, the estimator's explanation of the reasons for the significant deviations from the engineer's estimate, a copy of the bid examination sheets, and if applicable, a copy of the legal opinion and recommendation from the Special Deputy Attorney General. When applicable, the report will include a summary and applicable comments on projects previously advertised, in which all bids or proposals were rejected and re-advertised. This report will be compiled by the estimating engineer and sent to members of the Committee and the above named advisors two days prior to the Committee meeting.

Sample Report: Low Bid More Than +10% ABOVE Estimate

- The low bidder is +10.3% (+\$14.2 million +/-) above the Estimate.
- The low bidder is approximately \$417,000 +/- from being within the acceptable "Engineer's Estimate + 10%" threshold.

- Bidders relayed there is a lot of work underway in this area with more large
 projects anticipated to be let in the next couple of months. This has impacted
 subcontractors who have a full workload and may be unable to provide quotes
 for certain scopes of work. In some cases, prime contractors are paying a
 premium to obtain materials to meet schedule demands. Quotes were provided
 for review on the Asphalt Mixes resulting in an additional +\$1,550,719 to the
 Asphalt items.
- Bidders indicated that Utility subcontractor quotes are also difficult to obtain due to their current workloads. Additionally, material prices have increased recently including casing pipes that are required for the Bore & Jack operations. Quotes for the Utility work were also submitted for review. The Estimate was revised based on the provided subcontractor quotes resulting in an additional +\$1,726,950 to the Bore & Jack items.
- Incorporating the justified cost revisions noted above in the amount of +\$3,277,669 results in a REVISED ENGINEER'S ESTIMATE = \$140,944,128 making the low bidder +7.7% above the REVISED ENGINEER'S ESTIMATE.

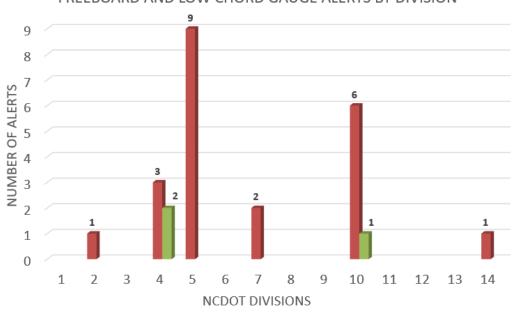


BRIDGEWATCH ALERT HISTORY from April 1, 2022 to Present



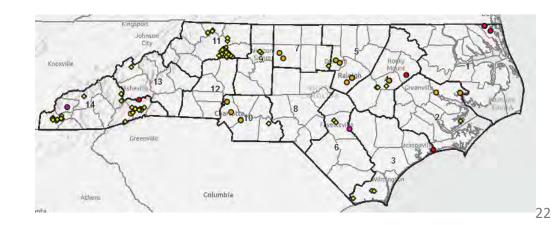

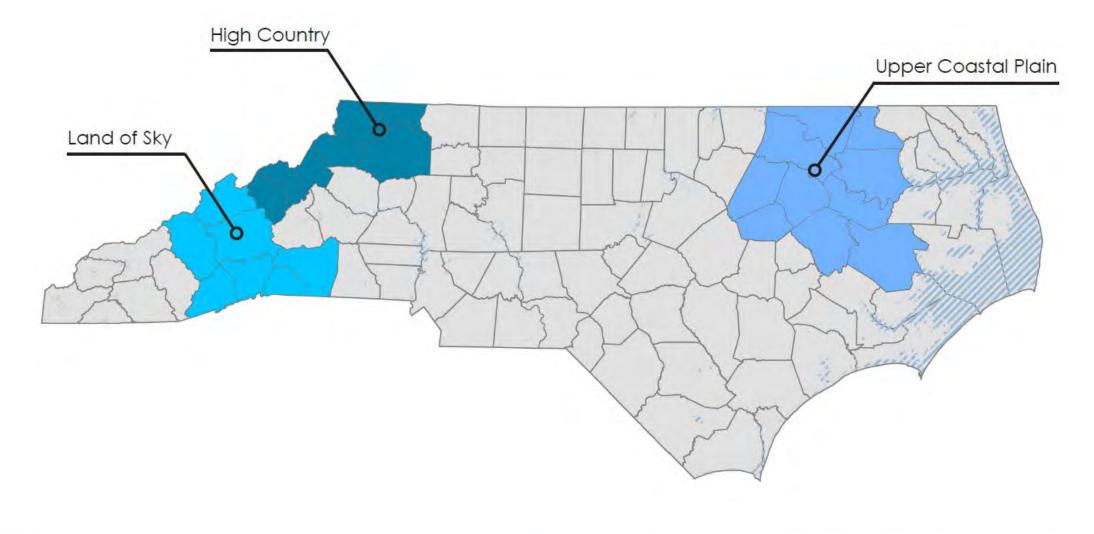

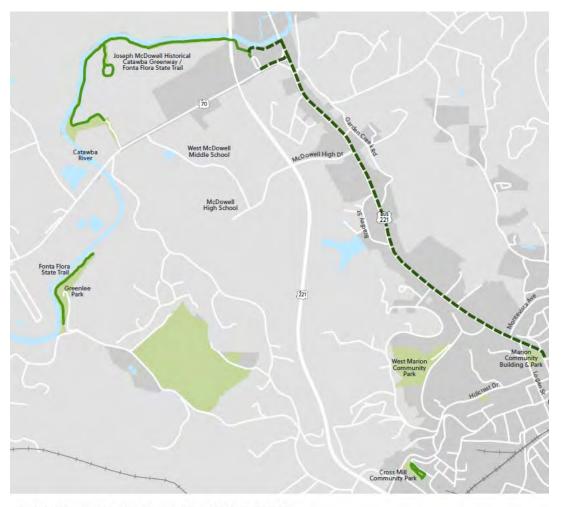

Transportation Disadvantaged Index (TDI) Tool

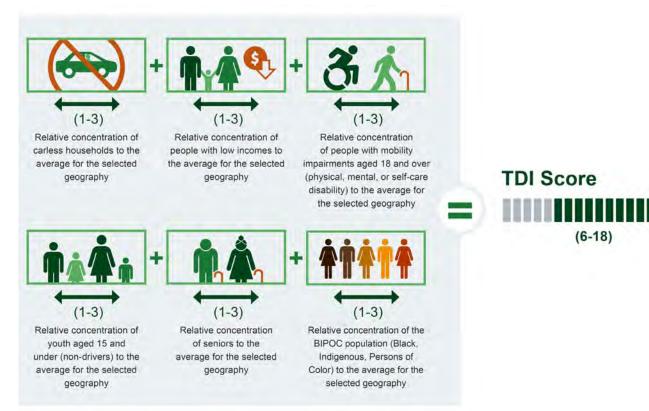
- NCDOT's strives to improve the quality of life, build healthy communities, support job creation and provide equal opportunities so all people can thrive
- Transportation disadvantage is a concept that identifies and calculates relative barriers to accessing transportation.
- Understanding and evaluating transportation disadvantage can:
 - Help achieve NCDOT's mission
 - Improve policies, planning, and project development
 - Change the culture on addressing impacts
 - Foster adoption across NCDOT's programs



Transportation Disadvantaged Index (TDI) Tool

- Six indicators to generate a Block Group score based on variance from the geographic mean.
 - Vehicle ownership
 - Income
 - Disabilities
 - Age: Youth
 - Age: Seniors
 - BIPOC

Higher score = greater level of transportation disadvantage.

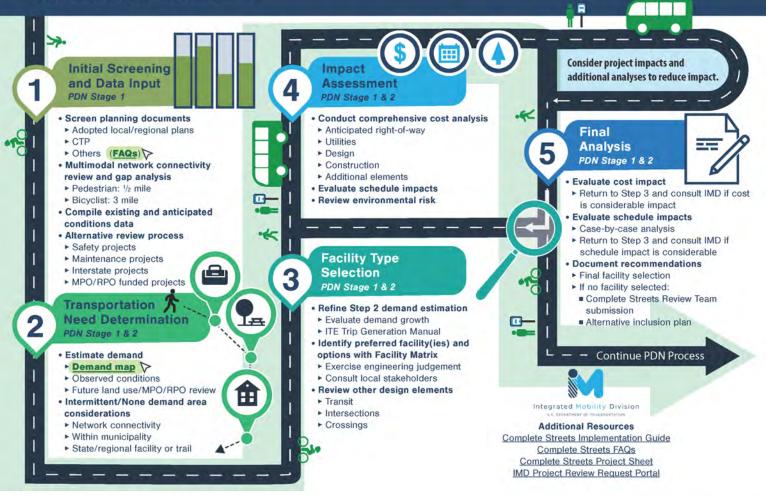

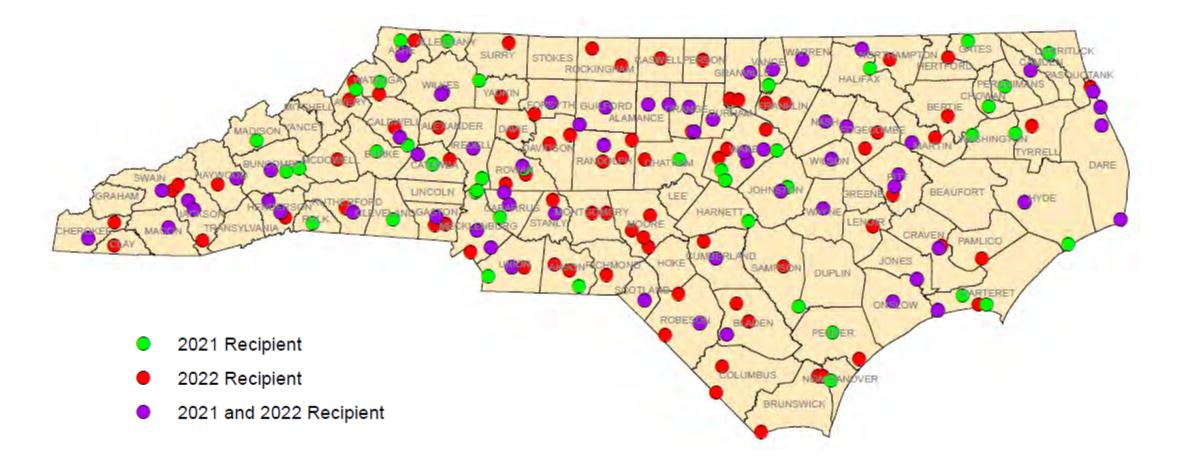

Complete Streets Implementation Update

The Complete Streets Project Evaluation Methodology process serves as guidance to aid in the evaluation of highway projects for Complete Streets elements. This guidance is intended to support Project Leads and Managers throughout the PDN stages, beginning with all five steps in PDN Stage 1 and select steps revisited in PDN Stage 2. Project Leads and Managers should supplement this process with local conversations, detailed analysis of conditions, and engineering judgement to design the appropriate facility to meet identified needs.

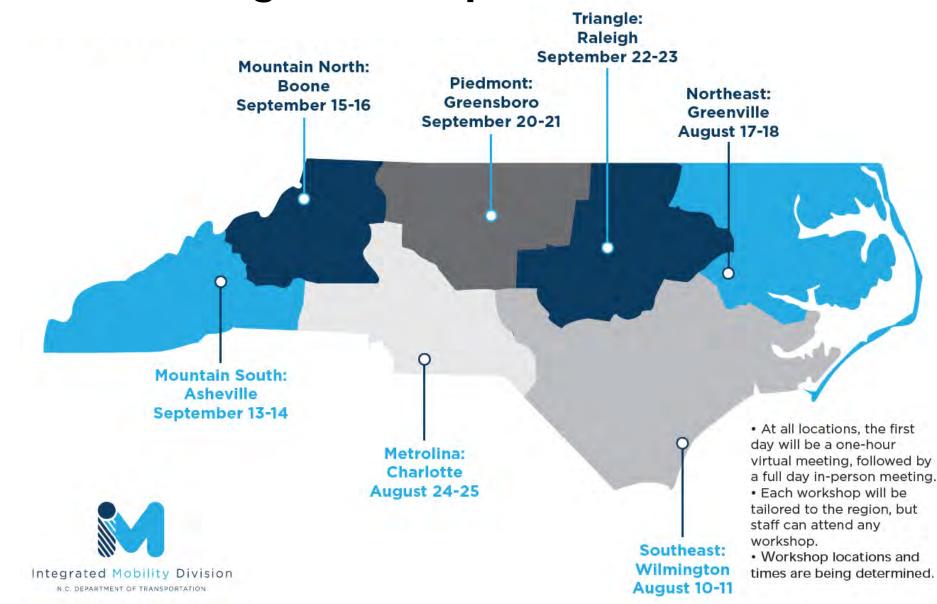

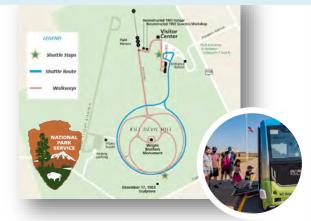

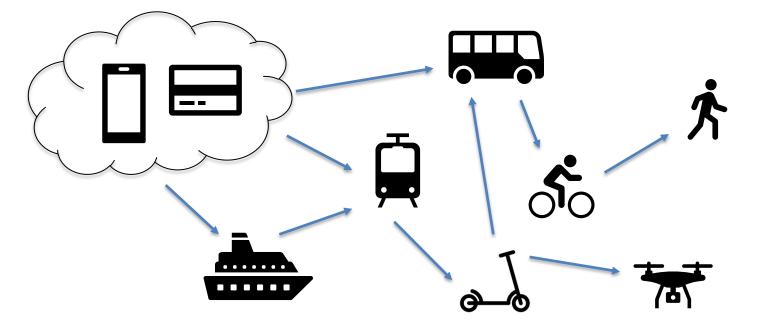
Mobility as a Service (MaaS) Levels

Microtransit

Microtransit Overview

A technology-enabled transit service that typically uses shuttles or vans to provide pooled on-demand transportation with dynamic routing.



While it uses similar technology such as a mobile app for requesting and scheduling rides, microtransit is different than a rideshare like Uber or Lyft:

- Typically subsidized
- Operates in defined service zones
- Combines trips rather than serving single trips
- Provides lower fares
- Employs professional drivers and dedicated vehicles

Service Models

Software as a Service (SaaS)

Provides the software and the transit agency provides the drivers, vehicles, and operations management.

Transportation as a Service (TaaS) / Turnkey

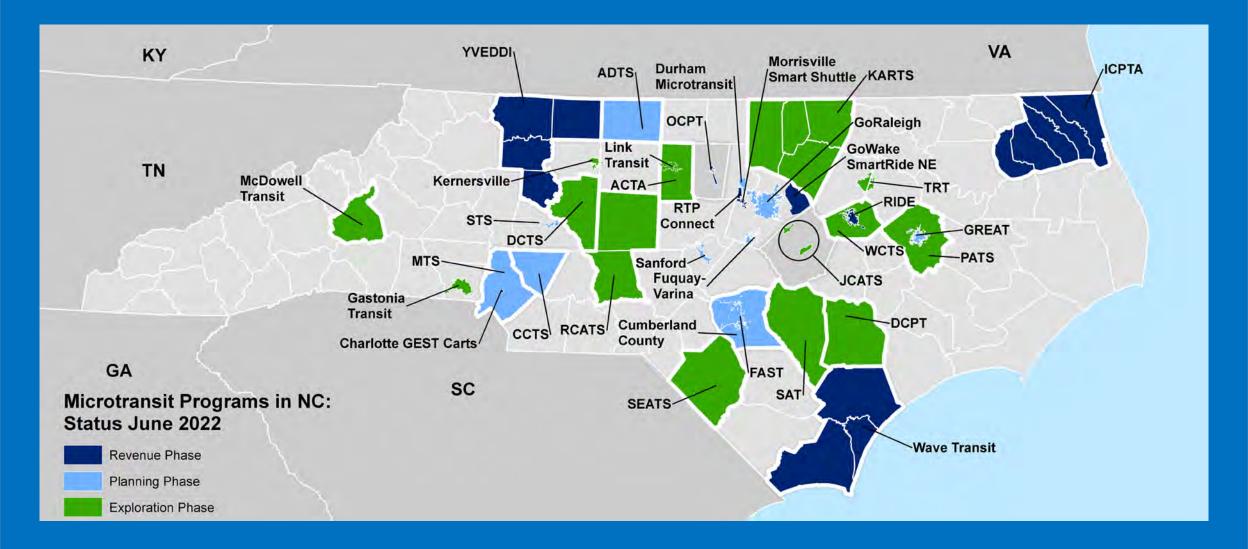
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Provides the drivers, vehicles, software, and operations management as a turnkey solution on behalf of the transit agency.

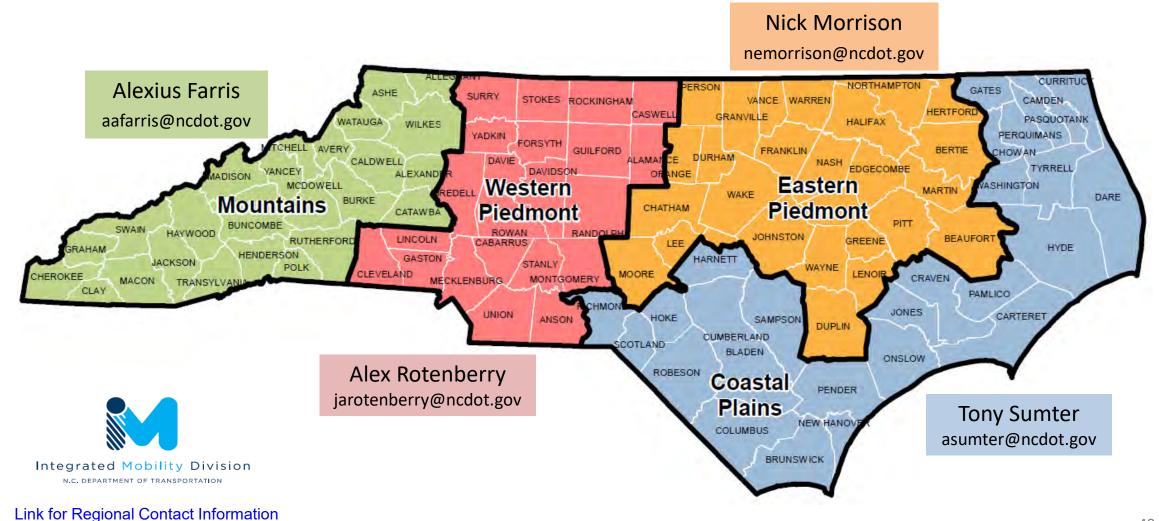
