Full Board Work Session

Wednesday, November 2, 2022

Chairman Fox welcomed members of the Board to the in-person meeting located in the Board Room and thanked members for being present to handle business brought before them. Some of the members attended the Work Session via Microsoft Teams.

Chairman Fox thanked Board Member Zimmer again for his hospitality and Chad Kimes in Division Three for their assistance in hosting a great October travel trip to the Division.

Roll Call

Chairman Fox conducted a roll call of members with the following members present in the meeting: Chairman Fox, Vice Chairman Perkins, Board Member Moran, Board Member Alcoke, Board Member Zimmer, Board Member Mitchell, Board Member Daughtry, Board Member Hunt, Board Member Mathis, Board Member Molamphy, Board Member Rosenburgh, Board Member Wells, Board Member Phillips, Board Member Clarke, Board Member McGrady, and Board Member Cody.

The following members were absent from the Work Session: Board Member Jordan, Board Member Tillman, Board Member Lathrop, and Board Member Lail.

Declaration of Quorum

Following the roll call, Chairman Fox stated the members participating constituted a quorum of the Board and he declared the meeting open.

Call to Order

Chairman Fox called the full board Work Session to order approximately at 1:00 PM on Wednesday, November 2, 2022.

Ethics Statement

Chairman Fox read the Ethics Statement advising all members of the Board that may have any conflict of interest, or appearance of conflict, to refrain from participation in that item and to file the proper paperwork with the Secretary to the Board of Transportation.

Chairman Fox read, "In accordance with the State Government Ethics Act, Executive Order No. 2 issued on January 12, 2009, and N. C. G. S. §143B-350, it is the duty of every Board member to avoid both conflicts of interest and appearances of conflict. "To comply with this statement and the State Ethics Law, I ask whether any Board member has a known conflict of interest or appearance of conflict with respect to any matters coming before the Board today."

"If so, please identify the conflict or appearance of conflict when the item appears on the agenda for consideration, refrain from any undue participation in the particular matter involved and sign before our notary the Declaration that has been provided to you for such purpose."

Office of Civil Rights Update

Chairman Fox welcomed Ebony Pittman, Deputy Secretary for Business Administration to present an update on the NCDOT Office of Civil Rights.

Ebony Pittman opened with reminding members that the Office of Civil Rights met with the Board's Workforce Committee back in March and provided then an update on the department's Disparity Study including the recommendations that resulted from the study.

Deputy Secretary Pittman advised that the Office of Civil Rights seeks to collaborate with other business units within the department to ensure that equity is a part of the Office of Civil Rights. The Office of Civil Rights is excited to head in the right direction in terms of the civil rights program at NCDOT.

Ebony Pittman welcomed Tunya Smith, Director of the Office of Civil Rights to present an overview of the Office of Civil Rights. Tunya Smith advised that the Office of Civil Rights had been working to advance to create a successful and sustainable program that aligns with state and federal equity plans.

Tunya Smith provided a brief overview of the Office of Civil Rights, its responsibilities and what they plan to accomplish. She advised that the findings of the 2019 Disparity Study released in September 2021, indicated under performance in several contracting programs. Her

presentation reviewed the progress and accomplishments of the Office of Civil Rights to date, which included assistance from the Secretary and his team along with board members; Vice Chair Perkins, Board member Jordan, and Board member Mathis. She outlined strategies and plans into the future that will continue improvements. She touched on other items that the unit is working on, such as the Equal Employment Opportunity Compliance Curriculum (EEOC) which was replaced with Make our Organization a Great Place to Work, Outreach ESB Program, apprenticeships, and other outreach programs.

Prioritization 7.0 (P7.0)

Chairman Fox welcomed Brian Wert, Senior Transportation Engineer, to present an update on Prioritization 7.0 (P7.0).

Mr. Wert presented an overview of what was shared during the October board meeting. He stated today's presentation will include a Workgroup Update and a review of highway scoring with the quantitative scoring components, historic criteria weights, and criteria details. He stated the plan for the December board meeting is to present the non-highway scoring.

Mr. Wert welcomed any board member interested in obtaining a more in-depth understanding or discussion about prioritization, specifically P7.0, to please reach out and staff will be glad to set up a time.

Chairman Fox stated that the Finance Committee received an update on a few minor edits to the Spend Plan Policy. He advised that the full Board received a copy of the policy with the minor changes at their seat. He announced that the Board will vote on the policy revisions next month. For questions regarding the Spend Plan Policy, members of the Board were directed to reach out to Stephanie King, Chief Finance Officer, and her team.

Official Board Meeting

Thursday, November 3, 2022

Chairman Fox welcomed members of the Board to the meeting located in the Board Room and thanked members for being present to handle the business brought before them.

Roll Call

Chairman Fox conducted a roll call of members with the following members present in the meeting: Chairman Fox, Vice Chairman Perkins, Board Member Moran, Board Member Alcoke, Board Member Zimmer, Board Member Mitchell, Board Member Daughtry, Board Member Hunt, Board Member Mathis, Board Member Molamphy, Board Member Rosenburgh, Board Member Wells, Board Member Phillips, Board Member Clarke, Board Member McGrady, and Board Member Cody.

The following members were absent from the official Board meeting: Board Member Tillman, Board member Lail.

Declaration of Quorum

Following the roll call, Chairman Fox stated the members participating constituted a quorum of the Board and he declared the meeting open.

Call to Order

Chairman Fox called the official Board of Transportation Meeting to order approximately at 9:02 AM on Thursday, November 3, 2022.

Ethics Statement

Chairman Fox read the Ethics Statement advising all members of the Board that may have any conflict of interest, or appearance of conflict, to refrain from participation in that item and to file the proper paperwork with the Secretary to the Board of Transportation.

Chairman Fox read, "In accordance with the State Government Ethics Act, Executive Order No. 2 issued on January 12, 2009, and N. C. G. S. §143B-350, it is the duty of every Board member

to avoid both conflicts of interest and appearances of conflict. "To comply with this statement and the State Ethics Law, I ask whether any Board member has a known conflict of interest or appearance of conflict with respect to any matters coming before the Board today."

"If so, please identify the conflict or appearance of conflict when the item appears on the agenda for consideration, refrain from any undue participation in the particular matter involved and sign before our notary the Declaration that has been provided to you for such purpose."

Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Fox mentioned the newly renovated Board Room and acknowledged the flags strategically placed at the front of the Board room. Chairman Fox mentioned that he and Secretary Boyette would like to begin the official Board meeting by opening with the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman Fox invited Secretary Boyette to lead the members of the Board and the staff in starting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval - October 4-5, 2022, Meeting Minutes

Chairman Fox stated the meeting minutes from October 4-5, 2022, were distributed for review prior to the meeting. Chairman Fox stated if there are no additions or corrections, he would accept a motion to approve the October 4-5, 2022, meeting minutes of the Board of Transportation. A motion was made by Board Member Clarke and a second by Board Member Cody. The minutes were approved unanimously by members of the Board.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

Road, Bridge, and Ferry Naming Honorary Designations

Chairman Fox invited Board Member Hunt to present the resolution for the Oscar N. Harris Bridge naming. Board Member Hunt read the resolution for the Oscar N. Harris Bridge located in Division Six. The reading was accepted as a motion by Board Member Hunt and a second by Board Member Cody. The motion passed unanimously by the members of the Board.

Chairman Fox welcomed the family forward. Board Member Daughtry in favor of Oscar N. Harris shared with members his experience knowing Mr. Harris, his kind nature, and what a wonderful and exemplary person he was throughout his life. One of Oscar N. Harris' sons spoke on behalf of his mother, Sheila Harris-Maness, who could not be present at the full Board

meeting. He read a statement from his mother and thanked the members of the Board for this honor. He introduced the family present.

Chairman Fox read the resolution for UNC 2022 Women's Lacrosse National Championship. The reading of the resolution was accepted as the motion. The resolution was unanimously approved by the Board upon a motion made by Chairman Fox and a second by Board Member Hunt.

Chairman Fox welcomed a number of the women athletes on the national championship team as well as Rick Steinbacher, senior associated athletic director, for UNC – Chapel Hill. Members of the team provided comments to the board as did Mr. Steinbacher. Highlights of the win were shared with the board.

Secretary's Remarks

Chairman Fox welcomed Secretary Boyette to provide his remarks to the Board.

Secretary Boyette welcomed all Board Members and staff attending in-person and virtually to the Thursday, November 3, 2022, Board Meeting.

The NC Quick Pass call center ribbon cutting was held on October 10, 2022, at the DMV Headquarters in Rocky Mount. Rocky Mount is one of the two locations for call centers within the state.

The Rail Division and Aberdeen Carolina and Western Railway joined other state and local leaders to celebrate the grand opening of the Midland Logistics Park in Cabarrus County on October 11, 2022. This includes three additional properties for prospective rail customers and is a 70-acre development anchored by the railway's Midland Transload Yard.

Walk and Roll to School Day event took place in Durham October 12, 2022, at Eastway Elementary School. This allows parents, children, and teachers to walk or bike to school to show support for safer, more accessible streets, healthier habits, and less traffic congestion.

Secretary Boyette had the pleasure to participate in the Minority Enterprise Development Week Celebration located at the McKimmon Center on October 18, 2022. This event provided the opportunity to share ways in supporting minority and women-owned businesses and opened discussion for contracting opportunities and where firms can begin with the process.

Secretary Boyette was part of a panel session on broadband at AASHTO's annual conference in Orlando, Florida on October 22, 2022. This event allowed an overview of grants that the state has received in recent years to help with the deployment of broadband and closed with a panel discussion on programs and funding for expanding high-speed internet.

Secretary Boyette mentioned that the Governor's Highway Safety Program partnered with Law Enforcement across the state for the Halloween *Booze It and Lose It Campaign* that occurred during October 24, 2022, through October 31, 2022. The Governor's Highway Safety Program also organized the Safety City exhibit that was held along with state and local partners throughout the North Carolina State Fair.

NCDOT staff joined Waxhaw, Union County, and CSX officials for a groundbreaking event for a rail safety improvement project. Secretary Boyette mentioned that this included construction of 2,500 feet of additional railroad track to meet demands of more freight trains along the CSX corridor. This new track will allow for freight trains to pass one another more efficiently. This project also includes construction of a new bridge over the railroad tracks to improve safety and efficiency.

Secretary Boyette mentioned NCDOT also participated in the grade crossing safety and railroad trespassing prevention workshop held at N.C. State University.

Secretary Boyette advised that there was an all-time high hit for ridership for the passenger rail service and more individuals rode the NCDOT intercity passenger rail service in September than any other month previously during the 32-year history by NC By Train Service.

Secretary Boyette mentioned that Governor Cooper issued a new executive order that focuses on supporting a market-driven transition to zero-emission vans, buses, and trucks.

Secretary Boyette advised that the last of the STIP drop-in held at the division office and the public comment period on the draft STIP concluded the last week of October. He mentioned that NCDOT staff will continue to work with planning organizations across the state to make final tweaks and to finalize the draft STIP for 2024-2033. Secretary Boyette advised that the final draft is scheduled to be presented to members of the Board for consideration and adoption Spring 2023.

NCDOT Division of Aviation announced that they are now accepting entries for the 2023 North Carolina Aviation Art Contest. This year's theme is "Air Sports and the Environment". The

deadline for North Carolina students to submit is January 17, 2023. More information is located at ncdot.gov by searching "art".

Secretary Boyette advised that firms across the state joined NCDOT staff to learn more about opportunities to work on NCDOT jobs and that another round of disadvantaged business enterprise outreach meetings were held on October 22, 2022. These meetings have been held quarterly since the summer of 2021 and approximately 700 individuals from hundreds of firms have participated. Secretary Boyette stated that it is the goal to assist the small businesses to grow so they can continue to help the building and maintaining of the state's transportation system.

Secretary Boyette advised that NCDOT Communications and Office of Civil Rights teams compiled a video about On-the-Job training program that displayed the story of one of NCDOT employees that is very thankful for her position. Secretary Boyette added that one of the Highway Construction Trade Academies assisted her in the landing of a new career. For more information about the training program, please visit ncdot.gov and search "On the Job Training."

Secretary Boyette proceeded to provide NCDOT personnel updates with members of the Board. Brian Mayhew was named as the new State Traffic Engineer. Mayhew has been with NCDOT for the past twenty-seven years and has served in multiple roles in the Transportation Mobility and Safety Division in the Signing and Delineation, Congestion, Management, and Traffic Safety units. Mayhew has served for the past six years as the State Traffic Safety Engineer.

Keith Eason is the new division engineer for Division Four. Eason has been employed with NCDOT for more than twenty-eight years and most recently as the Division Three Maintenance Engineer.

Secretary Boyette recognized Tom Walls, NCDOT drone program training specialist, who was awarded the Outstanding Government Service Award during the Governor's Awards for Excellence. Secretary Boyette stated that this is the highest honor a state employee can receive for notable service to the state and its individuals. Tom Walls is credited with pioneering Unmanned Aircraft Systems program.

Secretary Boyette recognized three of NCDOT employees who went above and beyond their typical duties that assisted in saving the lives of others. Division Six Traffic Signal Technician Supervisor, Heath Pittman, noticed a man face down on the ground while traveling near a walking trail on July 14, 2022. Heath Pittman stopped and called 911, and initiated chest

compressions until first responders arrived at the scene. It was noted that Doctor's confirmed that Heath Pittman's actions were what saved the individual's life. Secretary Boyette advised that Heath Pittman has been employed with NCDOT for seventeen years and presented him with the Extra Mile Award.

Division Roadside Environmental employees JP Coleman and Jeremy Shoffner within Division Nine noticed an individual sitting on their front porch that appeared to be in some sort of medical distress while traveling through Kernersville on September 9, 2022. JP Coleman and Jeremy Shoffner stopped to check on the individual and also administered CPR until first responders could arrive on scene. The local town honored JP Coleman and Jeremy Shoffner in late September for assisting in saving the gentleman's life. Secretary Boyette presented JP Coleman and Jeremy Shoffner with the Secretary's Award for their efforts.

Secretary Boyette advised that the last award was a first and it was elected by a group of peers for Division Engineer for "Best Male Lead" at the NCDOT Documentary Award. Secretary Boyette presented Jeff Cabiness with the award.

Secretary Boyette then welcomed Robin Barfield, Director of Safety and Risk Management, forward to present the Roadeo Winners. Robin Barfield announced that it was an honor to present the 2022 Equipment Roadeo update. The statewide event was held on Tuesday, June 21, 2022, at the State Fairgrounds. This event allows employees an opportunity for showcase their skills, broaden teamwork, fellowship, and share their expertise among the audience and each other. The overall winner for the State Championship was awarded to Division Ten. The group also represented the state well in the regional competition in Batton Rouge, Louisiana on September 29, 2022. Robin Barfield introduced the NCDOT 2022 regional team in the backhoe competition, Cliff Jenkins from Division Four from Wilson County Maintenance, and Nakoma Emanuel with Forsyth County Maintenance in Division Nine. For the crane competition, Robin Barfield announced Chris Baldwin, from Alamance Bridge in Division Seven and Larry Flowers from Cherokee County maintenance in Division 14. For the double-axle competition, Robin Barfield announced Matt Stark from Onslow County Maintenance in Division Three and Zachary Moore with Rowan County Maintenance in Division Nine. Robin Barfield announced Travis Price with Wentworth Maintenance in Division Seven and Kevin Deal with Statesville Maintenance in Division Twelve for the low boy competition. Robin Barfield announced Will Brown with Wentworth Maintenance in Division Seven and Justin Hearn of Davidson Maintenance in Division Nine for the motor grader competition. Issacs Etheridge of Wilson Maintenance in Division Four and Brian Schmidt of Person Maintenance in Division Five were

announced in the single-axle competition. Mark Hayes of Moore County Roadside Environmental in Division Eight and Rocky Milsaps of Alexander County Taylorsville Maintenance in Division Twelve were announced the tractor mower competition.

- August 10, 2022, meeting minutes were approved as distributed with a motion by Committee Member Cody, seconded by Committee Member Molamphy.
- NCDOT Director, Strategic Initiatives and Program Support, Burt Tasaico, introduced the topic of Public Perception of Transportation Fees in North Carolina.
- Daniel Findley, Ph.D. of the NCSU Institute for Transportation Research and Education was introduced to the Committee by Mr. Burt Tasaico. Dr. Findley shared a presentation titled "Public Perception of Transportation Fees in North Carolina."
- Executive Director J.J. Eden introduced the topic of Intelligent Transportation Solutions.
- A representative of Verizon Business Group, Athreya Sreenivasan, was introduced to share a presentation titled "Verizon Intelligent Transportation Solutions."
- The meeting concluded with a brief open discussion of the presentation by all attending Committee Members.
- The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 PM with a motion by Committee Member Cody, seconded by Committee Member McGrady.

Workforce Committee

Chairman Grady Hunt called the November 2, 2022, Workforce Development Committee meeting to order, conducted a roll call of members present, and declared a quorum was present. Chair Hunt read the non-conflict/ethics statement and asked if there were any known conflicts of interest. The August 10, 2022, minutes were unanimous approved by the Workforce Development Committee.

Presenter: Robin Barfield, Director, Safety & Risk Management – Safety Initiatives & Review

- Safety and Risk Management (SRM): Focus on employee safety; Reduce unsafe conditions; Defensive driving and CDL program; Bolster Organizational Risk Management; Examine and implement innovative safe technologies; and Lead NCDOT's OSHA compliance auditing programs.
- Defensive Driving Training: 1,800 plus employees trained since program launched in June 2020 virtually and 571 employees trained since June 2021.

- Excavation Safety Training: Trained employees to anticipate, recognize and evaluate hazards; Implement and manage controls; Authority and responsibility for excavation safety.
- Red Cross First Aid, CPR and AED Training: 175 employees trained by SRM in the last year.
- Driving Simulator Training: 30 plus snowplow operators per day; 300 to 400 drivers will be trained in the next few months.
- New CDL Program Entry Level Driver Training (ELDT) Addition: Extend Transportation Worker Class Specifications to 365 days to follow Federal mandate (March 2022); NCDOT required to set up Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA)-approved certification program; Training must be provided and recorded on FMCSA's Training Provider Registry; and DMV required to verify training was completed. JJ Keller pilot model rolled out with 100% online modules.
- Safety Helmets Next Generation Head Protection: SRM researched the safety helmet market. The KASK Zenith X (EN 12492) has 360-degree head protection. It was piloted across several Divisions with positive feedback and saved an employee from serious injury involving a guardrail. Chief's office authorized roll-out to high-risk units such as bridge, roadside, and maintenance.
- Industrial Hygiene: Updated 5 plus Safety Policy and Procedure Programs;
 Conducted audits across NCDOT for Industrial Hygiene Programs;
 Evaluated equipment depots and employee exposure to noise; Continue to evaluate indoor air quality across NCDOT; and Asbestos evaluations.
- Ferry Division Safety Audit: Evaluated All NCDOT ferry terminals, ferry shipyard, and paint spray booth; Created a safety work plan to avoid potential employee exposure to hazards.
- HR Director Amanda Olive gave a brief update on the apprenticeship pilot program, retention and hiring bonuses, and labor market increases for Ferry and DMV.

Highway Committee

The Highways Committee heard two presentations on November 2, 2022.

Contractual Adjustments Overview

The first presentation, *Contractual Adjustments Overview*, was provided by Mr. Boyd Tharrington, Director of Field Support. Mr. Tharrington began with an overview of DOT contracts. For example, DOT contracts outline the work to be performed, detail how compensation will be provided, and establish contract times and key dates.

After contract award, however, many factors may prompt the need to change or adjust contract terms.

Examples include

- Problematic field conditions
- Specification changes
- Material availability
- Critical path delays
- Third party coordination
- Value engineering proposals

There are two main types of contractual adjustments: (1) Supplemental Agreements and (2) Claims. Supplemental agreements are written agreements between contractor(s) and NCDOT that formally amend the contract. *Claims* are requests for additional compensation or additional contact time.

There are four (most common) bases for supplemental agreements:

- Extra Work
- Altered Work
- Overruns and Underruns
- Value Engineering

Processes for how the Department handles supplemental agreements and claims were explained.

- The contractor or NCDOT identifies an issue not covered in the contact or recognizes changes
- The contractor notifies NCDOT and requests additional compensation for the work
- If NCDOT agrees, the price and time is negotiated, and the supplemental agreement is executed
- If NCDOT does not agree, the contractor can notify NCDOT of their intent to file a claim
- Work is performed
- If work is in dispute, the contractor files a claim

About claims:

- NCDOT's claims processes are essential to keep projects moving forward
- Protects the industry and NCDOT by providing a mechanism to resolve disputes
- Claims can be resolved during active construction or after project completion
- NCDOT has developed closeout conference procedures to resolve issues in formal discussion

Discussion followed.

Preparing for Connected and Autonomous Vehicles

The second presentation, *Preparing for Connected and Autonomous Vehicles*, was provided by Mr. Kevin Lacy, Director of Strategic Planning and Programming.

Mr. Lacy provided an overview of the autonomous and connected vehicle industry. For example, today's market does not offer Level 5 fully automated vehicles. The highest-level AV currently available is Level 2.

- Connected vehicles (CV)
- Automated vehicles (AV)
- Subscription / shared vehicles
- Electric vehicles (EV)

In North Carolina, automated vehicles may be in widespread use sooner than expected.

- Driverless testing is expanding more companies in more places
- California has eight different companies approved to do Driverless Testing on their roadways
- More and more automated delivery and personal delivery devices
- People are paying for driverless rides in some cities
- Driverless shuttles such as the one at the Wright Brothers National Park
- Self-driving trucks are operating in industrial mining sites
- Self-driving trucks are becoming more prevalent

Factors driving quick adoption:

- Improved safety
- Cost savings of subscriptions or shared vehicles
- Benefits to specific groups: the elderly and disabled individuals
- Manufacturers are planning for the transition

Potential challenges:

- Level 5 AVs need more technology and research
- Federal and state legislation
- NHTSA exemption process
- Public skepticism
- Liability and insurance concerns

Big picture actions needed:

Federal legislation and regulations

- Data sharing concerns
- Road and bridge design needs
- Additional DOT funding to maintain CV/AV infrastructure
- Non-system road and private driveway concerns
- Local government planning, parking, land use, and curb management issues
- Public Education
- Impacts to the transportation industry and workers (truck drivers)
- Train people for new businesses
- More research and more implementation

Multi-Modal (MM) Committee

Chair Lisa Mathis called the November 2, 2022, Multi-Modal Committee meeting to order. The September 7, 2022, meeting minutes were distributed was made by Board Member Leo Daughtry and seconded by Board Member Valerie Jordan.

Public Transportation, Rail, and Aviation funding items were presented by Ryan Brumfield, IMD Director, Jason Orthner, Rail Director, and Bobby Walston, Aviation Director. The items were recommended for approval by the Multi-Modal Committee. Board member Landon Zimmer made a motion for approval. The motion was seconded by Board member Chuck McGrady and approved unanimously by the Committee

Multi-Modal Updates – Julie White, Deputy Secretary for Multi-Modal Transportation

- FRA and NCDOT jointly hosted a Grade Crossing Safety and Railroad Trespass Prevention Workshop for three days this week. Sec. Boyette kicked it off which we appreciated as trespassing along railroad rights of way is the leading cause of rail related deaths in the U.S. while railroad crossing incidents are the second leading cause.
- The General Assembly provided the Ferry system funding to address Labor Market challenges which has been implemented and should help address our vacancy challenges.
- The agency sponsored and participated in the BikeWalkNC Summit in Greenville last week where our team were speakers and served as resources for those in attendance.
- Presentation Ryan Brumfield, IMD Director, NCDOT'S Integrated Mobility Division and Jason Orthner, Rail Director, NCDOT Rail Division Update
 - The Integrated Mobility Division Director and Rail Division Director presented updates about the S-Line Rail Corridor, which focuses on connecting urban communities and rural communities.

Chairman Fox asked if there were any additional items for discussion. He stated hearing none he would accept a motion to adjourn the meeting. A motion was made by Daughtry and seconded by Board Member Moran. Chairman Fox stated the motion passed unanimously.

Expenses



- First quarter expenses are lower than forecast by \$162.3M or 8.1% in September.
- Largest variances remain in Construction (\$82.4) and Maintenance (\$75.9) programs due to material and labor issues. Over 77% of September cost were to external parties.
- Mobility & Modernization, Contract Resurfacing, and Bridge Program showing the largest difference in Maintenance.
- Areas are expended at higher levels than the previous year.



Biennial Budget Formulation



- Biennial budget process started agency submittals due to OSBM by Nov. 23rd (fall of even numbered years).
- Base budget adjustments are taking place for allowable changes to include debt service, existing lease increases, recurring salary and benefit adjustments, Intergovernmental transfers etc.
- Expansion budget requests for new initiatives and needs is due to our budget office by Nov. 15th.



Federal Update



- Continuing Appropriations Act was passed for continued operations thru Dec. 16th for a 77-day period.
- Per FHWA Notice N4520.277 (10/20/22), NC received \$252.7m in Obligational Authority.
- Currently developing strategies to position NC for August Redistribution next year based on the potential of high-level spending of additional billing authority.



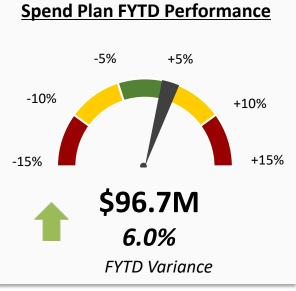

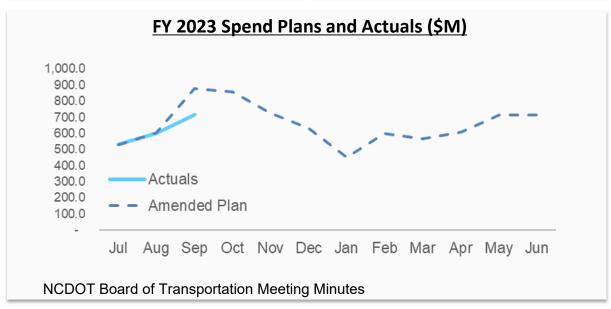

Detailed Report

Financial Analysis

- **HF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$1,096.3 million in September 2021 to \$1,422.5 million in September 2022. An increase of \$326.1M million or 29.7%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures during SFY 2022 due to labor and material shortages.
- **HF Revenues & Expenses** Revenues decreased from \$244.0 million in September 2021 to \$230.4 million in September 2022. A decrease of \$13.7 million or -5.6%. This decrease was due to a \$27.9 million decrease in motor fuel tax revenues, a \$1.2 million decrease in license & fee revenues, slightly offset by a \$9.3 million increase in highway use tax revenues in September 2022 compared to September 2021. Expenses (current accounts) increased by \$30.3 million, or 405.2% in September 2022 compared to September 2021.
- **HF YTD** September 2022 YTD revenues exceeded September 2021 YTD revenues by \$21.2 million, and September 2022 YTD expenses (current accounts) were less than September 2021 YTD by \$24.4 million.
- **HTF Cash** Cash balance increased from \$996.0 million in September 2021 to \$1,015.7 million in September 2022. An increase of \$19.7 million or 2.0%. This increase in cash was primarily due to decreased expenditures during SFY 2022 due to labor and material shortages.
- HTF Revenues & Expenses Revenues increased from \$144.0 million in September 2021 to \$167.6 million in September 2022. An increase of \$23.6 million or 16.4%. This increase was due to a \$20.2 million increase in motor fuel tax revenue, a \$3.1 million increase in highway use tax revenues, slightly offset by a \$0.5 million decrease in fees revenue in September 2022 compared to September 2021. Expenses (current accounts) increased by \$11.9 million or 480.0% in September 2022 compared to September 2021.
- HTF YTD September 2022 YTD revenues exceeded September 2021 YTD revenues by \$46.4 million, and September 2022 YTD expenses (current accounts) exceeded September 2021 YTD expenses (current accounts) by \$0.8 million.

Key monthly action:

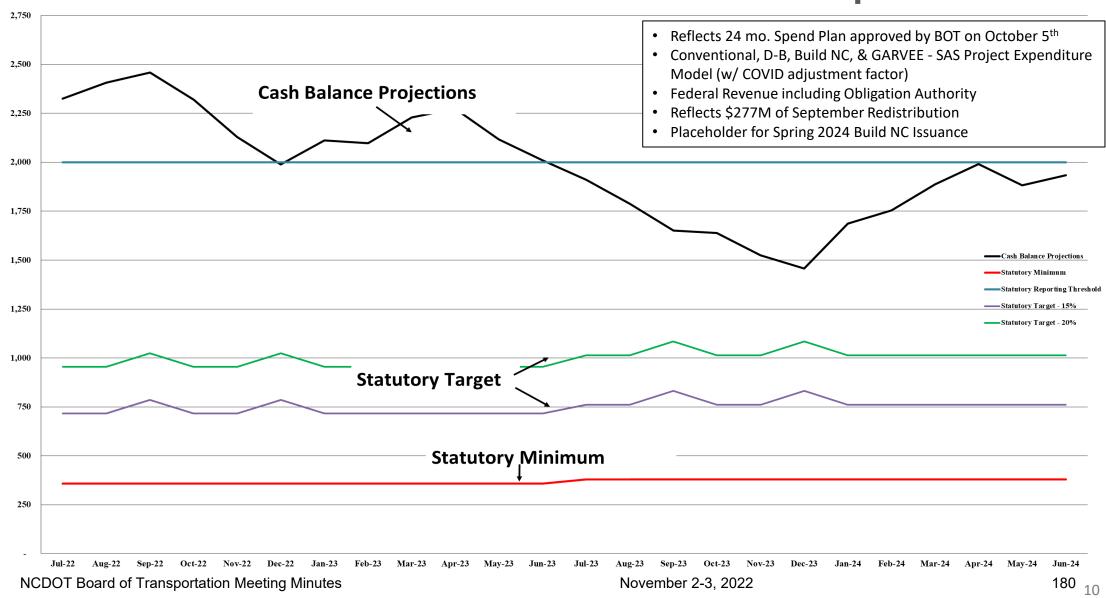
On September 28, DOT repaid \$30M of the Highway Trust Fund loan to the Highway Fund. This fully repaid the loan made on January 4, 2019 for \$20M and partially repaid the loan made on January 9, 2019 for \$80M. The outstanding balance of the loans after this payment will be \$85,300,000.

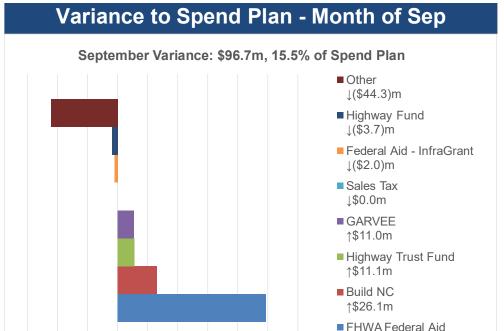

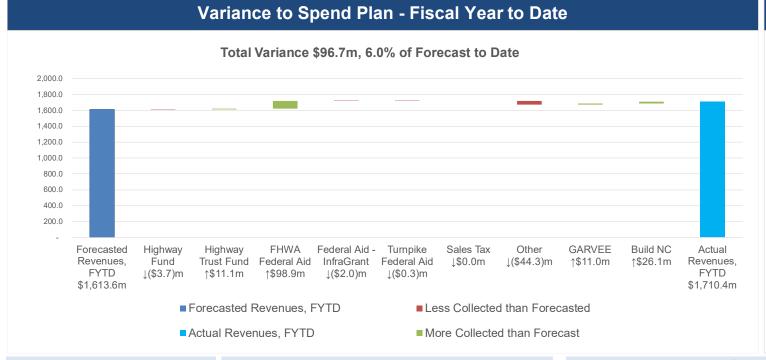

Revenue Summary and Variances – Fiscal Year to Date (\$M)



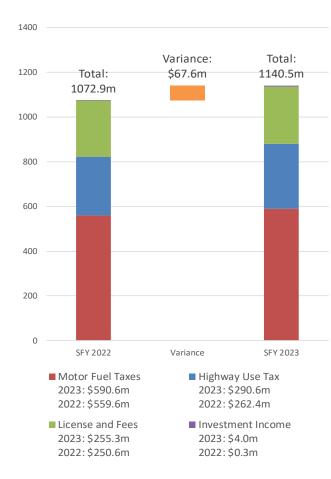

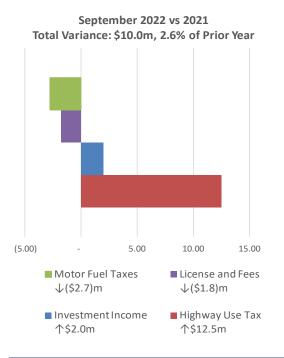
Highway Fund & Trust Fund Details September 2022(\$M)

Fiscal Year Totals



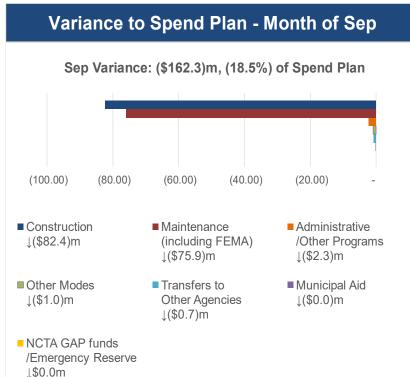

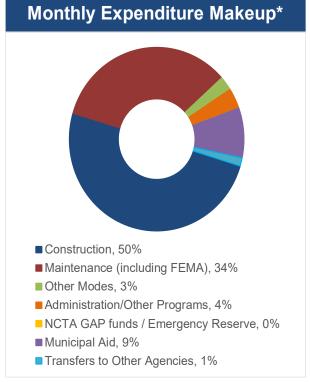

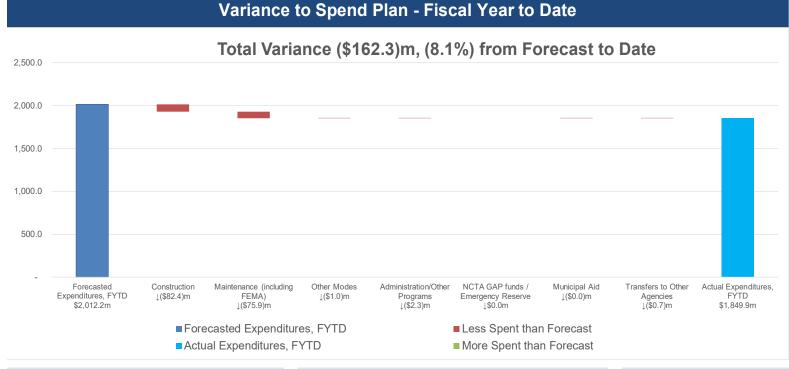

Overall Expenditure Summary and Variances – Fiscal YTD (\$M)



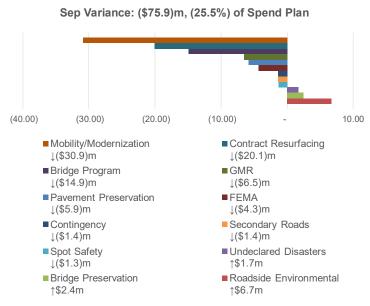

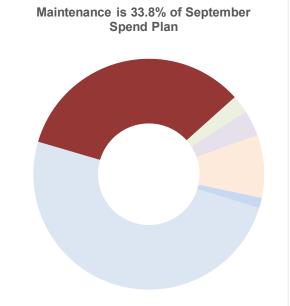

Variance to Spend Plan - Month of Sep



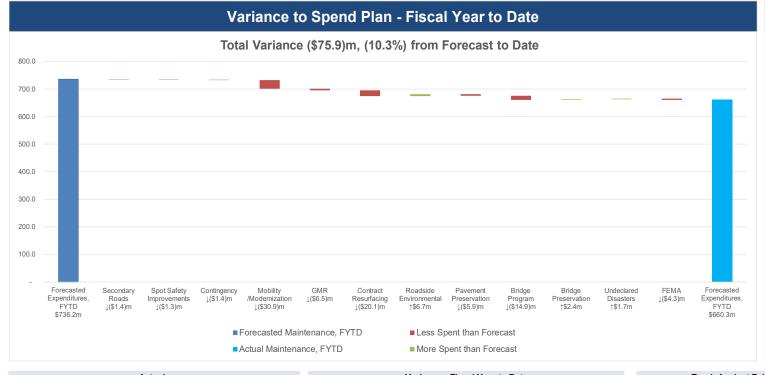

Maintenance Expenditure Summary and Variances – FYTD (\$M)

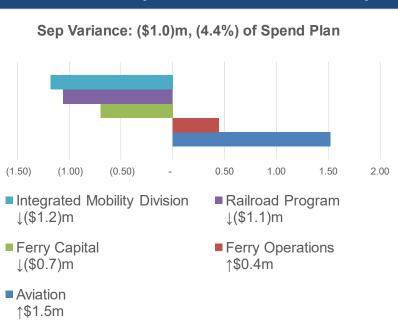

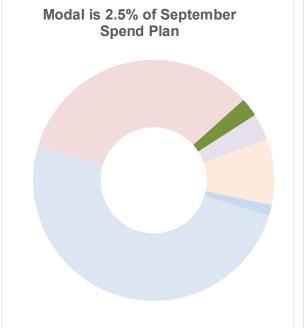

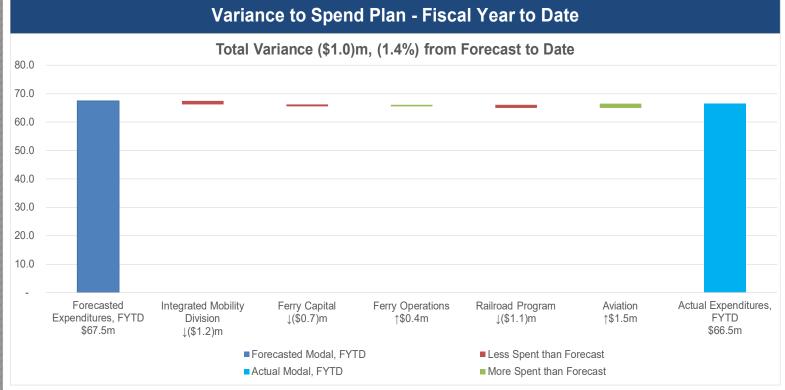

Modal Expenditure Summary and Variances – FYTD (\$M)

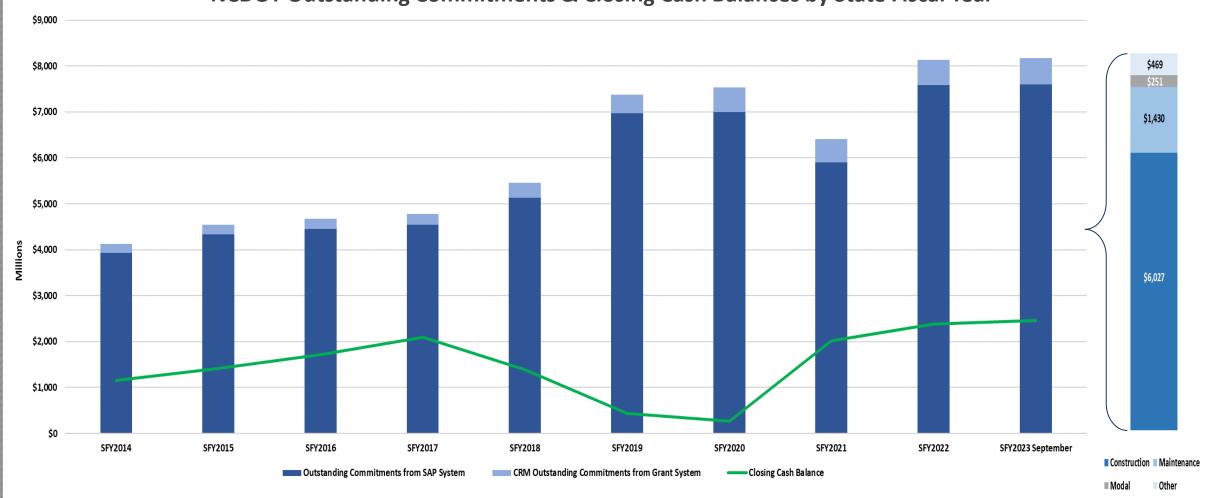

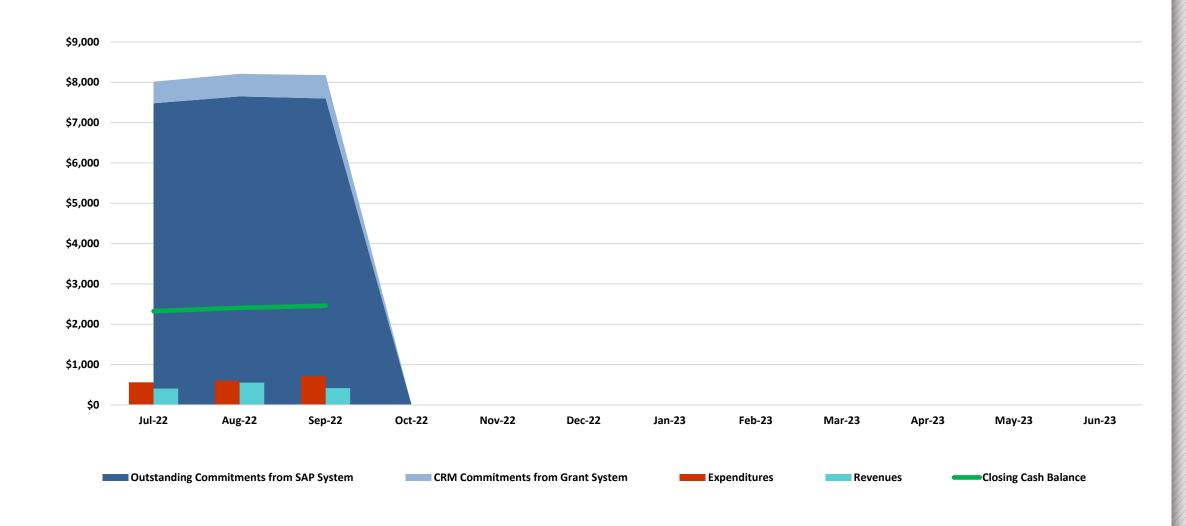

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NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Cash Balances by Month

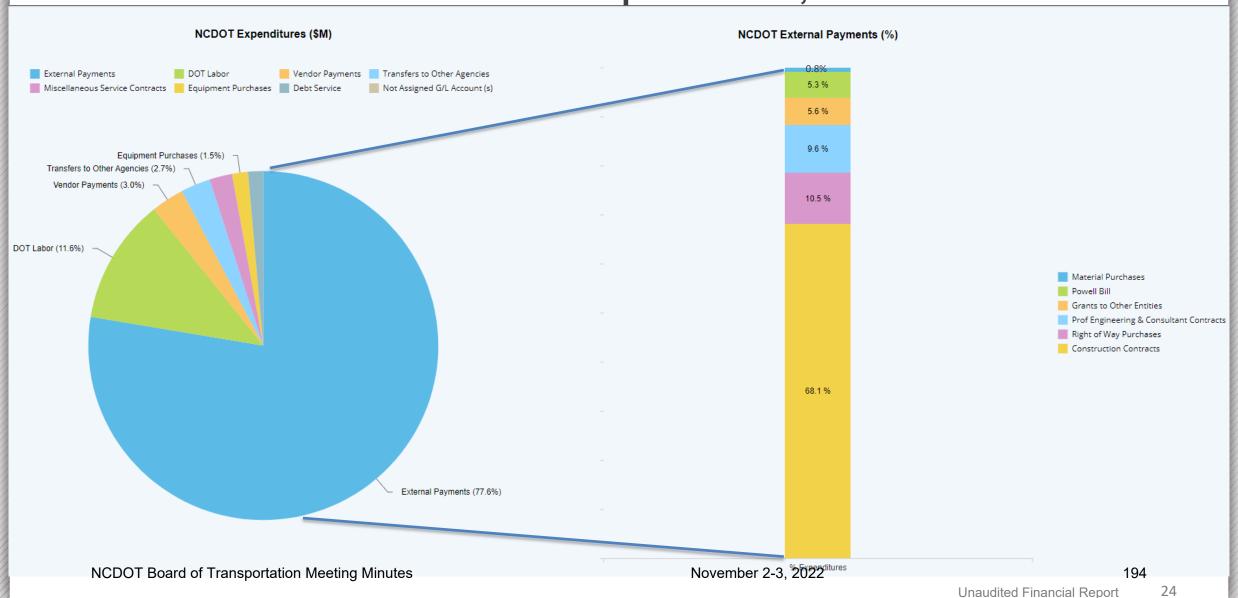

September 2022 – Reporting Required

- N.C.G.S 143C-6-11(m) requires DOT to report each month when the department's combined average daily cash balance for the month is outside of the statutory target range.
- For September 2022, the **combined average daily cash balance** of the Highway Fund and the Highway Trust Fund was \$2.35 billion.
- The cash target amounts representing 15% and 20% of the total appropriations for the current fiscal year are \$786 million and \$1,024 million, respectively.
- The closing cash balance for September was \$2.46 billion which is above the target range and above the minimum cash balance requirement of \$358 million under N.C.G.S. 143C-6-11.

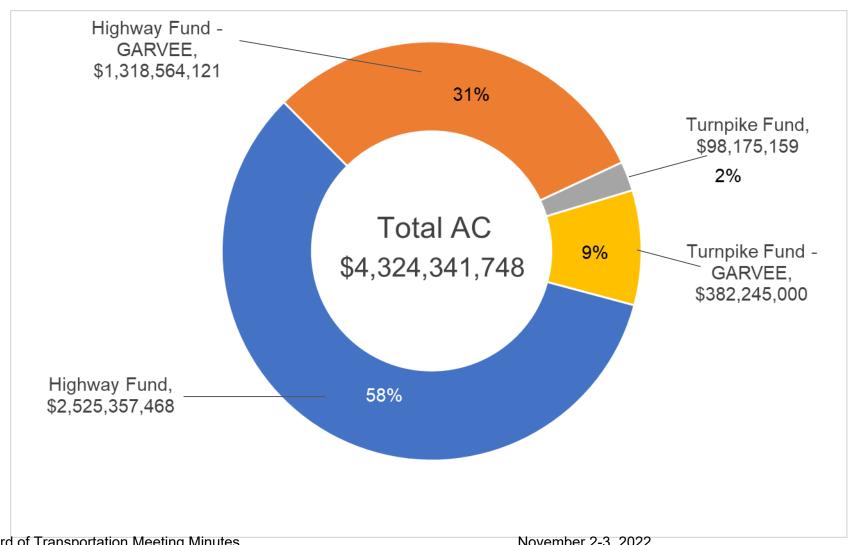

Spend Plan Policy Proposed Changes

• Definition Changes:

"Department" - shall mean the North Carolina Department of Transportation

"BOT" – shall mean The Board of Transportation with members as defined in G.S. §143B-350 of the North Carolina General Statutes. shall mean Board of Transportation

"Department" – shall mean the North Carolina Department of Transportation.

"Finance" – shall mean the Finance Committee of the BOT.BOT

"FHWA" - shall mean the Federal Highway Administration.

"FPC" – shall mean the Financial Planning Committee.

"NCDOT" - shall mean the North Carolina Department of Transportation.

"OSBM" – shall mean the Office of State Budget & Management

"FHWA" - shall mean Federal Highway Administration

Spend Plan Policy Proposed Changes

• Formatting Changes:

BOT oversight and Spend Plan approval include the following:

Review and act on each Spend Plan developed by NCDOT. Ensure the approved Spend Plan is fiscally responsible while accomplishing transportation goals across the State.

Either approve the Spend Plan or report any objections with specificity and reasons in writing to the FPC for action and then to the General Assembly and Fiscal Research.

Ensure NCDOT is operating within the approved Spend Plan. Any modification to the Spend Plan or expenditures outside the Spend Plan must be approved.

The <u>Chief Financial Officer (CFO)</u> and staff will update the FPC members on the status of the plan and areas of concern will be discussed, along with corrective actions identified. High alert items will be analyzed to include legislative impacts, revenue collections vs estimates, construction forecast updates, disaster cost, litigation, among others.

Spend Plan Policy Proposed Changes

• Language Changes: The word "shared" replaced "presented".

Financial Management will work with business units to develop such plan based on their specific areas. The Draft Spend Plan will be assembled and shared to the FPC for detail review. The FPC will have representation from FHWA and OSBM. After consensus is obtained it will be submitted for required approvals.

Language Changes: The word "may" replaced "will".

Oversight and Modifications

The Secretary of Transportation or designee if absent, may conduct monthly FPC meetings in which the Spend Plan will be reviewed comparing expenses against the target. FPC will investigate areas of concern immediately with the specific area and senior leadership.

Advance Construction (AC)

Definition:

• An authorization technique that allows FHWA to authorize a project without obligating federal funds. FHWA approves a project as being eligible for federal funding, but does not commit to funding the project.

Advantage:

• Maintains eligibility for future reimbursement without a commitment of current Budget Authority (BA) and Obligation Authority (OA)

Effective use of AC requires:

- Availability of state funds to pay project bills until reimbursement
- A stable federal program

Traditional Funding vs. Advance Construction

Traditional Funding

Uses full Obligation Authority (OA) and Budget Authority (BA) when authorizing funds

For example, \$10M Federal Construction Authorization/Obligation

- \$8M (80%) in Federal Funds obligated immediately in year 1
- \$2M (20%) remaining covered with State Match

Advance Construction

Obligates funding over several years rather than at the beginning of a project

For example, \$10M Federal Construction Authorization/Obligation

- \$8M (80%) in Federal Funds authorized but not fully obligated until expenditures occur
 - Convert and Obligate \$2M in year 2
 - Convert and Obligate \$4M in year 3
 - Convert and Obligate \$2M in year 4
- \$2M (20%) remaining covered with State Match

Advance Construction Workgroup

Session Law 2020 -91 required DOT to submit a report to the General Assembly about the use of AC at NCDOT

Workgroup was formed September 2020 to investigate AC usage and make any needed recommendations

- Implemented AC Policy including oversight March 2021
- At end of each Federal Fiscal Year (FFY), analysis is completed on:
 - Current AC funding levels
 - Expected AC conversion for next 2 FFY's
 - Expected new AC funding for next 2 FFY's

AC Control and Monitoring

Two types of AC are considered separately:

- GARVEE: NC General Assembly has statutory limits in place and therefore the policy did not require any additional tests.
- Non-GARVEE AC: AC policy requires 2 tests to ensure AC usage is monitored and used prudently. (Federal funding used for GARVEE payments is subtracted prior to performing tests)

Constraints for GARVEE AC

First Constraint: The greater of the two following tests

- Outstanding principal cannot exceed authorized federal funds in the prior FFY
- Maximum annual principal and interest does not exceed 20% of expected average annual federal revenue shown for the seven-year period in the most recently adopted STIP

Second Constraint: The amount of revenues for the FFY of issuance and previous FFY shall be at least 300 percent of the maximum annual payments for all bonds.

Constraints for Non -GARVEE AC

First Constraint: Limit AC (by funding source) to 4 years of anticipated federal apportionments

Second Constraint: Limit amount of unreimbursed state funds (by funding source) on AC to 1 year of anticipated federal apportionment

First Constraint Test FFY 2023 National Highway Performance Program (NHPP) Example

First, calculate limit for threshold:

- FFY 2023 Apportionment = \$772.6M
- Amount of NHPP needed for GARVEE payment = \$118.2M
- Net FFY 2023 NHPP apportionment = \$772.6M \$118.2M = \$654.4M
- Limit on NHPP AC = $$654.4M \times 4 = $2,618M$

Next, calculate projected AC balance at end of FFY 2023:

- AC balance at end of FFY 2022* = \$1,806M
- Projected obligations in FFY 2023 = \$0.8M
- Projected new AC in FFY 2023 = \$370M
- Projected AC conversion in FFY 2023 (Net apportionment projected obligations) = \$654.4M \$0.8M = \$654M
- Projected AC balance at end of FFY 2023 (AC balance at end of FFY 2022 + new AC AC conversions) = \$1,806M + \$370M \$654M = \$1,522M
- \$1,522M is under the 4 year limit of \$2,618M, we pass first test

Second Constraint Test FFY 2023 NHPP Example

- Net FFY 2023 NHPP apportionment = \$654.4M
- Current amount of unreimbursed NHPP AC expenditures* = \$107M
- Since \$107M < \$654.4M, we pass the second test

Note: This test needs to be done in real time, so we have done the calculation for the end of FFY 2022. We also check periodically throughout the year.

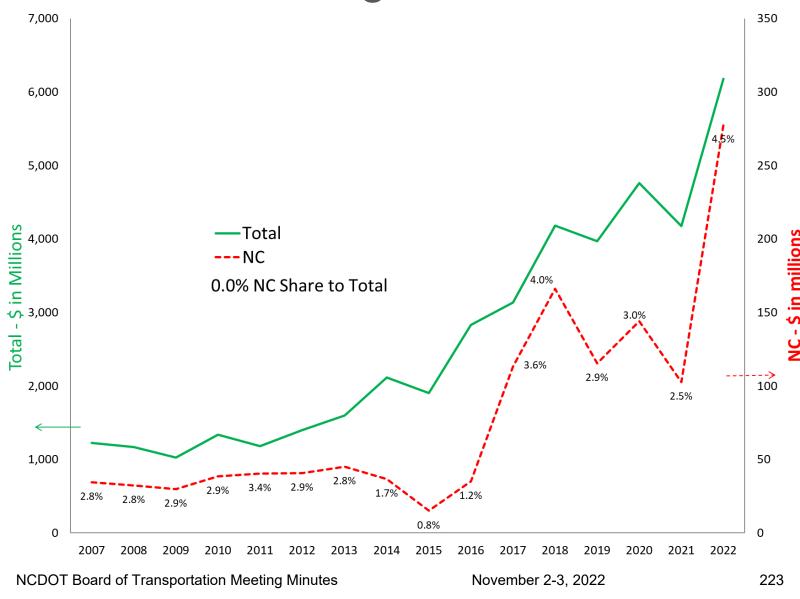

History of the Powell Bill Program

- NCGS § 136-41, Law passed in 1951
- The goal was to provide financial assistance to municipalities for municipally-maintained streets
- State Senator Junius K. Powell, an attorney and former
 Mayor of Whiteville, led the signatures on the bill, hence the name
 of the "Powell Bill" Program
- First Powell Bill funds were distributed in the fall of 1951 (\$4.5 million among 386 participating municipalities)

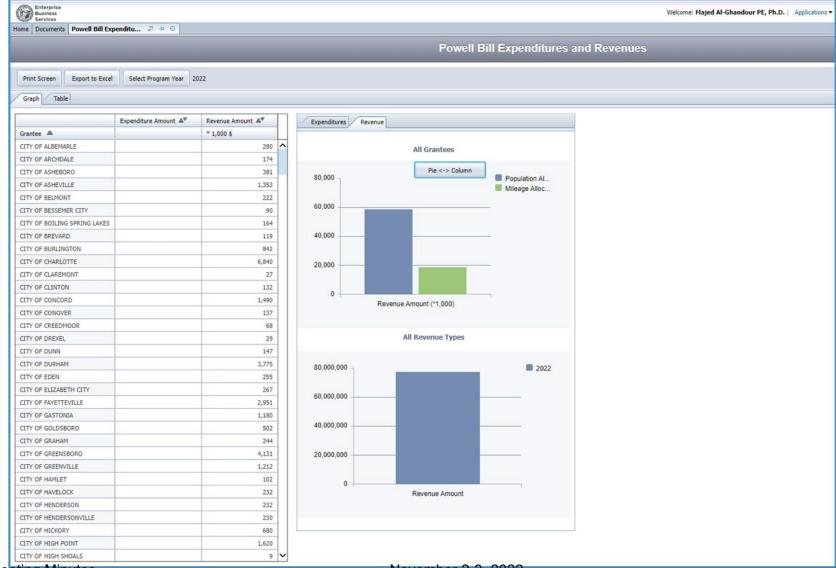

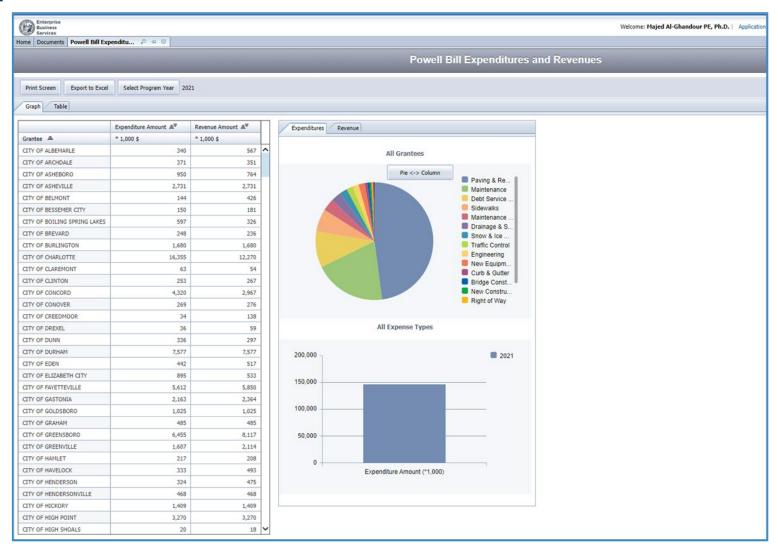

Dashboard: Revenues

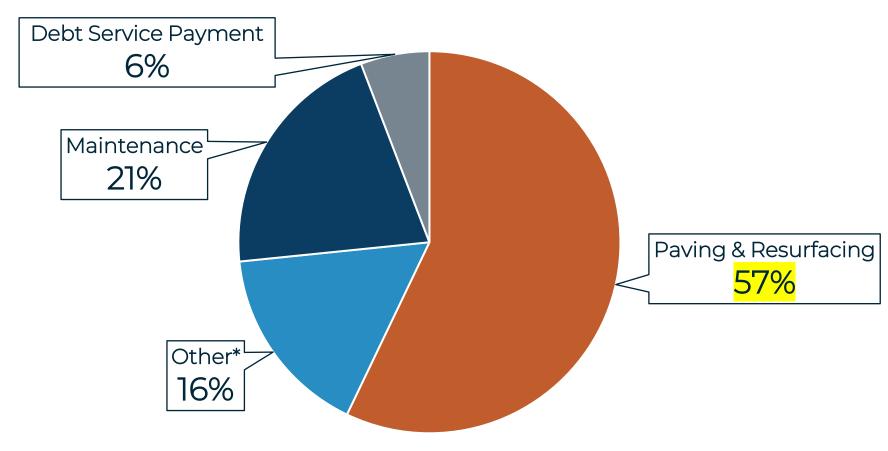


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Dashboard: Expenditures

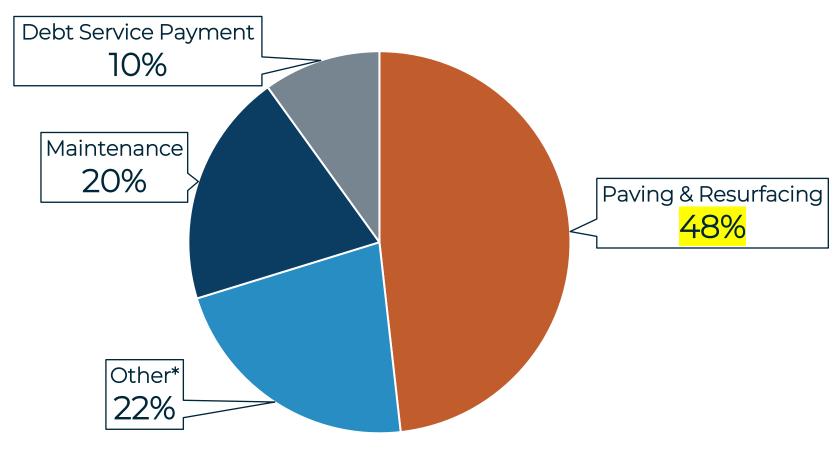

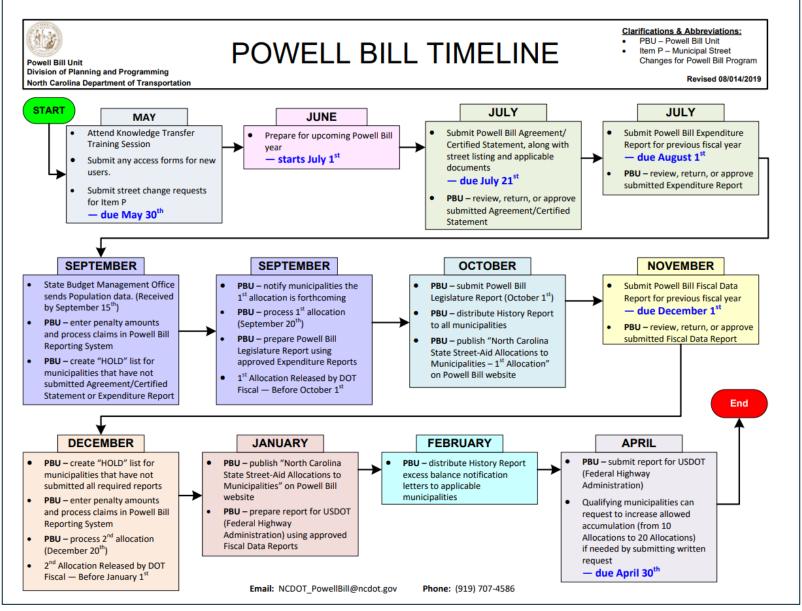

NOVEMBER 2, 2022 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

STATUS OF OIG

OIG is making great progress but it will still take time to get us where we would like to be. We continue to build rapport with other state agencies, the Office of State Budget and Management, business units within NCDOT and the State Auditors Office along with other internal & external customers.

Staffing Updates:

Consultant, Unitality, Railroad & Turnpike (CURT) has two openings we are trying to fill. Interviews for one of the positions will be this week. All other units are staffed.

Engagements (audits) completed:

Internal audit completed the second portion of the *CARES Act Grant Funds* engagement for *Integrated Mobility Division (IMD)*. Findings and recommendations have been agreed upon with management and actions plans have begun. We are in the Planning stages for two new engagements: (1) Badge Access, and (2) P-cards.

AASHTO Internal Audit CPE training:

The Internal Audit staff along with the Inspector General were able to attend the 2022 AASHTO Committee on Internal & External Audit Meeting held in Chicago, IL during the week of Sunday, August 21st through Thursday, August 25th. All received 23 hours of continuing professional education.

New Consultant with Single Audit:

August 11, 2022, OIG signed an agreement with an outside consultant to conduct the reviews of our Single Audits that OIG receives from the Local Government Commission. The consultant is determining any findings that relate to NCDOT and whether further follow up is warranted.

Action Items:

Audit Plan

OIG submitted the *Risk Based Audit Plan* to the Office of State Budget and Management meeting the September 30th, 2022 deadline. The audit plan was discussed with the Secretary Boyette and Chairman Perkins receiving both approvals.

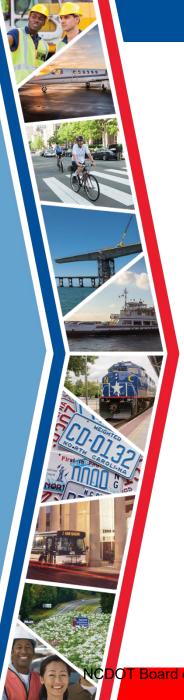
SAMM's Tool

The *Self-Assessment Maturity Model (SAMM) Tool* was submitted to the Office of State Budget and Management meeting the September 30th, 2022 deadline. Last year a third party completed this. The SAMM's Tool is a very detailed self-evaluation of the internal office staff, policies & procedures and how you rate yourself on a scale of 1-5 with 5 being the highest and 3 being average. OIG's overall rating is 2.85 which shows progress but room for improvement. Other state agencies had similar ratings. The previous year's SAMMs Tool had NCDOT as a 2.60 rating. We increased our rating just a little to show improvement since we purchased the Auto Audit software and our internal audit being fully staffed.

Future Action Items for 2023

Charter Revision

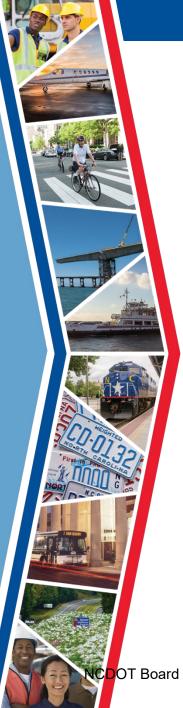
OIG is in the process of rewriting our Audit Charter to better reflect our actual operations and office makeup. We plan to spell out in detail the various audit compartments within OIG: *Internal Audit, Investigations* and *Consultant, Utility, Railroad & Turnpike* (*CURT*). 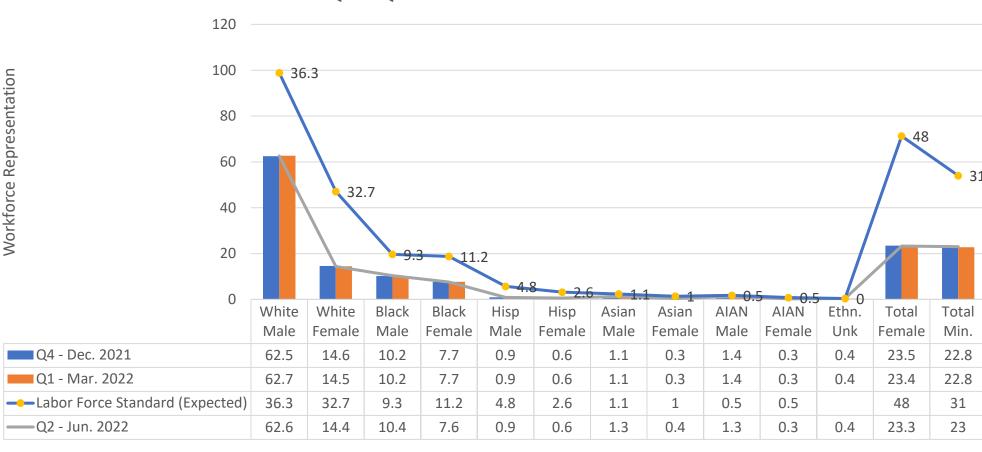

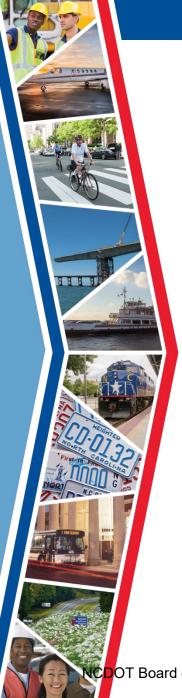


Workforce Representation Trends

Key Definitions

Criteria – Names of scoring components identified in law.

Measure – a data driven way to evaluate a criteria. A specific criteria may have one or multiple measures.

Scaling – The process by which raw measures are converted to a 0-to-100-point scale. Scaling occurs at the measure level.

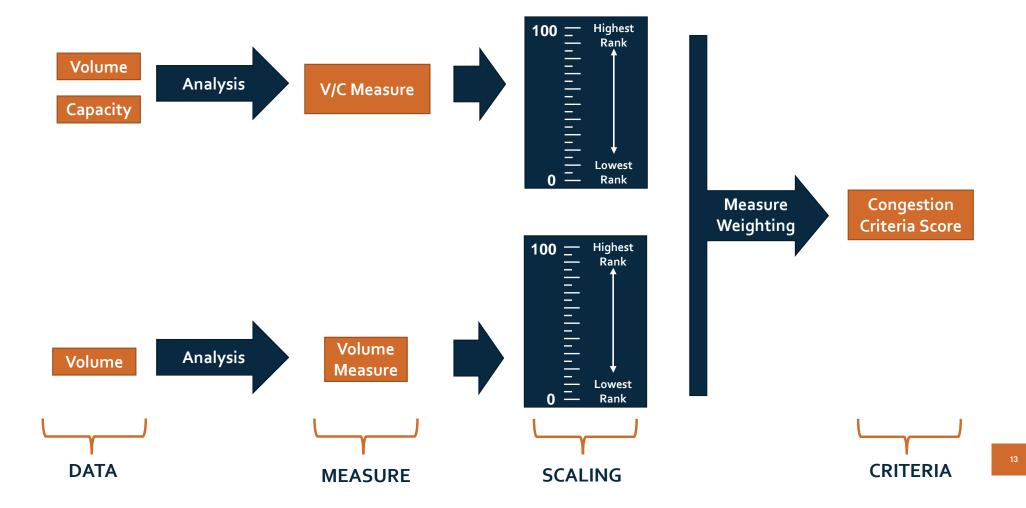
Measure Weight - The percent of the criteria score accounted for by a single measure. Different measures for the same criteria may have different measure weights.

Criteria Score – The sum of multiplying each scaled measure by the measure weight.

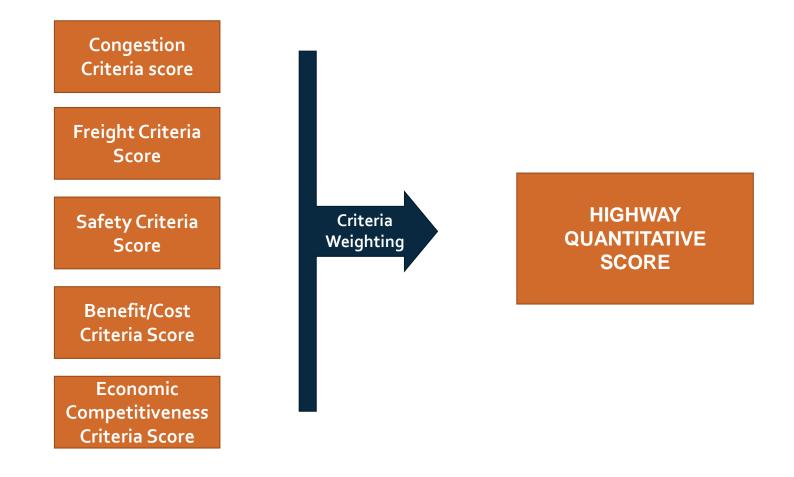
Criteria Weight – The percent of the total quantitative score accounted for by a single criteria. Different criteria may have different criteria weights.

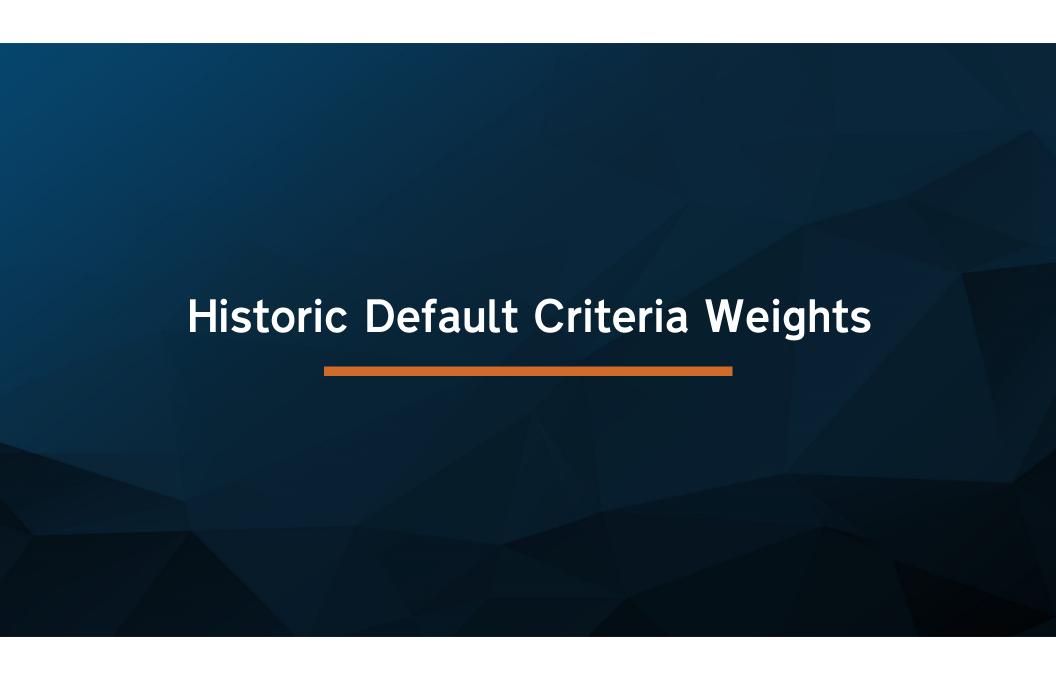
Quantitative Score – The sum of multiplying each criteria score by the criteria weight.

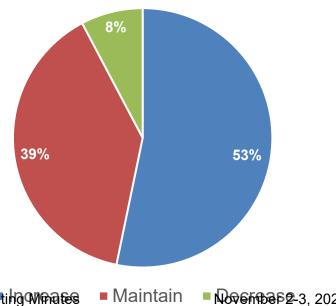


Transportation Funding and Tax Alternatives



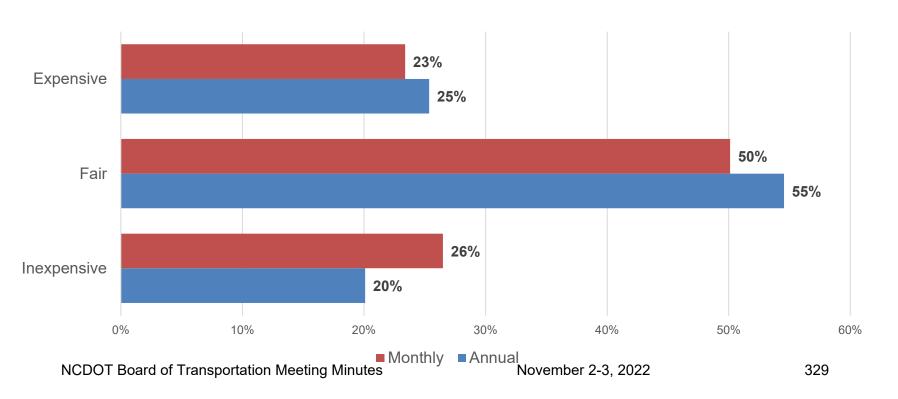
Perception of transportation funding in NC

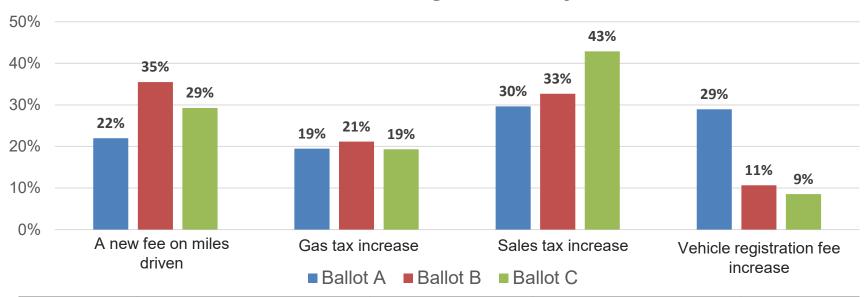


Perception of gas tax cost, monthly versus annual ballot

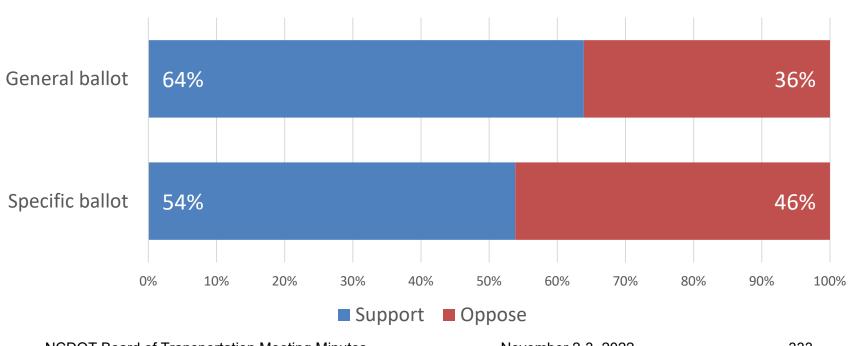

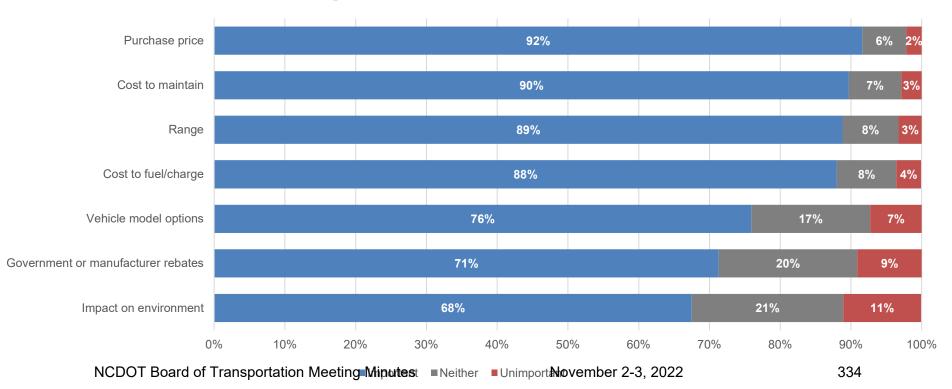

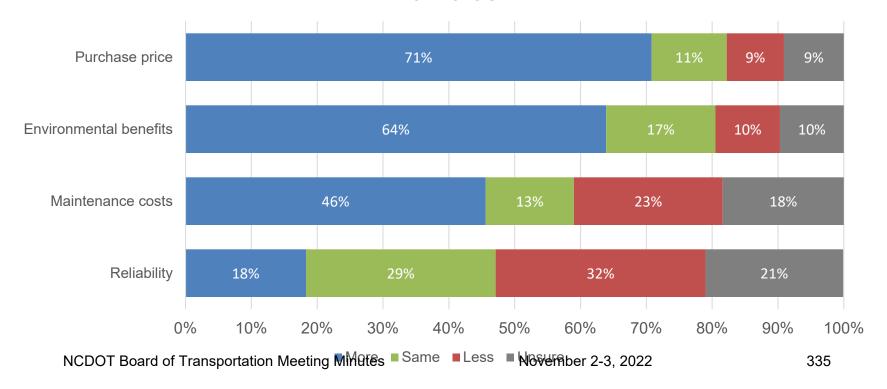


Importance of Vehicle Traits



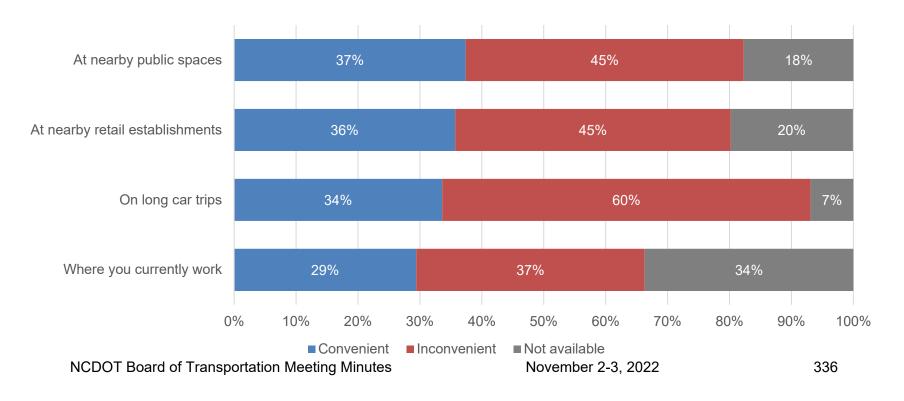


Perceptions of EVs versus traditional gas- and diesel-powered vehicles

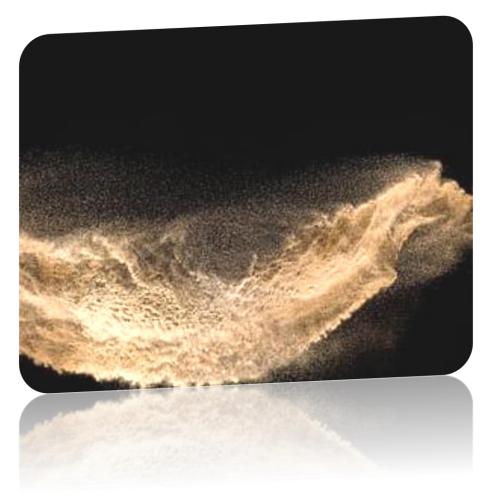

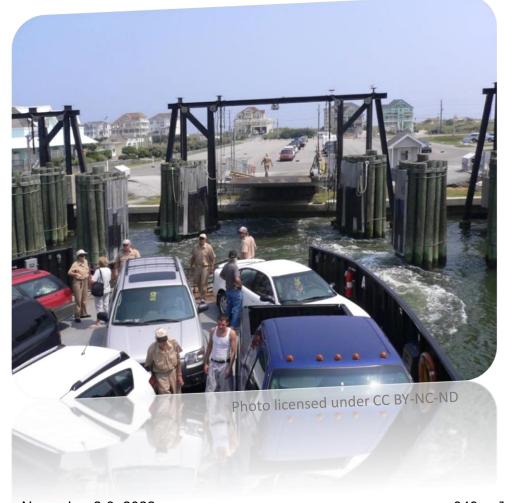

- Establishes contract times(availability date, completion date, intermediate completion dates)
- Most design-bid-build contracts are line-item contracts with established description, quantity, and unit price
- Design build contracts are typically lump sum with a single line item to design and construct entire project
- Contracts reference the Standard Specifications and contain provisions that detail methods of construction, materials, and basis of payment

Need for Contractual Adjustments

- Field conditions
- Plan revisions
- Specification changes
- Overruns or underruns
- Material requirements or availability
- Delays to controlling operation
- Third party coordination
- Value Engineering proposal



Types of Contractual Adjustments

Supplemental Agreement - Written agreement between the Contractor and the Department covering amendments to the contract

Claim - Assertion of an entitlement to either additional contract time or additional compensation

Basis for Supplemental Agreements

Extra Work(Article 104-7 of Specifications)

 Work necessary or desirable to fully complete the work as contemplated for which payment is not provided by the contract

Altered Work(Article 104-3 of Specifications)

• Increased cost of performing work resulting from a change or alteration for which there are existing contract unit prices

Overruns and Underruns(Article 104-5 of Specifications)

• Increase or decrease in contract unit price based on quantity changes that exceed established thresholds

Value Engineering(104-12 of the Specifications

• Approved proposal from contractor that saves construction cost

Supplemental Agreement Process

- Department or Contractor identify issue not covered in contract document or work that has been altered
- Contractor notifies Department requesting additional compensation for work
- If Department agrees, price and time is negotiated, and Supplemental Agreement is executed
- If Department does not agree, Contractor can notify the Department of intent to file a claim
- Work is performed
- Contractor files claim if work is in dispute

Supplemental Agreement Approval Authority

- Resident Engineer Supplemental Agreements for all Articles of the Specifications up to \$100,000 and associated time up to 30 days on all projects.
- **Division Engineer/Division Construction Engineer** Supplemental Agreements for all Articles of the Specifications with unlimited authority for compensation and time.
- State Construction Engineer/Assistant State Construction Engineer/Area Construction Engineer Reviews Supplemental Agreements greater than \$100,000 and time extensions greater than 30 Days.
- State Construction Engineer/Assistant State Construction Engineer Reviews Supplemental Agreements greater than \$200,000 and time extensions greater than 90 Days.





- The Department's claims processes are essential to keep projects moving forward
- Claims can be filed for additional compensation or additional contract time
- Protects the industry and the Department and provides a mechanism to resolve disputes
- Claims can be resolved during active construction or after project completion through established processes
- Department has developed closeout conference procedures to provide opportunity to resolve issues in formal discussion

Claims for Additional Compensation



104-7 or 104-3 If a request for additional compensation for extra work or additional work is denied, the Contractor may file a claim in accordance with the Specifications



104-4 When the Department suspends work on the project, or the Contractor contends that he has been prevented for performing work on the project, the Contractor may file a claim in accordance with the Specifications

Claims for Additional Contract Time



108-10(B)3 If the Contractor's controlling operation is delayed by circumstances beyond his control and without his fault or negligence, he may, at any time before payment of the final estimate, make a written request for an extension of the completion date, intermediate completion date or intermediate completion time



108-10(B)4 If changes in the work from that originally contemplated in the contract are ordered by the Engineer and these changes result in reduction of quantities, elimination of items, additional work or extra work, the Engineer will allow an extension in the completion date, intermediate completion date or intermediate completion time

Claim Resolution Processes

- Active Claims- Contractor may submit a claim prior to project completion to the Resident Engineer.
 Department reviews and responds in writing.
- Final Claims- Contractor may submit claim after project completion and prior to the payment of the final estimate to the State Construction Engineer or Division Engineer depending on if the project is Central or Division let. Issues have been through active claims process. Department reviews and responds in writing.
- Verified Claims- GS 136-29 allows contractor to submit verified claim to the Chief Engineer after the final estimate has been paid. Claim is reviewed by committee and response issued in writing.

Claim Approval Authority

- **Resident Engineer** approval authority is \$100,000 and 30 days for active claims under all Articles of the Specifications. Resident Engineer can not deny any active claim.
- **Division Engineer or his / her delegate** approval and denial authority for active claims is unlimited under all Articles of the specifications.
- Area Construction Engineer reviews all active claims over \$100,000 or 30 days.
- State Construction Engineer or Asst. State Construction Engineer reviews all active claims over \$200,000 or 90 days.





- May be scheduled after project completion prior to submission of a final claim.
- Contractor may bring claims for additional contract time, additional compensation, or any quantity disputes as topics for discussion.
- Opportunity for Contractor to verbally explain the basis of the claim, even if issues have previously been reviewed as active claims.
- Department staff present that can agree and execute a closeout conference form

State Law for Zero Occupant Vehicle

Neighborhood occupantless vehicle. – A low-speed vehicle that is also a fully autonomous vehicle, designed to be operated without an occupant and used to transport cargo. A fully autonomous vehicle is defined in G.S. 20-400.

Allows operation on certain roads and conditions:

- Only on streets and highways where the posted speed limit is 45 miles per hour or less.
- Must be operated in the right-hand travel lane or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the street or highway, except when preparing for a left turn.
- On a highway with two travel lanes, the operator of the neighborhood occupantless vehicle must turn off the
 roadway to a controlled stop as soon as practicable and when it is safe to do so to allow faster moving
 vehicles to pass when passing is unsafe because of traffic in the opposite direction or other conditions and
 there are five or more vehicles immediately behind the neighborhood occupantless vehicle.

Operator Defined. – For the purposes of this section, an "operator" is a person that enables or controls, or is responsible for enabling or controlling, with or without remote support, the operation of a neighborhood occupantless vehicle.

Pooled Fund Study: Capacity Adjustments

- Ten states, including NC, contributed money and time to pooled fund study
- Led by Oregon DOT, 2018-2022
- Contractor was Kittelson in Wilmington, NC

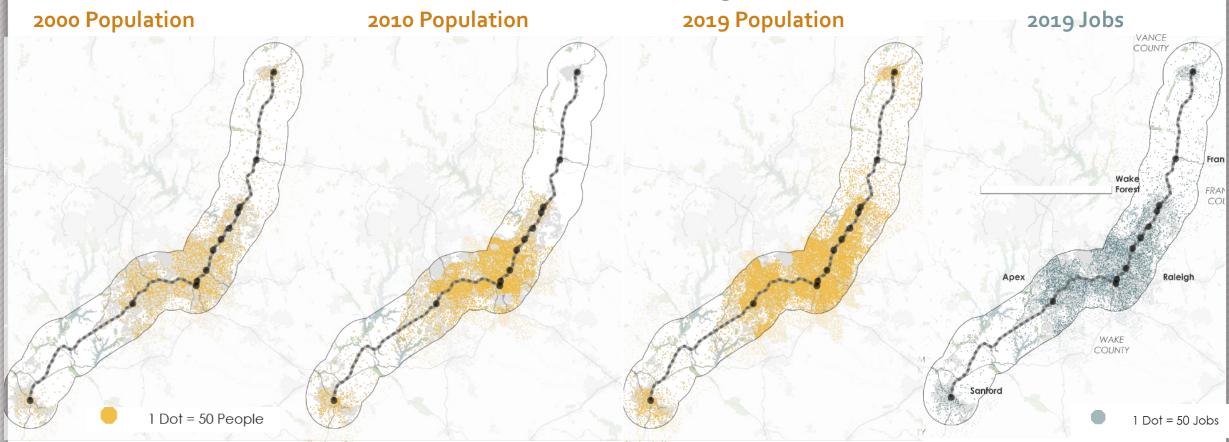




S-LINE TIMELINE
