Declaration of Quorum

Following the roll call, Chairman Fox stated the members participating constituted a quorum of the Board and he declared the meeting open.

Call to Order

Chairman Fox called the full board meeting to order on Thursday, March 7, 2024.

Ethics Statement

Chairman Fox read the Ethics Statement advising all members of the Board that may have any conflict of interest, or appearance of conflict, to refrain from participation in that item and to file the proper paperwork with the Secretary to the Board of Transportation.

Chairman Fox stated the meeting minutes from February 1, 2024, were distributed for review prior to the meeting. Chairman Fox stated if there are no additions or corrections, he would accept a motion to approve the February 1, 2024, meeting minutes of the Board of Transportation. A motion was made by Board Member McGrady and a second by Board Member Zimmer. The minutes were approved unanimously by members of the Board.

Chairman Fox stated the motion passed.

The second-place winner for the Daylily Award went to Division 7 located at I-85 at Grandover Resort in Guilford County. The first-place winner for the Daylily Award went to Division 4 located at US 264 at Downing St. in Wilson County. The second-place winner for the Eastern Region Award went to Division 2 located at I-95 at MM 13 South in Robeson County. The first-place winner for the Eastern Region Award went to Division 2 located at NC 58 at NC 24 Cape Carteret in Carteret County. The second-place winner for the Central Region Award went to Division 9 located at US 52 at Exit 129 Perch Rd. in Stokes County. The first-place winner for the Central Region Award went to Division 7 located at US 29 at Barnes St. in Rockingham County. The second-place winner for the Western Region Award went to Division 13 located at US 25/70 at South Windy Ridge Road in Madison County. The first-place winner for the Western Region Award went to Division 12 located at I-40 at Exit 138 Oxford School Road in Catawba County. The second-place winner for Best Overall went to Division 7. The first-place winner for Best Overall went to Division 9.

Chairman Fox invited Christy Dunston, HBCU Outreach Director, to present her update.

Secretary's Remarks

Secretary Hopkins started off by welcoming everyone to the Board of Transportation meeting. He said a special thank you to Dr. Cline for his update on demographic trends in our state and he also thanked Christy Dunston for the HBCU update this morning.

Even though it was the shortest month of the year, we had a lot of activity in February. For starters, we celebrated Black History Month – a time to reflect on the profound contributions of African Americans to our nation's history, culture, and progress. We had several social posts featured throughout the month recognizing the contributions of African Americans on transportation and our department, including an interview with our Chief Engineer Lamar Sylvester. He encouraged everyone to check out these posts on our various social media channels. He announced that we will be doing the same as we celebrate Women's History Month in March, so be on the lookout for more posts featuring the incredible women we have the privilege of working with here at NCDOT.

Secretary Hopkins announced that the Aviation Art Contest Winners have recently been named. This event is held annually to inspire and engage young people in aviation. The theme for this year was "Air Sports for a Peaceful World." There were more than 1,600 entries into the 2024 North Carolina Aviation Art Contest. After weeks of judging, winners emerged from each of the three age groups. Pictures of the winner's artwork were shown during the meeting. In the Junior division, Jasmine Lee of Antioch Elementary School in Matthews took home first prize. In the Intermediate group, the winner was Ellis Gibson of North Buncombe Elementary School in Weaverville. In the Senior division, the winner was Isabel Chang of Cary Academy in Cary. These three will advance to the national competition and have the chance to make the international competition. This year, the top 12 winners in each age group will have their artwork displayed digitally at the North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh. Pictures of the entries can be seen on the NCDOT Flickr site. The work the participating students turn in each year is nothing short of amazing. Congratulations on a job well done to all who participated in the competition.

Secretary Hopkins talked about a local cold case that made national news last month. This case reached closure thanks to the help of one of our DMV employees. A video about this story was played in the Board Room. After the video, the Secretary mentioned how this is a testament to the wide range of work our License & Theft agents conduct. He then congratulated inspector Hickman and the rest of the cold case team for their hard work and dedication to help bring closure to the families of this tragedy. He then invited Inspector Hickman to come up to the front so that he could present him with an award.

Secretary Hopkins then spoke about a new technical training series that we are excited to be starting here at NCDOT. The Technical Training Series is a pilot program that will offer various courses to small highway construction contractors interested in working on NCDOT projects. This is a free program that is limited to 25 firms per class, and it provides an overview of the skills and resources necessary to work on various types of DOT type projects. Beginning in April, there are many opportunities to get involved from our locations in Durham, Fayetteville, Greensboro, and Wilkesboro. He encouraged anyone interested to register on our website.

Secretary Hopkins shared that the Office of Civil Rights is working hard to connect with firms statewide on contracting opportunities with the department. Twice this month, March 9th and 23rd, NCDOT will host outreach meetings to educate disadvantaged business enterprises. Odd numbered divisions are hosting on March 9, 2024, and even numbered divisions are hosting on March 23, 2024. For more information, including when and where these meetings will be held, you can head to our website.

Secretary Hopkins reminded everyone that there are two great opportunities to participate in transportation conferences in the coming months. This year's North Carolina Traffic Safety Conference will be from April 23 - April 25, 2024, at the Greenville Convention Center. Attendees will have the opportunity to network and discuss traffic safety solutions to create a safer North Carolina. Fast forward a month to the 5th annual North Carolina Transportation Summit that will take place May 21- 22, 2024, at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro. This event explores topics related to safety, funding and innovation for North Carolina's growing population and transportation needs. Registration is now open for both events.

Secretary Hopkins then shared some personnel updates. He announced that Emily McGraw accepted a promotion to serve as the Director of Highway Operations, effective February 21, 2024. Over the course of nearly 25 years with the department, Emily has held various roles such as Pavement Design Engineer, Bridge Preservation Engineer, and most recently, State Maintenance Engineer. She started with NCDOT right out of high school and received her Bachelor's and Master of Science from N.C. State University. In addition to Emily's promotion, he announced that Wiley Jones also accepted a promotion to join the Chief Engineer's Office as our new Director of Field Support. Also holding a degree from N.C. State University, Wiley began his career with the department as a summer intern in Division 10. He joined the department in a permanent role in 1996 as a Transportation Engineering Associate. Over the past 27 years, he has served many roles In Division 5 while most recently holding the title of State Construction Engineer since October of 2022. He mentioned that the department is

fortunate to have both Emily and Wiley as leaders in our agency and congratulated them on their promotions.

Lastly, Secretary Hopkins presented two awards. Both awards are named after females who were trailblazers at NCDOT so it's fitting that we're presenting these during Women's History Month. The Brent Hamilton award is presented to an NCDOT employee demonstrating exemplary dedication to financial services and being a role model for adherence to ethical standards. The award recognizes significant dedication and hard work to the betterment of financial services and operations within business units throughout the state. The award is named in honor of NCDOT's former Fiscal Manager Brent Hamilton, who was devoted to financial work. Unfortunately, her life was cut short after a courageous battle with cancer. This year's recipient has served the state for 26 years with nearly 20 of those being here at the Department of Transportation. She accepted the role of Regional Account Supervisor in 2022, overseeing seven regional accountants serving as the Department's expert on the Division of Highways Spend Plan.

To quote from her nominations, the recipient's "presence everywhere she worked can still be discerned. Her processes, spreadsheets, systems, and reports remain in use long after she departs. Her institutional knowledge is vast, and she can be relied upon to tackle any task no matter how complex and leave a clear process for those who follow after." Please join me in congratulating this year's Brent Hamilton Award winner, Cheryl Barbour. He then presented the Karen Collette Trailblazer Award. This award is presented each year to an NCDOT female employee who is or has been a significant role model in the department. Someone who exemplifies trust, initiative, and presence while having a measurable Impact to those around her. This year's recipient has held various roles within the Department, including most recently becoming the state's first female Division Maintenance Engineer, in Division 2. She has not only led by example, but she continues to inspire the current and next generation of transportation leaders. This year's winner of the Karen Collette Trailblazer Award is Mary Beth Houston. The Secretary mentioned that there was a number of other women that were nominated, and he wanted to take a moment to name them: Leila Boulos, Jennifer Evans, Becca Gallas, Alison Kluttz, Anamika Laad, Emily McGraw, Kimberly Moore, Cat Peele and Caitlin Melvin. He thanked all these nominees for their efforts and for being such positive role models here in the department.

The Department will reimburse the University 100% of the approved eligible costs up to the maximum federal and state award amount of \$60,000.

This Project is to provide a National Summer Transportation Institute curriculum targeted for high school students related to transportation career opportunities. The Department will reimburse the University 100% of the approved eligible costs up to the maximum federal and state award amount of \$59,005.

Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Committee

The Road/Bridge/Ferry Committee approved two honorary designations and two bridges namings.

- 1. Congresswoman Eva Clayton Highway I-85 from Vance/Warren County Line to Exit 226 (Ridgeway Drewry Road) in Warren County (D5)
- 2. Commissioner Eddie C Bridges Highway I-840 from North Elm Street to Lawndale Drive in Greensboro (D7)
- 3. Sergeant Matthew R. Fishman Bridge Bridge on US 117 over Country Club Road in Wayne County (D4)
- 4. David and Sarah Stedman Bridge Bridge on US 64 over I-73/I-74/US-220 in Randolph County (D8)

Finance Committee

The Finance committee heard 3 presentations.

1. Financial Update: Mark Newsome, CFO

Highlights of the presentation and discussion included:

- The OSBM and NCDOT Consensus Revenue Forecast is complete; the FRD process is currently underway.
- Total revenues and other receipts and total expenditures and other disbursements are close to the forecast.
- Available days of cash on hand is 101.5; Available cash as a percentage of commitments is 25.3%.
- 2. Debt Management Update: Mark Newsome, CFO

Highlights of the presentation and discussion included:

- NCDOT's total outstanding debt is \$1.97B; GARVEE makes up 43% and Build NC makes up 57% of the outstanding debt.
- NCDOT currently does not meet statutory requirements to issue additional Build NC bonds for FY24.
- Current financing plans include a GARVEE issuance in FY2025 and every other year thereafter, assuming debt capacity.
- 3. Economic Update: Adeel Faroogi, Economic Analyst

- US Economy is strong at 2.5% real GDP growth for 2023.
- US unemployment levels remain low (3.7%); NC unemployment is lower (3.5%).
- Headline inflation is easing; however construction inflation remains more persistent.

Highways Committee

The Highways committee heard one presentation.

1. North Carolina Transportation Innovation Council: Alyson Tamer, State Value Management Engineer.

- The Program Overview of STIC (State Transportation Innovation Council)
 - Bringing together public and private transportation stakeholders to evaluate innovations, kickstart rapid technology transfer, and spearhead accelerated deployment of innovative ideas.
- NC TIC Current Initiatives
 - Every Day Counts (EDC) and Accelerated Innovation Deployment (AID)
- STIC Program Project Eligibility
 - Must have statewide impact, align with STIC Goals, eligible for federal-aid assistance, and funding must be expended within 2 years.
 - Funding available is \$125,000/fiscal year and a 20% non-federal match is required.
- STIC Completed Project
 - Automating Waze Road Closures NCDOT's Web Team and GIS and Traffic Systems collaborated to create and automated closure feed from TIMS to Waze in December of 2022.
 - NCDOT now leads the eastern states in number of full closures shared in Waze.
- STIC Project Funding Opportunity
 - Aims to foster innovation and provide financial support for projects improving transportation efficiency, safety, and sustainability in NC.
 - Visit the <u>North Carolina Transportation Innovation Council (NC-TIC) website</u> for more details.



- Women Connect
 - The group is creating a community for female NCDOT employees to connect with colleagues and share experiences, as well as identifying opportunities to change behaviors and culture towards women at NCDOT.

Multi-Modal Committee

The Multi-Modal committee heard one presentation.

1. GTP Multi-Modal Presentation: Gage King, NC Global Transpark (GTP) Project Manager and Rick Barkes, NC Global Transpark (GTP) Airport Director.

Highlights of the presentation and discussion included:

- Gage King gave a presentation on North Carolina Global TransPark, giving a quick overview of its history and going over its features, economic effects, and collaborations. Including a list of initiatives pertaining to tenants and airport upgrades.
- In addition, Gage invited others to tour the site and praised its attractiveness.

Advanced Technology Committee

The Advanced Technology committee heard two presentations.

1. North Carolina Wrong Way Data Summary & Committee: Shawn Troy, NCDOT State Traffic Safety Engineer

Highlights of the presentation and discussion included:

- An update on wrong way driver data in the state of North Carolina.
- This update included details on crash data and trends.
- 2. Wrong-Way Driver Detection: Dennis Jernigan, PE, NC Turnpike Authority Deputy Chief Engineer

- Overview of current wrong way driver detection technology on existing NCTA roadways, where the technology is installed, and how it works.
- A review of the Triangle Expressway Wrong-Way Driver Detection Technology Pilot, system deployment at Triangle Expressway Interchanges.
- A review of the intentions for the I-485 Express Lanes Wrong Way Driver Detection Notification System. Currently under construction, the system is being installed independent of tolling technology.
- Mr. Jernigan concluded with an overview of the Wrong Way Driving RFLOI, conducted in the Spring of 2023.

Workforce Committee

The Workforce Development committee heard 1 presentation.

1. Transportation Engineering Associates (TEA) Program Update: Chandra Cross, Recruitment Programs Manager

- NCDOT's TEA Program is a cornerstone of our Workforce Strategy: 27% of NCDOT staff are eligible to retire in the next 5 years. 73% of NCDOT's workforce is 40 or older. Response to Recruiting update: 1) Over 200 applicants, 2) Offer acceptance rate 61%, 8 Universities represented, 3) Multiple engineering degrees represented Civil (52%), Chemical, Electrical, Environmental, Mechanical, 4) 24% are former summer interns.
- Highlights of TEA Recruiting: 1) Extended posting, 2) Earlier recruiting cycle that
 matches with industry, 3) Competitive salary \$70K to \$76K, 4) Clear qualification,
 interview and selection process, same day offers, 5) Participate and co-sponsor
 recruiting and networking opportunities.
- Program Expectations: Employment is conditional upon willingness to work anywhere
 in the state, 18-month structured program with two options Field Operations and Preconstruction, 360-degree evaluation and reviews, and TEA Buddy Program provides
 peer support as Associates transition to the workplace. Preparing for permanent hire
 begins 6 months before the end of program: 76 current TEA Associates, and 28
 eligible for transfer to permanent Engineer I positions.

Other Business/Closing Comments

Chairman Fox took a moment to recognize Jaime DiLauro. After 3 years in the Governance Office, Jaime has accepted the position of Performance Management Specialist with the Office of Strategic Initiatives & Program Support, working with Ryan Brumfield and his team. She is a two-time Tar Heel with a bachelor's degree in public policy and a Master of Public Administration from the School of Government, both from UNC – Chapel Hill. Jaime also recently got married and her new name is Jaime Barber. Stacy Wooten will be taking over the processing of our reimbursements and temporarily Marilyn will be taking over Jaime's committees. Thank you, Jaime, for all your work in the Governance Office.

Lastly, Chairman Fox reminded everyone that in April, we will be traveling to the western part of the state in Divisions 13 and 14. In the next couple of weeks, the Governance Office will be sending out your hotel confirmations and the comprehensive itinerary which details the specifics (times, tours/activities, attire, etc.) of the trip. In the meantime, on Monday, Governance emailed everyone a preliminary summary of the tours and activities that have been planned for our trip.

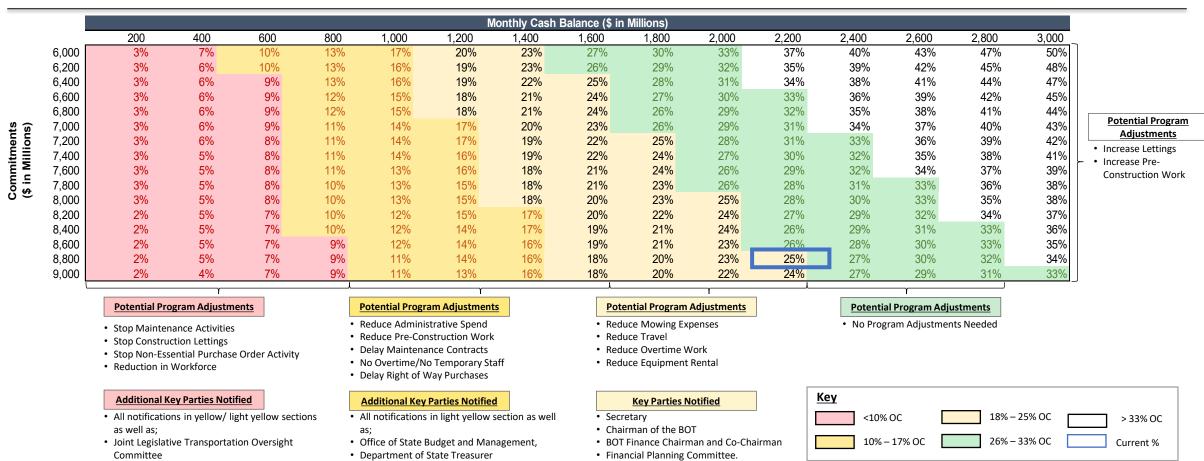

Monthly Ending Cash as a % of Commitments

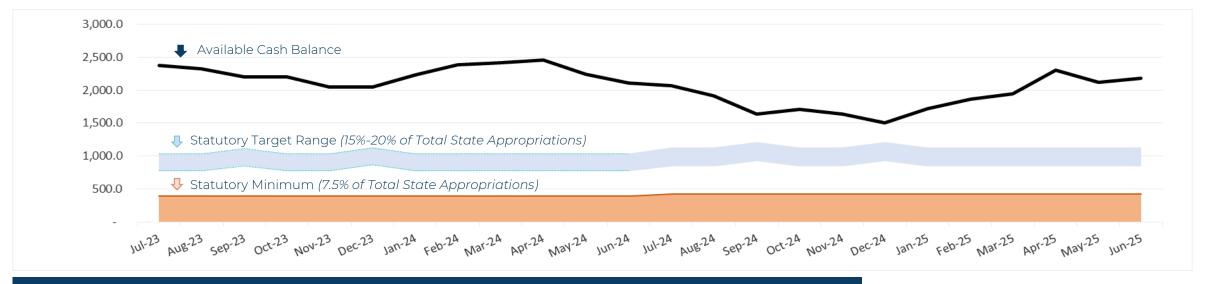

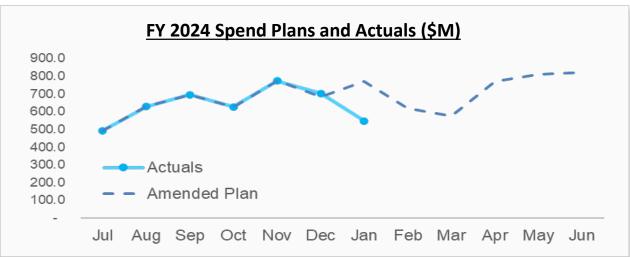

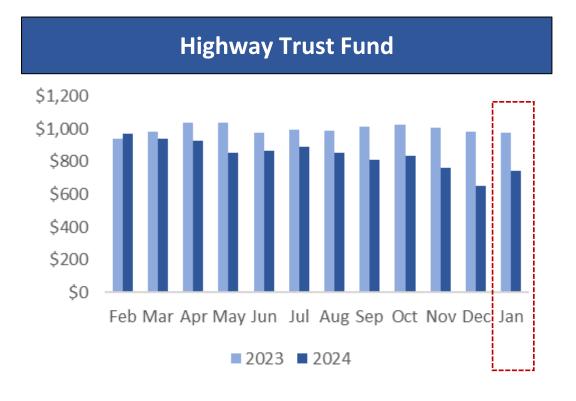

HTF cash balance decreased by \$232.1M or 23.7% from January 2023 to January 2024.

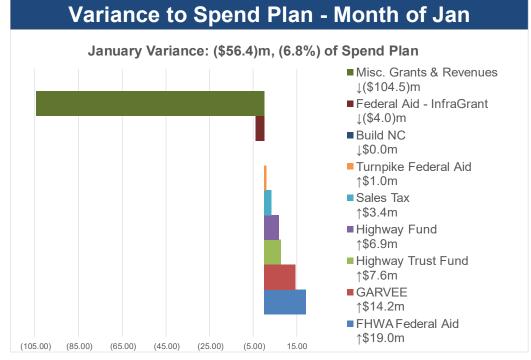

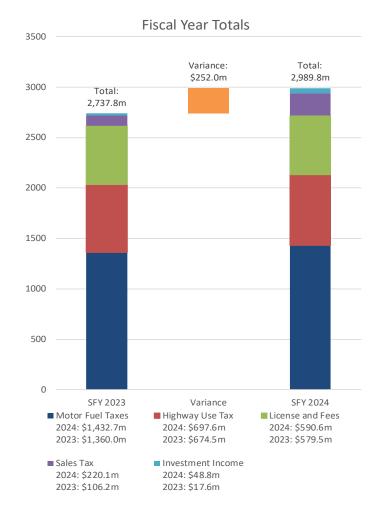

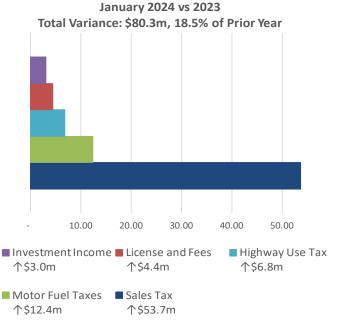
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Revenues by Source - Highway Fund & Trust Fund - Jan 2024(\$M)

FYTD YoY Variance



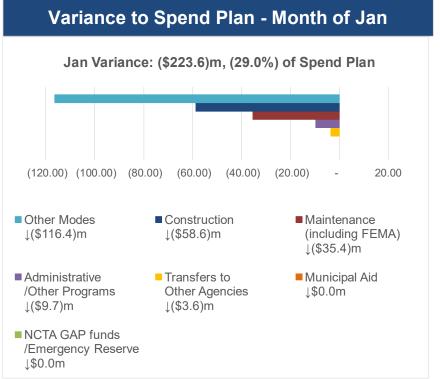

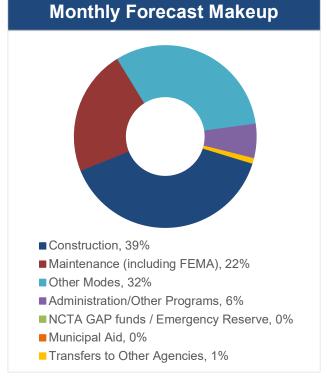

Overall Expenditures and Other Disbursements Actuals vs Forecast – Monthly (\$M)

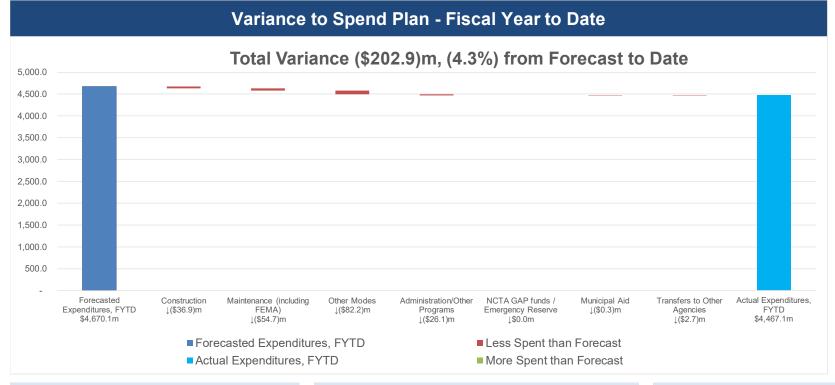

Overall Expenditures and Other Disbursements Actuals vs Forecast – FYTD (\$M)

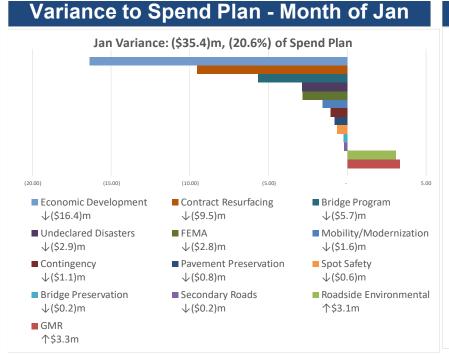

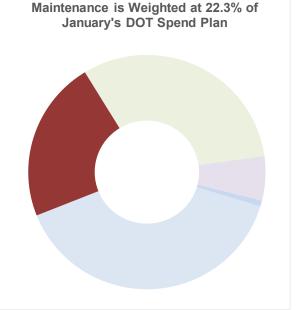

Actuals vs Forecast - Monthly (\$M)



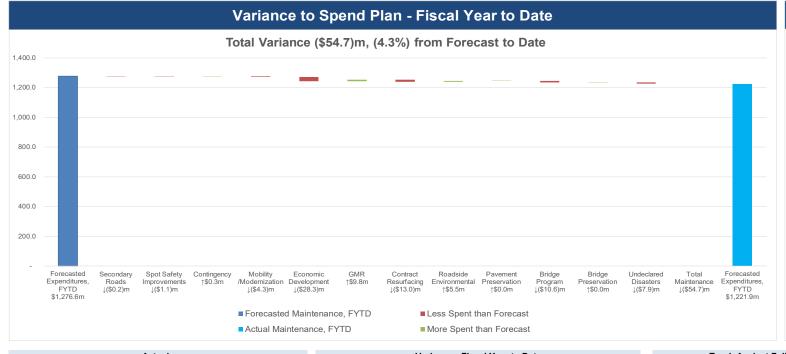

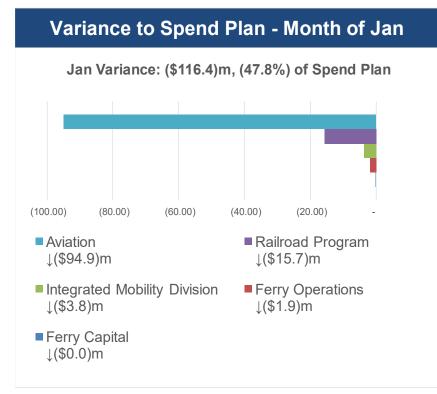
Maintenance Expenditures and Other Disbursements Actuals vs Forecast – FYTD (\$M)

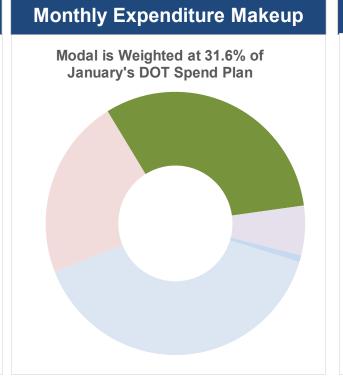

Modal Expenditures and Other Disbursements Actuals vs Forecast – Monthly (\$M)

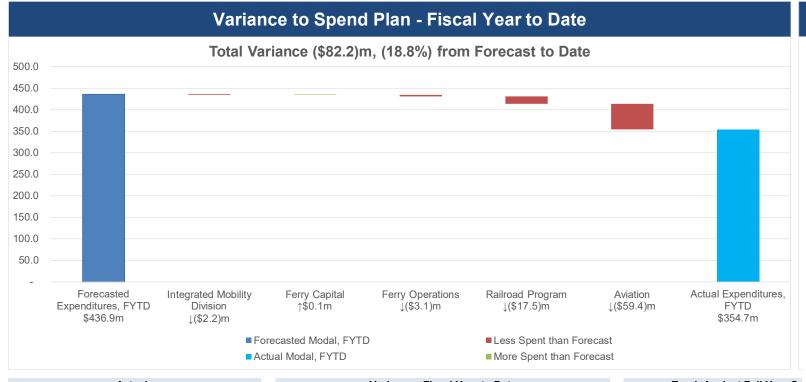

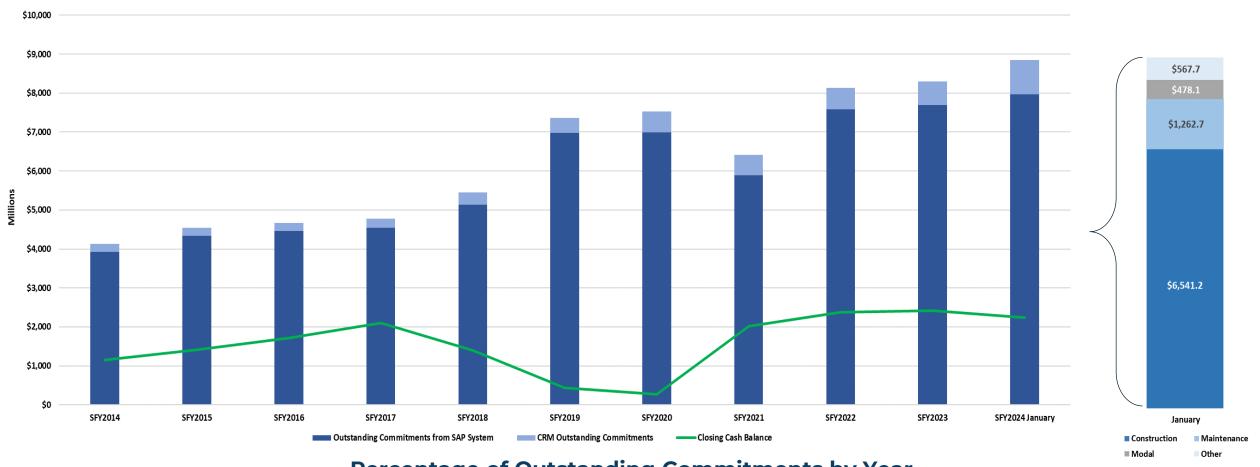
Modal Expenditures and Other Disbursements Actuals vs Forecast – FYTD (\$M)

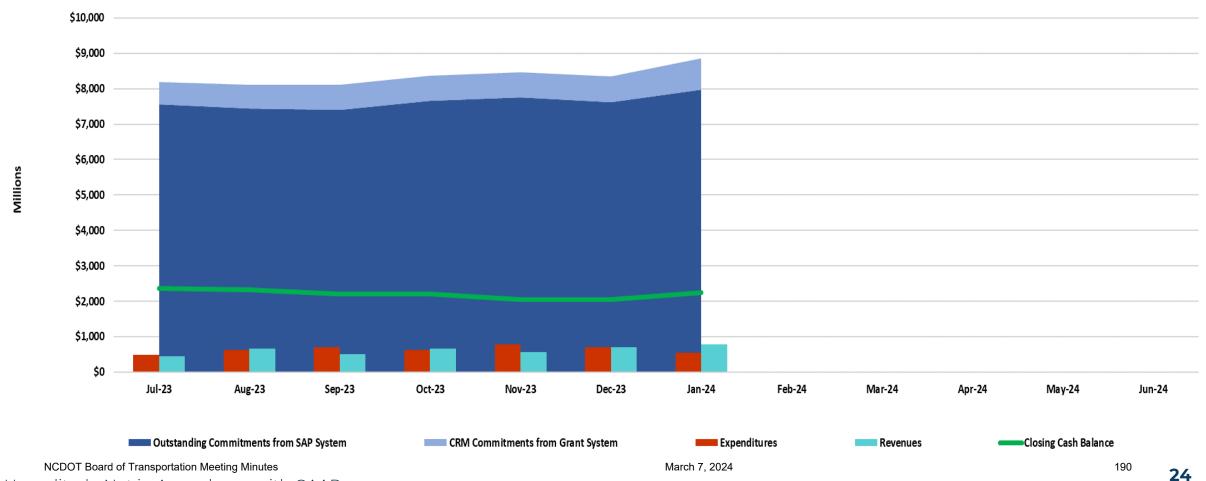
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Available Cash Balances by State Fiscal Year

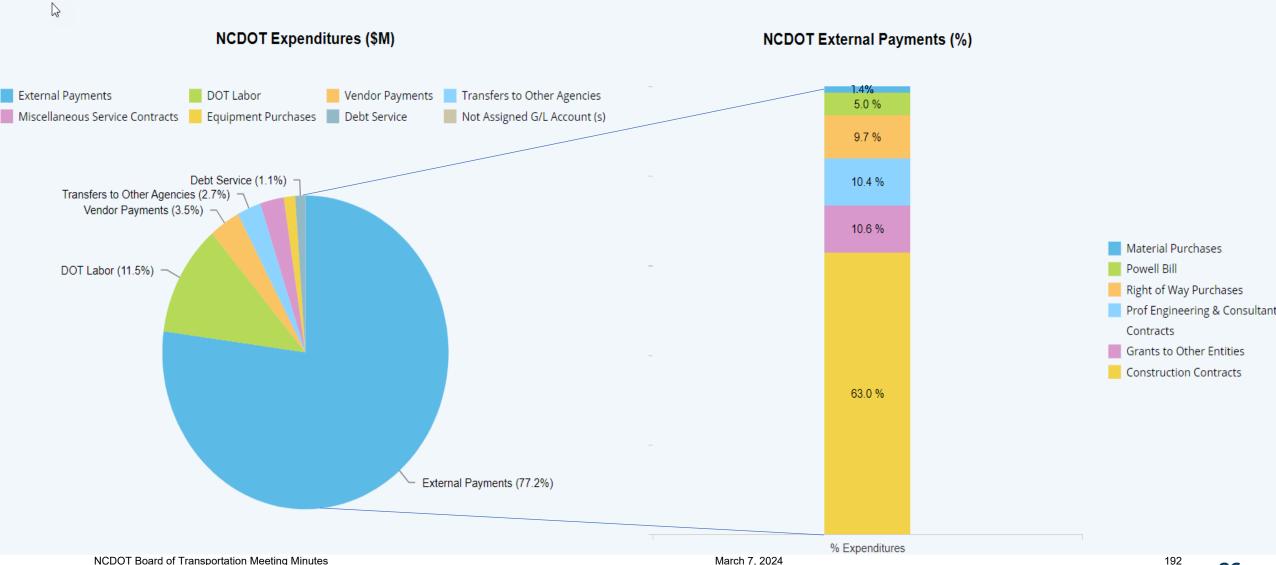
NCDOT Outstanding Commitments & Closing Available Cash Balances by Month

NCDOT Expenditures SFY2024 as of January 31, 2024



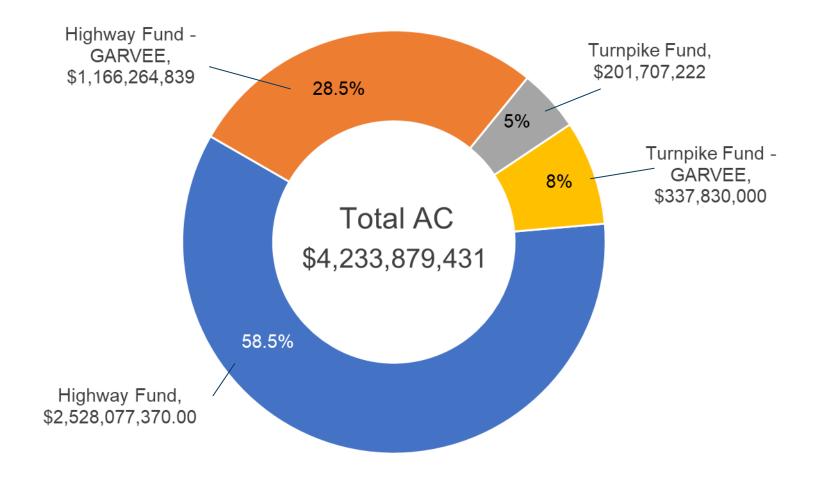

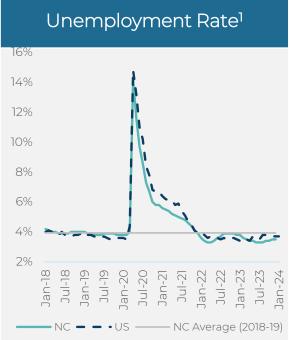

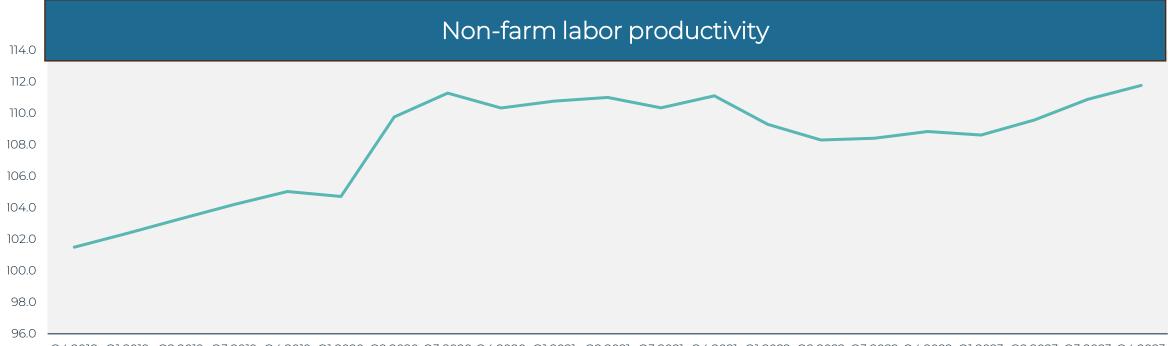

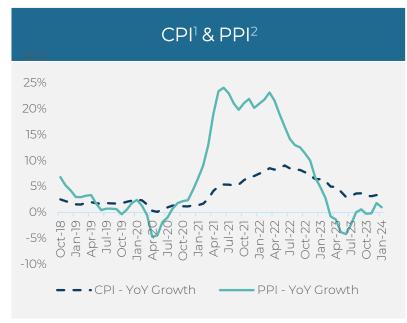

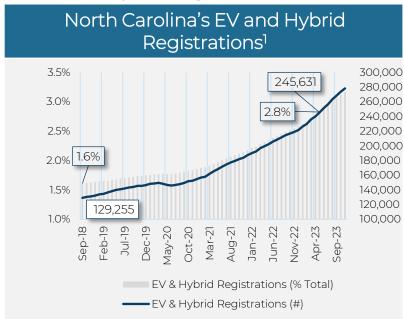
- Crude oil prices moderated in 2023, mainly due to record oil supply from Non-OPEC countries, making up for supply cuts from OPEC+ countries
- In recent weeks prices have slightly increased owing to middle east tensions and refilling of Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR)
- Gas prices have not typically had a significant effect on the miles traveled or individual transportation habits
- The U.S. populace is driving fewer miles per person despite a post-pandemic rebound
- This indicates a structural change in the economy (hybrid working).

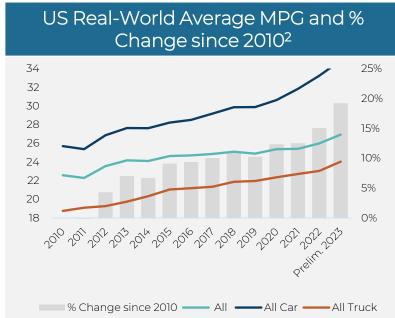

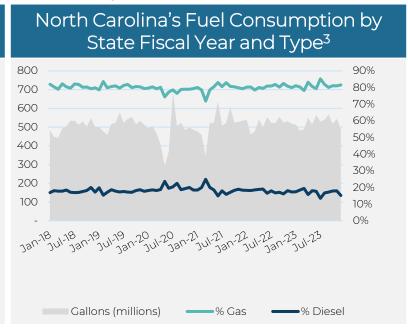
EV and hybrid registrations and fuel efficiency grow while gas and diesel consumption is steady



- In 2022, sales of electric vehicles increased 55% in the US^4
- As of Nov. 2023, there's been an 115% increase in the number of EV & Hybrid vehicles registered since September 2018 in NC
- Gas registrations have dropped from 93% to 91% of NC registrations since 2018 with diesel registrations remaining steady at ~6%

- If the current growth and inflationary trends continue, economists predict a soft landing, which means a decent growth rate, moderating inflation that meets Feds target rate of 2 percent by end of the year and a slight increase in unemployment rate.
- If inflation remains sticky and rates remain high, there remains likelihood of a hard landing, with GDP shrinking in mid 2024 followed by a weak recovery, inflation will rise in 2024 and be around 2.2 percent by the years end before falling under Fed's target in early 2025, unemployment rate will also significantly rise.
- If labor productivity is sustained and banking sector stays robust, economists see an exceptional era of growth. Unemployment rate will remain 3.5% through mid-2024 and inflation will also remain above Fed's target at 2.3 percent, falling to 1.6 percent in Q1 of 2025.

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Macroeconomic Overview

Headwinds and a Tailwind

- US population growth is slowing. While US demographics are better than that of many other developed countries, the country will need to continue to adjust to slow labor force growth, tighter labor markets, and the need to pay for the care of an aging population.
- The current US budget trajectory is unsustainable¹ (which is, of course, related to the need to pay for the health care of an aging population).
- An important question for the future of the US economy is whether trend productivity growth can be achieved fast enough to improve the standard of living. Before the pandemic, productivity growth was disappointing. If productivity growth picks up, many of the country's other problems will likely become easier to solve.

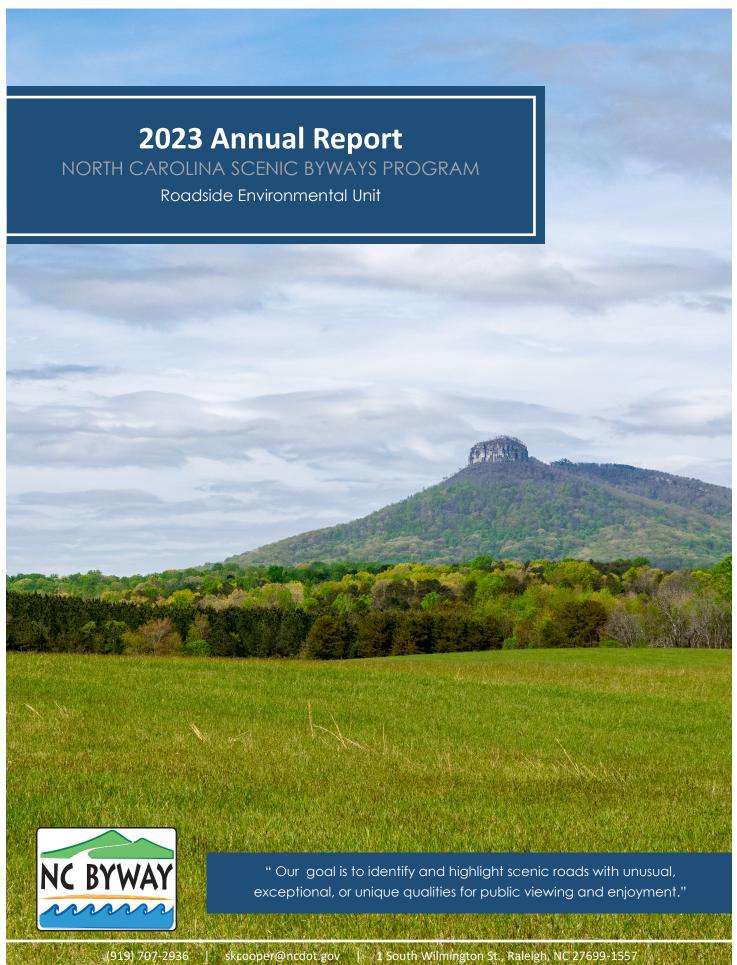

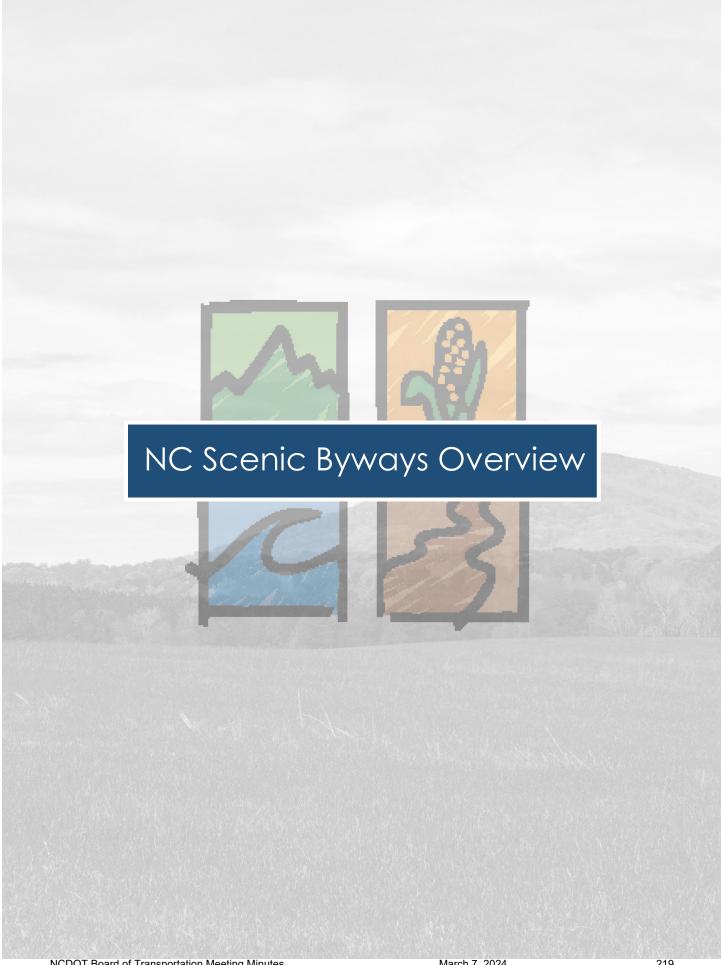


NC Scenic Byways Overview:	
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Coastal Region Byway (Brunswick Town Road)	9

Since it inception in 1990, the N.C. Department of Transportation has designated 62 scenic byways to give visitors and residents a chance to experience North Carolina's history, geography, and culture, while also raising awareness for the protection and preservation of these treasures. Byways are carefully selected to portray the diverse beauty and culture of the Tar Heel State and provide travelers with safe and interesting alternate travel routes. These byways are intended as an alternative to the faster-paced traffic and commercial areas found along our state's major highways and interstates. Following the byways, motorists will see some of North Carolina's most breathtaking scenery, from the Blue Ridge Mountains to the fertile plains of the Piedmont to the crystal blue shores of the coast. The routes vary in length from 1.5 to 173 miles and are clearly marked with highway signs with the Scenic Byways logo. North Carolina Scenic Byways are selected based on natural, cultural, and historic features along the route. Motorists will see little or no development along the routes that detracts from the natural character and quality of the byway.



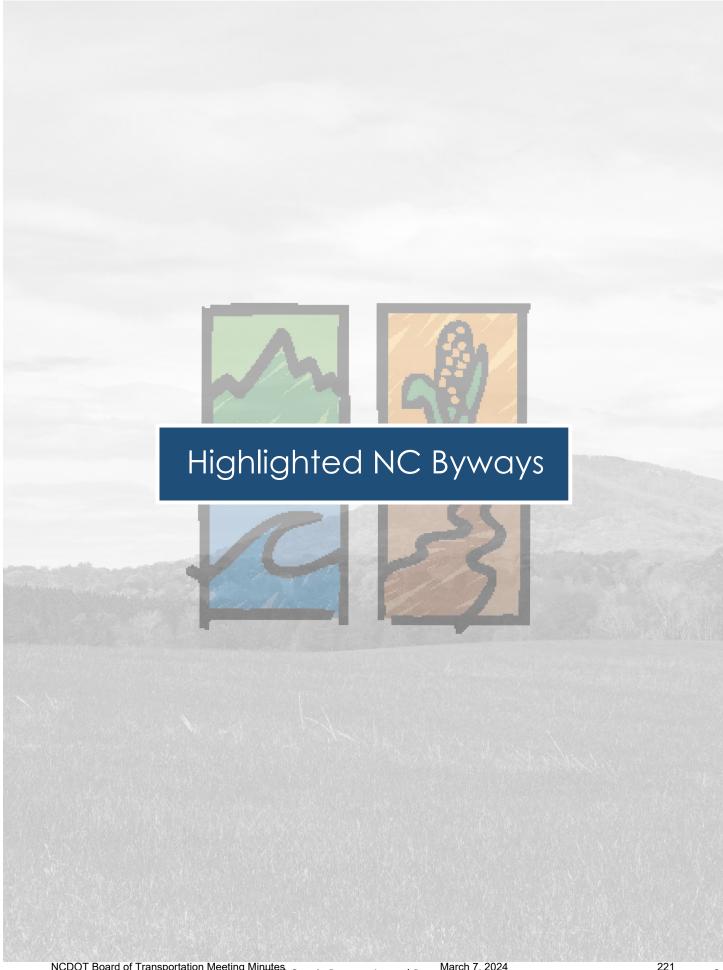

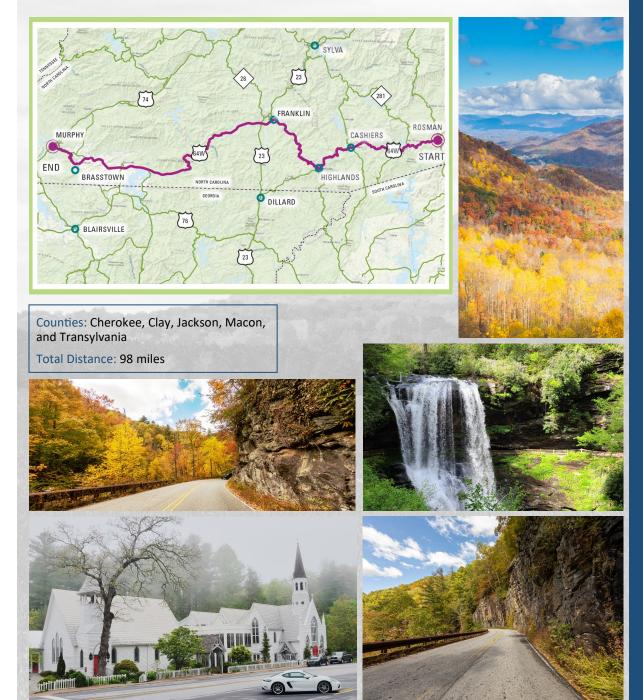




Waterfall Byway



The Waterfall Byway winds 98 miles through fi ve of the state's western-most counties and earns its name from the 200 waterfalls that surround the route. In fact, Transylvania County, where the byway begins, is known as the "Land of the Waterfalls" for the numerous waterfalls and trout streams that occur in the area. But this byway not only offers striking views of pristine mountain forests, lofty mountain ranges, and dramatic waterfalls, it also encompasses a vast amount of North Carolina's rich heritage and history throughout several quaint mountain towns.

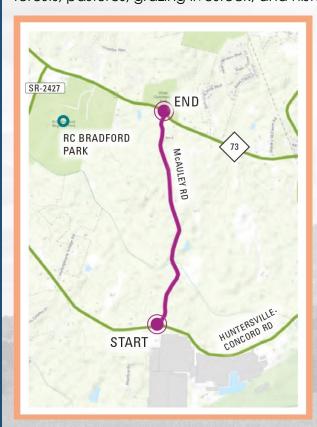




McAuley Road Scenic Byway



McAuley Road offers travelers a glimpse of the past through a typical 19th century landscape with a dirt road, one lane wooden bridge, open farmland, and dense woodlands. Located in Mecklenburg County, one of the fastest growing urban areas in the United States, this byway offers motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists an opportunity to see what Mecklenburg County looked like in the past. Traveling along the road, visitors will experience rolling hills, mixed forests, pastures, grazing livestock, and historical farm structures.

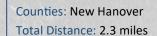


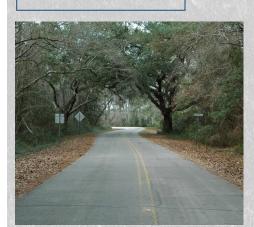
Brunswick Town Road may be one of the state's shortest scenic byways, but it is rich in history. Shortly before the byway begins, motorists will cross Allen Creek, once known as Lilliput Creek for the plantation at its headwaters. The byway promptly ends at the Brunswick Town/Fort Anderson State Historic Site which was settled in 1725. In addition to being one of North Carolina's primary colonial ports, it was home to royal Governors Arthur Dobbs and Benjamin Smith before the relocation of the royal governor to New Bern in 1770.

















2023 Management Duties: From project management and marketing plans to byway application reviews, NC Scenic Byways continues to operate in a variety of capacities to manage and advocate for the road less traveled.

The following are just some of the tasks undertaken by the Byways program during 2023:

FHWA 2022 National Scenic Byways Program Grant:

- In 2022, the FHWA sought projects that met the statutory eligibility requirements for the first National Scenic Byway's grant since 2012. The grant applications had to advance one or more of the four goals: (1) Safety; (2) Equity and Accessibil-



ity; (3) Economic Strength; and (4) Climate and Sustainability.

- NC Scenic Byways worked with Programs Management and four byway groups to prepare, organize, and submit five grant applications worth a combined total of \$6,678,809. Applications were submitted on June 14th, 2022.
- On April 28, 2023, the FHWA released the results of the process, and North Carolina had one application that was awarded. The Blue Ridge Parkway Association's *Blue Ridge Byways: Comprehensive Digital Traveler Information, Branding,* & Marketing application was awarded \$460,000.
- The project will develop comprehensive digital traveler information for a three-state region that includes North Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia, in addition to branding and marketing. The byways that will be impacted are the Blue Ridge Parkway (NC &VA), Skyline Drive (VA), and Newfound

Gap Road (NC & TN). Specific activities include redesigning the Blue Ridge Parkway Association (BRPA) website to include general information about the three national parks as well as comprehensive trip-planning tools for travelers (including customized itineraries); redesigning the BRPA mobile app to provide interpretation, trip-planning tools, visitor services information, and state-of the-art mapping and navigation within the national parks and gateway communities; branding for BRPA's print and digital products; and a marketing plan. The BRPA is responsible for all aspects of the Project and Grant. The Department will reimburse 80% of eligible costs up to a maximum of \$460,000.00 with NSBP Grant Funds. The Blue Ridge Parkway Association shall provide the 20% non-federal match and all costs that exceed the total available funding of \$575,000.

- We're currently working with the Project Management Unit to set up funding sources for the grant so implementation can begin.
- \$20 million in additional funding has been appropriated for 2023 by the FHWA and National Scenic Byways Program. The FHWA plans to announce another NOFO for this funding in early 2024.

Program Funding:

- August 1, 2022 Original Byway grant expired
- January 1, 2024 No grant/funding directly for NC Scenic Byways program with the exception of a donations account.
- We are currently trying to determine future funding sources and the possibility of external grants.



Signing Effort:

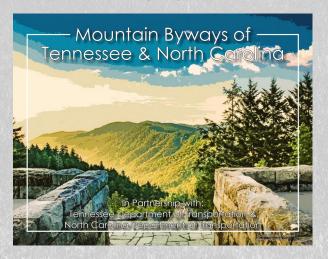
- With the help of the Division offices and Traffic Services, we've been able to install new signage and replace any outdated signage along most of our 62 byway routes.



Administrative Tasks/Projects:

- Reviewed multiple byway designation applications across the state.
- Took pictures and video for the Public Information Office to use in their marketing campaigns on social media and website
- Developed a comprehensive NC Scenic Byways Handbook that contains information related to the program history, the program objectives, the designation process, designation applications, the administrative codes, and any other information related to the byways program.
- Reorganized and updated the NC Scenic Byway Applications to mirror the national scenic byways application requirements and help ensure long term involvement from applicant organizations. The new updated application requires long term strategies to preserve the intrinsic qualities of the proposed route, information on existing or potential traffic and safety issues related to the route, a future marketing strategy and implementation plan for the proposed byway, and a plan on how the organization intends on maintaining investment and public involvement of the route over the next 10 years.

TN/NC Mountain Byway Travel Guide Collaboration:



- Collaborated with the Tennessee Scenic Byways Program to create a regional byways guide for the Smoky and Blue Ridge Mountain byways for NC and TN.

- Work with byway groups to develop and submit grant applications for the upcoming 2023 FHWA National Scenic Byways Grant NOFO.

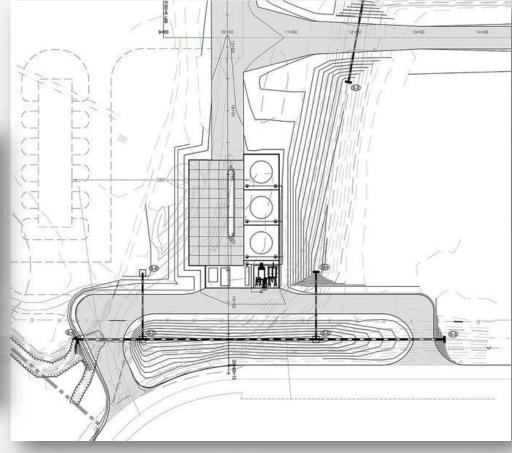




Fuel Farm Facility

Draken International Expansion

- Draken International located at the NCGTP's North Cargo building for in 2020
- Initial renovations to the building were provided for Draken's aircraft maintenance and flight operations
- Additional renovations are needed for them to expand their operations and create more jobs in N.C.
- \$900,000 grant was awarded from the N.C. Division of Aviation's N.C. Airport Economic Development Program to fund upgrades
- Installation of a 40-foot hangar door to allow for aircraft storage
- Simulator room construction is also be planned to assist Draken with pilot training on-site
- Other upgrades will include lighting, compressed air systems, and additional restrooms
- This project is expected to be completed in the summer of 2024







Fleet Readiness Center-East (FRC East) Expansion

FRC East, North Carolina's largest aviation maintenance, repair, and technical services provider, operates a satellite office at the N.C. Global TransPark for its Air Force UH-1 "Huey" helicopter line.

FRC East's economic benefits:

- \$2.5M initial investment
- 60 personnel
- Average annual salary of \$72,000

The MRO facility's turnaround time (TAT) has decreased, and workforce has expanded.

• 2021: Produced 7 aircraft Average TAT 269 days

• 2022: Produced 10 aircraft Average TAT 238 days

• 2023: Produced 8 aircraft Average TAT 183 days









Fleet Readiness Center-East (FRC East) Expansion

- FRC East has received the DSOR (Designated Source of Repair) for the following platforms:
 - Navy and Marine Corps C/KC-130J Super Hercules
 - C/KC-130T Hercules
- N.C. State Budget included an allocation of \$350 million dollars to fund the construction of the facility upon execution of an Intergovernmental Support Agreement with the Navy
 - Requires an annual payback of \$15 million upon occupancy
- HDR Engineering is working with FRC East on preliminary designs
- A joint venture, of Barnhill Contracting and TA Loving, has been selected as the Construction Manager at Risk for the project.
- C-130s will start arriving in September of 2026, with an induction of 2 the first year.

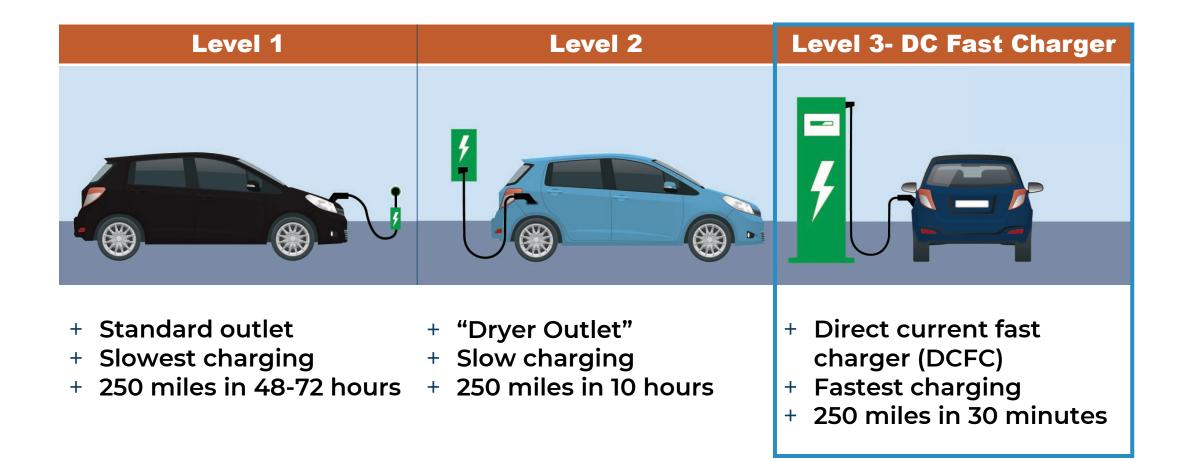

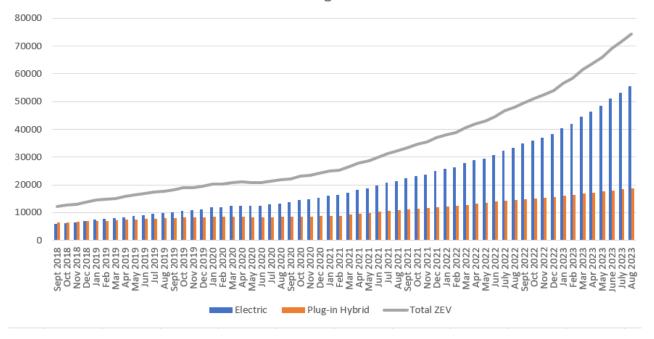


State of EV's and Charging Infrastructure in NC

Current State of EV's in North Carolina

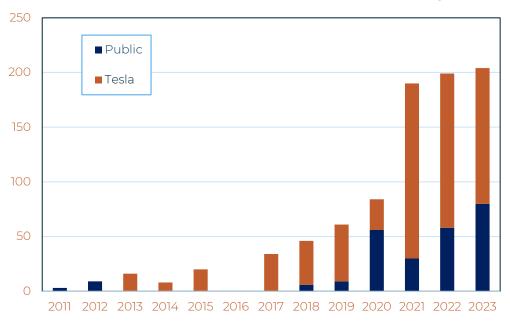

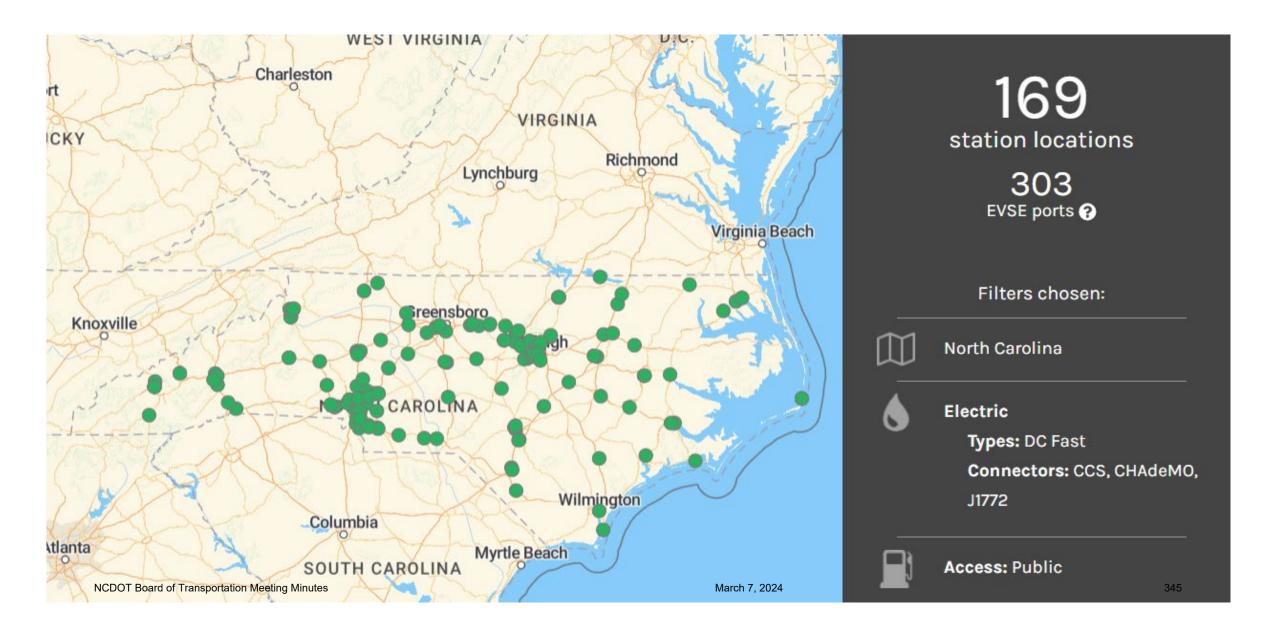

Number of DCFC Ports Installations by Year

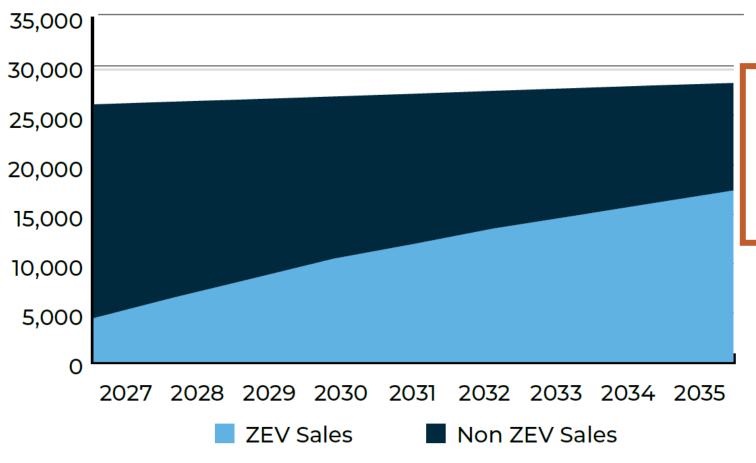


Current DC Fast Infrastructure Available to All EV Drivers

FIGURE 22. ZEV and Non-ZEV MDH Sales Projections

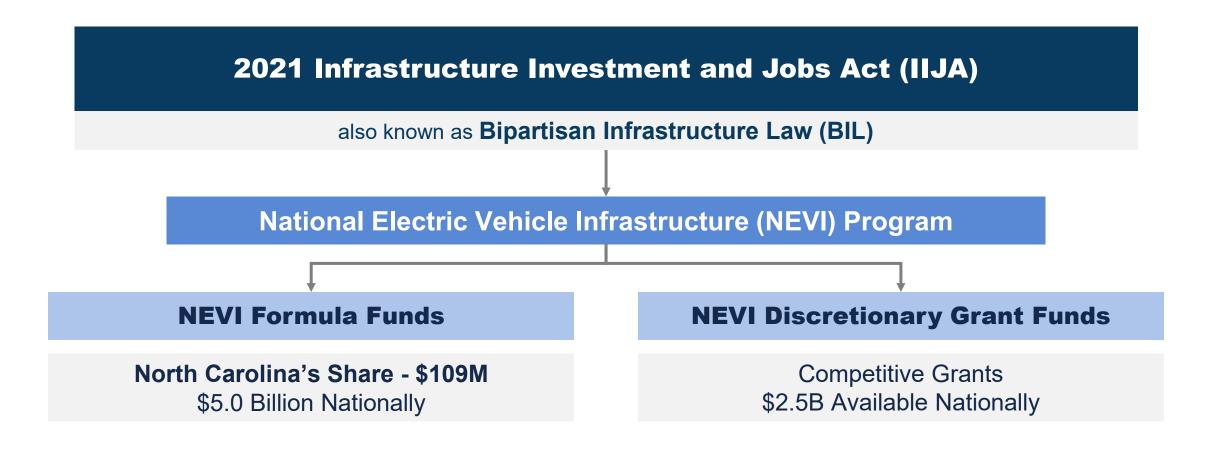

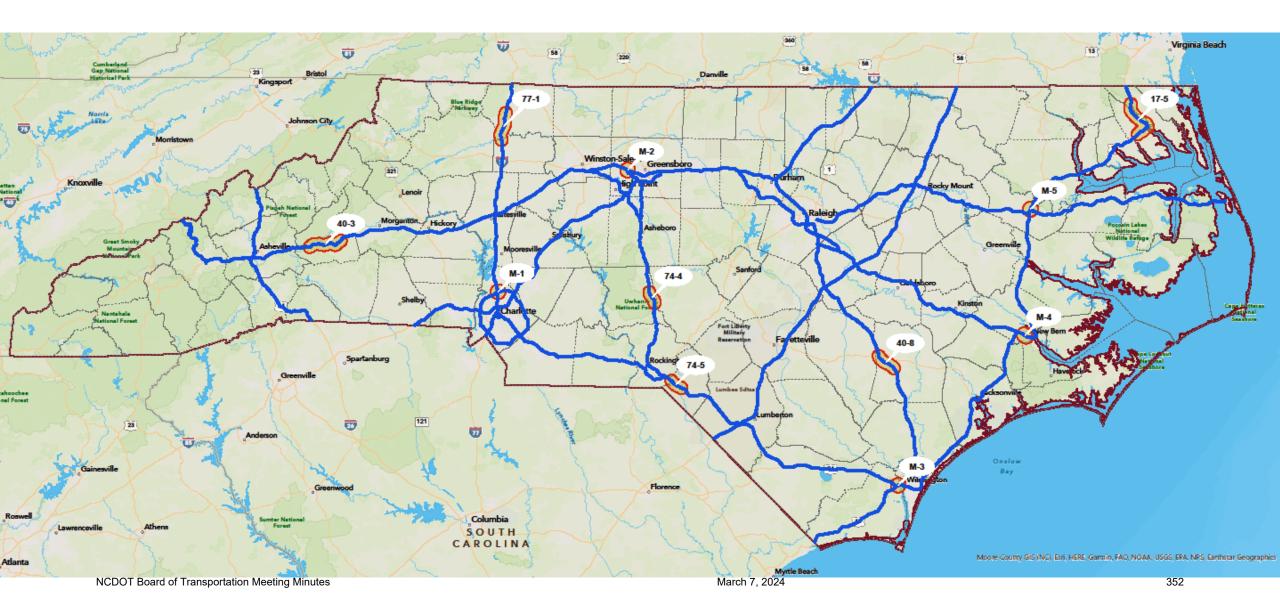

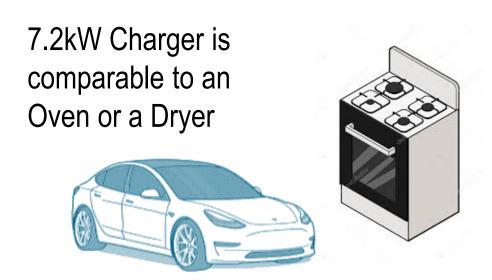

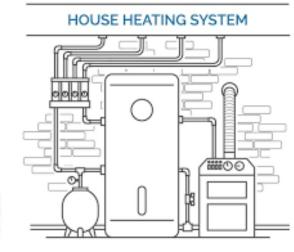

Common Scale of Power Consumption

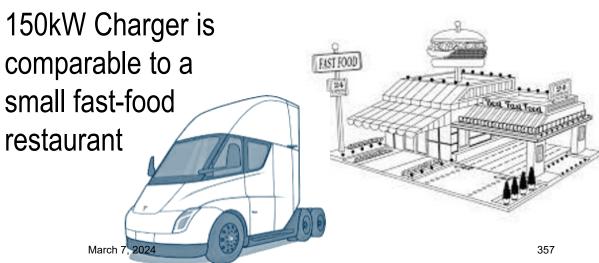

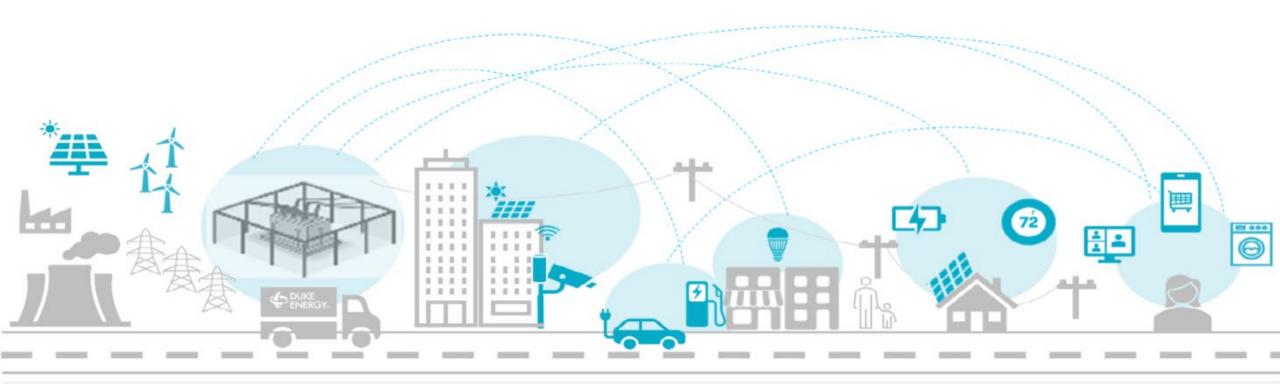








Grid Readiness for Transportation Electrification

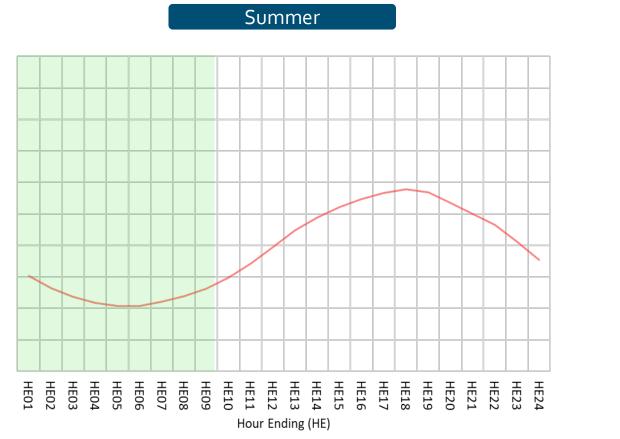

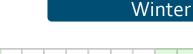

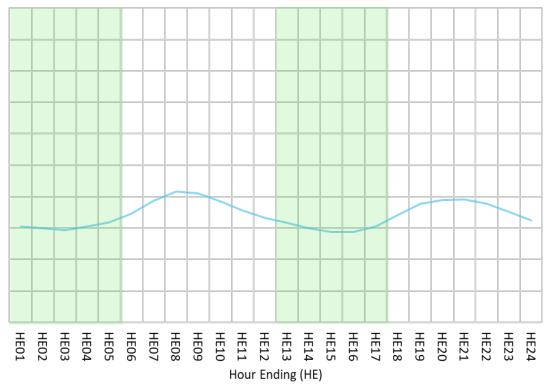

The average residential load transformer has room for EV charging, if charging occurs at the right times





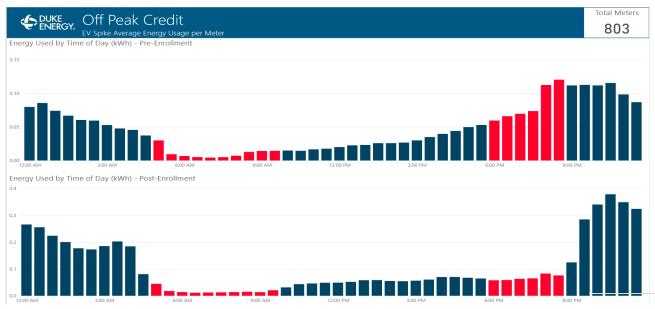


Load profile curve represents the average of 2000 – 50kVA transformers.

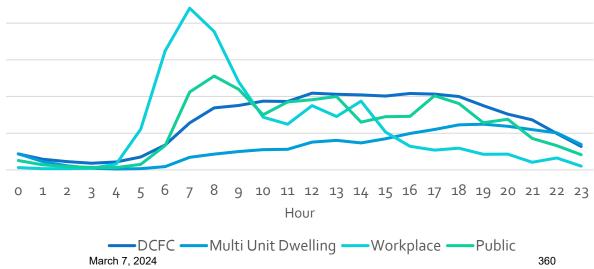

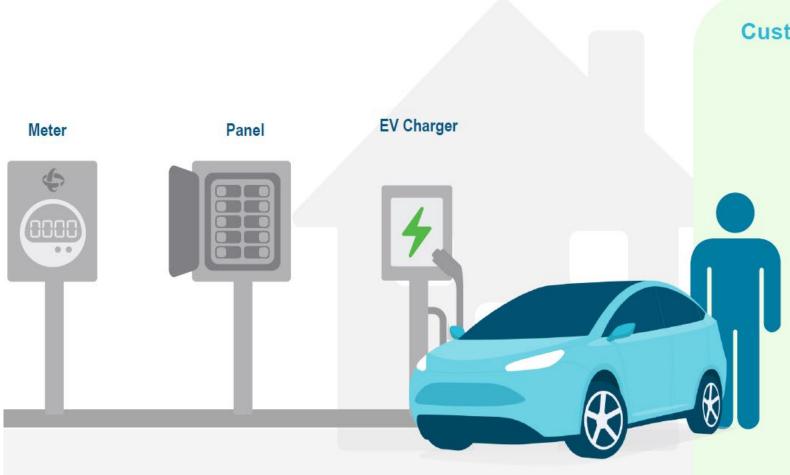
- Residential charging occurs largely in the late afternoon from 4-8pm.

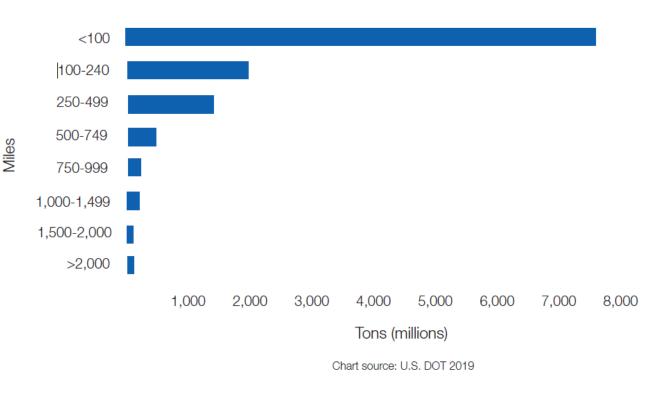
The Case for Fleet Electrification

Public policy, fleet suitability for electrification, and a **strong business case** for fleet electrification will push fleets to electrify at scale.

Local delivery and **transit** fleet operators poised to electrify because of three factors:

- 1. Short length of operation
- 2. Ability to return to central base
- 3. Frequent stops that work well with regenerative breaking

Total Freight Moved by Distance



The largest percentage of goods, by weight (75%) and value (57%), move less than 250 miles.

Trends and Concerns in Fleet Electrification

Trends:

- Large fleets making electric vehicle announcements
- Creating organizations to facilitate their fleet transitions
- Multiple small conversions / pilots
- Sophisticated companies are taking available capacity
- Regulators inquiring and/or opening dockets on Grid Readiness

Concerns:

- Aggressive timelines
- Lack of data for modeling and forecasting
- Early adopters consume available capacity
- Capacity planning lacks customer commitment
- Commercial/Industrial site clustering
- Obligation to serve
- "Used and Useful"

Customer Fleet Perspective

- Companies today, especially fleet operators are experiencing political and customer pressure to decarbonize their footprint
- For medium- and heavy-duty (MD, HD) fleets the scale of obstacles is more complex
- Consider vehicle choices and routes variability
- Development of charging solutions that fit their needs today and scale with EV technology of the future
- MD and HD vehicles are purchased and operated by companies using business and sometimes tax-payer dollars with a responsibility to remain competitive
- For the business and its customers there is little to no room for EV failure where margins are tight and down time equals lost revenue
- MD/HD fleets have limited charging windows, and how they are used is a function of tradeoffs of space and cost.

Today

- 100 Class 6 trucks (School bus, beverage, rack truck)
- 30 Class 8 trucks (Fire truck, semi, dump truck)
- Site load today ~ 500 kW

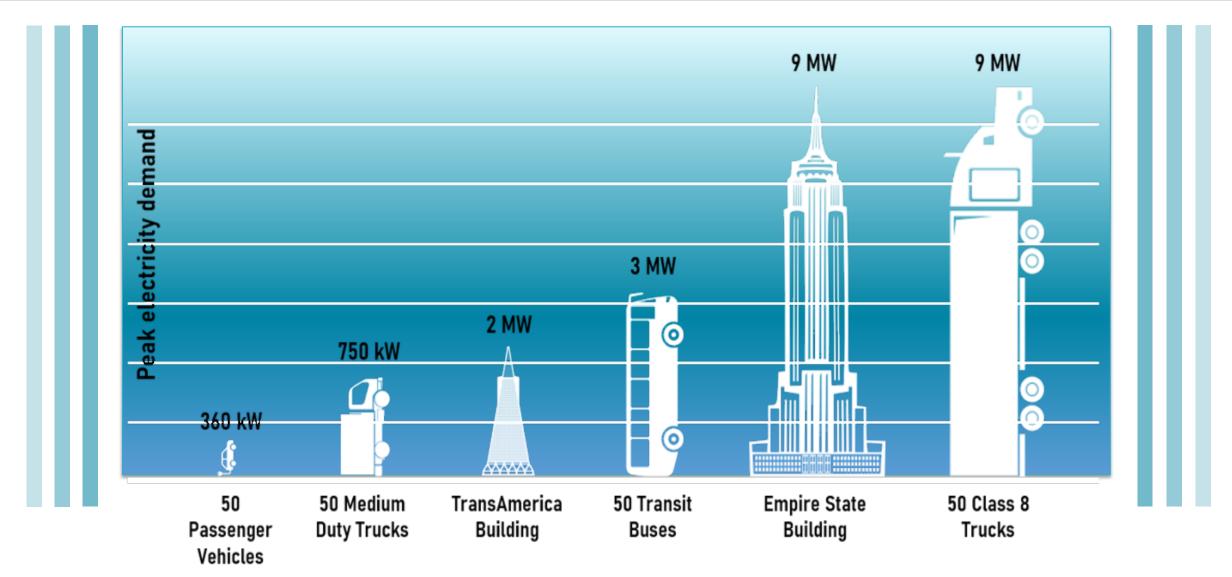


Electrified

- Class 6 trucks: ~ 100 kWh each per day
 - 10,000 kWhs in 8 hours = 1250 kW
- Class 8 trucks: ~ 400 kWh each per day
 - Assume 4-6 vehicles charging = 2 3 MW

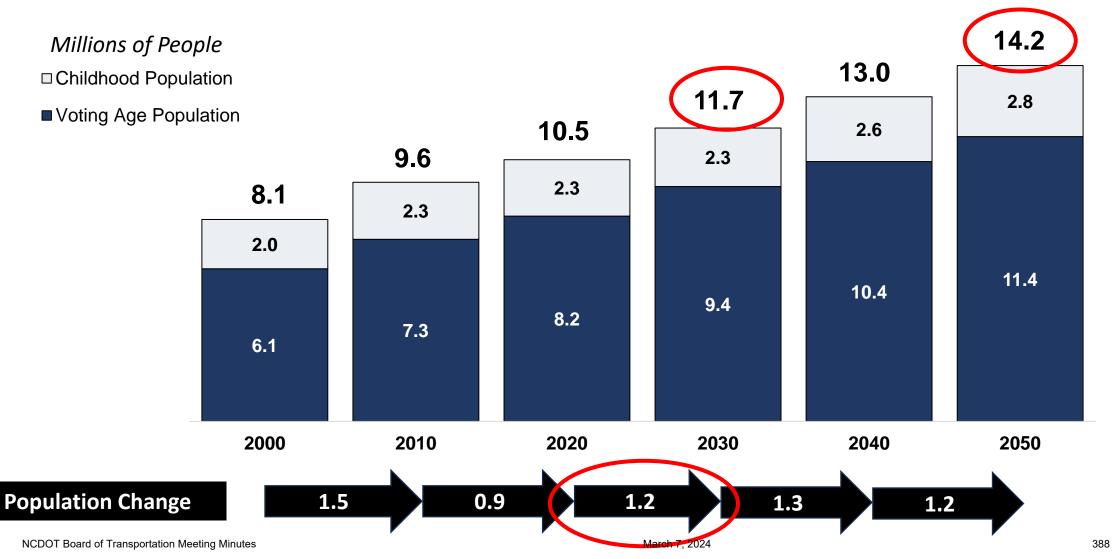

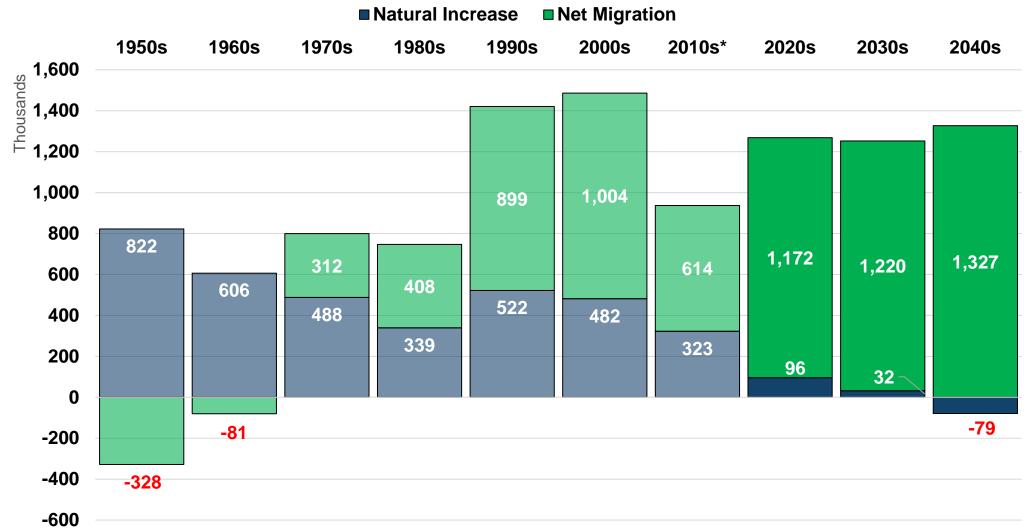
Past and Future North Carolina Resident Population

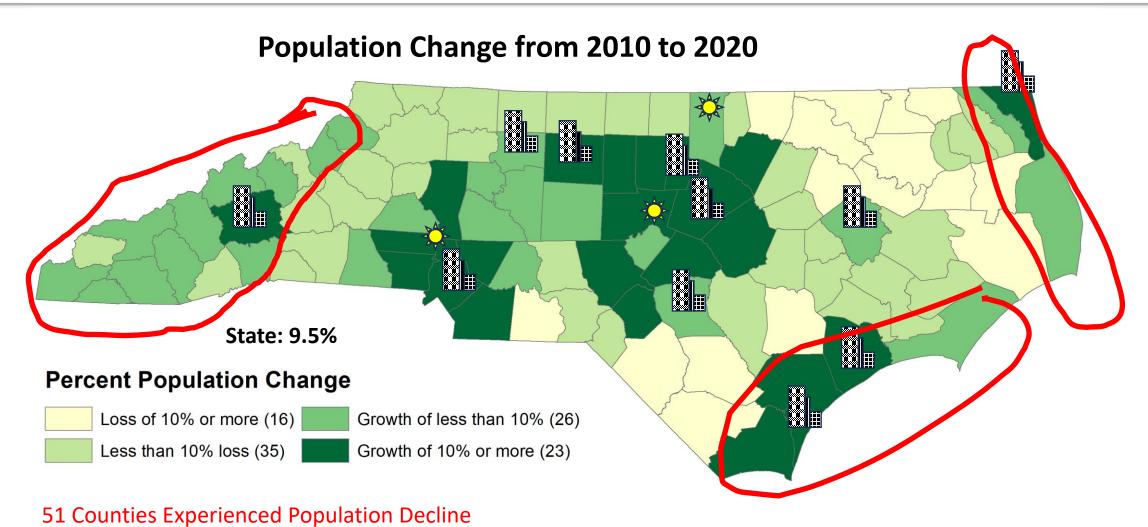

Most Population Growth in Major Urban Counties & Surrounding Areas



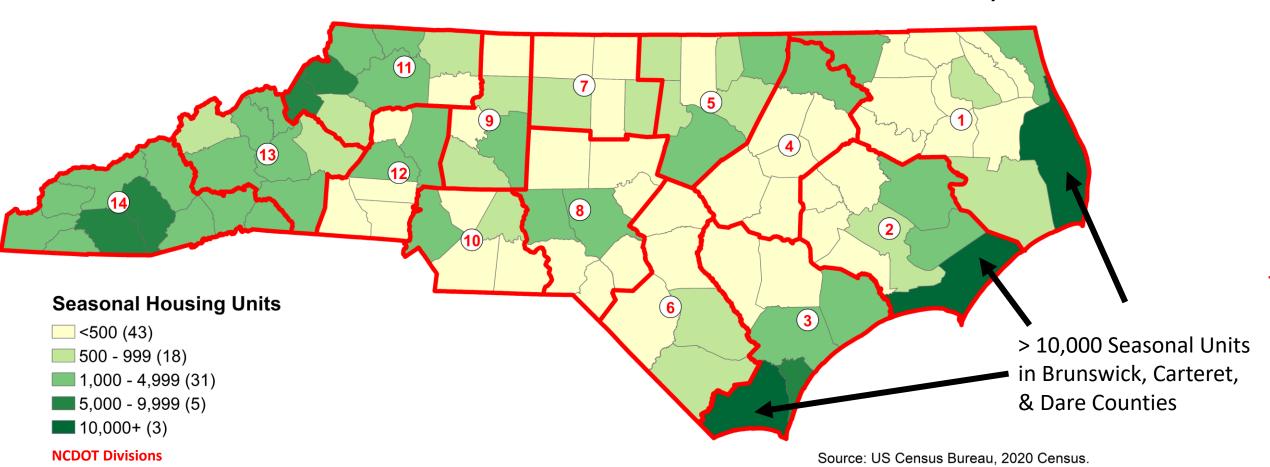

Number of Vacant Units Available for Seasonal Use, 2020



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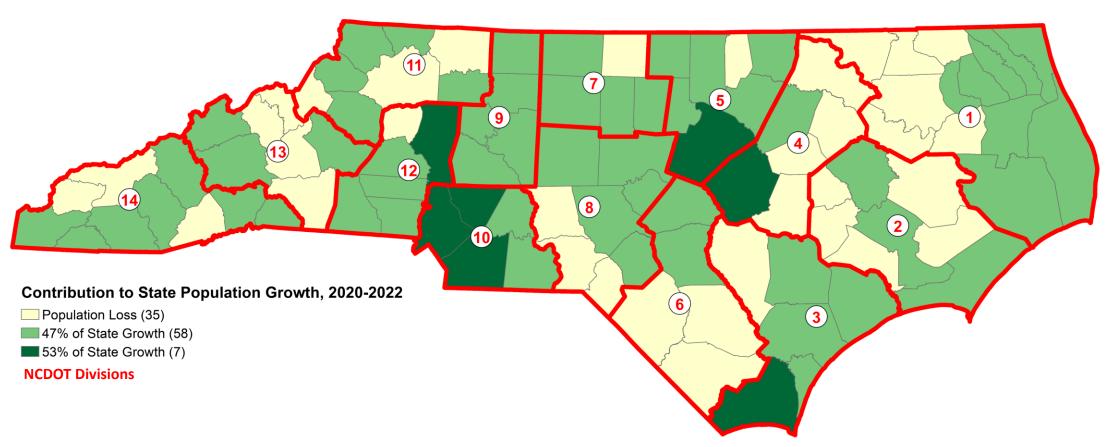

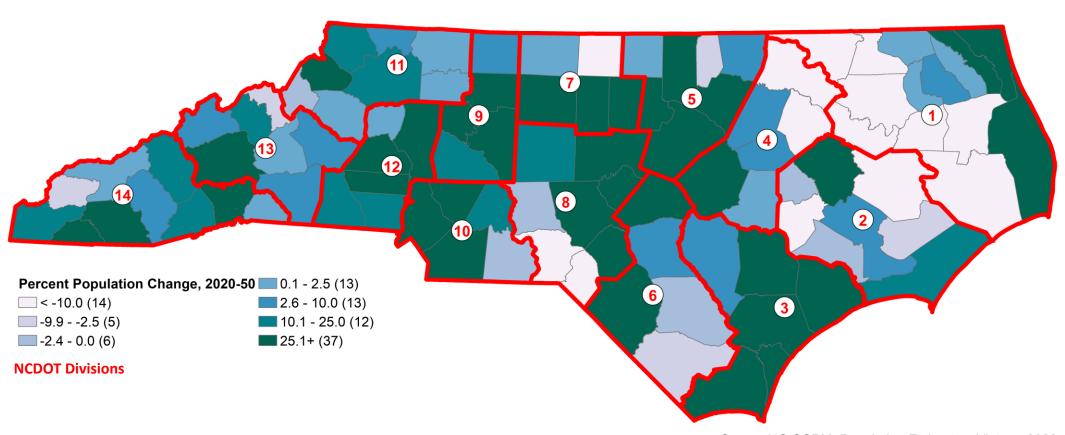

Percent Population Change from 2020 to 2050



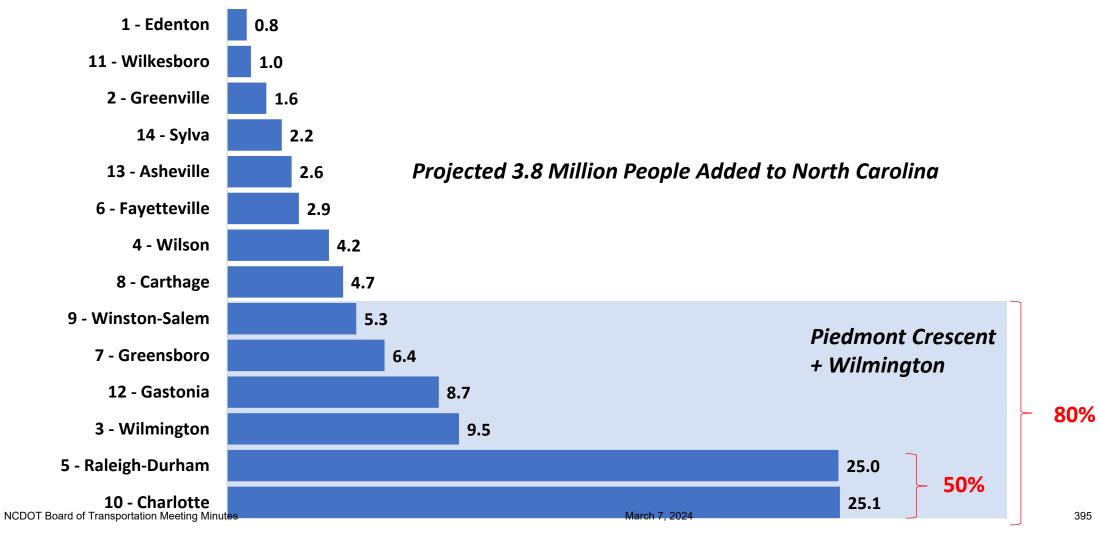

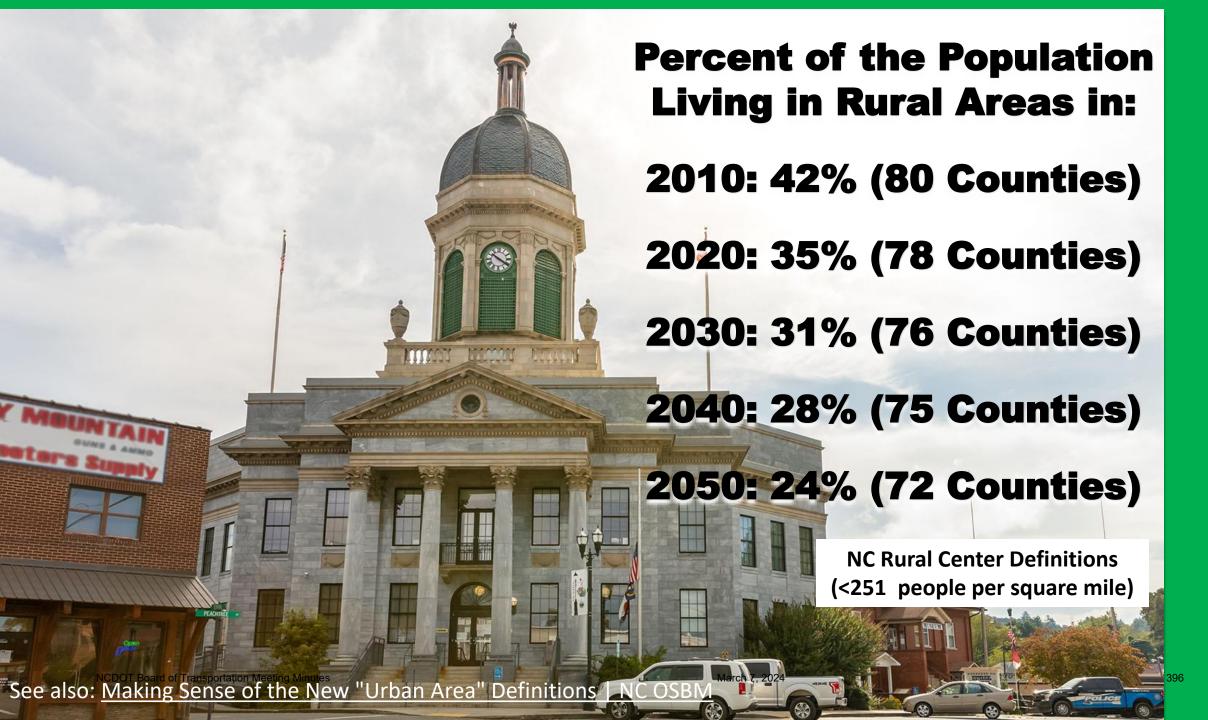


From 2020 – 2050, 50% of Growth Projected to Occur in Triangle & Charlotte Regions

NCDOT Division Contribution to Overall State Growth, 2020-2050

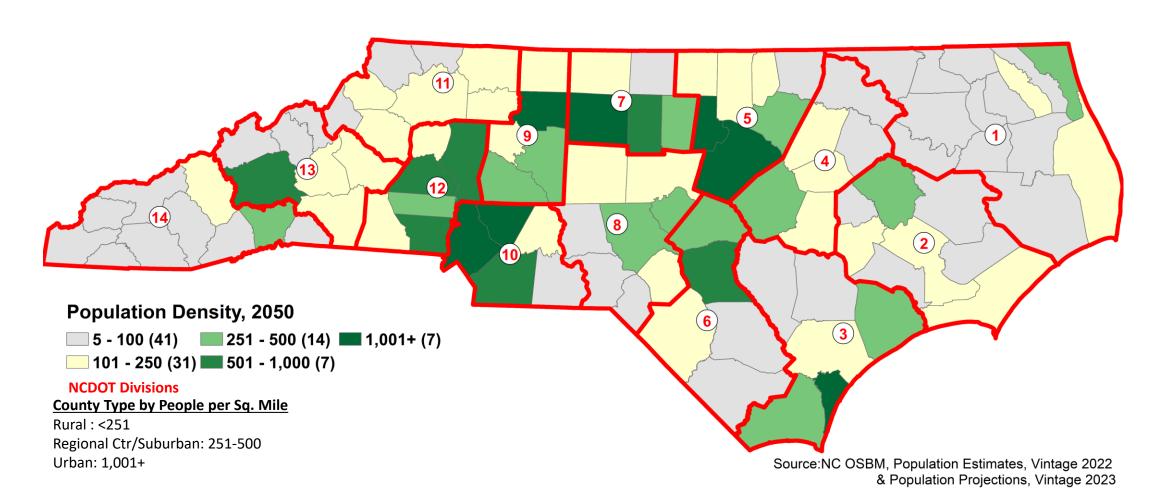








Projected Population Density in 2050



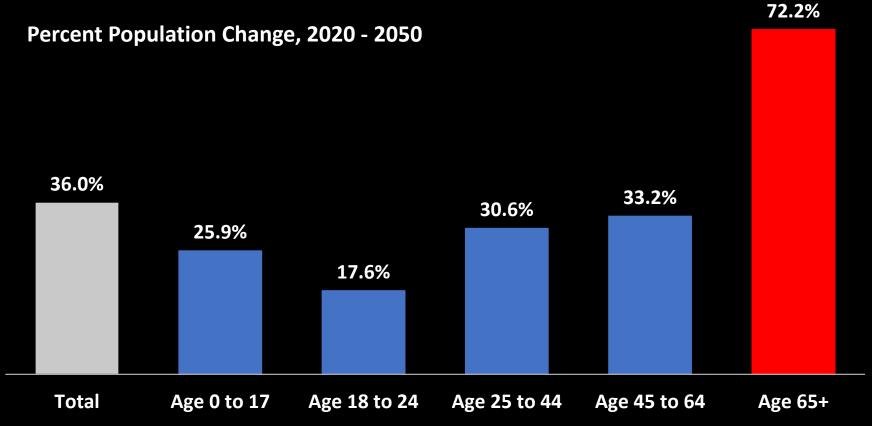
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Older Population Growing At Double the Rate of the Total Population

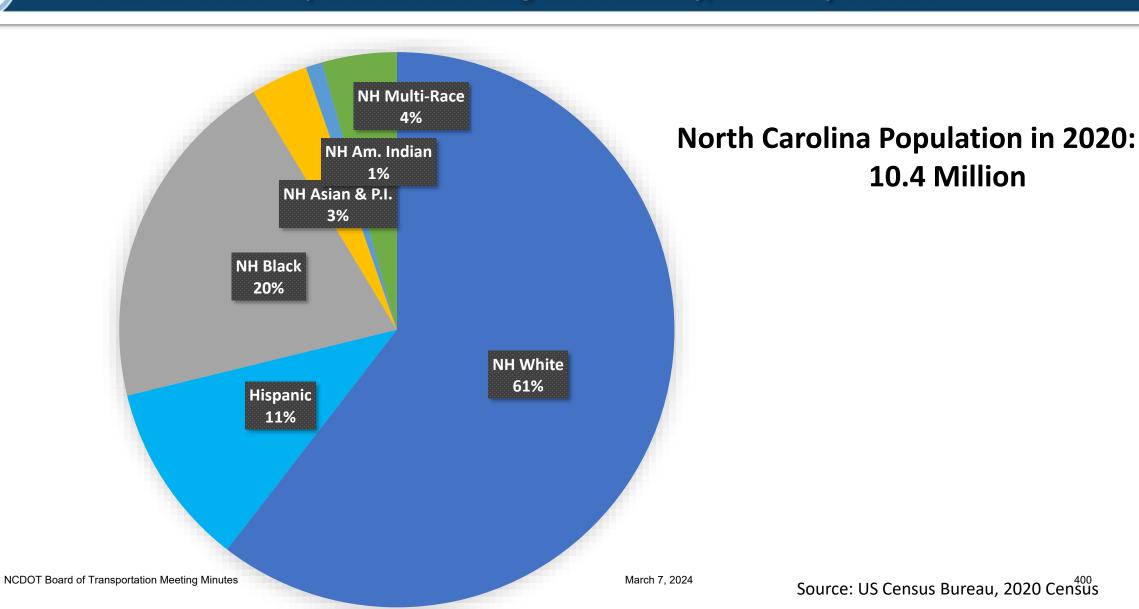

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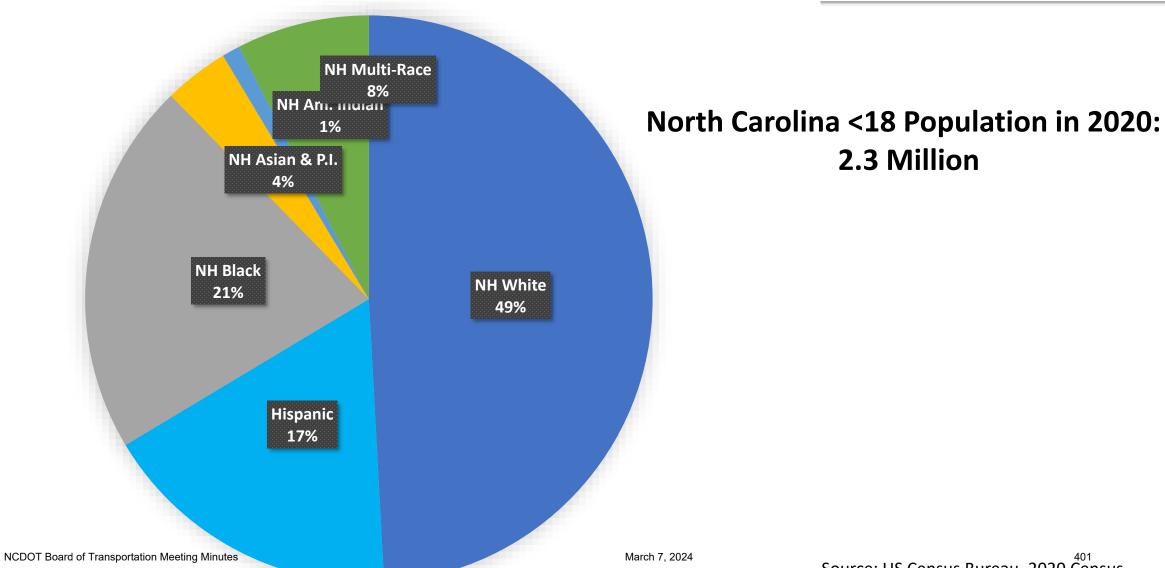


North Carolina's Population Becoming More Racially/Ethnically Diverse

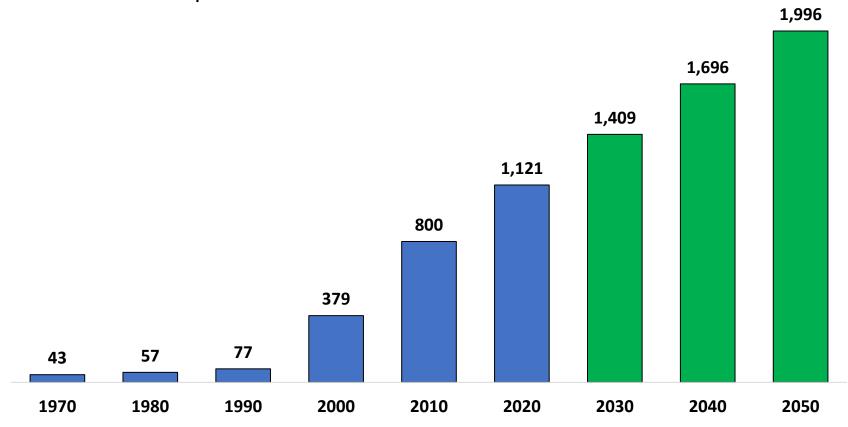




Hispanic Population Has Grown Rapidly and Continues to Grow

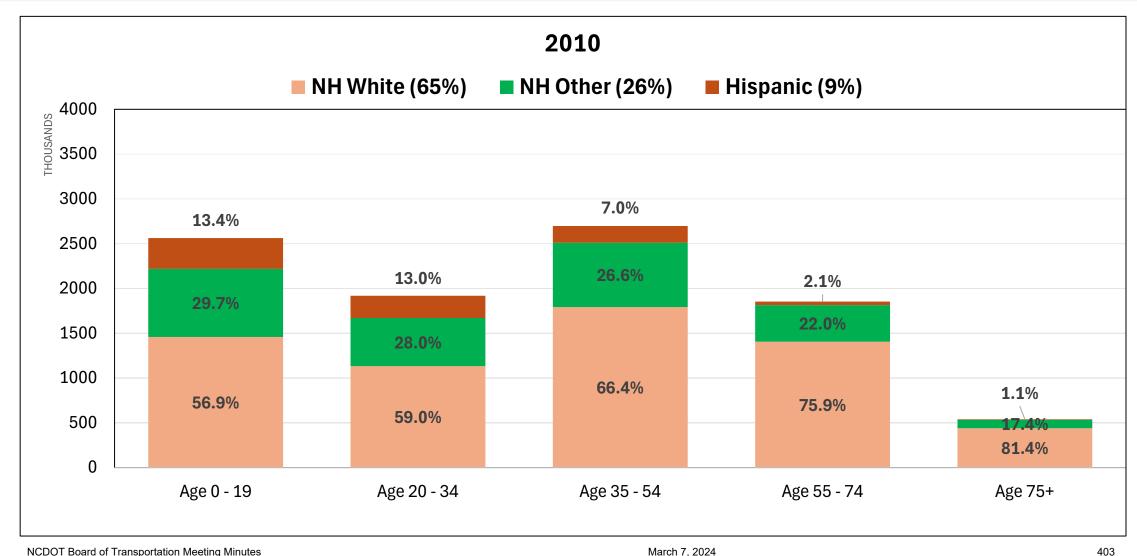
North Carolina Hispanic Population 1970 - 2010

Population by Age and Race/Ethnicity

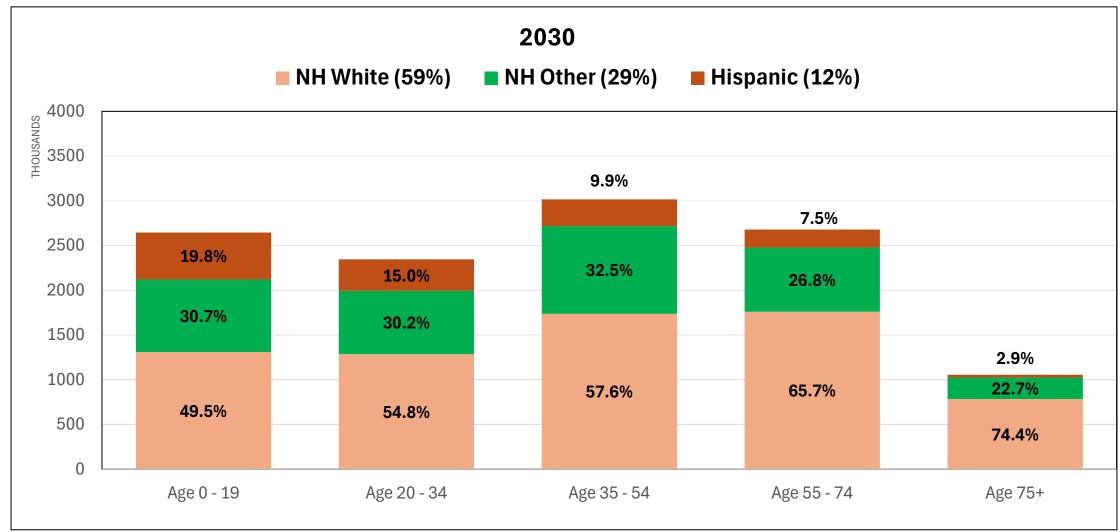

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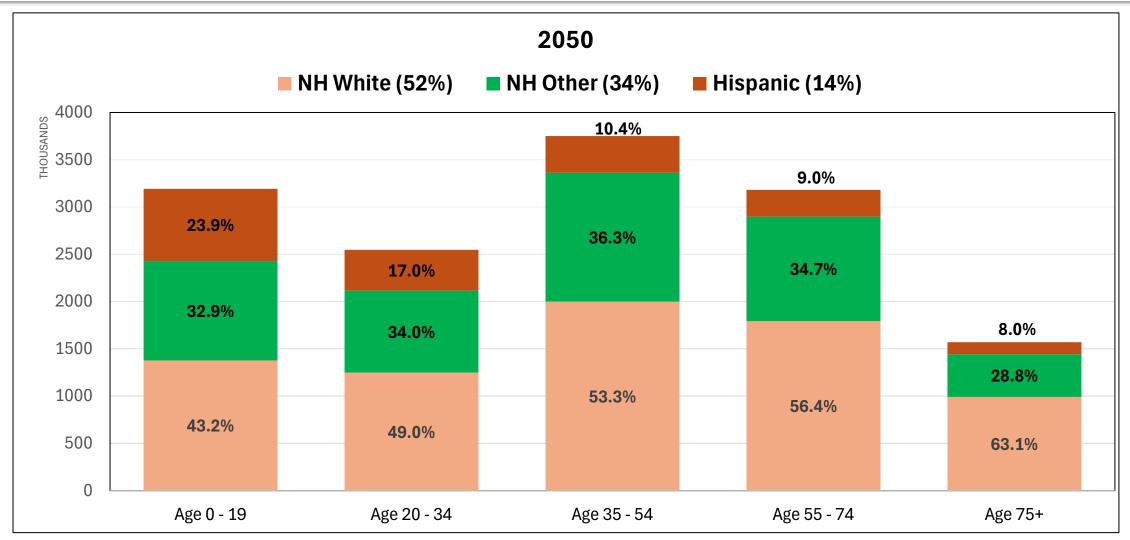

Population growth

- More drivers
- More vehicle miles travelled (VMT)
 - Even as average VMT declines
- More demand on all modes of transportation

Urbanization

- Increased congestion
- Increased demand for alternative modes of transportation
- Need to maintain transportation system in rural areas
 - Including areas with seasonal residents



Long Term Trends in Demographic Factors/Transportation Behaviors

Aging & race/ethnic change

- Attenuate rate of growth in drivers & VMT
- Increase demand for alternative transportation modes
 - Elderly giving up driving will still need transportation
- Retired drivers increase road use in non-peak commute hours
- Proportionally fewer drivers in "risky" ages suggest overall decline in crash rates
- More elderly drivers suggest increase in elderly involved in fatalities (due to frailty of people involved in crashes not severity of crashes)

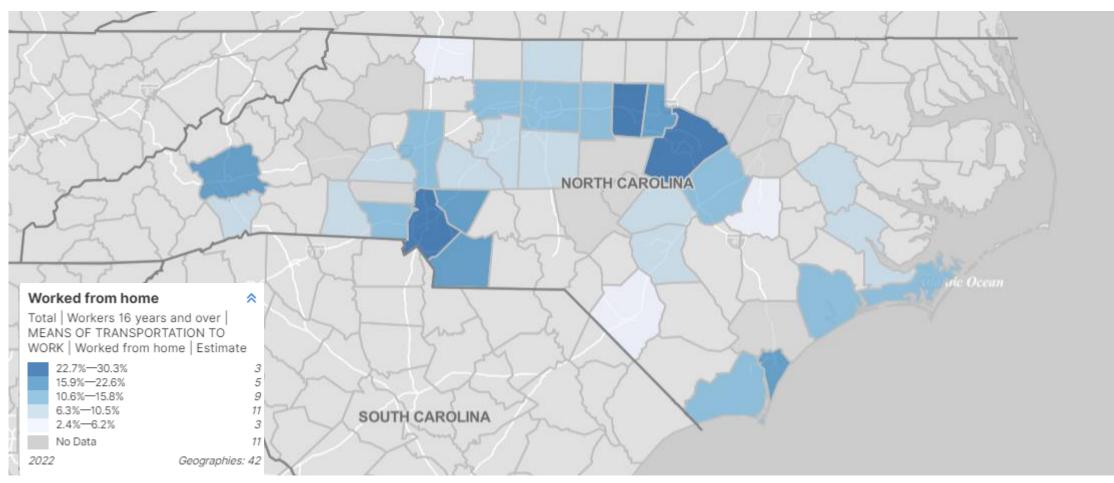

Work from Home in Select North Carolina Counties, 2022

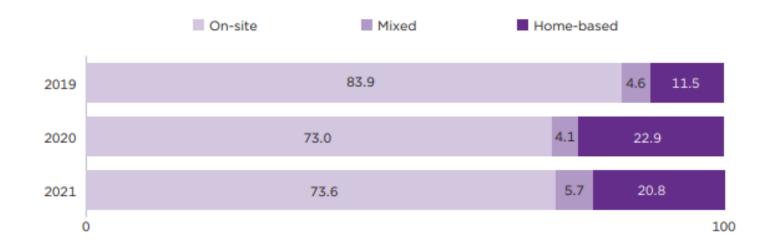
