Scholarships Provide Hope in Time of Uncertainty

The Office of HBCU Outreach at the North Carolina Department of Transportation awarded 27 scholarships at the beginning of 2020 to students attending North Carolina's HBCUs. This scholarship program was established to help students with academic success and remain in school through graduation and to build a pipeline of new transportation leaders.



Demarest Barnes attends Fayetteville State University and is a third year computer science major. Demarest was also a 2019 HBCU summer intern in the Enterprise Applications & Testing Services Unit with NCDIT. In his wordsDemarest is "blessed and very proud to be a 2020 recipient of the N.C. HBCU/MSI Transportation Scholarship Award. This scholarship is a financial blessing to me and my family as it helped immensely with my college tuition."

Africa Coardes is a senior at Bennett College. In the fall, she will be attending graduate school in social work at Radford University. For Africa, winning the scholarship "helped take away some of the financial burden of being a first generation college student. I am honored to have been a recipient of this great award."





Tysean Wooten is a senior at North Carolina Central University majoring in environmental and geospatial science. Receiving the scholarship has "greatly impacted my life from being able to pay for books and part of my tuition, but also pay for my graduation dues. This scholarship has helped me finish my bachelor's degree and have less financial worry going through my last semester of college."

Valeria Pacheco, also a 2019 HBCU summer intern, is an aviation science major from Elizabeth City State University. Receiving the scholarship "has helped to pay for my flight training. By removing this financial barrier, I can continue with my education, and not having any financial concerns allows me to improve my time management for studying and learning."





Antonio Nelson is a first generation college student attending Shaw University from Trinidad and Tobago. "Being the first in my family to attend college was one of my greatest challenges, and this would have been an impossible accomplishment if it wasn't for the lights of God through the help of the HBCU Outreach at the North Carolina Department of Transportation. They helped my family and I in our time of need and made it possible for me to complete attaining my education, graduate and give my parents the chance they never had to attend college through myself."

Kiana Williams is a senior at N.C. A&T State University majoring in supply chain management. She worked in a co-op position with Georgia Pacific and is the first student from N.C. A&T to intern with Chick-fil-A, Inc. Being awarded this scholarship "has allowed me to get closer to my goal of graduating from North Carolina A&T State University by giving me peace of mind to focus on my school work and extracurriculars instead of money for tuition."



Engaging HBCU/MSI students in transportation-related research is a key objective of the Office of HBCU Outreach at NCDOT. To support this objective, the office

sponsors several HBCU/MSI students to participate in the Transportation Research Board Minority Student Fellows Program hosted by the TRB and the U.S. Federal Highway Administration.


TRB and FHWA recognize the need for all segments of the U.S. population to access safe, reliable, and cost-effective transportation. To ensure that solutions to the nation's transportation problems address people from a variety of backgrounds, TRB established the Minority Student Fellows Program in 2010 to actively explore research, ideas and solutions from diverse perspectives. This program seeks to increase the number of underrepresented minorities in the transportation field and in TRB activities. In spring 2015, FHWA committed to providing additional funding for the program, thus allowing TRB to double the size of the program.



The Fellows Program supports registration, travel, hotel, and related expenses for minority students from eligible minority-serving institutions to attend the TRB Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., and present their research at a poster or lectern session. Students benefit not only from executing and presenting their research, but also from networking with transportation professionals from around the world and participating in sessions on a variety of topics.

We are happy to highlight North Carolina Central University's Tysean Wooten who participated in the program. Tysean was a senior at NCCU majoring in environmental

and geographical science. His research paper was titled "Utilizing Geographic Information Systems to Map Transportation Barriers in Food Availability", and he presented a poster presentation among thousands of other students. He was supported by Dr. Timothy Mulrooney, his faculty mentor.



Dr. Mulrooney is associate professor and graduate coordinator of the Department of Environmental, Earth and Geospatial Sciences at North Carolina Central University. He stated, "It was a great experience for [Tysean] and it has been a pleasure seeing him develop his technical skills and foster his ever-important soft skills. He has taken every advantage of scholarship, research and internship opportunities to develop new skills and our department looks forward to him representing NCCU in the workforce in the near future."

Recognized in Public Roads

Winston-Salem State University's <u>National Summer Transportation Institute</u>, the first all-girls NSTI in the nation, was featured in the <u>spring edition of *Public Roads*</u> (see page 30 of the magazine).

JoAna McCoy, program manager with NCDOT's Office of HBCU Outreach, who oversees the stateside of NSTI stated, "I am thrilled that NCDOT was integral in assisting in funding Winston-Salem State University's first National Summer Transportation Institute Program. I firmly believe that the secret to success is preparation, opportunity and exposure, and WSSU's program provided the framework for the girls to become engaged in the field of transportation."

The NSTI Program is a key component among the Federal Highway Administration's educational initiatives. NSTI is a two- to four-week STEM program aimed at exposing students in middle and high schools – particularly minority, female and disadvantaged youth – to transportation careers and encouraging them to consider transportation-related courses of study in the areas of science, technology and math
